## \$10,000 in Scholarships Are Available

The Gardner-Webb College \$10,000 Competitive Scholarship Program for 1968-69 has been announced by Robert W. Abrams, director of admissions.

Mr. Abrams states that 10 scholarships of \$500 each, 10 for \$350 each and 25 for \$100 each will be awarded to qualifying freshmen students in the 1968-69 class. Competition for the grants is slated for March 2 and again on March 9. Students may select one of these dates for testing. Tests begin at 9:30 a.m. on both these dates in Room 101 of the A. T. Withrow Science Building on the Gardner-Webb College campus.

Notice of intention to take the test should be given the college by the student. High school teachers and graduates of good character and high moral standards who have taken the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Board and who are recommended by either their superintendent, principal, guidance counselor, or classroom teacher, may compete for the scholarships.

The recommendation from one of the above mentioned must be in writing to the college before a student can take the test.

## Toward Senior Status

### DR. POSTON LOOKS AT THE SITUATION

Gardner-Webb has reached another milestone time in her history. The year 1968 will also be 60 years for decades to come and her eternal will be a vital force in her ongoing efforts to become a senior college.

Dr. E. Eugene Poston, president, recently outlined in a "progress report" just where we stand in the past years. He began the report by stating the purpose of the college: ". . . to develop quality Christian students who think for themselves, and who will dedicate themselves to the Christian way of life in the vocation of their own choice."

"We plan to accomplish this purpose by doing these things," states Dr. Poston:

1. Giving a limited number of majors which can be financed properly,
2. Continuing the pre-professional program through a maximum of two years,
3. Continuing the Associate in Arts Degree in Nursing and Business Education,
4. Discovering the needs of the larger community which will include three growing community colleges and striving to put into effect a program that will contribute to the spiritual, cultural and economic development of the community.

### ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION:

We plan to be a senior college with a limited number of majors in Liberal Arts. We shall continue to operate under the Board of Trustees elected by the People's State Convention of North Carolina with the help of a Board of Advisors elected by the Board of Trustees. We shall continue to publish a faculty handbook giving job descriptions, responsibilities and opportunities for faculty, administration and staff. The enrollment of Gardner-Webb College will be limited to 1,000 full-time students.

### EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM:

The admissions policy will continue basically the same; guidance and counseling will be continued and improved, and the student recruitment program is already doing an excellent job and will be continued with the additional work of contacting community colleges for their graduates.

The Curriculum Committee of Gardner-Webb is presently working on the core curriculum, core courses, a general curriculum for those who do not know what their major will be and some terminal courses. We expect a person will be required to have from 32 to 60 hours in a major.

Three excellent programs are scheduled for March 4-8 at Gardner-Webb College as part of its Distinguished Artist Series for 1967-68.

Throughout the week students, faculty, staff and guests will enjoy the second major art exhibit of the year when the Spring Art Exhibit is displayed. Recently the nationally known "Great Ideas of Western Man" exhibit was seen at the college through the cooperation of the Container Corporation of America.

To initiate the week Sergio Luca, violinist, will perform at 8 p.m., Monday, March 4, 1968, in the E. B. Harwell Building. At 8 p.m., Tuesday, March 5, Chema McLinton will bring his concertists and a soloist for an evening of entertainment.

Look in less than six years in this country has been eagerly engaged by leading American orchestras, including the Detroit, Dallas, Oklahoma City and San Diego Symphonies as well as the New York Philharmonic and Philadelphia Orchestras.

McGlotha's 90 minute concert is a new concept in jazz and, in fact, tells the story of jazz with such masterful poise as a concert. Beethoven to jazz setting serious works by Cesar Franck and Bach, an original Alec Wilder composition, grass roots blues, Dixieland, Swing, Boss Nova, and, of course, the great jazz standards.

The Springs Mill Co. has made the Springs Art Exhibit (which changes each year) available to the college for the third consecutive year. Gardner-Webb takes pride in making current art available for its students and the public to view.

