SPECIAL EVENTS SCHEDULED FOR G-W HOMECOMING

EUTING TO SPEAK AT LUNCHEON

George Euting, Coordinator of Coordinating Program Planning for the education division of the Southern Baptist Convention's Sunday School Board, will be featured speaker at the Founders' Day Luncheon Saturday, Oct. 25. He is the former vice president of Bluefield College in Virginia. Before this, he was secretary of the SBC Brotherhood Department. The author of many public relations and two books, he is well known to Tar Heel pastors and educators as a speaker who "tells it like it is."



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DAVID LINDSAY BUILDING

Dedication of the David Lindsay Classroom Building will highlight a full weekend of activities scheduled for Gardner-Webb Homecoming, 1969. Mr. David Lindsay, for whom the building is named, and his wife, Winifred Herbert Lindsay, gave Gardner-Webb a gift which could become the college's largest. Estimates have been set at \$748,000.

The Lindsays, Tar Heel natives known for their civic, church and educational philanthropies, formerly maintained a dairy goat farm in Rutherfordton. Close friends of a fellow dairy goat farmer, the late renowned poet Carl Sandburg, they were led to make the gift through an interest in higher education.

The classroom building which will bear the Lindsay name was a modern educational plant of the Boiling Springs Baptist Church before the college purchased these church facilities adjacent to the campus recently.

Other homecoming events include an open house, alumni barbecue, basketball scrimmage, and game between G-W's Bulldogs and Blue Field State.

Now retired, he served as head of 4-H work in North Carolina from 1926 until 1963. Under his leadership, the 4-H enrollment grew from 20,000 to 190,000, largest state membership in the nation. Annually, he presents a Citizenship Award to one of G-W's outstanding students. He himself has won numerous awards and citations, including Gardner-Webb's cherished "Alumnus of the Year" award for 1966.

Mobile Homes Temporarily Solve Campus Housing Shortage

Gardner-Webb has installed 16 mobile homes behind Suttle Tennis Courts as a temporary solution to the housing problem for men students. Allen Withrow of Arrowwood Mobile Homes in Charlotte drew the basic design of the 32 by 65-foot units according to college requirements. Each mobile unit has four rooms with individual entrances. Each has individual heat controls and will be air conditioned. A survey of students living in them indicates they offer advantages of less noise and greater privacy.

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Alumnus Harry Walker In New Hospital Post

Gardner-Webb alumnus Harry S. Walker has been named to direct a new department of pastoral care at Beckley Appalachian Regional Hospital in Beckley, W. Va. The hospital will be the first in this state to offer clinical pastoral education.

Pastoral care is a new concept in treating human ills, involving psychological, sociological, psychological, and spiritual factors in a sick person's life as well as the purely physical. An increasing number of hospitals are adding chaplains to their staffs.

The West Virginia hospital is planning to develop a school for ministerial and theological students supervised by Chaplain Walker. His primary responsibilities will be assisting in the care of the sick and developing a program of clinical pastoral education for ministers.

Chaplain Walker, 35, is a native of Lenoire, N. C. He and his wife both attended Gardner-Webb. He was graduated from Wake Forest University in 1962 and from Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1965. He served as pastor of several N. C. churches before enrolling for graduate study in the School of Pastoral Care of the North Carolina Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem, a pioneer teaching institution in the field, under the direction of Dr. Richard K. Young. As a graduate student, his duties at Baptist Hospital included the hospital chaplaincy, supervision and teaching of CPCE students and pastoral counseling.

He and Mrs. Walker have two daughters and a son.

Dr. Poston Will Lead Tour Groups

Dr. E. Eugene Poston, Gardner-Webb College president, will host two separate foreign tours late this year in mid-1970.

Dr. Poston will lead a pilgrimage to the Bible Lands, leaving Dec. 26 this year, which will include Jerusalem, Mount of Olives, Gethsemane, the Jordan River, Samaria, Galilee, Nazareth, Bethlehem and Jericho.

Arrangements will be made by World Tours International.

Dr. Poston and his son, Steve, will co-lead the second tour, an around-the-world tour, June 18 - July 18, 1970. This tour will include Hawaii, England, France, Switzerland, Italy, Iceland, Jerusalem, India, Thailand, Hong Kong, and Japan.

The second tour is being sponsored by Baptist Travel Ahead of Dallas, Texas.
