A 10-game schedule with two new opponents has been announced for the Bulldogs by head football coach George Litzen.

One new face in the football line-up is Carson-Newman College of Jefferson City, Tenn., whose players will visit Spangler Stadium Oct. 25 for G-W's annual Homecoming game. The other new opponent will be Maryville College of Maryville, Tenn. The Bulldogs will meet this team "away" Nov. 20.

The Homecoming game will be the first of five consecutive afternoon games, three of which will be in Spangler Stadium.

## G-W Athletics: It Was A Great Year Of 'Firsts'

Gardner-Webb College closed out its athletic year with an all sports record of 66 wins, 33 losses—and two men named to nationally selected All-American teams.

Basketball, baseball and golf were the big winners and produced the All-Americans. Football and tennis finished their seasons on the losing side, although both had moments of glory.

The college's basketball team, long a power in junior college ranks before the Bulldogs scored the first ever senior college field, had a season's record of 20 wins and four losses. This named Coach Eddie Holbrook's men a spot in the District 20 playoffs, but they lost there.

Basketball also produced the school's first All-American when George Adams, Kings Mountain center, was named to the National

## Decade Of Advance Budget Reflects Growth

Gardner-Webb College's Board of Trustees has approved a record budget of \$3,267,990 for the next fiscal year.

In June session, trustees also approved new constitutions for both faculty and students. These documents were earlier written and approved by respective faculty and student groups. The two constitutions establish committees which will work with the administration to achieve closer cooperation among all segments of the campus organization.

The college budget shows an increase of about \$400,000 over the previous year. Dur-

ing the past decade, G-W's budget has climbed from \$229,888 in 1961 to the \$3,267,990 approved recently for the coming year. The figures represent tremendous growth in 10 years. G-W has come from a junior college with 500 students to a senior college with more than 1,500 students. Its teaching faculty now numbers 85 full-time members as compared with only 25 in 1961. Its physical plant includes 33 buildings, many constructed in the past decade and is valued at slightly less than \$7,000,000.

Golf produced the second All-American in the person of Terry Florence, a Charlotte senior who placed third in the nation among a field of 110 men in the NAIA Tournament at Rockford, Ill. The golf team finished the five day tournament fifth in the nation after posting a 145 record for the regular season. It was their first national senior college journey. Coach Garland Allen's golfers got off to a bad start losing five of their first six matches, but hit their stride to close fast.

Baseball, another winner, had a season's record of 20-1. This was good enough to earn a spot in the district tournament, but Coach Jerry Benson's men lost two straight after winning their opening in the tournament. Benson, at Holbrook, will have most of his men returning for another season.

Tennis, under Coach Jim Taylor, just missed a winning season. The seniors won eight and lost nine.

Coach George Litzen's golfers finished with two wins and eight losses, but the wins included a 10 victory over Newberry for the Bulldogs' first triumph on the football field as a senior college. They also won an exciting 18-15 Homecoming game over Mars Hill.