### FINANCIAL RESOURCES

We are already exceeding the minimum expenditure per student set only on the junior college level but also on the Bachelor Institution level. Over the past two years, the enrollment has doubled and expenditures have quadrupled. Our endowment increased from \$440,344 to \$1,503,507. The scholarship and loan program will be tripled under the new Financial Aid Officer, Jesse Taylor.

### FACULTY

The growth of our faculty has kept pace with the growth of our student body during the past 16 years. The ratio of approximately one teacher for 18 students has been maintained and is the present ratio of the faculty-student ratio. In order to meet the requirements of the Southern Association in regard to its two categories for faculty, namely the number with three years of study beyond the Bachelor's Degree and the number of Doctorates, the Board of Trustees has set into operation a faculty training program which allows up to five faculty members per year a leave of absence with 70 per cent of their salary given as a scholarship grant while in school. This grant is renewable for a second year. Those who take leaves are required to return to Gardner-Webb and teach five years and cancel out the grant. Gardner-Webb faculty is over half way to the goal of 60% with three years beyond the B.A., and one-third of the way on doctorates.

### LIBRARY

Professional consultants (Mrs. Gladys Smith, former librarian at Winthrop College and Dr. George Logan, director of libraries at Mississippi State University) have studied the college library. During the academic year 1967-68 the amount of money available reflects an increase of 300 per cent. In addition a \$25,000 challenge

gift was met. Mrs. Royce Ellis, head librarian, states that 10,000 new volumes will be added to our shelves during the academic year and it is planned that this will be duplicated for the next six years. The goal is 80,000 volumes in six years. Total seating is 280 with the entire building now devoted to library use. Twenty study carrels have been added and 542 files set for microfilm work added. The library is open 77 hours a week and a great deal of furniture shuffling, etc. has been added.

### STUDENT ACTIVITIES

The present set-up continues with the Dean of Students, assisted by the Deans of Women and Men, responsible for student life and a faculty committee and athletic director responsible for athletics.

### PHYSICAL PLANT

Priority growth of the campus is insured through a master plan filed out by Robert H. Rucker, landscape architect from the University of Oklahoma. Campus beautification continues and a recent study of insurance has brought about an adequate program for all college property. A new dormitory for men is under construction enabling the college to house 800 students on campus. The remainder of the student body is expected to be made up of commuting students.

### SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

Two summer terms will be continued. No extension courses or branchs are planned and there are no plans for any aspect of graduate programs.

### RESEARCH

Teacher effectiveness will be stressed. Plans are being formulated to encourage individual research and writing for publication in order to build competency within the teacher fields.

## FROM CONVENTION

## OVER \$150,000 GOES TO GARDNER-WEBB

Gardner-Webb College received \$151,943 from the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina during 1967. The college received this money as its share of \$2,252,771 budgeted by the convention to its seven colleges and three social service institutions.

The colleges are Wake Forest University (\$599,970), Campbell (\$272,377), Chowan (\$385,600), Mars Hill (\$254,894), Meredith (\$254,600), Wiggins (\$171,252) and the Council on Christian Higher Education \$13,000 in addition to Gardner-Webb.

Twenty-six per cent of the 1968 budget of the convention will go for Christian education. This is estimated at \$1,804,000 as based on the Cooperative Program budget of \$6,900,000.

The social service organizations are the N. C. Baptist Children's Homes at Thomasville, the Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem and the N. C. Baptist Homes for the Aged.

## DR. ZENO WALL LIBRARY DONATED

The Zeno Wall Library, numbering more than 700 volumes, has been donated to Gardner-Webb College by Dr. Wall's children, Woodrow Wall, to whom the books were willed at the death of his father, stated, "Because of dad's very vital interest in the college, the family decided that his books should be given to Gardner-Webb, and it is my personal desire that they be a memorial from all the children."

Described as one of the "giants" in North Carolina Baptist life by the BIBLICAL RECORDER, Dr. Wall died September 12, 1957, at the age of 85. He served as president of Gardner-Webb College from 1950-52 and was for 25 years pastor of Shelby's First Baptist Church. His service to the state and the convention ranged from President of the convention for four consecutive terms to a wide range of committee assignments and other vital functions.
