

Dover Memorial Library; adequate infirmary facilities, now operating through a room set aside in the Huggins-Curtis Hall, are being planned on the basis of a \$13,500 gift from Dr. S. S. Royster, of Shelby, and a Government-approved gift of equipment with which to furnish the infirmary.
