Rutherfordton Drive Underway

Gardner-Webb's current capital funds campaign was extended into the nearby Rutherfordton community after the **SURGEON GENERAL'S REPORT ON SMOKING AND HEALTH**.

A goal of \$700,000 was set for this division, which includes Rutherfordton, Gilead, Spike, the college's overall goal of \$3,500,000—which already has reached nearly \$2,500,000. Donald Warren is general area chairman. Other steering committee members include William E. Neely, special gifts; Jenkins D. Keene, arrangements; G. Larson Clements, general gift; Mrs. Woodrow Jones, supervisor; and Tommie Hardin, Sam Hargett and Charles S. Andrews, division leaders.

Funds will be used for the construction of a new library, the conversion of the present library into a classroom building, a new dormitory, an addition to the present administration building, a new physical education complex and endowments.

Cash Awarded Honorary Degree

Gardner-Webb College was so confidant in honorary doctorate of humanities degree upon musician Johnny Cash in a column convolution service Sept. 28, beginning at 2 p.m.

Earlier that day—at 11 a.m.—Cash and his entire troupe of 14 were to present a concert in Spragle Stadium. An open invitation went out to general public, and a great crowd of listeners was expected to gather for both the concert and the convocation.

Cash—famous world-wide as an able and talented singer, musician and actor on radio, television, film and stage—was honored by the college for his work in another field. The honorary degree recognized his ignomous contributions in the areas of alcoholic rehabilitation, penal reform and drug abuse.

"We feel that Johnny Cash has done

as much as any other person in the country to help people in our prisons, those who are addicted to drugs and those with an alcohol problem," said Dr. E. Eugene Pasion, college president. "Much of his work in these fields has gone unnoticed as he did not seek or receive publicity for his efforts. However, those who know him best attest to his outstanding humanitarian efforts in these three fields as well as his Christian witness to all who came in contact with him."

Conferring of the degree was recommended by the college president to the faculty educational policy committee and the tone and character committee of the college's board of trustees. Both groups voted without a single dissenting vote to confer the degree.

Foundation To Assist Christian Vocational Students

A dedicated group from Gardner-Webb and the community have formed "The Christian Service Foundation of Gardner-Webb College" to provide scholarship aid for capable, deserving students preparing for full-time Christian vocational service.

Several students already are benefiting from the new foundation's help.

Membership is open to persons and organizations interested in helping financially needy students through gifts, bequests, etc.

Scholarships from foundation funds are awarded by the college's General Aid committee. It is proposed that half of all annual gifts be allotted each year as scholarships, and that the other half be placed in an endowed scholarship fund.

The foundation has elected the following as its interim officers during its organizational period: Dr. Thurman Lewis, head of the Biblical Languages Department, chairman; the Rev. Charles (Buddy) Freeman, college minister, vice chairman; and Mrs. Carl Lester, Methodist churchwoman of Lenoir, secretary-treasurer.

Freeman pointed out that many students preparing for Christian work cannot face heavy financial burdens, and that the foundation is aimed at providing help when possible. Some ministerial students, particularly, are married and have families when they answer a call to service, Freeman said. They must provide for their families while they undertake four years' undergraduate work

and three years' seminary training.

Recipients of foundation help must be full-time students preparing for Christian vocational work, who must maintain C averages grades, be of unquestionable moral character, take part in the college's field work programs such as internship and radio work, etc. Priority will be given to students majoring in Biblical languages, church music, religion and religious education.

A recipient need not repay his scholarship, unless he should terminate his studies or Christian vocation, but he will be expected to become a member of the foundation and encourage others to do the same.

Jeff Crawford of Charlotte, since religious education major and a Navy veteran, is serving as president of Gardner-Webb's student body. He was editor of *The Pilot*, campus student newspaper, last year. Dicky Sherrill of Portion is chief justice of the student government. Publications are in the hands of Tom Parker of Charlotte, yearbook editor; and Kathy Doves of Shelby, newspaper editor.

Tourneys, Mexico Trip To Highlight Basketball Season

Three tournaments and a four-day trip to Mexico City will be highlights of G-W's basketball season.

The tournaments are the Asheville Tip-Off Tournament, which matches G-W against UNC-Asheville, High Point and Morehead; the Kings Mountain Invitational, which includes Elon, Barber-Scotia and St. Augustine; and the Gardner-Webb Holiday Tournament with Lenoir Rhine, Mars Hill and Belmont of Nashville, Tenn.
