Peace College to Promote a Campaign for \$500,000.00 This Fall

We are confident that all Alumnae and friends of Peace College will be pleased to learn that the Board of Trustees of Peace has voted unanimously to inaugurate a campaign for \$500,000.00 this fall.

The recommendation to promote such a campaign was made to the Board at its meeting in January by a special committee composed of James D. Kilgore of Raleigh, chairman, and of the following members: Mrs. Julian Hutaft (Martha Clark) of Fayetteville, Spears Hicks of Durham, Dr. F. L. Knight of Sanford, H. H. Littrell of Rocky Mount, E. B. Manning of Roanoke Rapids, Wm. McPherson, Kelvin Gray, Raymond Snow, Dr. John Rhodes, and Dr. James Sprunt of Raleigh.

Included in the \$500,000.00 will be funds for *Building a Recreation-Physical Education Building* to furnish more adequate facilities for the physical educational work of Peace, and to provide a satisfactory and attractive place for social affairs, particularly over the week end. This is rated our most important need at Peace at the present time. Such a campaign should also provide funds for erecting a *West Dormitory and connecting corridor* similar to the present East Dormitory and corridor, and would contain classrooms on the first floor to relieve the present classroom congestion, with twelve bedrooms each on the second and third floors or a total of twenty-four bedrooms with single or connecting baths. When erected, this will complete the front of Peace from the architectural standpoint, and should greatly enhance the beauty of the front of Peace.

Funds would also be provided to modernize the present kitchen and to make needed and necessary improvements in the boiler room. It is estimated that \$400,000.00 will be needed to complete this building program. The Trustees feel that at least \$100,000.00 for the *endowment fund* should be included in the campaign amount. So a goal of \$500,000.00 has been set for the campaign.

The Executive Committee will act as a Campaign Steering Committee for the present or until a full campaign organization is completed—and professional assistance will be secured to direct the campaign.

Mr. E. B. Crow, Jr., Vice President and Trust Officer of the Branch Banking and Trust Company of Wilson, N. C., was elected a Trustee-at-large of Peace. Mr. Crow is connected by close family ties with both the Burwells and the Dinwiddies, former administrators of Peace. His wife, the former Margaret Wright of Raleigh, is also a Peace alumna. We welcome him to our Board.

The Peace Board of Trustees has met in December and in January, and it will hold its next meeting on March 10. It has gone on record as favoring more meetings and of taking more interest in the affairs of the College.

The Woman's Advisory Board

The *Peace College Woman's Advisory Board* composed of five representatives from each of the governing Presbyteries of the College, and several ex-officio members, the president of the Women of the Church of the Synod of North Carolina; the Chairman of Education of the Women of the Church of the Synod, and the president of the Peace Alumnae Association, held its

annual meeting at the College on Tuesday, November 11th. Mrs. George Matthijs of Durham, chairman, presided. The organization is only three years old, but it has already demonstrated its great helpfulness to the College.

Reports were presented showing that its first project, the three year *Room Refurnishing Project*, the refurnishing of 55 rooms in the Main Building in blond maple furniture has been completed this year. This project has meant much to the comfort and happiness of the Peace students.

The Sponsors of Peace, a new project, has been inaugurated in the Presbyteries of Albemarle, Granville, Kings Mountain, Orange, and Wilmington. This project is to function through a local Sponsor of Peace in each Presbyterian church of the five Presbyteries.

The Advisory Board also endorsed the \$50,000.00 Campus Improvement Project, and accepted a quota of \$1,500.00 on it. This Campus Improvement Project calls for the re-location of the present driveway, the paving of the new driveway, and the beautifying of the front entrance and grounds. The Alumnae are also sponsoring this project and it is hoped that it can be completed this summer. Any drivers who have entered Peace in recent years will give hearty support to this project.

The Peace Alumnae Council

The *Alumnae Council* met on Wednesday, November 12, 1952, at the College. This Council is composed of the Alumnae general officers, the Women Trustees, and a representative group of Alumnae from throughout the State. Mrs. Josiah William Bailey (Edith Pou), president of the Alumnae Association, presided at the meeting. Miss Margaret Sprunt Hall, the new Dean of Peace, was presented to the group, and met with the group.

On the docket for discussion and action were plans for observing Peace Loyalty Session in December, the operation of the current school, also plans for promoting the school in general.

The Alumnae voted to endorse the *Campus Improvement Project*, and to earmark up to \$1,500.00 of the Alumnae undesignated contributions to the Loyalty Fund in December for this project.

The Alumnae also voted to stress the sale of the Peace Tiles which sell for \$1.25 apiece, the Alumnae Association receives 25c on each tile sold. These may be secured at a cost of \$1.25 by writing to The Book Store, Peace College, Raleigh, N. C.

It was decided to have the Alumnae Council meet next year on the same day of the meeting of the Woman's Advisory Board (the second Tuesday of November) with the Advisory Board meeting in the morning, and the Alumnae Council in the afternoon and with both groups to be guests of the College for lunch.

Peace Loyalty Season

Peace Loyalty Week was observed from December 8 through December 15, 1952. Contributions have also been coming in almost daily since then, and we are interested in observing that our Alumnae are making their Loyalty Fund gifts at the time best suited to their convenience. We hope that a large number of Alumnae will respond yet with their Loyalty contributions. We have received \$8,313.66 from about 350 contributors. She was the guest speaker for the Christmas dinner for the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Edenton Street Methodist Church of Raleigh, and also the Christmas speaker for the Twentieth Century Book Club of Raleigh. She has addressed the Sherwood-Bates P.T.A., and the Myrtle Underwood P.T.A., both in Raleigh, on "Roots." She has taught the Young Adult Sunday School Class of the West Raleigh Presbyterian Church for the spring quarter.

Thirty-six silk screen prints of Woody Crumbo, a Pottawatomi Indian of Taos, New Mexico, were exhibited in the Recreation Hall in October and November. The artist shows the dances and ceremonials of his people in rhythmic line, full color, and intimate detail. His horses and deer are exotic dreamland creatures. One of the most interesting art exhibits in the Recreation Room were those of the paintings of Mrs. Robert (Mary) Caviness which were displayed in November. Some of the titles of her paintings were: J. M.
