## Fall Session Begins

# Gardner-Webb Looks Toward Accreditation



For the 64th year, the approach of fall has brought students back to the Boiling Springs campus—mattered now into a four-year institution but still enjoying growth.

With a successful first year as a major college behind it, Gardner-Webb now must achieve full accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools—a goal toward which its faculty and administration have worked for many months.

Gardner-Webb was fully accredited as a junior college, and its leaders are determined that the four-year program also meets this standard of excellence.

College representatives will meet in October with a Southern Association membership committee to review G-W's eligibility. If G-W meets all requirements, as expected, the college will be elected to association membership and accreditation at the group's December meeting at Miami Beach, Fla.

Guided by a committee of educators representing the Southern Association and by a stringent self-study, Gardner-Webb has taken a number of steps in past months to assure that accreditation will be achieved.

These activities have ranged from the strengthening of faculty and curriculum to a \$2.5 million capital funds campaign for necessary buildings and endowment.

### FACULTY

Students returned in late August for the beginning of a new academic year. They met some new faces among faculty and staff. Among them are the following:

**Dr. Lucy Lowell Sale** has been named a professor of education. He earned both bachelor's and master's degrees in elementary education at Appalachian State University and

received an Ed. D. degree from Indiana University in 1967. He has been an assistant professor at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and the University of Virginia, and has taught at Indiana University and the ASTC Campus Laboratory School. He and his wife are the parents of two children.

**Dr. James B. Hagley Jr.** of Edgewood, Md., is a new associate professor of psychology. He formerly was an employee development counselor for the U. S. Army Civilian Personnel Office at Aberdeen Proving Ground in Maryland. He also has taught at the University of Northern Colorado and Harford Junior College. He earned a B. S. degree in social sciences at Towson State College, a M. S. degree in guidance and counseling at the University of Missouri, and a Doctor of Education degree in counseling psychology at the University of Northern Colorado.

**Dr. Beñito R. González-Guevado**, a former Cuban teacher, has been named associate professor of Spanish. He received his bachelor's degree in Spanish at Universidad Central in his native Cuba and taught in Havana before coming to the United States in 1965. He taught Spanish and Portuguese post-1965 while working on his master's degree in Spanish and his doctor of philosophy degree at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He is married and has one child.

Three faculty members have been added to the Department of Business. They are Mrs. Helen G. Lowery, Essenee Newson Warren and William R. Waddle. All three have been named to the rank of assistant professor of business.

**Mrs. Lowery** attended Gardner-Webb and Western Carolina University as well as Lincoln State College, from which she received a

## Ministerial Board Elects Officers

## 80 Report For Football

Coach George Litton welcomed 80 men to his first fall football practice as the Bulldogs began work for their Sept. 11 trip to Hickory to take on the Big Bears of Lenoir-Rhyne. Forty-three of the 80 grid-dars are first-year men. Thirty-six of them are fresh out of high school and another seven are playing their first year of college football. Litton has 21 returning lettermen from last year's team which won two and lost eight.

The head Bulldog has added a new member to his coaching staff. Richard May, a graduate of East Tennessee State, has been named defensive coordinator. May comes to Bowling Springs from Guilford College. He was also chief assistant at Conover-Newman College for seven years.

A change has been made in the Bulldog schedule. The Oct. 9 date with Guilford has been shifted from an afternoon contest to a 7:30 game at West Guilford High School stadium.

The home opener was to be with Newberry Sept. 11 at 7:30.

As for the prospects for the 1971 season, Coach Litton says only: "We will be stronger, but we will also be playing a tougher schedule. However, I assure you that there will be plenty of excitement on the field again this season."



## Dr. Litton Heads Bulldog Club

The Gardner-Webb Bulldog Club, an athletic booster organization, has set a \$35,000 scholarship goal and elected a new president, Shelby dentist Dr. Robert Letten.

Ken Street, Shelby businessman, was elected vice president at the club's July board of directors meeting. Harold Canby, also of Shelby, was named secretary and treasurer. New directors include Gordon Dixon of Shelby, Billy Nooly of Rutherfordton and Tommy Haidis of Spindale.

Plans were discussed for reaching the goal of \$35,000 for the scholarship fund. The organization raised more than \$25,000 for the purpose last year.



## Well Represented!

Ten states are represented on the 80-member football squad of the Bulldogs in 1971. North Carolina leads the list with 33 members followed closely by South Carolina with 21.

## Graduates Eligible For Commission

Graduates of associate degree nursing programs such as the one offered by Gardner-Webb College can receive a full second lieutenant commission in the United States Army, according to Mrs. Grace Lee, director of the department of nursing at Gardner-Webb.

Mrs. Lee said that in the past only those graduates from the baccalaureate degree program were commissioned by the Army. However, effective July 1, 1971, the requirements have been changed and graduates in the two-

year program will be commissioned.

"We are very pleased by this action of the Department of the Army," said Mrs. Lee. "We have always felt that the graduates from schools such as Gardner-Webb deserved the Army commission. They have been doing the same work as the baccalaureate graduates in the Army."

This applies only to graduates from accredited institutions such as Gardner-Webb which is accredited and approved by the National League of Nursing.
