








A View of the Sanctuary, From Back


FACING THE FUTURE

Historical Sketch

The First Baptist Church was organized on the third Sunday in June, 1878, with twenty-eight charter members; viz:

The place of organization was the old Methodist Church house, known as Elam Methodist, then located on grounds now occupied by the Central Grammar School. For a short while, the new church worshipped in Carey Hall. During the following summer, a brush arbor and an old barn, located on the back of the lot now occupied, was used for worship.

Col. Wm. W. Gaffney, a son of first Deacon H. G. Gaffney, donated to the church a lot on the corner of Limestone and Smith Streets, valued at \$600.000, on which was built a wooden church at a cost of \$1,400.00. This church served until 1899.

Rev. W. L. Brown served as pastor for four years, from June, 1878 until November, 1882. The outstanding accomplishments during his pastorate were: the building of the house of worship; the erection of a small parsonage on the rear of the church lot, and a slight increase in the church membership. The church joined Spartanburg Association, remaining with this group until 1899 when it changed to the Broad River Association.

The second pastor of First Baptist, Rev. T. W. Smith, served only five months when he died.

In May, 1883, Rev. I. W. Wingo was called to serve as pastor, and remained here until January, 1892. When Rev. Wingo took up the pastorate of this church there were sixty members; upon his retirement there were one hundred, thirty-four. During this time there were several wonderful revivals, especially in the year 1886. The church held services twice a month and greatly prospered during this period.

In February, 1892, Rev. B. P. Robertson, then a student in the Southern Baptist Seminary, was called as full time pastor, at a salary of \$700.00 per annum. The first thing the church did was to remodel the building at a cost of \$400.00. During the pastorate of Bro. Robertson the church grew and by September 11, 1899, there had been additions to bring the membership up from 134 to 320. In 1899 the second build for First Baptist was constructed on the same site at a cost of about \$50,000.00.

On July 28, 1896, a second Baptist Church was organized through the assistance of First Baptist. On this same day our church was changed from Gaffney Baptist to First Baptist and the second church came to be called Cherokee Avenue Baptist.

In the spring of 1897 the ladies undertook and succeeded in raising money for a new pastorium. The lot on Montgomery Street cost \$300.00 and the building was constructed at a cost of \$800.00. The pastor moved into the new house in July, 1897. This same year First Baptist aided Cherokee Avenue in constructing a new building. Gaffney Manufacturing Company gave the lot and \$1,000.00 toward its construction.

- Dr. A. C. Cree became pastor of First Baptist in 1900 and in that year the second building was dedicated.
- Dr. A. M. Simms became pastor in 1903. During his tenure, the Sunday School was graded and Southern Baptist literature was used from then on.
- Dr. J. S. Dill assumed the care of the church in 1911. Finding need for more Sunday School space, money was raised and a building added to the main sanctuary. In 1913, the annex was dedicated. When Dr. Dill resigned in 1919, there was a membership of 656.
- Dr. R. C. Granberry, during 1919, became next pastor, serving the church until he was elected President of Limestone College in 1924. This was the period of the 75 Million Campaign. The church pledged \$90,000.00 to this drive and paid the full amount. This was a wonderful achievement for the church.
- Dr. Cecil V. Cook became pastor in 1924 following Dr. Granberry and served for three years. During his stay the present parsonage was built at a cost of \$12,000.00.
- In 1927, Dr. R. A. MacFarland became pastor of the church and served until 1933. Though pinched by the great depression, the church grew in membership and spirituality. The rotation of church officers was begun under his leadership.
- Dr. D. A. Howard accepted the pastorate of the church in 1933, serving here for ten years. During his stay the present four-story educational building was erected at a cost of \$52,471.00. Dr. Howard left behind him a fine monument to remind us of his noble, quiet leadership. In 1941 this building was occupied.

September, 1943, Dr. D. M. Rivers began the pastorate of the church. Under his leadership the debt against the church was liquidated and a Building Fund reserve amounting to \$50,000.00 was collected. Dr. Rivers made a fine contribution to the spirit and growth of the church.

On January 15, 1948, Rev. Frank E. Morris came to be with us. During his pastorate, plans were made and a new house of worship was constructed at a cost of \$450,000.00. During his pastorate the membership has grown to around 1,500. The church stands near the top among the leading churches of the state in income, remaining around seventh to fifth place in gifts to missions.

It is interesting to note that Mr. Morris aided in conducting the funeral of Rev. B. P. Robertson in the old church building which Mr. Robertson helped to construct. This took place just prior to the demolishing of the building to make way for the present structure.

The future of the church is just as bright as the promises of God.
