BEAVER DAM BAPTIST CHURCH,
CLEVELAND COUNTY, N. C., Sept. 23rd, 1886.

The King's Mountain Baptist Association met in its Thirty-Fifth Annual Session, Tuesday, September 23rd, 1886, with the Beaver Dam Church.

The Introductory Sermon was preached at 11 o'clock by Rev. G. M. Webb. Text: Luke 19th chapter 10th verse.

On motion to-day at 11 o'clock, A. M., was made a special order for State Missions.

Rev. W. H. Strickland offered the following resolution, to-wit:

WHEREAS, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina has recognized the Woman's Mission Work among our churches by appointing a Central Committee located at Raleigh, of which Miss Fanny Heck is the efficient President, Miss Sally Baily the Secretary and Mrs. Fabias H. Briggs the Treasurer, and

WHEREAS, more than seventy Woman's Mission Societies are at work throughout our State, co-operating through this Central Committee, therefore

Resolved, That this Association appoint a committee on Woman's Mission Work, to report from year to year, as do our other standing committees.

Resolved, That we urge our pastors to use their best offices to have Woman's Mission Societies organized in all our churches.

On motion the resolution was adopted and the following committee appointed, to-wit: W. H. Strickland, L. P. Stowe, G. M. Webb.

The Committee on Temperance reported as follows:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

If our churches were really and truly modeled after the apostolic pattern, then a Baptist church would be a *Total Abstinence Society*, but while we are New Testaments in theory, are we much better than the unsanctified world in practice?

So totally abstinent was the Baptist Church at Ephesus in Asia Minor, in the days of Timothy and Paul, that it was necessary for the Holy Spirit speaking through Paul to say to Timothy, "drink no longer water, but a little wine for thy stomach's sake and thine oft infirmities." But what do we see now? Members of Baptist churches making, buying, selling, drinking intoxicating liquors and thereby helping on the tide of drunkness. Alas! the churches many times, by their long continued silence and failure to discipline their members, give their sanction to the liquor traffic and so become partakers of the evil deeds of these servants of satan.

Unquestionably drunkness is the most monstrous sin in christian lands, bankrupting more characters, sowing more poisons, blasting with mildew more happy families, wasting more money, filling more prisons, occupying the time of more courts, levying higher taxes, entailing more insanity, suicides, murders, and drowning more souls in perdition than any other sin, and in a large measure churches are responsible for these fearful results.

In this time of temperance discussion and ventilation, let every Christian put himself on the side of prohibition, and let him lift up his voice like a trumpet, cry aloud and spare not.

We make the following recommendations:

1. That the pastors of this Association be earnestly requested to preach to their churches on the subject of temperance during the month of October next.

2. That we exhort our churches to exercise New Testament discipline against drunkness and *moderate drinking* among their members—cutting off such as will not heed the church and reform their lives.

3. That in the sense of this body it is unbecoming in any of its members to make, gauge, keep, store, sell, buy or drink spirits as a beverage, and for any and all these things they should be disciplined.

If this remedy be severe, be it remembered the disease is fearful and its consequences for evil unmeasured and immeasurable. What would Christ say if he came among us and found men professing His holy name, who were drunken and babbling, who were makers or vendors of this enemy of man and God? He drove the money-changers out of the temple, would He be less severe on rum-sellers and rum-guzzlers?

REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

But we hope that the churches are doing more than they report. We think that there is no better place for the early training of children in the paths of virtue than the Sabbath School, for the principles implanted in the minds of the little ones are the principles that control them through life. If then so much depends on early training, where can we labor to more advantage than in the Sabbath School? We therefore urge the importance of having a school in every church, and every member get in the harness and go to work. Be pastors, be superintendents, or teachers, and if you cannot be these be students what you ought to be, and the God of all grace will be with you and the good work will go on and on, Amen.

We have now in the field about seventy missionaries who are doing a grand work for the Master, but our Board is in need of funds to pay our men. Let us rise to action and give liberally that the cause may not suffer.

The Committee on Religious Literature reported as follows:

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Your committee beg leave to recommend the adoption of the report of last year as follows:

Of all literature for the Baptists, as necessary to their spiritual growth and for making them a power in the religious world, your committee, first of all, insist on the free circulation and the earnest study of God's Word.

