Former Shelbian - - Jeanne Grealish Will Present Two Spring Concerts

Jeanne Grealish, mezzo-soprano, will present two spring concerts in this area; the first one will be held at Gardner-Webb College, Tuesday, April 7, and the second at Central Methodist Church on Thursday, April 9. Both concerts will begin at 8 p.m.

Accompanying her at the piano will be Miss Jane Snow. Both artists are currently on the roster of Community Concerts, Columbia Artist Management; and are on the faculty of the University of New Mexico.

A former Shelbian, Miss Grealish attended the Shelby City Schools, and was graduated from Shelby High School in 1953. She studied voice under Mrs. Robert Gidney.

A graduate of Meredith College, her background includes the New England Conservatory,

the Vienna Academy of Music, and the Vienna State Opera where she received special training. Foremost among her coaches have been Lotte Lehmann, Elizabeth Hoengen, Povla Frijsh, Edwin McArthur and Erik Werbs.

Miss Grealish has received international recognition for opera and oratorio appearances and solo recitals. She has been soloist with such groups as the Vienna and Paris Jeunesse Musicale, Vienna Chamber Orchestra, Innsbruck Radio Orchestra, Chautauqua Festival Orchestra and Brevard Festival Orchestra. The versatile mezzo was invited to appear with the Vienna Chamber Opera during the renowned Vienna Music Festival. Miss Grealish has been heard throughout Europe and the United States, wherever she sings, glowing reviews

follow.

At the age of 18, Jane Snow made her debut as a pianist playing the Saint-Saens' G. Minor Concerto with the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra.

Miss Snow was trained at the Cincinnati College-Conservatory and the Julliard School of Music, studying piano with Leon Conus, Hans Rischard and Percy Grainger. She has also studied extensively in Europe.

Arrangements for the Gardner-Webb Concert are being handled by Jerry Hill. Ticket holders will be admitted there, but will not turn in their tickets, but use them again Thursday evening at the Central Methodist Church concert.

Mrs. U. L. Patterson, fine arts patron, announces that tickets are \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for students and may be obtained from choir members of churches in the city and county and from civic organizations. Tickets must be bought prior to the concert. None can be sold at the college or the church.
