The committee on Temperance asked for more time to report and Rev. R. N. Hawkins read the following:

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

We, your committee on Religious Literature submit the following: First of all, the study of the Bible for the education of the family, which is God's first school. Other great helps are religious newspapers and good books. A good newspaper is within itself a kind of University. Good books, teaching us on definite lines are very essential. With the cheapness of newspapers today, every family, though they be poor, can have them. We will not say one paper, of course. Every family ought to have at least one good religious paper and then should take others. Paul wrote to a young preacher, "Give attention to reading." The mind needs nourishment as well as the body. Good reading furnishes the nourishment necessary to intellectual and spiritual growth. The great men of the age come out of reading families; many of the families very poor but read and gained inspiration and purpose.

No parent has a right to shut his family up in a dark room to live without a knowledge of the great things transpiring in the world touching the Kingdom of God. To do so is to commit a sin against every member of the family, against the State, against the world and against the Kingdom of God. We would recommend as good papers, the Biblical Recorder, the North Carolina Baptist, the Foreign Mission Journal and the Home Field, published at Atlanta, Ga. Remarks by Revs. J. C. Gillespie, C. J. Woodson, M. E. Parrish. The Report on Digest of Church Letters was adopted.

Bro. J. Y. Hamrick read the following:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Daniel Webster defines Temperance to be the moderate use of all things necessary and total abstinence of all things unnecessary. We believe the use of alcoholic beverages is not only unnecessary but of great harm mentally, physically and morally.

The liquor traffic of the present day is one of the greatest curses on the American continent. It is more destructive than the three curses of war, pestilence and famine. The American Grocer publishes annually, an estimate of the retail cost of stimulating beverages; and it says in its issue of March the 25th, 1903. that for the year ending June 30th, 1902, the retail cost of intoxicants for the year amount to \$1,172,569 255, which divided up would make 19½ gallons per capita; an increase of 93 per cent. since 1880. It is estimated that we have 200,000 miles of railroad carrying 600,000,000 persons annually and handling more than 1,000,000,000 tons of freight and that the gross income from all sources amount to \$1,588,526,037 an amount a little more than the annual drink bill of the nation.

It is evident from these figures that we are fast becoming a nation of drunkards, unless there is a change in this condition of things. We are gratified however to know that a great reformation is sweeping over our State, and over our entire South land that there are only a few counties now in North Carolina where liquor is sold under license.

We believe with the combined and continued effort of the Christian people, North Carolina can soon be made a prohibition State.

We would again express our desire that this Association by a preamble and resolution, again ask the next legislature to submit a constitutional amendment to the people of the State which will forever debar the manufacture and sale of liquor in the State. We ask the Christian people and the friends of temperance to see that the present temperance laws are strictly enforced against all violators.

Bro. B. T. Falls read the following :

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

We are now in the midst of an educational awakening. We have better school houses, longer terms and an ever increasing demand for better trained teachers. Our public school systems have proved inadequate to supply these demands and we are forced to draw upon our denominational schools to supply the deficiency. Our Ex-Governor to whose efforts North Carolina owes a debt of gratitude that she will not be able to pay until his ashes are mouldering in the dust, has labored for four years in behalf of universal education. and our present Governor with his matchless eloquence declares it to be his ambition to write his name higher in educational circles than his predecessor. This extensive education of the masses will demand a more highly educated ministry, upon whose shoulders the spiritual welfare of the people rests.

In this enlightened age and in the higher one that is before us, the progress the growth, and the welfare of Christianity depend upon the extent to which our ministry and our people are educated. Furthermore as a denomination the extent of our growth, and the degree of our progress will be measured by the value of our educational institutions. For we among the few pride ourselves upon the fact that it is under the light that our cause prospers.

The work of our master is indeed a great work, and he needs men of power to do that work, and it will be a great day for the cause of Christ when His people shall realize this pressing need. The pastors who shall take charge of our churches in the future will need an enlarged horizon, a better rounded view, a fuller vision, a deeper and stronger conviction on the matter of world wide evangelization, the burden of which rests upon their shoulders.

