Dr. Hammett Named 'Alumnus Of Year'

Dr. Horace G. Hammett of Columbia, S. C., was named Gardner-Webb's "Alumnus of the Year" at the annual alumni banquet on campus May 13.

Former executive secretary of South Carolina Baptist, Dr. Hammett was cited for his many years of service to the denomination in the two Carolinas.

The award, voted by the board of trustees and presented by Dr. J. Roy Robinson, chairman of the banquet, attended by about 450 alumni and college family members.

Dr. Hammett came to the Boiling Springs school when it was a boarding high school in 1920. He played in the school's first foot-

ball game (also the first for Cleveland County) in 1922. The game resulted in a 6-0 victory over Coffey, S. C., but one player broke his arm—and football was subsequently banned in the county for several years.

Dr. Hammett later went to Furman on a football scholarship. He returned to Boiling Springs to teach English and mathematics and to coach. He was Boiling Springs Junior College's first athletic director.

While teaching at the junior college, he teamed with the young women who later became his wife to write the college's alma mater. She was then Miss Louise Woody, Wooddale, N. C., native who was chairman

of the music department. He wrote the words for the alma mater and she composed the music.

Dr. Hammett later served pastorate at First Baptist Church in Wilmington, S. C., First Baptist Church of Great Falls, S. C., First Baptist Church of Weyersville, N. C., and Temple Baptist Church of Durham. He was named assistant general secretary-treasurer of the General Board of the South Carolina Baptist State Convention in 1950. He became the general secretary-treasurer in 1962, retiring in 1968.

The award came as a surprise to Dr. Hammett. Earlier in the banquet program, he and Mrs. Hammett gave a witty account of how they came to write the college's alma mater. They formally presented Gardner-Webb with the original copy of the song, written in pencil on both sides of a sheet of paper—"because paper was hard to come by in those days." The manuscript has been sealed in glass for permanent preservation.

A moving rendition of the Alma Mater was given by the Hammetts and the college choral ensemble, directed by Dr. George Cribb.

Mrs. Hammett also was honored during graduation weekend with a citation for Christian service. (See article on Page 5)

Robed and capped in academic regalia, 273 Gardner-Webb graduates marched in traditional procession through the campus each May 14 to receive diplomas and degrees.

Afternoon commencement exercises were held in Bogt Gymnasium before an overflow audience of parents and friends.

Twenty-one of the graduates received two-year associate in arts degrees. The others, members of Gardner-Webb's second senior class, received bachelor of arts and bachelor of science degrees.

Four well-known North Carolinians were presented honorary doctorates,

and another was awarded a certificate of merit. (See related stories and photos.)

The Rev. Coy C. Privette, pastor of the North Kannapolis Baptist Church and president of the Christian Action League of North Carolina, gave the commencement literary address.

Graduates face a world in which many people place their values upon material things and neglect the welfare of others, the Rev. Privette said. Young people with higher values are needed in today's world.

"I realize that you know a lot about hypocrisy in our world and that is why I say, students, that we need you in

our government and in our church," he added.

Earlier in the day at baccalaureate, the Rev. Ernest C. Upchurch, director of the City and Metropolitan Missions Department of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, told the graduates their chief responsibility as Christians was "a ministry of service."

"We are loved before we love. We are served before we serve. You have been served by this college and now you graduate into an active voice and become servants as you minister to the needs of the world and its people," he said.

Christian Service

She and her husband, who was named "Alumnus of the Year" at the annual alumni banquet the night before, composed the college's cherished alma mater while both taught at the school. Formerly Miss Lucene Woody, she was head of Gardner-Webb's music department, organist for several churches, and a teacher of private music students.

"Following the Biblical admonition to use one's talents to the fullest," said Dr. E. Eugene Poston in making the citation, "Mrs. Hazenett has been active in all phases of church life and Christian service . . . In the most admirable way, she has harmoniously combined the multiple roles of homemaker, teacher, civic leader, mother, and Christian servant of her Lord Jesus Christ . . ."

Mr. and Mrs. Hazenett live at Columbia, S. C., and are the parents of two sons.

