Cited were Albert O. Myers, Sr. of Commerce, philanthropy and business-industrial leadership; David Lindsey of Rockford, philanthropy and industrial leadership; Mrs. T. B. DeFries of Shelby, educational guidance and counseling; George W. DeFries of Hickory, Christian Witnessing and business leadership; and Dr. W. Perry French of Raleigh, secretary of the Baptist State Convention of N. C., Christian ministry and divine ministerial service.

This was the last year Gardner-Webb, as a junior college, will give the Associate Degree. Although the college will continue the Associate Degree in some programs, its move into senior status will make this the last large class to receive the degree.

The 1968 class numbered 151 and was addressed Sunday morning by Rev. A. H. Burroughs, pastor of the Spanish Baptist Church of Spartanburg and soon afterward by Dr. Ben Fisher, executive director of the Council on Christian Higher Education for the Baptist Convention of N. C.

Cited For Christian Service

The pastor of the First Baptist Church of Hickory, Dr. Roy Robinson, was named "Alumnus of the Year" May 17 at Gardner-Webb College.

Dr. Robinson called this "a great thrill and honor" as he accepted the silver engraved bowl from Thomas J. McGraw, vice-president of Gardner-Webb.

Over 400 alums and friends gathered for the annual spring banquet to elect officers, conduct association business and honor the Alumnus of the Year.

Dr. Robinson is a native of Gaffney, S. C. where he graduated from high school in 1927. He attended Gardner Webb in 1938-1940 and was voted on the college's state championship football team of 1940. He went on to Furman University for his B.A. and earned his B.D. from The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Ky. Furman University awarded him the Honorary Doctor of Divinity in 1957.

His work in education has been extensive, including serving as a trustee of North Greenville Junior College, the Baptist College of Charlotte, Gardner-Webb College, Wake Forest University, and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. From 1949-50, Dr. Robinson served as Student Union Secretary for the Baptist State Convention of Florida and has been pastor of the Southeast Baptist Church of Gaffney, S. C.; Citadel Square of Charleston, S. C.; First Baptist of Greer, S. C.; First Baptist of Shreveport, Louisiana; and Vernon Baptist Church of Vinton, Va.

Gardner-Webb awarded Dr. Robinson an Alumni Citation in 1959 and he preached the Baccalaureate Sermon for the 1965 graduating class.

Endowment Scholarship Established

A \$1,000 Endowment Scholarship has been established at Gardner-Webb College in memory of a Rutherford County youth killed Jan. 11 in the crash of a Navy T-3A jet trainer in Meridian, Miss.

The scholarship was established by Mr. and Mrs. John F. Carpenter and family to be awarded to a student who has academic ability and financial need, preferably from Rutherford County, but other areas will not be excluded. The recipient will be selected annually by the College Scholarship Committee.

The endowment was established by gifts from friends in Rutherford County with the Carpenter family to match the amount given. Carpenter stated that the scholarship fund would continue to grow from year to year with a gift from the family. He also said that gifts from other concerned people would be appreciated. Anyone wishing to contribute may send their gift to the ENSIGN RONALD FRANKLIN CARPENTER MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND in care of Gardner-Webb College, or the Rev. Harvey Langley, pastor of the Concord Baptist Church.

The amount to be given will be determined by the college's scholarship committee with applicants for the scholarship making application to this committee.

Carpenter, in making the presentation to Gardner-Webb president, Dr. Eugene Poston, said there were many factors taken into consideration before the scholarship was set up. One of the major factors was the desire of the administration receiving the scholarship be a four year school serving the Rutherford County area. In speaking of the scholarship, Carpenter said that as far as he ever could want something of this nature, Ronald was a graduate of East Rutherford High School and the 12-3 Naval Academy. Gardner-Webb College's Bulldog of the Year Award was made posthumously May 1 to Thomas B. Hincock of Shabby, Hinck's widow, Mrs. Delores Freeman Hinck, accepted the award from Dr. E. Eugene Poston during the college's annual All Sports Banquet.

A director of the Bulldog Club and a long-time supporter of the college, Hinck was praised for his outstanding achievements in helping young men achieve an education and success in athletics. In his memory, the family Saturday evening through Basketball Coach Eddie Hellmack, presented the college with a \$12,000 endowed scholarship.

Hinck was a native of Cleveland County, a graduate of Shabby High School, attended Howard Business College and then worked for Carolina Forest before entering the construction business with other members of the Hinck family. In 1938, he was appointed secretary-treasurer of the firm. He and his wife have five children, Tommy, Mark, Steve, Eddie and Susan. price of everything but the value of nothing.

Dr. Fisher said, "Had we listened to the prophets we might not find ourselves embroiled in many of the contemporary problems in this diversified culture." He went on to report the famous General Education in a Free Society report made at Harvard University 20 years ago and edited by Dr. Cognac.

The report, in part, said that American Higher Education said that time had taught it "a way in a scientific, progressive, detached and empirical methodology. It went on to say that there is a tendency in this type of thought to view as irrelevant the whole realm of belief and commitment by which, in all appearance, much human activity occurs.

It was Dr. Fisher's opinion that, "Until man can discover a point of reference outside himself he is apt likely to escape the abyss of relativism into which he plunges deeper and deeper. The idea that there is nothing really right or nothing really wrong in the final step in man's search for truth.

God."

From this point he went into the question of civil orders and justice under law. He asked, "Can an institution which by its very nature is guided by intelligence and reason tolerate the substitution of violence for the power of persuasion, or permit anarchy under the guise of dissent and civil disobedience?"

He said, "If young people are dissatisfied with what they believe to be a hypocritical value system of the elders, this does not relieve them in the least of a responsible search for truth and an ethical way of life. I think that we must admit that for all our scientific and technical progress we are still, in many respects, barbarians. Look at our penal system. Are we serious about executing 15 or 16 year olds in North Carolina? Evidently we think war is the best method to settle international disputes, and in day when world citizenship is essential for survival, militant antinomianism is on the rise. Racism is still rampant, and the treatment of minority groups remains a shameful aspect of our world culture."
