## GARDNER-WEBB IS FULLY LICENSED AS FOUR-YEAR SENIOR COLLEGE

Gardner-Webb College, now in its first year as a four-year senior college, has been licensed by the North Carolina State Board of Higher Education as a senior college and granted permission to offer the baccalaureate degree beginning in 1971.

The college was officially notified of the board's action by Dr. J. Lee Stokes Jr., associate director of the state board. The action followed a visit to the campus by a committee named by the board to investigate Gardner-Webb. This committee was composed of Paul Lakin, chairman; Charles Adison Hewlett, Wilmington; Clarence Leiberman, Lincoln, and Dr. Stokes.

This committee met with the staff of the college, several faculty members and students chosen by the committee. The committee members said they "were impressed with the progress made at Gardner-Webb." Before visiting the campus the committee was furnished a status report, the same one prepared for the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. This report tells of the progress G-W is making toward achieving full accreditation as a four-year senior college.

Dr. E. Eugene Poston, college president, was well pleased with the action of the state board as was Thomas J. McGraw, vice president of academic affairs. Both men expressed their satisfaction with the action, but added they were already strengthening some weaknesses pointed out by the committee.

"We are concerned about the points we need to strengthen. They outlined these to us and we are doing something about them," said Dr. Poston. "We know we had some rough spots that needed to be smoothed out. We are happy to have the comment and advice from this committee."

Mr. McGraw was even quicker to add that work had already begun on the "weak points as listed by the committee."


"We appreciate their recommendations and we are going to do all in our power to strengthen these points. We know we have them and they are going to get major attention," continued McGraw.

"We feel that this recognition by the state board of higher education is another step toward our goal of building one of the finest colleges in the southeast," said McGraw.

Bright red windshield decals like the one above will be awarded each spring to those who contribute to Gardner-Webb's Annual Fund. It was voted at a January quarterly meeting of the G-W Alumni Association executive committee.

It also was voted to form a Parents Club and give other special recognition to Annual Fund donors.

The Parents Club, for parents of present students and alumni, would work cooperatively with existing alumni chapters. One goal is to have joint parent and alumni meetings during 1971-72.

Special recognition for Annual Fund giving is planned for the spring annual banquet. The executive committee voted to award plaque to the chapter with the highest percentage of member participation in the fund, to the chapter giving the largest total contribution, and to the chapter with the largest per capita gift.

# Eddie Holbrook Is Appointed New G-W Athletic Director

Coach Eddie Holbrook, 35-year-old G-W basketball coach, has been named the school's athletic director. He succeeds Norman Hines who earlier was promoted to an administrative position. Dr. E. Eugene Poston, G-W president, announced Holbrook's appointment after a recent meeting of the executive committee of the college board of trustees.

Native of Elkin and a graduate of Lehigh-Rhine College, Holbrook coached at Chase High in Spindale before coming to G-W in 1964. His record at the college is 135 wins and only 33 losses.

As athletic director Holbrook will direct the entire athletic program and will retain his position as basketball coach.

"We are most happy to have Coach Holbrook to step into this new responsibility," Dr. Poston said. "We know that this will mean added work for him, but we are fully confident that he can do the job that will be necessary as we enter more fully into a senior college athlete program."

## This Spirit Helped Build Gardner-Webb

This letter comes from "an alumnus, but a staunch supporter," Mrs. J. R. Taylor of 15 Red Oak Dr. in Greenville, S. C. It tells a lot about the spirit that built Gardner-Webb.

"When I hear the name of Gardner-Webb College, I feel a kinship. I have heard my mother tell about her father cutting wood, hauling it out of the woods, selling it for firewood, back in the school's infancy (when it was Boiling Springs High School and belonged to a few Baptist Associations round about there) in order to give 'another \$100 to keep the school from closing its doors.' My grandfather was William G. Gilligan and he lived not too far from the school. He wanted all of his nine children to go 'an education' and that high school was the means of getting that, even though it meant hard work, frozen breath in the form of icicles hanging off his moustache that he wore in those days, and giving the money that was so sorely needed in the home for essentials that they would like to have had, but those nine got their education there and one has since been a teacher there, Dr. J. T. Gilligan, who retired a few years ago."

As an added bit of "nostalgia" Mrs. Taylor writes that "it is general knowledge that all the brothers and sisters (the nine above mentioned) got wife or husband from the acquaintances made among the students in school there."

sociation. The group includes eight classical, rock, jazz and folk musicians whose unique style has taken them all over the nation and into several foreign countries.

Friends of Gardner-Webb and its young students continue to provide scholarships to underwrite the costs of their education.

M. A. (Brock) Morris, real estate dealer of Lumberton, S. C., has given the college \$5,000 to be placed in endowment with the intent to be used for deserving students' financial aid. The scholarship fund will be named "The Mr. and Mrs. M. A. (Brock) Morris Endowed Scholarship." Deserving students of good character from South Carolina will

be considered first. G-W has more than 300 South Carolina students on its campus.

A \$500 student scholarship-dean fund has been established by Mr. and Mrs. T. R. Hendris Jr. of High Point. Mr. Hendris is head of the Hendris Baking Co. of High Point. This fund also will be available to a worthy student needing financial help.

Dr. E. Eugene Foster, college president says, "We are very pleased with these generous gifts. There is no way to measure the long-term good that will result from them. Private colleges today are in need of such help from individuals who are concerned."

A \$100 golf scholarship has been established for a G-W student by the River Bend Golfers Association of Shidley. It will go annually to a student who can "use his golfing talent to earn a college education," says River Bend Club Professional Sam Sherman. The fund will be supplemented by proceeds of the annual Building Open courtesy held in April at River Bend.

The men were soon in full pads and hitting at full speed as they prepared for a full schedule of major college meets next year. To date seven games have been firmly set and arrangements are being made to find at least three other opponents.