Honorary Degrees Awarded

Four outstanding North Carolina leaders were awarded honorary doctor's degrees by Gardner-Webb College during commencement ceremonies.

Each were R. Patrick Spangler of Shelby, chairman of G-W's board of trustees and John L. (Jack) Fraley of Cherryville, both awarded honorary doctor of humanities degrees; Dr. Norman Adrian Wiggins, president of Campbell College, honorary doctor of laws degree; and Dr. Vance Havner of Occonohoc, Baptist evangelist, honorary doctor of divinity.

Spangler, associated with family business enterprises involving six construction, cement and paving firms, is in his second term as trustee chairman. He served as national chairman for two major capital gifts campaigns for G-W, raising more than \$5 million for the school. He also serves on the Peace College Board of Visitors and on the board of trustees of the University of North Carolina. He and his family built Gardner-Webb's Spangler Stadium as a memorial to his father. A modern dormitory — R. Patrick Spangler Hall — and his endowed scholarships for students at the college are testimonials to his continuing interest in the institution. As a citizen, he has been instrumental in bringing many millions of dollars worth of new industry to North Carolina, and has worked for honest, efficient government in the political campaigns of four gubernatorial candidates.

Fraley has been president of Carolina Freight Carriers Corporation since May, 1970, having risen from the sales staff and his previous position as executive vice president. He has served on G-W's board of advisors, and as a trustee of Pfeiffer College and Charlotte College. He is on the board of stewards of Cherryville's First Methodist

Church and first vice president of the N. C. Motor Carriers Association. He has worked continuously for the economic development of North Carolina and the conservation of its natural and human resources. He has given much of his time, energy and financial resources to help others, particularly the young and less fortunate.

Dr. Havner is the beloved "boy preacher" who was licensed to preach at 12 years and ordained shortly before his 15th birthday. During 54 years of service for his Lord, he has preached or conducted revivals in 45 states and has held pastorates at Salem Baptist Church near Elizabeth City, N. C., and First Baptist Church in Charleston, S. C. He is the author of many books of sermons and inspirational messages, and for 40 years wrote a weekly column for The Charlotte Observer. Dr. Havner attended Gardner-Webb's predecessor institution, Stirling Spring High School in 1916 before studying at Catawba College, Wake Forest and Bob Jones University, from which he received a doctor of divinity degree.

Dr. Wiggins is a nationally recognized legal scholar who authored a definitive study of wills and estates and is the editor of a North Carolina will manual. President since 1967 of Campbell College, which he helped guide to accredited senior college status, he has served as president of the N. C. Foundation of Church-Related Colleges and the N. C. Association of Independent Colleges, and is a member of the Long-Range Planning Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention. He has served on the faculties of several colleges and universities, and has combined in remarkable fashion the careers of legal counsel, professor, governmental consultant, religious lay leader and college administrator.

Baseball Team Wins District Honors

Gardner-Webb's baseball became the second 1973 athletic team at the college to gain district honors when the Bulldogs went to the finals of NAAIA District 36 finals.

Catch Jerry Bryson's men lost a 6-0 game to district champion High Point. The Bulldogs whipped Pfeiffer and Guilford to advance to the finals.

The Bulldogs had an overall season record of 11-5, but the news that hit the Piedmont area during the Spring washed out nine Bulldog baseball games. This hurt the team's chances limiting their on-the-field action.

During the regular season the Bulldogs scored a 7-4 win over High Point and dropped the second regular season game 5-2

During the tournament, which was held in Guilford, the Bulldogs suffered most from the lack of hitting. Coach Bryson's men were shut out twice in the double elimination tournament, first 7-0 by Pfeiffer and then by High Point. The wins were 8-2 over Pfeiffer and 2-1 over Guilford.

Fitcher Bob Lail and Johnny Phillips did fine jobs on the mound for the Bulldogs. Lail gave up only three runs in two games, with only one of them earned. He struck out 27 men in two games of the tournament. Phillips pitched a fine 2-1 victory over Guilford, but was hit hard in the 6-0 loss to High Point.