Your committee confidently believes that a minister who has gone through the course of study and training at Wake Forest College will have this breadth of vision and a fuller conception of the great work that he has to do, and will be a better builder in Christ's Kingdom.

Your committee then would call the attention of the association to two institutions which should have the support of not only every church in the association but of every member of the several churches in the association. The first of these institutions is Wake Forest College which is conspicuous this year for the following reasons: (1) The change of administration, (2) The large number of students enrolled there being 301 up to the present, (3) The improvement in the preparation of the new students there being a very few taking preparatory work, (4) The excellent spirit among the student body generally. Out of the 313 students enrolled 54 are supported by the Board of Education as compared with 47 last year. This means an expenditure of about \$500 per month. The Board of Education is using every precaution to place upon this list only competent and worthy men.

The second institution of which every Baptist of North Carolina should feel so justly proud is the Baptist University for Women located at Raleigh. The work of this institution is second in importance if indeed it may be called second to that of Wake Forest College. The power and force of an educated woman is a potent factor in the spiritual welfare of any community. The unique social position that she holds is rapidly bringing her to her own, and we have it of old that "the hand that rocks the cradle rules the world."

We would call attention to the need of a first class denominational high school. This school is needed not only for the Baptist as a denomination but by the community as a whole and your commit-

tee believes that if the matter is presented to the people in the proper way and sufficiently urged the people will support it liberally regardless of denominational views. We furthermore believe that its establishment will be a great help to the progress of general education.

The cause of Christian education is one that should demand the united support of every minister and pastor in this association. They can do much toward pressing this with the brethren from the pulpit and by individual work. Your committee recommends that they take frequent collections during the year for this purpose.

Met at 1:30 p. m. Prayer by Rev. J. M. Bridges. A collection of \$5.85 was taken to finish paying for carpet on King's Mountain church floor. (Woman's Missionary Society met at this hour in Presbyterian church.

Rev. J. V. Devenny read the following:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES FOR THE ASSOCIATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL

The Board of Trustees appointed at the last session of the King's Mountain Association looking to the establishment of a High School within the bounds of the Association beg to submit the following report:

The board met October 10th, 1904, and organized with J. V. Devenny Chairman, and Carme Elam Recording Secretary. At a subsequent meeting a set of by-laws was adopted for the governing of the business meetings of the Board, and J. H. Quinn was elected Treasurer. The Chairman was authorized to act as Financial Secretary in securing funds for building purposes

At a meeting held in the Baptist church in Shelby on July 10th, 1905; after the matter of a location had been thoroughly discussed by the board, Boiling Springs was selected as the location offering the best advantages, all things considered for said School. The Board at the same meeting agreed that an earnest effort should be made to secure in addition to the local bid of Boiling Springs community the sum of at least three thousand dollars in cash and good subscriptions before beginning the work of building. Of that amount the sum of \$1489 12 has already been subscribed and \$206.87 has been collected and paid over to the Treasurer of the Board.

It is the desire and purpose of the Board to proceed with the work of building at the earliest practicable date. In this undertaking the Board needs the hearty co-operation of all the pastors and of the entire membership of all our churches. It is most earnestly asked of each pastor that he present this matter to his church or churches and

take a collection for this object either in cash or in subscriptions payable in three and six months. It would be well for this work to be done in October or November of the present year.

The following vacancies having occurred in the membership of the Board it becomes the duty of the Association to fill said vacancies at the present session of the body. The terms of office of all of class one expire by limitation, namely: W. W. Washburn, L. S. Jenkins, G. W. Kendrick, J. M. Wilson, J. V. Devenny. Bro. A. T. Mull having failed to act with the Board, leaves a vacancy to be filled in Class Two. D. F. Putnam of Class Three having moved away his place is also vacant. Adopted by the Board Sept 21st, 1905.

