

CLEVELAND COUNTY, N. C., Sept. 22nd, 1887.

The King's Mountain Baptist Association met in its thirty-sixth annual session, Thursday, Sept. 22nd, 1887, with the New Bethel Church.

The committee on Education reported as follows:

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

It calls for devout thankfulness on the part of the Baptist of the State that their college at Wake Forest continues to prosper. The endowment fund is increasing slowly from year to year; the best chemical Laboratory in the South is approaching completion. There chemical Laboratory in the South is appleading completion. There are now 187 students in attendance, the largest number ever present at the opening of the session. It is delightful to know that the prayerful toils and sacrifices of our fathers are at last bearing precious fruits for the glory of God and the good of humanity. It becomes us to see to it that as many as possible of our sons enjoy the educational advantages which are now offered them at our college.

Last year more than forty young ministers were at the college, preparing themselves to do the best possible work for the Master. These young men were dependent on the churches for help while pursuing their studies.

Owing to the financial stringency prevailing throughout the State, the contributions were not equal to the needs of the Board, and there is still a considerable debt brought over from last year. It is exceedingly important that the twenty-five young brethren now at the college be enabled to continue their studies, and that twentyfive others who are kept back by the embarrassment of the Board be enabled to go. If the churches should greatly increase their con-tributions it will be a benefaction worthily bestowed and will be

pleasing to God. Elder R. D. Mallary who for five years conducted the Female College at Shelby with singular wisdom, retired from the position at the close of the last session. This action was rendered necessary

by ill health. He deserves to be held in grateful rememberance for his able and faithful management of the college. A worthy successor has been found in the person of Elder E. J. Willis, of Virginia, a ripe scholar, a teacher of arge experience and of just those qualities of head and heart which fit him for his high position. With him are assistants who are admirably qualified for their work. We take pleasure in commending Bro. Willis and the college to the confidence of the people. The times call more loudly than ever on parents to educate their daughters. Now we have just such a school as we need, offering first rate educational advantages at moderate cost. Let us see to it that our girls receive the full benefit of these great advantages. J. D. HUFTHAM, Chm'n.

Notwithstanding the financial stringency which has prevailed throughout the South, the Orphanage passed through the year endthroughout the south, the orphanage passed through the year end-ing on the 29th of July without debt, during that time the Baptist of the State contributed six thousand dollars. A comfortable and at-tractive Chapel, built of brick, has been completed in which the Orphans meet every Sunday for worship, and Bible study. Four dwelling houses are now complete, with room for ninety six chil-dwelling houses are now complete, with room hous heavy section. dren, seventy are there now, eighty two have been received since the institution went into operation. A few left, some having found

the institution went into operation. A few fert, some having found homes and others having been removed for other causes. The health of the Orphans has been uniformly good. It is important that the contributions for the coming year shall be increased. About a thousand dollars are still due on one of the tracts of land. This should be paid at once. A house should also be built for the General Manager. A printing office should also be manyided for the Orphanage Journal "Charity and Children" as provided for the Orphanage Journal, "Charity and Children," so that the printing may be done at the Orphanage, thereby lessening the expense and at the same time enabling the boys to learn a trade by which they may be able to earn an honest living when their term of pupilage is over. We earnestly commend this institution to the prayerful consideration of the brethren.

CLERK.

CONSTITUTION OF THE KING'S MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

We, the united Baptist churches of Jesus Christ, located partly in the States of North Carolina and South Carolina, having all been immersed upon a profession of our faith in Christ, propose to maintain the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan :

Article 1st. This Association shall be known by the name of the King's Mountain Baptist Association.

2nd. This Association shall be composed of such members as shall be chosen and recommended by the churches in union.

3rd. Other churches may become members of this Association by their delegates presenting certificates of their appointment, provided on examination they be found orthodox.

4th. The Association shall organize by electing a Moderator and Clerk, who shall hold their appointments until another election, unless displaced by the body.

