

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

To get the true idea of education, we must draw the contrast between the child and the person of mature years. Education develops the mind and makes it strong. We believe education is derived from the word "E Duco," which means to draw out. By it the powers of the mind are drawn out and made to expand and take in knowledge, so that the educated homeometric and home and the power of the mind are drawn out and made to expand and take in knowledge, so that the educated homeometric and home made to expand the property of the prop ted become wise and learned. But some minds are not elastic and will not expand; hence we have [so called] educated men and women among us expand; hence we have [so called] educated men and women among us who are of no real service to the world, but this should be no drawback to our efforts to give the people a literary training. As parents and teachers we ought to nerve ourselves for the task before us, and remember the injunction to train our children. We are glad to see the people moving forward on this line. We now have a number of high schools in our bounds where our children can receive a practical or preparatory training. The where our children can receive a practical or preparatory training. The Boiling Springs high school commends itself to us more than any other, in as much as it fixes its sessions to suit the working or rural class of chilas much as it fixes its sessions to suit the working or rural class of children. And for higher training for young men, we would recommend Wake Forest College, which is now equal to any in the state. For young ladies we cannot say too much in praise of Oxford Female Seminary and High Point Female College. Brethren, let us awake to our duty and do the best we can for our children, and posterity will rise up and call us blessed.

**Part As to Ministerial Education, the time has come when it is a necessity, and all should lend a helping hand to support the large number of ministerial students at Wake Forest College. Some are there from our own bounds who need our help.

REPORT ON HOME AND INDIAN MISSIONS.

The work of our home board fills a long-felt want in the work of The work of our home board ills a long-felt want in the work of Southern Baptists. A clear-cut distinction ought to be always kept before the minds of the people between our home and State mission work. The State Boards aim to assist in supplying the destitute places within their respective borders, while the home board has for its aim the supplying of all destitutions in the different states; i. e., doing the work in a state which its board is not able to do. The reason why Cuba is under the home

board, rather than the Foreign, is simply because the home board took up the work when it began. The labor of the home board is stupendous. We are trying through it to reach the foreign population that has come to live with us. We are also trying to give the Gospel to the poor untutored Indians. Surely they call for our sympathy and help. The needs of our colored brethren are also calling for our help and co-operation. The destitute territory within the bounds of our Southern Convention calls loudly for our help. The work in Cuba lies or ought to lie very near to the heart of every Southern Baptist. The work in this little isle, so wonderfully commenced and sustained, ought to fill every heart with missionary zeal.

Brethren, let our hearts be alive unto these departments of our home mission work. Let us give as hath been given unto us, not only of our prayers, but of our money. Respectfully submitted.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Just one hundred years ago this year, God laid on the Baptists the signal honor of inaugurating the great work of modern missions. It was an insignificant man [as the world then viewed him] who first conceived the idea. It was an insignificant denomination which first undertook the

work, and the beginning was altogether insignificant. But no event of the century has been so revolutionizing and far-reaching in its effects. To no man and to no work are the Baptists more indebted than to William Cary and the work he began. Missions have brought the Baptists from the lowest to the highest round in the religious world. But for missions we would have been today the few scattered, unorganized, ineffectual folks of a century ago--a hiss and a by-word among other churches. As it is we are great in our work accomplished, great in numbers, great in organiza-tion, great in all resources for future work. If we are faithful to the trusts our fathers bequeathed us, our children will see great things indeed. With a view to storing the minds of our people with our wonderful history and thus paying a debt we owe the past, and with a view to inspiring to yet greater things for the future, we have undertaken a special Centennial work. It was thought that to send out one hundred new missionaries and to raise \$250,000 for conjugate them and those already on the field for to raise \$250,000 for equipping them and those already on the field for more efficient work, would be an easy task for the 2,000,000 Baptists of the South, your committee recommend that this Centennial work be fully canvassed and acted upon by the brethren of the Association. It is cause of unceasing regret to your committee that we cannot report our beloved missionary, Brother GP Bostic, as on the field and still our representative among the heathen. The Association is in possession of the facts in the case, and your committee have no recommendations to make in the matter save that we shall not allow this to cool our order now to began and save that we shall not allow this to cool our ardor nor to lessen our efforts in the work of Foreign missions. It is the opinion of your committee that the recent criticisms of the Foreign mission board have only proved the brethren of that Board more worthy of our confidence, both as to their integrity and efficiency. Your committee recommend a thorough discussion of the plane and path of the Board in the body of the Record in the body of the Record in the body of the recommendation. of the plans and methods of the Board in the body of this Association.