The school matter was discussed by Revs. J. V. Devenny, A. H. Sims and Bro. J. H. Quinn.

On motion the report on Associational High School was adopted and vacancies on Board of Trustees filled as follows, viz: W. W. Washburn, J. E. McBrayer, A. H. Sims, J. M. Wilson, J. V. Devenny to fill expired terms; R. L. Weathers to fill vacancy in Class Two and J. F. Moore to fill vacancy in Class Three.

Rev. C. W. Payseur read the following:

REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

The election of Rev. M. L. Kesler as general manager of the Orphanage to succeed Rev. J. B. Boone who has held that position for the past ten years, was the most important work of the Board of Trustees within the year. Bro. Kesler is now on the ground and in charge of the Institution. His fine common sense, practical knowledge, tender sympathy and devotion to duty, evidently fit him for the great work to which he has been called.

A debt on the orphanage caused by the establishment of a system of water works and other extraordinary expenses, greatly hampers the work and ought by all means to be paid off this year.

There are over 300 children at the orphanage and a building now nearing completion will increase the number to 325. The current fund must be enlarged to meet the running expenses of the Orphanage, and, unless our contributions are enlarged we cannot hope to meet running expenses much less to pay off the debt.

The health of the children has been excellent since the fearful scourge of typhoid fever last fall, when more than 80 of the little ones were victims of that dreaded disease.

The plant, including the invested fund is worth \$160,000, and no other orphanage in the State is equal to the Thomasville Orphanage in the number of children cared for.

We urge our Sunday Schools to set apart one Sunday in each month as orphanage day and that a special collection for the orphanage be taken on that day. More than 300 schools in North Carolina have adopted this plan and it has been more helpful to them than to the Orphanage, since "It's more blessed to give than to receive."

We call the attention of our churches and Sunday Schools that Charity and Children can be had in clubs of ten or more to one address at sixty cents a year. Individual subscription is one dollar a year. Every cent of profit from the paper goes into the Orphanage Treasury. The cost per capita of maintaining a child at the Orphanage is about five dollars a month and this includes the salaries of all

the employees. Surely there isn't a church but what will pay the expense of one orphan one month.

The outlook before the Orphanage is bright, and truly brethren we should rally to its support Respectfully submitted,

The Orphanage was discussed by Revs, C. W. Payseur, W. H. Reddish and Bro. A. Johnson. On motion the report on Baptist Orphanage was adopted.

In addition to pledges to Orphanage fund in appendix, a hat collection was taken of \$33.19 and turned over to Bro. A. Johnson by the collectors.

On motion the Association adjourned to 8 p. m. Prayer by Rev. C. J. Woodson.

FRIDAY—NIGHT SESSION.

The Moderator called the body to order at 8 p. m. and Rev. M. E. Parrish read the following:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

In presenting our report we believe our first duty is to return grateful thanks to God for His blessings on our work during the past year. Never in our history have we so successfully lengthened our cords and strengthened the stakes. Two thousand two hundred and thirty-one baptisms were reported for the year. New stations have been opened for work and a number of new churches have been organized. Fifty new missionaries have been sent out. We raised in the home land \$283,415.88 for the support of this work. Thus we have the largest number of baptisms, the largest number of missionaries sent out, and the largest amount contributed to this work that we have had during any one year since its organization. This seems to be a manifest demonstration that God is blessing it and approving it.

The changed conditions on the foreign field is marked. The suspicions which formerly caused hostility and hatred have in a large measure given place to friendliness and love. The observance of the Sabbath, the family life of the missionaries, and native Christians, the new standard of living as exemplified by the converts, have all made a great impression, and it seems the day is near when we will see thousands turning to Christ.

The great growth of our work has brought us to a situation which demands careful consideration. Our Missionaries are now facing the largest opportunities in our history. In some places larger and better church buildings are greatly needed. In great and growing cities the little chapel should be supplanted with a neat, commodious building on a main Street.

