## First Class Awarded Bachelor's Degrees

Wearing their black mortar's classic black and red, 242 seniors marched in a "Pomp and Circumstance" procession May 16 into Gardner-Webb College's history.

Granted bachelor's degrees in Post Physical Education Building commencement ceremonies, they became the college's first four-year graduates. Thirty-one other students were granted two-year associate in arts degrees.

Friends of the college, many of whom have shared the dream of the Decade of Advance ending this year, attended in unexpectedly large numbers. More than 3,500 found places inside the building, and another 400 or so good class by outdoors, their presence underscoring the day's triumph, joy and fulfillment.

Seated side by side in the historic Class of 1971, graduates heard Dr. William C. Archie, executive director of the Mary Reynolds Babcock Foundation in Winston-Salem. The speaker told them of their need to face the reality of the world and use all their resources—physical, mental and spiritual—in making a way for themselves.

Earlier in the day, at annual baccalaureate services, graduates, their parents and friends had heard Dr. Nathan Brooks, Jr., director of the church programs division of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. He urged graduates to be a leavening agent in a world beset by social conflict. Professor Gilmer Blockbourn, a 1960 G-W graduate, spoke at a breakfast for graduates and their parents.

## G-W Confers Honorary Doctorate

Gardner-Webb College conferred its first honorary doctor of humanities degree in commencement ceremonies May 16 in recognition of Lloyd C. Bost of Shelby, president of Bost Bakery, Inc., and chairman of the college board of trustees.

Two other outstanding citizens, B. E. Martin of Charlotte and Earl Webb Spangler of Shelby, were presented citations for distinguished service to church and community. (See story, Page 2)

Bost has been a member of the board of trustees since 1965, and has served as chairman for two terms. During his chairmanship, two regional food drives were launched and successfully completed for a total of more than \$5 million. He has joined with other members of his family in providing the Bost

Physical Education Building and Pool on campus.

His distinctive service has extended to many other church, civic and community endeavors, including the local United Fund, Rotary Club and Chamber of Commerce. As chairman of Cleveland Memorial Hospital's board of trustees in the mid-60's, he successfully led a campaign for a bond issue to enlarge and expand the institution.

A Shelby native, Bost received his B. S. degree at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where he was named to membership in Phi Beta Kappa. He and his wife, the former Miss Virginia Reid Falls, have three sons and a daughter and live at 717 W. Warren St. in Shelby.

## Earl Spangler, B. E. Morris Cited By College

Earl Webb (Bud) Spangler of Shelby and Barrill Edna Harris of Charlotte received special citizen citations during spring commencement exercises.

President of Spangler and Sons, Inc., a Shelby concrete firm, Spangler was recognized for outstanding religious, civic, educational and youth service, including his leadership efforts in establishing a Cleveland County Boys' Club.

A recipient of Shelby's "Citizen of the Year" award in 1969, he is a member of G.W.'s board of advisors and in 1967 was alumni association president. He and other members of his family made possible the construction of the Ernest W. Spangler Memorial Stadium on the campus. He and his wife,

Evelyn, have three daughters and a son and live at 517 Tecumseh Place in Shelby.

Morris, an 81-year-old Baptist minister, was cited for his long years in the field of Christian education. Although "ordained" in 1957 after serving 24 years as pastor of Durham's Gray Stone Baptist Church, he has served 19 churches as interim pastor since. Active in the service of the denomination for many decades, he is a former trustee of Wake Forest University.

Recognizing the need and the value of a college education for ministers, he recently established a \$10,000 scholarship fund at Gardner-Webb, with proceeds to be awarded to worthy and needy ministerial students. He and Mrs. Morris are the parents of

four daughters. They live in Charlotte, where he presently is interim pastor of the First Baptist Church. He also is active as an evangelist and Bible teacher.

## J. O. Terrell Retires After 26 Years

**JAMES Orylle Terrell**, dean of instruction at Gardner-Webb College for 17 years, retired effective May 16. He closed out a total of 26 years on the faculty of the college.

Dean and Mrs. Terrell were honored by the faculty and staff at a testimonial dinner recently. They were given various gifts and faculty members, former students, and college administrators gave tributes to the veteran professor.