But next to the Bible, we think it necessary that North Carolina Baptists who belong to the Associations which compose the Baptist State Convention circulate that literature among them that will bind them close together as brethren, inform them of the good work

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of the Lord going on in other parts of his vineyard, to faithfully expound the word and to fearlessly defend its truths. Believing this, we earnestly recommend the "Biblical Recorder," which has for more than fifty years stood as the organ of the Baptists. We would like to see it read at every Baptist fireside. For special information on Foreign Missions, we recommend the "Foreign Mission Journal," of Richmond, Va., and for Sunday Schools, "Kind Words," and the Quarterlies and Lesson Leaflets of Atlanta, Ga., and the publications of the American Baptist Publication Society.

SATURDAY, Sept. 25th, 1885.

The Association met in pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Rev. J. H. Yarboro.

The Moderator called the body to order.

Rev. J. M. Bridges stated the needs of Corinth Church and took a cash collection amounting to \$15.13 to aid them in building a house of worship.

The Committee on Religious Exercises announced the hour of preaching at hand, stating that Rev. A. P. Hollifield would preach at the Academy, followed by Rev. P. R. Elam.

The Committee on Woman's Missions reported as follows:

WOMAN'S MISSION WORK.

1 Although Woman's Mission Societies for evangelizing the heathen, are of recent date among us and are looked upon with suspicion by some, yet it is a fact that they ante-date the Christian church and are of Scriptural origin and practice.

In Luke 8th chapter, 2d and 3rd verses, we read, "And certain women which had been healed of evil spirits and infirmities, Mary called Magdalene, out of whom went seven devils."

"And Joanna the wife of Chusa, Herod's steward and Susanna

and *many others*, which ministered unto Jesus of their substance," and these women together with the twelve apostles were with him. This was during the Ministry of our Lord on earth, most probably the Christian Church was not organized till after the crucifixion.

2 The present organizations known as Woman's Mission Work is about twenty or twenty-five years old, having its beginning in Baltimore and spreading into all the States of our Southern Baptist Convention. It has been most efficient in South Carolina, Virginia, Maryland and Georgia, but is accomplishing good in all the States, and is just yet in its infancy. In some of these States, notably Missouri, Virginia and South Carolina these societies are so well organized and have been so successful in raising funds that they have their missionary or missionaries in China or Mexico whom they entirely support by their contributions.

3 This work has abundant promise for success, it is taking deep hold of our Christian women; in the North and West it is in a much greater state of forwardness than in North Carolina, and last year one-sixth of all the money raised for Foreign Missions in the United States was raised by these societies.

4 These societies of sisters are not out side of our churches nor separated in any way from us, they are not seeking independence of action but only ask to work in our churches, and subject to our advice and regulations. At Reidsville last November, our State Convention formerly recognized them and appointed a central committee, through which the various societies may co-operate. Miss Fanny Heck is President, Miss Sally Baily Secretary, Mrs. F. H. Briggs is Treasurer, their postoffice is Raleigh, N. C., and all contributions sent to them will be acknowledged in the "Biblical Recorder." There are more than seventy societies now, in North Carolina, co-operating in this work and we believe that soon they will be counted by hundreds. Why should not every Baptist church have its Woman's Mission Society as it has its Pastor and Sunday Schools? God is opening our eyes and hearts to these opportunities and obligations and those churches that fail to be Calebs and Joshuas will die in the wilderness. It is and will be in the churches "the survival of the fittest." The days of that church that ignores missions, education, Sunday Schools, is numbered, their obituaries will be read by the next generation.

In conclusion your Committee exhort pastors of this Association to use their earnest endeavors to organize a society of this kind in all their churches and if the pastors will not give encouragement to this work, let the sisters meet and organize and go to work themselves. Miss Fanny Heck, of Raleigh, will gladly correspond with any one and give the needful information.

We are gratified to know that there are already Woman's Mission Societies in the church at Shelby, Elizabeth and Waco in this Association. Respectfully submitted.

There are about seventy-five Missionaries in foreign fields under the direction of our Southern Board, besides the native helpers. These are in China, Brazil, Africa, Italy and Mexico. All these must be sustained and supported by contributions. What are we doing for this grand work? 'Tis sad to know that this Association is doing so little for Foreign Missions. We have heard the question asked, "Cannot the heathen be saved without the Gospel?" According to God's word we answer *no*. This being so, we ought to ask ourselves the questions, can we be saved if we do not help send the Gospel to them? Brethren, let us wake to larger interest and greater sacrifice in this great work. It costs less in dollars and cents to convert a heathen than it does an American. Respectfully submitted.