It is with inexpressible sadness that your committee note the embarrussments which have beset our Foreign mission work this year. Truly it
is a time when the friends of missions should cover themselves with sackeloth and ashes and mourn. Your committee recommend that a directory
of the work of our Foreign Mission Board be inserted in the Minutes this
year if possible; if not, in the Minutes of 1893, as a matter of reference for

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Dear Brethren: There are three principal channels through which the Gospel must reach the unchristianized world, viz: State. Home, and Foreign missions. Each of these has its particular work to do, and should not be displaced by the others. Just as each individual must answer before God for the sins of his flesh, so each department of missions is responsible for the work in its distinct field of labor. In view of the great need of Home and Foreign mission work, there seems to be a growing tendency to neglect State missions, but we should remember that the command "Go ye therefore and teach all nations," includes the unsaved in our own State as well as the heathen Chinese. Last year we had one hundred and eighteen missionaries employed in this department; this year we have only one

hundred,--eighteen less than last year. These missionaries are located in hundred,—eighteen less than last year. These missionaries are located in thirty-four of the forty associations connected with the State Convention. Amount received for the year ending with August, 1891, \$5,060.97, making a decrease of \$1,331.18 from last year. The work to be done in our State is as needful today as it was one year ago. We will need every dollar of the \$17,000 which the Board has estimated for this year. We must look to the pastors to push this work before the people. Let us all join hands and hearts in this matter and God will crown our labors with the salvation of the poople. T DIXON.

Supplement to report on Obituaries:
Rev James Brumfield was born in Pittsylvania county, Va., at the foot of the mountains on Dan river, in July, 1806. He died in Gastonia, June 12th, 1892, and was buried by the side of his wife and daughter-in-law, in the Dallas (N C) Cemetery. From the fly-leaf of his Bible we copy, "Embraced Jesus October 5th, 1838." He was at first a Methodist, but changed his views and was baptized into the fellowship of the Middle Creek Baptist church, Smith county, Va., Sept. 21st, 1844, by Rev Noah Baldwin. He began preaching, soon after his conversion, among the Methodists and continued to preach after his connection with the Baptists. He was ordained to the full work of the Baptist ministry, (writer does'nt know the continued to preach after his connection with the Baptists. He was ordained to the full work of the Baptist ministry, (writer does'nt know the exact time). If a full record had been kept of his life, it would be interesting and profitable reading. He was a cabinet workman, having served his trade in Richmond, Va. The first office and printing room furniture ever used by the "Religious Herald," Richmond, Va., were the works of his hand. He worked at his trade and preached the Gospel, from Richmond, Va., to Spartanburg, S. C. In Virginia he was associated with and enjoyed the confidence of such men as Noah Baldwin, Jesse Witt and J B Jeter. In company with the former two he was once denied the privilege of the floor in a Virginia Baptist Association, because of their advocacy of Temperance and missions. He was a member of the old Broad River Association perance and missions. He was a member of the old Broad River Association in the days of the Curtises, J G Landrum, M C Barnett and Drury Dobbins. As a preacher, Bro Brumfield was short, but pointed. He tried to make centre-shot with one idea. In exhortations and prayers he was one of the most gifted of men. He would reach and affect any one who heard him. His influence in society was most blessed. Deeply pious he had the gift of impressing everybody with his humility, faith and zeal. This pastor, at the time of his death, was scarcely able to determine whether "I have finished my course, I have fought a good fight, I have kept the faith," or "a good man and full of the Holy Ghost," was a more appropriate text from which to preach his funeral sermon. Both were true of him.

Towards the close of his life, he became keenly anxious to cross over the river and be with Christ. Heaven was very real to him. He seemed to see it. Its light him the pathway have been to see it.

to see it. Its light shined upon his pathway here below. He is Home at last, "forever with the Lord, Amen!" So let it be. His last service in public is one never to be forgotten by those who were present. A picture of the scene is hung in the gallery of their souls. Tremblingly leaning on his staff, he spoke in clear and melting tones of how the Lord had led him through life, then his force lit up with a heavenly ince and his over second. through life; then his face lit up with a heavenly joy, and his eye seemed to peer into the very presence of his Lord as he told us how he waited and yearned to go. Then choking down with emotion, he burst forth in the most eloquent strain that this writer ever heard, "Brethren, meet me there!" God help us all to heed this exhortation.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL SUPPORT.

Your committee would beg leave to report that our ministers are very poorly paid in the King's Mountain Association. It makes one sad to look over the report of churches numbering from 322 to 212 and 223 members, and only paying \$100 for pastor's salary, these churches being composed of some wealthy members, and the majority of them in good circumstances. In making an average we find one church of 322 members paying to pastor less than 31 cts. a piece, and \$2 to Ministerial Education; contributions to other objects correspondingly small. No Sunday school. This is only a fair sample. Many of our churches are great sleeping giants. We find the average salary paid to pastors to be \$113.22, making an average of reported members from representative churches to pay less than 75c. a piece.

In looking around for the cause for this state of affairs, we are constrained to lay the blame largely at the door of the preachers. It might be said by some of our conscientious laymen that we pay our preachers in proportion to the preaching we have. Poor preach, poor pay! We would reply that a church ought not to be content to pay its pastor less than it is able, and then look them out a pastor they consider worth their money. This would have a good effect in causing our ministers to make a better preparation for preaching. Your committee would specially commend the liberality of the Gastonia church to their pastor, 100 members, salary \$800. making an average of \$8 to the member. We would also commend the liberality of the Shelby church in contributing to the various departments of denominational work May God in His wisdom, and by His spirit, stir up our churches to their full duty on this subject. May we all remember that the Scripture says, "the laborer is worthy of his hire."


