The Dover name stands solidly in bricks and mortar on Cardner-Webb the College campus, visible testimony to this Cleveland County family's support over many years.

Not so visible as the Dover buildings, but as essential to the college's growth, are other evidences of Dover assistance---well-stocked shelves in the library, endowment funds, the "Dover Scholarships" on campus. .

Even the college's president Dr. E. Eugene Poston, counts Dover financial help as the key to his own education as a young student. Hundreds of others can say the same.

Both the Dover Textile Group and Gardner-Webb College began in 1907, and their history has been a unique saga of two institutions interwoven in growth and community impact. Help has gone out to the coll-

ege over half a century from the Dover plants, Dover Foundation and the Dover family personally.

A legacy of interest in education from John R. Dover, Sr., founder of Dover Textile Group, became a tradition for his sons, Charles I. Dover and the late John R. Dover, Jr., and other family members.

As Dr. Poston put it: "The college's history shows that when Gardner-Webb has had a real need, the Dover family and the Foundation have come forth to help."

That assistance came at critical times in the college's earlier sturggle fro existance ---such as the 1940's when E.B. Hamrick Building had to be completed, an endowment had to be raised for entry into the Baptist state family of cole Baptist state family of colleges, and a library had to be erected.

The latest gift, of \$75,000, comes at another historical time in the life of the college --- growth toward excellence as a senior institution. Giving service as well as financial help, the young Dover Brothers devoted endless personal atten-tion to the college's financial

The present college library named in honor of John R. Dover, Sr., has been a special

beneficiary of the Foundation. It was insturmental in its construction and in 1968 provided a \$25,000 challenge gift for additional books.

The trustees were challenged to match the \$25,000 gift for books which gave the library enough books to attain accreditation as a senior college, before the school entered the four-year field.

"This was one of the biggest factors in the progress that was made in the library which stimulated the growth enough for us to acquire enough books to reach standards required for accreditation," said Dr. POS-ton. "This challenge gift was a vital and welcomed gift."

Many more volumnes have been added over the years through the Charles I, and John R. Pover, Jr. "bookshelves", utilizing other contributions. By longstanding tradition, Do-ver plant supervisors give "Mr.

Charles" donations for library books as his Christmas gift. He matches their gifts for books to be placed in the Gardner-Webb library. The family of John R. Dover, Jr. matches similar gifts in his memory for the library. These two sources have pushed the total number of books in the library to more than 50,000, enough to be an accredited senior college li-

Another building, the Charles I. Pover Campus Center erected a few years ago, is the heart of campus social life and houses cafeteria, bookstore, offices and student activity rooms.

Soon to rise at the college entrance is a new campus chapel to be named in honor of John

R. Dover Jr., and made possible by members of the family. As the campus center is the heart of G-W's social life, the chapel will stand as its spiritual center.

Taken together, the buildings the scholarships, the library books, the endowment funds given by the Dovers represent thousands of dollars given to Gardner-Webb.

"Mr. Charles" once called it "an investment in the future."

For Gardner- Webb and the Dover Textile Group, born in the same year in the same area, it's an investment that seems destined for dividends.
