Business Intern Program Launched

Is it possible for a college student to know what it's like to work in the business world before he graduates?

A new program at Gardner-Webb is giving business students just that opportunity.

First put into practice this past summer, the internship program allows a student to work with a business firm of his choice for three months, earning 15 hours of college credit in the process.

Six students completed internships during the recent summer session and spread the program a big success. The firms for which they worked—a savings and loan association, industrial plant, a linen service, and a television and appliance center—also felt the internships were worthwhile.

The program was instituted by the college's division of business and economics under the direction of Deck Andrews. It is designed to provide the student with actual business

experience and also to give prospective employers an opportunity to train and decide if they want to hire a young person right out of college.

"This program was under study for more than a year before we put it into effect," Professor Andrews said. "Many businessmen do not have a chance to evaluate a prospective employee until the person is already at work and under contract." He added that internships give both the business and the student an opportunity to evaluate each other and make a reasonable decision as to any future plans for working together.

Each participating business firm is asked to file regular reports with the college as to the student's progress, his work and his personal attitude. Students may generally sign up for this program during their junior or senior year.

G-W Begins 67th Year

GARDNER-WEBB began its 67th year in late August, looking toward some historic moments.

The year will see an expansion of campus facilities, testimony to the success of the college's recent capital gifts campaign.

Construction on the new John R. Dover, Sr. Library will get underway in early fall, providing one of the most modern facilities of its kind in the area. The present library will be converted into a classroom building.

The Webb Administration Building will be doubled in size in another construction project, hopefully allowing the college's entire administration to be housed under one roof. Because of a space shortage, various administrative offices currently are crisscrossed all over the campus.

The John R. Dover, Jr. Memorial Chapel now being completed is to be dedicated in late October. This modern and inspiring building has become the religious heart of the campus. It will house a chapel, offices of the college minister, Baptist Student Union quarters, and professors' offices.

The capital gifts campaign backing the present growth began with a goal of \$1,500,000, but already has passed the \$2,500,000 mark.

In addition to new buildings, Gardner-Webb begins the year with many new educational ideas, including the business internship program described elsewhere in this issue.

Remaining constant, however, is Gardner-Webb's continuing desire to provide top quality Christian higher education for its students, who number around 1,500.

GOALS for the future include continued upgrading of buildings, increasing the number of faculty members with doctor's degrees, expanding the curriculum, and increasing student aid to make it possible for more qualified young people to afford a college education.