In these building enterprises the native Christians who are mostly from the poorer classes cannot help much and should be assisted by the board. In some cases when the missionaries occupy small rooms, these have become crowded and they cannot do an enlarged work until they occupy a larger building.

Again, we need buildings for our Theological Training Schools. We have already more than one hundred men in these schools and soon this number will be greatly increased and we have no place

for them. A few thousand dollars spent on this part of the work now, would mean much for us in the near future. A careful estimate shows that we should spend not less than \$135,000 this year in permanent improvements. Our current expenses are now about \$375,000 a year or a little more than \$1,000 each day.

Your committee sincerely believes that it is the duty of this Association to endeavor to raise one day's expenses of our Board. We know we are amply able to do it and God would richly bless us in this noble advance. The work of the world is done by few. God wants a part to be done by you. Respectfully submitted,

SATURDAY—MORNING SESSION.

Met at 9:30 a. m. Music. Religious Exercises conducted by Rev. D. P. Bridges. The Moderator called the body to order at 10 a. m.

Bro. J. Y. Hamrick submitted the following resolution, viz:

"Whereas the King's Mountain Association has decided to erect an Associational High School and Boiling Springs has been selected as the site for said school, and,

Whereas the Sandy Run Association has for several years been agitating the establishment of a similar school, and,

Whereas the location selected by the Trustees of this Association is convenient to members of the Sandy Run Association; therefore,

Resolved that the Moderator of this body appoint a committee of five to attend the next session of the Sandy Run Association and extend an invitation to that body to co-operate with this Association in the erection and adoption of the school now under way.

Resolved Second, That the said Association be requested to appoint such a board or committee as in its judgment may seem best to co-operate with the Board of Trustees heretofore appointed by this body for the erection and operation of said School which shall be known as the school of the two Associations.

Remarks by Rev. A. H. Sims.

On motion the foregoing resolution was adopted and the following appointed under said resolution to attend the next session of the Sandy Run Association, viz: Rev. J. V. Devenny, Bro. J. Y. Hamrick, C. J. Woodson, R. L. Weathers and the Moderator A. C. Irvin added to said list by the Association.

On motion Rev. M. E. Parrish, J. M. Wilson and

F. P. Gold were appointed to get up a report on Woman's Work.

Bro. R. L. Weathers read the following:

REPORT ON TIME AND PLACE.

We, your committee on Time and Place recommend that the next session of the King's Mountain Baptist Association meet with the Beaver Dam church five miles West of Shelby on Thursday before the 4th Sunday in September, 1906.

We also recommend that Rev. A. H. Sims be appointed to preach the introductory Sermon next year with Rev. J. V. Devenny alternate.

Rev. A. H. Sims moved to amend the report by striking out Thursday and inserting Wednesday, 10 o'clock a. m. in lieu thereof. A lively discussion followed; participated in by Revs. A. H. Sims, J. V. Devenny, C. J. Woodson, M. E. Parrish and Brethren O. M. Mull, J. Z. Falls, G. A. Gold and R. L. Weathers. A vote on the above report was taken by ayes and naves without a decision. A rising vote was taken when 24 voted for the amendment and a greater number against. The amendment was lost. The committee accepted an amendment to insert after the word "Thursday," the words, "at 10 o'clock a. m." The original report with the "10 o'clock a. m." amendment was unanimously adopted.

On motion the Association declares it to be the sentiment of this body that the Association, hereafter, provide no preaching for Sunday at the place where this body shall convene.

Rev. D. G. Washburn read as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

"Enlarge the place of thy tent and let them stretch forth the curtains of their habitations." This has been the key note of the year's work in every department of our Home Mission work. The appropriation, have been increased about fifty per cent over any previous year. Great enlargement has been made in the cities among the Foreign population, in the Mountain School work, in Cuba and in the work among the negroes and also in the Church Building department. God's blessings have been found out on the forces at work on the different fields.