He is a native of Jackson County, North Carolina, and received his education at Western Carolina Teacher's College, where he earned his bachelor's degree in 1932. His master's degree was earned at Peabody College for Teachers in Nashville, Tenn. He also did special study at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

HE served for 21 years as a teacher and principal in the public schools of Jackson and Buncombe counties of North Carolina before coming to Gardner-Webb in 1945. He taught in Oakley High School in Ebanore and Woodfin High School in Asheville.

He was the recipient of the Distinguished Service Award of Western Carolina University in 1997. He is a member of the National Education Association and served as president of the Southwestern group of Higher Education Division of the North Carolina Education Association in 1993.

# G-W Capital Fund Campaign Exceeds Goal

**THIRTEEN** months to the day after Gardner-Webb College kicked off its \$1,500,000 capital gifts campaign, a total of \$2,151,782.14 was announced at a campus victory dinner with more than 1,100 people in attendance.

April 13, 1970, before 650 of the college's officials and friends, a goal of \$1.5 million

was announced to build a new library, convert the present library into a classroom building, build a new men's dormitory and double the size of the present administration building.

Thursday night, May 13, 1971, with Gov. Robert Scott as principal speaker, the college's Best Physical Education Building was

dedicated for the announcement of the total raised to this date.

National Chairman R. Patrick Spangler told the group that to the moment \$2,151,782.14 had been given and added, "We are on our way to reaching the final phase of the three-phase program which is a goal of \$5.5 million."

THE campaign will not be brought to a close until two other areas are completed. These include Forest City and Rutherfordton in Rutherford County, as well as Charlotte which is in the middle of its campaign. Chairman reported a total of \$384,190 already given. Preliminary plans are also underway to have a campaign in the Golfway, S. C., area which is less than 20 miles from the school's campus.

Shelby, the city nearest the college, had a goal of \$150,000, but final figures show that \$724,840 has been contributed from that city. Basking Springs, the site of the college, had a goal of \$20,000 and \$84,123 has been given from that town.

**OTHER** areas and their goals and gifts include: Kings Mountain, \$30,000 goal with gifts of \$42,877; Cherryville, \$52,800 goal, gifts of \$70,147; Belmont area, \$200,000 goal, gifts of \$201,250; Gastonia area, goal \$250,000, gifts of \$265,229 and Upper Cleveland, \$20,000 goal, gifts of \$40,897.

In his speech to the large crowd Gov. Scott had nothing but the highest praise for the college and for Spangler, who has led the college in two hard drives in the past six years which have raised more than \$5 million.

"PAT Spangler has money from in the first, all bearing the brand of service and success," said Gov. Scott. "You picked a big man for a big job and he has been more than equal to the task. With a goal of \$1.5 million the drive has realized more than \$2 million."

"Prior to my arrival I read with interest the step by step story of Gardner-Webb's 'Decade of Advance,'" continued the governor. "Extra so, I was not fully prepared for the visible evidence of your progress, new and renovated buildings, a well-groomed campus, and a growing community of scholars."

During the night's activities both Spangler, and Lloyd C. Best, chairman of the board of trustees, were honored with special citations and plaques for their contributions to the progress of the college.

## More Special Gifts Announced

These special gifts have been made recently to Gardner-Webb.

A \$20,000 bequest has come from the estate of Joseph W. Godden, the man who engineered the 1948 restoration of the White House and was instrumental in the Williamsburg restoration. The fund will be used to set up a pre-engineering scholarship. A Scotland native, Godden settled down in Cleveland County upon his retirement. He had come to Shelby as chief engineer in construction of the massive PPC Industries, Inc. plant. Mrs. Godden died in 1960 and her husband died June 24, 1970.

Everette G. Spurling of Faison has given \$12,000 to establish an endowed scholarship. A retired businessman and general office

manager of Stacey Brothers Department Store, he is married to the former Miss Vera Lutzert, an alumna of the old Basking Springs High School. Spurling has been a longtime friend of the college and is very active in community activities.

H. Milton Loy has given the college a six-unit apartment house in Shelby as a home associated to his parents, E. M. Loy of Jacksboro, N. C., and the late Mrs. Loy. The apartments will be administered under a trust fund, with the proceeds going to the donor's wife until her death and then reverting to the college. Funds will be used to construct a campus building in honor of the Loy.

McGraw and his wife, the former Miss Betty Falls, have three daughters and live in Haling Springs. He is an active member of Boiling Springs Baptist Church and the local Rotary Club.

McGraw expressed deep appreciation for the award.
