45 Win Competitive G-W Scholarships

Gardner-Webb College has awarded \$10,000 in competitive scholarships to 45 high school seniors in five states. They'll enter G-W as freshmen in the fall.

The scholarships were awarded on the basis of competitive tests given on campus to students who were recommended by their high school principals and who had previously taken college board exams.

Top \$500 scholarships went to David Hergen Reit, Deborah Anne Beasley and Kay Rease Rollins of Shelby; Kimberly Kay Down and Marilyn Todd Pepe of Charlotte; Gary Lee Linzberger of Dallas; Kathy Ellen Dixon of Matthews; Missis Lee Lyles of Clinton, S. C.; Katherine Boaz Dobbins of Fort Mill, S. C.; and David Alan Jarman of Silver Spring, Md.

The \$250 scholarship winners are Nancy Virgin Spangler of Shelby, Terry Lee Lefford of Moonshera, Deborah Diane Morrison of Forest City, Pamela Ann Scaggs and Jacqueline Rachel Funderburk of Charlotte, Joyce Carol Campbell of Belmont, Dorothy Ann Elliott of Asheville, Janice Carol Holt of Durham, David Michael Winger of Hudson, Kathy Ann Grace of Huntersville, and Debbie Jane Phipps of Greenville, S. C.

Twenty-four others won \$100 scholarships.

Area Fund Drive Exceeds Its Goal

Gardner-Webb's capital gifts campaign in the Forest City-Belton Rutherford area netted more than \$115,000 for the college, well over the \$80,000 goal.

Robert A. Jones, area chairman, expressed appreciation to all who worked to make the drive a success.

"We felt that we would be able to reach our goal when it was set prior to the campaign, but we had no idea that we would exceed it as much as we did," Jones said. "We are very pleased with the results of the campaign and we appreciate all of the work that went into the drive."

Program Wins Award

G-W Public Relations Cited

Gardner-Webb's public relations program recently was awarded a certificate of merit by the Bayou Public Relations Association, holding its annual meeting in San Antonio.

The certificate is the second highest honor awarded by the association, which held competition in 25 categories with 298 entries.

Bill Boyd, director of public relations at Gardner-Webb, said this was the first time the school had entered the competition since he joined the staff three years ago.

"Considering that this competition is open to all Baptist colleges, seminaries, institutions and agencies all over the nation I felt that we did pretty good," said Boyd. "There are 56 colleges, six seminaries, and almost 300 other institutions including hospitals, state conventions, agencies, foundations, and

boards who are eligible to enter the awards competition."

Gardner-Webb also won a certificate of merit with a brochure, "The Decade of Advances." This booklet told of the growth of the college over the past 10 years.

The total public relations program entry was broken into five categories featuring a visit to the college by Billy Graham, the awarding of a degree to Johnny Cash, a successful capital gifts campaign, the announcement of senior college accreditation and the athletic program including the All-American awards in basketball site George Adams.

Boyd is a graduate of the University of Florida in Journalism and received his theology degree from Southern Seminary. He came to G-W from the pastorate in Florida.