Many souls have been led to Christ and the spirit of consecration to our Lord and His work has been reported from many sections. Many baptisms have been reported from Cuba, and out in the Territories many great revivals have been enjoyed. The weak places have been made stronger, and earnest, aggressive work has followed these revivals. God's favors have likewise fallen upon our cities;

such as Baltimore, Memphis and New Orleans, and in the great centers, our Baptist cause has moved to the front, as never before during the past year. Other cities have been aided by our Home Board to very great advantage, and the results will be great in days to come.

The people of our mountain sections have been crying for help and our Home Board has heard their cries and lent them their helping hand. Our schools have increased in number, the work has been greatly improved in quality and the outlook is full of hope and promise.

We have eighteen schools with more than seventy teachers, and about four thousand students. We are bound to give thanks to God for the wonderful progress being made in our Home Mission fields by our Home Board. The religious destiny of the South lies in the hands of Baptists more than in any other and we as a part of Southern Baptists cannot slumber, but let us arise and do our part of this great word by enlarging our contributions to our Home Board.

Rev. J. V. Devenny read the following:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

All true mission work is one. For the sake of convenience we refer to the work done by our Board of Missions and Sunday Schools in supplying the gospel destitution within the borders of our own State as State Mission work. For the same reason the field of State Mission endeavor is generally considered under three divisions.

THE FIELD.

1. Evangelization in the eastern part of the state. In that section there is great destitution of the gospel as Missionary Baptists interpret it, while almost every form of perverted truth found in America seems to flourish there. The State Mission Board has sent many missionaries into this part of the field, many people have been converted to the true way and strong churches established in various localities, but much land still remains to be possessed.

2. Evangelization and organization among the factory population in the middle part of the State. The great industrial development of this section is producing rapid changes in the population. New towns are constantly being built and many are moving away from the old church and into the new community. There is most urgent need for preachers to meet these people with a pure gospel and meeting houses into which they may be gathered for worship. In some instances this need can be supplied by local efforts, but in many cases the needed work will be left undone unless our State Mission Board does it.

3. Educational work in the western part of the State. This section for the most part is well supplied with a pure gospel and church houses in which the people may meet. The great need is christian schools and christian teachers. This need is being supplied in some measure at least by our mountain school work carried on jointly by our State Board and the Home Mission Board, but the work should

be enlarged, and to insure permanent success, it must be well sustained.

THE WORKERS.

To cultivate this vast field the Board had under appointment for the conventional year ending with last December, 124 missionaries. During the present year 140 have been appointed. One of this number, Bro. J. C. Gillespie labors within the bounds of our own Association. Among these missionaries are to be found many of our strongest preachers, and perhaps there is no body of men to be found anywhere more consecrated and more ready to bear hardness as good soldiers.

THE WORK.

There has been steady growth in State Mission operations for the past several years, and the work being done is proving more and more effective.

The ideal, "A Missionary Baptist Church and an efficient Sunday School within reach of every person in our State" has not yet been attained. Rejoicing in what has already been accomplished, let us as an Association bid our State Mission Board "go forward" in the name of the Lord and Master

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND COLPORTAGE.

The Sunday School is of inestimable importance. It stands with the pulpit as one of the greatest evangelizing agencies of the present day. Nothing brings more manifest and better returns than the work in the Sunday School. We are glad to note that all but two churches in this Association report Sunday Schools, but we are sorry to note the great discrepancy between the numbers in our Sunday Schools and the membership in our churches. Last year we reported 3330 Sunday School scholars and 6682 church members, which indicates that a very large per cent of our church members do not take any part in the Sunday School work. We think it would be a fair estimate that not more than 15 per cent of our church members take part in the Sunday School work. This would be counting about four children and non-church members to every one connected with the church.

We also deem the work of colportage of great help in the development of our people and the propagation of our distinctive tenets. Good books and tracts are of incalculable value as an agency to indoctrinate our people and establish them in the faith. The power of a good book can never be overestimated, while tracts have often proved most effectual in bringing souls to Christ.