5th. This Association, as an act of christian courtesy, may invite ministers of our denomination to seats with us in council.

6th. This Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum, which they are authorized to form for themselves,

7th. This Association hath an inalienable right to judge what churches shall be admitted into its confederacy.

Sth. The Association thus formed shall be regarded by us only in the light of an advisory council, with no coercive power "to lord it over God's heritage."

9th. This Association shall have power to withdraw from any church in its connection that shall hold corrupt doctrines or indulge in sinful or vicious practices.

10th. Every church in union having a membership not exceeding fifty in number, shall be entitled to a representation of two dele-

gates, and one additional delegate for every increase of fifty over that number.

11th. The primary object of this Association shall be "to strive for the unity of the Spirit in the bonds of peace" amongst the churches, the employment of domestic missionaries, and to keep up the statistical accounts of the churches in its connection, and finally, to concentrate our efforts for the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom on earth, and for the deposition of the works of darkness.

12th. None but the members of this body shall be allowed a vote in its councils, and a majority shall decide in disposing of and settling all business that may constitutionally come before them.

13th. This Association in all cases disclaim the right in its associate capacity to settle church difficulties, but when a division occurs and two parties equally claim to be the church, and represent them selves by letter and delegates, this Association shall have the right to decide at the first or some future meeting of its body thereafter, which party shall be recognized as the constitutional church, and entitled to a seat in council.

14th. The Minutes of the Association shall be read each day and corrected, if need be, by the body, and when the business shall be gone through with, signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises.

15th. Any article of this constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting, by a majority of two-thirds of the delegates present voting for the same.

RULES OF DECORUM.

1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. The Moderator shall be deemed a judge of order, and shall have a right to call to order at any time; also it shall be his duty to see that the Rules of Order are attended to; to take the opinion of the Association on all questions properly brought before the body.

3. Any member not being satisfied with his decision on any point of order, may appeal to the Association on the same day the decision is made, but at no other time.

4. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a regular record of the transactions of the Association.

5. But one person shall speak at a time, and he shall rise to his feet and obtain leave of the Moderator, and when he has done speaking he shall sit down, and shall not speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than twenty minutes at a time, unless he obtain permission of the Association.

6. ¹⁰ The Moderator, when addressed for leave of speech, shall signify the same by naming of them, or otherwise.

7. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject on hand, or use words of personal reflection, or with a view of calling to order for some particular purpose. Any

motion made and seconded, shall come under the consideration of the Association, except withdrawn by him who made it.

8. Every case taken up by the Association shall be decided first, before another is offered.

9. When anything is taken up by the Association, after allowing, time for the debate, the Moderator shall put the question; and those in favor of the thing proposed shall rise to their feet, and those opposed to it, keep their seats; the Moderater shall procure the decision before those standing take their seats.

10. No person being a member shall depart the service of the Association without leave.

11. The appellation of "Brother" shall be used in our address to each other.

12. The names of the members shall be called as often as necessary.

13. No member shall be indulged in any practice that has a tendency to interrupt in the time of a public speech, or any other practice that would dishonor the Association.

14. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any other member, provided he appoints some other member to his seat while he is speaking, but shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he shall give the casting vote.

15 Any person breaking these rules of order shall be reproved at the discretion of the Association, but only on the day the breach was made.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES.

1. We believe in one only true and living God—the Father, Son and Holy Ghost—three in one.

2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only true rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

4. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, by his own free will and holiness.

5. We believe in the doctrine of Election, through santification of the Spirit and belief of the Truth.
6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only

6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only by the merit of Jesus Christ.

7. We believe the saint shall persevere in grace, and not finally fall away.

8. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers who have been immersed upon a profession of faith are the only proper subjects for the Lord's tuble.

9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and general judgment.

10. We believe that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

11. We believe that no minister has a right to the administration of the ordinances, only such as has been called of God, as was Aaron, and regularly baptized and approved of by the church, and come under the imposition of hands by a Presbytery.
