Historic Class To Be Graduated May 16

Gardner-Webb College will graduate its historic first senior class in traditional pump and pageant Sunday, May 16.

About 270 students are candidates for degrees. Following the footprints of alumni before them, they'll walk in cap and gowns through the landmark arch and across the spring-flowering campus in their procession. They'll be making history of their own, however, as a majority of them will receive the college's first bachelor's degrees. Gardner-Webb added a senior class this year to complete its advancement to four-year status.

The day's events will begin with 11 a.m. baccalaureate services in East Physical Education Building. Dr. Nathan Brooks Jr., de-

nator of the Church Programs Division of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, will be speaker.

Principal speaker for graduation exercises, scheduled for 3 p.m. in the East building, will be Dr. William C. Archie, executive director of the Mary Reynolds Babcock Foundation of Winston-Salem.

Dr. Archie, a Salisbury native, completed undergraduate study at Davidson College and earned a master's degree at Wake Forest College. He further earned master's and doctor's degrees in Romance languages at Princeton University. Before becoming director of the foundation in 1966, he held teaching and academic posts at Wake Forest College, Duke

University, Emory University and the University of Delaware. He was director of the N.C. Board of Higher Education in 1961-63. He is a member of the Davidson College Board of Visitors and the Warren Wilson College Board of Trustees.

Dr. Brooks baccalaureate speaker attended Morehead College and received A.B. and D.B. degrees from Wake Forest College. He received the Th.M. degree from Southern Baptist Seminary and did further graduate study at Columbia University. He served as minister of several Baptist churches in the South before assuming his present duties in 1966.

Two Summer Sessions Scheduled

G-W will offer nearly 200 different courses during two summer school sessions planned this year.

The first will begin June 7 and conclude July 4. The second will begin July 19. Commencement will be held Aug. 14.

Registration for the first session will be held at 9 a.m. June 3. Classes will be held each day Monday through Friday.

A student may earn as much as six semester hours credit during each of the five week sessions, or seven hours with special permission.

Courses will be offered in the following general areas of study: business administration, economics, physical education, religion, Spanish, biology, chemistry, history, sociology, psychology, music, education, data processing, mathematics, geography, library science, political science, health, theater arts, art and science education.