REPORT ON WOMAN'S WORK.

Our sisters of the Woman's Missionary Union during the year

have been earnestly pressing forward along several different lines of work. Their contributions show a good increase over any former year. They have done a noble work in giving out valuable information. Perhaps no effort which they have put forth will yield better results, however, than that among the young people. The movement to get all the Sunday School children interested in our various Mission enterprises, will yield rich fruit. Their contributions to Foreign Missions in the Southern Baptist Convention for last year was \$53,678.45. Their Christmas offerings alone were \$11,787.01. Their cash contributions to Home Missions through the year made the splendid total of \$30,698.32, an increase over the previous year of \$5,828.62. This does not include the large help given by boxes to the Missionaries. In our own State our women have 431 Societies in 47 associations.

They contributed \$14,287.93. Of that amount the Children's Societies contributed \$1,067.32.

The Kings Mountain Association has 6 Woman's Mission Societies, four of which report the following amounts raised this year: Boiling Springs \$20.60, Shelby Church \$97.70, New Bethel, \$7.16; King's Mountain, \$27.19.

Your committee commends this work to our churches and suggests that all work be reported each year to the Association through the regular church Treasurer.

The above report was discussed by Rev. M. E. Parrish. Said report was adopted. On motion Woman's Work will have a place in the order of business hereafter. Bro. J. Y. Hamrick offered the following resolution:

Whereas the association has most heartily endorsed the report on Temperance which favors the abolition of the liquor traffic from the entire State. And whereas, prohibitions are ineffective without some method or plan to put them in force and effect,

Resolved, Therefore, that a committee of three representatives be appointed by the Moderator of this body to convey to the next Legislature, the wishes of this body and to urge the submission of such a constitutional amendment to the voters of the State.

The above resolution was adopted, and pursuant thereto, the Moderator appointed Revs. M. E. Parrish, C. W. Payseur and Bro. Carme Elam to present resolution to the next General Assembly of North Carolina.

Report of committee on Associational High School adopted by the Association of 1904 and re-printed by order of the Association of 1905 as follows:

In view of the educational needs of the present day, of the constantly increasing number of young people who are becoming members of our churches and whose efficiency and usefulness depend so largely on their early training, and in view of the duty as well as the ability of the King's Mountain Association to provide educational facilities for the youth within her bounds, it is the opinion of your

committee, that a Denominational High School ought to be established. For the accomplishment of this object your committee would make the following recommendations:

I. That a Board of Trustees be elected at the present session of this body consisting of fifteen representative brethren to be divided into three classes. The five first named shall constitute Class One and shall hold office for a period of one year. The five next named shall constitute Class Two and shall hold office for a period of two years. The five last named shall constitute Class Three and shall hold office for a period of three years. It shall further be the duty of the Association at each annual session hereafter, to elect five representative brethren to succeed those whose term of office may expire with said session. Said brethren when so elected, to hold office for a period of three years. Provided, that when a vacancy occurs on said Board from death, resignation or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the association to fill said vacancy at its next annual session.

II. That the Board of Trustees herein provided for shall be a body incorporated with power to act as representative of the Association, to acquire property by gift, purchase or otherwise, collect funds and administer the same, select a site and erect buildings thereon for school purposes, employ and dismiss teachers, and exercise all the duties and privileges commonly exercised by such bodies.

III. That it be the duty of said Board of Trustees to present to the Association, on the second day of each annual session, a comprehensive report of its work during the previous year.

IV. That it be the duty of said Board of Trustees to have a meeting within one month after their election and organize by making one of their number Chairman, one Recording Secretary and effecting such other organization as may seem to them wise. That, at an early date, they shall procure a charter from the state, under the provision of which they may act.

Bro. Esley O. Green was asked to draw a copy of the resolution to be presented to the Sandy Run Association in regard to High School.

On motion collection on Sunday will be applied to State Missions.

On motion the list of Licentiates is ordered omitted since church letters sent out by the State have no blank space for them.
