Dr. Poston Pledges To Continue To Build Institution Which Will Bring Honor To College's Namesakes

Dr. Eugene Poston, speaking at the funeral of Mrs. Gardner, said, "She had the unusual ability to put first things first in religious life, government, community and civic service. Service to her fellowmen was always first with her and this is the essence of Christianity. As President of Gardner-Webb College, I can assure you we dedicate ourselves to building an institution that will honor the name of Gardner and Mrs. O. Max Gardner."

In a newspaper quote, Dr. Poston said, "Personally she was one of the finest Christian spirits I have ever met. She helped and encouraged me greatly through the years."

Scripture read at the funeral was Proverbs 31: 30-31.

COLLEGE WAS NAMED IN HONOR OF GARDNER-WEBB FAMILIES

Mrs. O. Max Gardner, Sr., 83, wife of the late O. Max Gardner, governor of North Carolina (1929-32) and one of the staunchest supporters of Gardner-Webb College for decades died at 2 a.m., Thursday, Jan. 16.

Mrs. Gardner suffered a stroke on Jan. 11 and was hospitalized in Charlotte until the time of her death. She was born Sept. 7, 1885, in Shelby and was the daughter of the late Judge and Mrs. James L. Webb.

It was, in a great way, through the work of the Gardner and Webb families that the Boiling Springs Junior College began the program which has led it to today's outstanding position. The school was named in honor of the two families in July of 1947.

The O. Max Gardner Fine Arts Center, the James Webb Auditorium (Decker) Hall, the new home for the President, and the Webb Administration Building stand as monuments to the vital work done by these families in the progress of the college.

Mrs. Gardner and her sons continued support of the college after the death of Mr. Gardner and her work on the Board of Trustees encompassed the entire sphere of work at the school.

Funeral services were held Jan. 17 at the First Baptist Church of Shelby with Dr. E. Eugene Poston and Rev. Roland Lott officiating, assisted by Rev. Marice Dabow. Burial was in Sunset Cemetery in Shelby and, at the family's request, went to go to Gardner-Webb College.

Mrs. Gardner was a graduate with honors from the Lucy Cobb school for girls in Athens, Ga. She traveled widely before and after her marriage, having given abroad four times and toured most of the United States.

When her husband was governor, she was considered a charming "first lady" and also called "Climax-king". She was a benefactor of many charitable, cultural, religious and educational institutions and agencies. Her interests in North Carolina have encompassed the state.

Her husband was in the Treason Little Cabinet as under secretary of the treasury and was appointed Ambassador to Great Britain by President Harry Truman.

Mrs. Gardner was a popular member of Washington society. She was a life member of the Woman's National Democratic Club, being one of four honorary vice presidents. She also belonged to the Colonial Dames of America, Washington Chapter, the 1925 F. Street Club, and was a life member of the Y.W.C.A. there.

Mrs. Gardner was a sister-in-law of the late Sen. Clyde R. Hoey and a niece of the late federal judge E. Yaiza Webb.

She is survived by her daughter, Mrs. Margaret Love Burgess, of McPherson, N. J., and her son, Ralph O. Max Gardner, Her son, James Webb Gardner, died Jan. 19, 1946, and O. Max Gardner, Jr., who died Nov. 10, 1961. She also leaves six grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

College Serves Denominational Needs

Gardner-Webb College is serving Baptists. The educational junior college, now on the brink of becoming a four year school, has over 100 students studying for some phase of Fellowship Christian work.

While the majority of the 1,300 students are not attending fulltime Christian service, it is felt by the college administration that the philosophy of the school is helping develop many of these into strong leaders with an insight into the problems faced by the modern church.

Areas of service listed among the 100 are the ministry, ministry of music, religious education, deacons, church secretaries, youth directors, foreign missions, home missions and teaching in the area of Bible and religion.

While all of these students are studying for future service, they are also taking part in a planned program of study and athletics which is designed to upgrade their regular studies. The Ministerial Association, the Baptist Student Union, the Young Woman's Auxiliary, and the Fellowship of Christianes United in Service are organizations which help put them into the extra work by these students.

A preaching clinic is held for ministerial students who will be going to area churches to fill pulpits. All services are held each month in Shelby, and during the first semester of this school year there were 31 pulpits filled by GW students in addition to the 11 churches who have GW students as fulltime workers.

The Student Prayer Service on Wednesday evenings attracts an average of 80 students and always popular are the Morning Watch services held twice a week and a Prayer Breakfast held Thursdays.

Through the cooperation of area radio stations, students have an opportunity to do 10 minute weekly programs and learn the value of broadcast and taping methods.

All of this coupled with lectures on marriage counseling, hospital visitation, Baptism and other areas where a practical approach is needed for training, help give the college a well rounded approach to the training of future Christian leaders.

Rev. Charles (Buddy) Francis, college minister, is referring some of the present approaches to fulltime Christian work states that there are plans for considerable expansion in these areas some of which will be announced in the future.

FIRST ANNUAL FUND INVITES YOUR HELP

The vast majority of Gardner-Webb's alumni haven't as yet taken advantage of the opportunity to help the cause of Christian higher education at a time when help is most desperately needed.

Our first Annual Fund has a record of slow but steady progress. These things are slow because the average alumnus just doesn't know how urgently his slow meter needs his support. He doesn't realize the value of the combined gifts of the alumni to an institution. If each of Gardner-Webb's alumnus gave \$10 per year toward her support, that would give her about \$70,000 annually to provide that margin of excellence that spells quality and greater service to our young men and women—that magic thing that you catch in the campus spirit and you see in the progress of the program and plants.

As Gardner-Webb grows into a four-year institution, these things will be needed for her to continue her status and Southern Association accreditation and to compete with the well established four-year colleges. Victor, mascot of the Gardner-Webb College Bulldogs for nine years, died Jan. 5. The huge bulldog which had been cared for by Bud McSwain, postmaster at Boiling Springs, for many years died over a dramatic period of the College's growing athletic program.

During the same years, Victor saw two Region 10 football titles, four Western Carolina Junior College football titles, three Western Carolina Conference basketball titles, a Region 10 basketball title, a Region 10 baseball title, and two teams named into national playoffs, and two conference golf titles.

Ironically, his death comes at a time when the college is making a transition from junior to senior college athletics. His son, Victor II, will now take over the position. He also is being cared for by McSwain who does this as a service to G-W and its athletic program.

Bulldogs Advance In National Poll

Gardner-Webb College's basketball team is ranked eighth in the nation after coming through the first half of a rugged schedule with a 10-1 mark.

The Bulldogs have won in four games with Atlanta Coast Conference freshmen anti; defeated DeKalb of Georgia, Brandywine of Delaware, Miami Dade of Florida, and Abraham Baldwin of Ga. in interregional clashes and remain unbeaten in Region 10 play.

The lane defeat was a startling 136-109 upset at Fort Pierce, Fla. by Indian River Junior College.


