

Rev. R. N. Hawkins read the following

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Your committee would direct your attention—First, to the work which is being done: secondly, to the persons employed in doing it; thirdly, the success attending their labors, and the means necessary to the accomplishment of the work which is being done.

It is confined within the limits of this State; but, thank the Lord, its influence and blessed results are not confined here, although this is its field. It consists first, in preaching the gospel in destitute places in communities where the preaching of the gospel, as we belive it, cannot be had without help from abroad.

There are many important places in this State where the voice of a Baptist preacher would not be heard but for this help; many of God's poor would not have the gospel preached to them. Secondly, among other things, we need Baptist convictions. Numbers of people yearly depart from us because of the lack of convictions. Thirdly, building houses of worship. This is needful. After a TC

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church has been organized the next thing is to build a home for it, otherwise it will soon go down. The State Board helps the needy church, not only in securing a pastor, but also in securing a house and establishing the work. By reference to the list of missionaries published in the minutes of our State Convention, you will see that some of the very best men in the State are in the employ of this Board, and that they are located at some of the most important and influential places, which are towns and villages, but in the years to come will be cities of no small importance. Our churches should grow with the communities where they are. It is a sad thing for a Baptist church to decrease while all other things about it are on the increase. The State Board had, last year, 106 missionaries; sermons preached, 20,934; addresses delivered, 21,303; mission churches supplied, 335; out stations supplied, 1,246; baptized, 1,768; added by letter, 1, 263; new churches constituted, 56; new Sunday-schools organized, 187.

Brethren, the success attending the labors of our missionaries is evidence that God has set the seal of his approval upon the work. Many churches once helped by the State Board—and but for this help, perhaps would never have existed---have now become self-supporting, and in turn are helping, with grateful hearts, other churches. We need more faith and prayer. We need, more than ever, to realize that this is God's work. He is the Author of it; he gave it to us; working with him and for him, we cannot fail. Difficulties are before us, but let us remember our Commander

Duficulties are before us, but let us remember our Commander and Leader---His power and presence. Let us talk to God more about the work. More earnest prayer is needful for missions. Let us labor for the coming of Christ's kingdom. God loved this work, and gave his Son for it. Let us pray to God more for this grand work.

Your committee would insist upon pastors that they be thorough missionaries, that they may influence the churches for missions. They are God's appointed leaders. If they are indifferent or alraid. little will be done; if strong and earnest, much can be accomplished to work up their churches in missions.

The pastor needs three things: 1. Convictions of God's truth; 2. Courage to speak the truth; 3. Consecration to earnestly, patiently press this truth until he brings it to pass.

Brethren, is not our State Board—the right arm of our State Convention—blessed of God in many ways? If so, then let us support it with our money and our supplication. It is only a short time until our State Convention will meet, and it is our duty as churches and as an Association to see that our Secretary will not have to report a debt, but be furnished with money sufficient to pay all the missionaries.

Boone, representing the Baptist Orphanage and *Charity and Children*; Rev. Charlie Blanchard, in the interest of Wake Forest College; Rev. J. W. Cobb, representing the *North Carolina Baptist*, published at Fayetteville, N. C.;

Revs. F. C. Hickson, J. D. Bailey, T. L. Briant, and brethren K. D. Edwards and W. C. Allen, were received as messengers from the Broad River Association, who bore to us from our sister, the said Broad River Association, the following message, viz:

WHEREAS, The King's Mountain Association has published in her minutes for 1895, a resolution detrimental to Rev. C. F. Felmet, one of our ordained ministers; and

Whereas, Rev. C. F. Felmet was lettered from the King's Mountain Church of that Association about November, 1892, in good and regular standing; and

Whereas, the said Rev. C. F. Felmet presented said letter on or about March, 1893, to the Clifton Church of this Association, and was received by authority of said letter; and

Whereas, the said Rev. C. F. Felmet continued a good member with said church until lettered by his request; and

Whereas, he is now a member of Brown's Chapel, a church in this Association; therefore, be it

Resolved 1st, that we appoint Revs. F. C. Hickson, J. D. Bailey, T. L. Briant, and K. D. Edwards and W. C. Allen, a committee of this Association to visit the King's Mountain Association at its next meeting, and demand a retraction of their resolution, or for them to prefer specific charges for actions since said letter was

them to prefer specific charges for actions since said letter was granted from King's Mountain Church, with proof to sustain them. *Resolved 2d*. That Rev. C. F. Felmet's life and walk, since with us, has been that which should characterize the gentleman and Christian, so far as we know or believe.

I hereby certify that this preamble and these resolutions were unanimously adopted by the Broad River Association at its recent session. [Signed] J. D. BAILEY, Mod'r.

On motion of Rev. T. Dixon to table said resolutions, a vote was taken, when the motion to table was lost.

WHEREAS, Our sister Association, the Broad River, of South Carolina, has complained at the resolution passed at the last session of this body in reference to C. F. Felmet: and whereas, the Associa-tion has preferred no charges against Mr. Felmet, but only stated the fact that charges affecting Mr. Felmet's character were in circu-lation, and advised that Mr. Felmet have these charges adjudicated by a jung of the by a jury of his peers in the ministry; therefore.

Resolved. That this body has no further concern with the matter. Resolved, That Elders T. Dixon, G. M. Webb and P. R. Elam be a committee to confer with the committee of the Broad River Association, and aid them in gaining information in reference to Mr. Felmet's case, and in any other matter concerning Mr. Felmet's case in which the committee may choose to act.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The cause of temperance is steadily gaining ground in our country, yet the great evil is still abroad in our land. Temperance organizations have done good, but they alone cannot crush the mons'ere vil. What we need to-day is prohibition in our churches, towns, counties and states. While we, as Baptists, profess to be the friends of temperance, we fear there is not that prompt action on our part to characterize us as such. Let all Christians of every creed. rise up in the name of our God and enter an earnest protest against intemperance. This seems to be our only hope.

Christians must take a decided stand against this evil. Brethren. let us rise up in the name of our God and break the coils of this monster and drive it from our land; for if all the men and money used in this business were turned into order other, and prosperity dustry, the great money problem would be settled, and prosperity and peace would reign supreme. The number of orphans has increased to the extent of the capacity The number of orphans has increased to the extent of the capacity of the Orphanage, and even beyond its capacity. There are now 144 orphans there, which is 24 more than was designed for the pres-sent buildings. This deficiency is being remedied by the erection of the Central School Building, which will relieve the school rooms in give additional room for 75 or 80 orphans. This building is in course of construction, but funds are still needed for its comple-tion. Besides the needed funds to meet the growing demands of the combans, there has come a stringency in current funds. Samuel tion. Several things conspire to bring about this: "Hard times," political excite-ment, etc., but we must not let the orphans suffer or be neglected in this political uproar. REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Education refer with great pleasure to Wake Forest College as the institution for the education of our young men. We refer with pride to its past history, its present high character, and its brighter prospects for the future: and especially would we refer to its liberal provisions for aiding young men desirous of de-voting their time to the ministry. And we would commend to the prayerful consideration of the churches of this Association, the interest of the Board of Education of the Convention, which provides for the expenses of these young brethren, as the churches should supply the necessary means thereof.

Your committee would recommend all the Baptist High Schools of the State, and especially the one at Cleveland Mills, in our own bounds, taught by Prof. W. B. Dove. We believe that the time has come when, as nearly as possible, each Association in the State should establish and foster a high school within its bounds as a feeder to Wake Forest and our Female Colleges.

We, therefore, recommend that this Association consider this proposition.

STATE AID TO HIGHER EDUCATION.
