Kara M. Finch, '05, entered the human services field, because she saw the toll caregiving took on her grandmother. "My grandfather suffered with dementia for about 10 years before he passed," she related. "I watched my grandmother care for him for years, and I also saw the difficulties that she experienced as an aging caregiver herself. I realized the lack of services available to our older adults and not only wanted to be able to help my grandmother, but also those in my community."

Upon earning her associate's degree in 2003, Finch began looking for a

bachelor's program. Her instructors at Stanly Community College (SCC) in Albemarle, N.C., suggested she look into Gardner-Webb University's GOAL—The Degree Completion Program.

"I decided to go to GWU because of the flexibility of night classes and the ability to continue working full time while also going to school," recalled Finch, who lives in Locust, N.C.. "Additionally, the human services program at Gardner Webb was highly recommended by my instructors at SCC."

She valued the support and connection she received from her GWU professors. "It was encouraging to be taught by caring and compassionate individuals who truly wanted to see me succeed. Also, the ability to take classes close to home and continue to work was valuable to me."



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While work experience in the human services field is a valuable teacher, her Gardner-Webb professors provided the instruction she needed to become a better human services professional and ultimately to teach others. "Through hands-on opportunities, I learned how to effectively lead group sessions, how to manage crisis situations, and how to support individuals even when their beliefs and values are different from my own," Finch noted.
