THEODOSIUS BARTON (Bart) FORD IS FIRST JUNIOR AT GARDNER-WEBB

BOILING SPRINGS, N. C. — Theodosius Barton (Bart) Ford of Greenville, S. C., and the Baptist State Convention of N. C. made corroboring decisions on Nov. 13, 1968—both concerned Gardner-Webb College.

While Ford, oblivious of what the convention was doing that day, was making application to enter the junior year at Gardner-Webb College, the convention was voting to allow the college to put in the junior and senior years.

Ford's application has become the first of hundreds as the present sophomores begin making plans to remain at GW and others prepare to transfer from junior colleges.

It now appears that approximately 250 sophomores are planning to remain for the junior year.

Ford, son of Mrs. Elizabeth Jones Ford of 312 Deltwood Dr., Greenville, S. C., and the late Edward Eugene Ford first made application to attend Gardner-Webb on Oct. 11, 1966 and was accepted. However, he decided to attend Anderson Junior College where he is presently enrolled. He will graduate there this spring.

Ford graduated from Wade Hampton High School where he was in the Chemistry Club, Biology Club and Circle K Club. He is considering teaching as a profession.

For Those Who Remember Mr. Moseley —Here's Another



A fresh basket recently by Gardner-Webb College's Alan Lund for North Greenville brought back basketball memories for the jovial campus chemistry professor, M. A. Moseley.

It seems Moseley is the only "coach" on campus with a 100 percent record in the field. In the 1930's, he played, he coached the Clippers, S. C., young student teams in Spartanburg to play the city's postagers.

Cowpens got off to a lead and on halfpays had the basketball 40. Moseley's senior problem was a lute lad who kept begging to get into the game. Finally, it did succeed but Moseley put the boy in and he got the ball, ran the wrong way and tossed in a basket for the Spartanburg club.

"I got him out before he defeated us," retorts Moseley whose team went on to win 62. "So you see," he said, "I'm the only undefeated coach around whose team also scored every point in the game."

After the game "Coach" Moseley retired from the field and concentrated on science.
