ALUMNUS-AUTHOR SEEN IN NEW LIGHT

An interesting sidelight on a distinguished literary alumnus is published in the January, 1970, issue of the N. C. Historical Review.

"Found: The Missing Editorship of W. J. Cash" deals with the late Wilbur J. Cash, newspaperman and author of the widely known *Mind of the South*. He was a member of the Class of 1917 of the Boiling Springs High School that preceded Gardner-Webb College. He called his home, Boiling Springs, "my ancestral village" in some of his writings.

The article was written by Dr. Joseph I. Morrison, journalism professor at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and author of the recently published work, *W. J. Cash: Southern Prophet*.

Dr. Morrison's article tells that soon after this biography's publication, he was loaned copies of the extinct newspaper *The Cleveland Press*. Its editor had been W. J. Cash. The copies illuminate a formerly obscure portion of Cash's career and his lonely editorial stance during the alarmy Smith-Hoover presidential campaign of 1936. It was in the same year that O. Max Gardner of Shelby, benefactor of the college, was conducting his highly successful campaign for the North Carolina governorship, and the temper of politics was bright and lively.

Cash's journalistic efforts during the period, reflecting his own view of the political situation, make interesting reading as excerpted and explained by Dr. Morrison.

G-W REPRESENTED AT REGIONAL MEETS

Dr. Farnin Hewitt, Gardner-Webb religion professor, delivered a paper at the annual meeting of the American Academy of Religion's southeastern region meeting in Tallahassee, Fla., March 21. The paper, entitled "The Redefinition of Intercessory Prayer in Contemporary Theology," deals with the efforts of such men as John A. Y. Roberson, Douglas Blythe and Paul Van Buren to redefine intercessory prayer in terms of ethical action. The meeting was held at Florida State University.

Van Marrell, all G-W religion professors. The meeting was held at the First Baptist church with Dr. Taylor C. Smith, Furman University professor of New Testament, as the group's president.

G-W Librarian Bill Malone attended the winter meeting of the Metroline Library Association in Charlotte Feb. 18. There attending heard a talk by Roger McDougall, immediate past president of the American Library Association and New Jersey State Librarian.

Gardner-Webb Signs 'Long' Tennessean To Grant-In-Aid

Seven-foot, 240-pound Tennessee prep star Kenneth Long has been signed to a four-year basketball grant-in-aid by Gardner-Webb.

He signed the scholarship at Hampton, Tenn., High School March 12. Present were his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Long of Hampton, and Theresa McGraw, G-W vice president of academic affairs, Bill Boyd, director of promotion, and Coach Roger Banks, chief G-W sign recruiter.

One of the most sought-after high school players in East Tennessee, Long averaged 20.5 points and 35 rebounds this year, his only senior season. The Hampton team won its conference title and advanced to the semi-finals of the state district tournament.

G-W Basketball Coach Eddie Holbrook feels the college's weight program will help Long add some weight and probably some height. "One of the strongest high school players I have ever seen," Long has a "good touch and a good eye for the basket," the coach noted. "However, he is a late developer due to his size and the fact that he did not play very much high school ball."

Holbrook said Long isn't as agile as Art Gilmore, the other seven-footer he recruited and coached. He thinks Long can become as good as Gilmore, though, with proper work and development.

Another Tennessee basketball player signed to a G-W grant-in-aid is Doug Jolley of Kingsport, who averaged more than 14 rebounds per game in his last Dobyns Bennett High School to an 11-0 conference record. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Jolley, he's six-foot eight and weighs 230 pounds.

"He has good speed, is tall and has the mobility that I feel will make him a fine ball player," Holbrook says.

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New Major Offered

Gardner-Webb College for the first time is going to offer a major in biblical languages in its 1970-71 catalog, according to Dr. I. Thurston Lewis, professor of ancient languages and literature.

The college will be among the first Southern Baptist schools to offer such a major, which will include six hours of Aramaic, 12 hours of Hebrew, and 24 hours of Greek. These hours will be taken over a four-year period.

The language professor said this new major, with appropriate supportive work in related courses, is excellent preparation for those who will continue their biblical studies in a seminary, university graduate school, or in independent study in the pastorate.

BASEBALL, TENNIS IN FULL SWING

The Bulldog baseball team opened its first season of senior college play March 16 with a game at Elon College.

Baseball Coach Jerry Bryson had 14 freshmen returning from last year's team which won the Junior College Eastern Region Title with a 24-4 season. The Bulldogs then went to the national playoffs in Grand Junction, Colo., for the second straight year.

The 1970 schedule include such powers as California State, Pa., New York State, Albany State, Western Carolina and Milligan College, Tenn.
