The Gardner-Webb College \$10,000 Competitive Scholarship Program for 1968-69 has been announced by Robert W. Ahrens, director of admissions.

Mr. Ahrens states that 10 scholarships of \$1000 each, 10 for \$550 each and 25 for \$100 each will be awarded to qualifying freshman students in the 1968-69 class. Competition for the grants is slated for March 2 and again on March 9. Students may select one of these dates for testing. Testing begins at 9:30 a.m. or both these dates in Room 101 of the A. T. Walker Science Building on the Gardner-Webb College campus.

Notice of intention to take the test should be given to the college by the student. High school seniors and graduates of good character and high moral standards who have taken the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Board and who are recommended by either their superintendent, principal, guidance counselor, or homeroom teacher, may compete for the scholarships.

The recommendation from one of the above sources must be in writing to the college before a student can take the test.

Toward Senior Status

DR. POSTON LOOKS AT THE SITUATION

Gardner-Webb has reached another milestone time in her history. The year 1968 will also be a decade for decades to come and her status will be a vital force in her upcoming efforts to become a senior college.

Dr. E. Eugene Poston, president, recently outlined in a "progress report" just where we stand at the year open. He began the report by stating the purpose of the college: "...to develop quality Christian students who think for themselves, and who will dedicate themselves to the Christian way of life in the vocation of their own choice."

"We plan to accomplish this purpose by doing these things," states Dr. Poston.

1. Giving a limited number of majors which can be financial property.
2. Continuing the pre-professional program through a maximum of two years.
3. Continuing the Associate in Arts Degree in Nursing and Business Education.
4. Discovering the needs of the larger community which will include three growing community colleges and striving to put into effect a program that will contribute to the spiritual, cultural and economic development of the community.

ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION:

We plan to be a senior college with a limited number of majors in Liberal Arts. We shall continue to operate under the Board of Trustees elected by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina with the help of a Board of Advisors elected by the Board of Trustees. We shall continue to publish a Faculty Handbook giving job descriptions, responsibilities and opportunities for faculty, administration and staff. The enrollment of Gardner-Webb College will be limited to 1,000 full-time students.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS:

The admissions policy will continue basically the same; guidance and counseling will be continued and improved; and the student recruitment program is already doing an excellent job and will be continued with the additional work of continuing communication for their graduates.

The Curriculum Committee of Gardner-Webb is presently working on the core curriculum, elective majors, a general curriculum for those who do not know what their major will be and some terminal courses. We expect a person will be required to have from 30 to 40 hours in a major.

FINANCIAL RESOURCES

We are already exceeding the maximum expenditure per student not only on the junior college level but also on the Bachelor Instruction level. Over the past ten years, the enrollment has doubled and expenditures have quadrupled. Our endowment increased from \$440,334 to \$1,903,501. The scholarship and loan programs will be regulated under the new President, Art Oliver, June Taylor.

FACULTY

The growth of our faculty has kept pace with the growth of our student body during the past 10 years. The ratio of approximately one teacher for 16 students has been maintained and is the present status of the faculty-student ratio. In order to meet the requirements of the Southern Association as regards to its two categories for faculty, namely the number with three years of study beyond the Bachelor's Degree and the number of Doctorates, the Board of Trustees has put into operation a faculty training program which allows up to five faculty members per year a leave of absence with 70 per cent of their salary given as a scholarship grant while in school. This grant is renewable for a second year. Those who take leaves are required to return to Gardner-Webb and teach five years and cannot count the grant. Gardner-Webb faculty is over half way to the goal of 60% with three years beyond the B.A. and one-third of the way on doctorates.

LIBRARY

Professional consultants (Mrs. Gladys Smith, former librarian at Winthrop College and Dr. George Louis, Director of Libraries at Mississippi State University) have studied the college library. During the academic year 1967-68 the amount of money available reflects an increase of 300 per cent. In addition a \$25,000 challenge

FROM CONVENTION

OVER \$150,000 GOES TO GARDNER-WEBB

Gardner-Webb College received \$154,345 from the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina during 1967. The college received that money as its share of \$1,252,771 budgeted by the convention to its seven colleges and three social service institutions.

The colleges are Wake Forest University (\$359,393), Campbell (\$272,771), Chowan (\$183,300), Miles Hill (\$254,364), Meredith (\$183,660), Wingate (\$171,253) and the Council on Christian Higher Education \$11,000 in addition to Gardner-Webb.

Twenty-six per cent of the 1968 budget of the convention will go for Christian education. This is estimated at \$1,664,600 as based on the Cooperative Program budget of \$6,300,000.

The social service organizations are the N. C. Baptist Children's Homes at Thomserville, the Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem and the N. C. Baptist Homes for the Aging.

The goal is \$5,000 volumes in six years. Total seating is 280 with the entire building now devoted to library use. Twenty study carrels have been added and 342 files are set for microfilm work added. The library is open 77 hours a week and a great deal of furniture shifting, etc. has been added.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

The present set-up continues with the Dean of Students, assisted by the Dean of Women and Dean of Men, responsible for student life and a faculty committee and athletic director responsible for athletics.

PHYSICAL PLANT

Orderly growth of the campus is insured through a master plan laid out by Robert H. Recker, landscape architect from the University of Oklahoma. Campus beautification continues and a recent study of insurance has brought about an adequate program for all college property. A new dormitory for men is under construction enabling the college to house 840 students on campus. The remainder of the student body is expected to be made up of commuting students.

SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

Two semester terms will be continued. No extension courses or bimonthly are planned and there are no plans for any aspect of graduate programs.

RESEARCH

Teacher effectiveness will be stressed. Plans are being formulated to encourage individual research and writing for publication in order to build competency within the teacher fields.

DR. ZENO WALL LIBRARY DONATED

The Zeno Wall Library, numbering more than 700 volumes, has been donated to Gardner-Webb College by Dr. Wall's children. Woodrow Wall, to whom the books were willed at the death of his father, stated, "Because of daddy's very vital interest in the college, the family decided that his books should be given to Gardner-Webb, and it is my personal desire that they be a memorial than all the children."

Described as one of the "giant" in North Carolina Baptist life by the BIBLICAL RECORDER, Dr. Wall died September 12, 1957, at the age of 85. He served as president of Gardner-Webb College from 1930-32 and was for 25 years pastor of Shelby's First Baptist Church. His service to the state and the convention ranged from President of the convention for four consecutive terms to a wide range of committee assignments and other vital functions.
