C. G. Lane. my trip to Mexico.
I volunteered in Capt.
W. J. Clarke's Co. Lieut. J. F. Hake
raised part of the company in
Chenland, Guilford & Bertawick
countys. we left in May 1844.

Marched on foot to Black on foot
for there went to Wilmington
Boarded steamer for Charleston. S.C.
we went aboard the old ship
Charleston for Veracruz. passed
the Island of Cuba & the
Bahama Islands. we were 33 days
crossing the ocean. landed at
Veracruz. left there under Maj.
Lally. of S.C. on our march
for the city of Mexico. had
a fight at the National Bridge
where my Brother James Lane was
wounded died in Halapa. we
had a battle at Cuyganda. we
went from Halapa or Jalapa. to the
city under Gen. Jacob Lane of
origen. we fought the retreating
forces of Santa Ana at Wamantla
where Capt. Walker of Texas
Kings was killed. This was
Santa Ana's last stand. we
remained in city of Mexico
about three months when
peace was declared.
