Personnel Shortage

Nursing Program Serves A Real Need

Nursing, a field really being a personnel pinch, is getting a real boost from the nursing program at Gardner-Webb College. It offers a two-year nursing program for registered nurses.

For this school year, the number of students enrolled in the program has almost doubled. This year's 105 fall-semester students compare to around 65 in past years.

The majority of the students are from

Cleveland, Rutherford and Cherokee counties. They come from as far north as New York and as far south as Florida.

The Gardner-Webb program has the distinction of being one of only three fully accredited programs in the state out of 21. The program is accredited by the North Carolina Board of Nursing and the National League for Nursing as well as the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges.

In its sixth year of operation, the program will have graduated by the end of this year 128 nurses. Out of this number, 119 have written and passed the state board exam. The other nine graduates are expected to become licensed at the next writing of the board. There are very few programs in the country that can claim the success of the Gardner-Webb program in the high percentage of graduates becoming licensed by the state board.

The nursing department is constantly coming out with innovative programs to keep up with rapid technological advances. An example of this is the Auto Tutorial Laboratory Study Program. Through this program the nursing students are taught by individualized systems in every technique of nursing. After hearing and seeing the proper procedures, the student actually practices what she has seen with the latest equipment under close supervision.

In addition to daily class work the students receive supervised "on the job training" at Cleveland Memorial Hospital in Shelby and Rutherford Hospital in Rutherfordton. Without the aid of these two fine hospitals the program could not exist. The students also work one week at North Carolina Orthopedic in Gastonia and five weeks at Broughton Hospital in Morganton.

A big plus for the student is the availability of the College Level Examination Program (CLEP). Through this program the student can earn credit for a course without taking it provided he or she scores high enough. For example, one nursing student earned 24 hours of credit through this program.

Another program offered is licensed practical nurses, to man in the medical camp and to transfer students is the challenge examination. If high enough scores are made on this examination, six hours of credit can be given for the first level courses in nursing. This is a big advantage for the LPN who wishes to become a registered nurse. For this reason many older students are back in school to obtain the advanced standing.

"There is a vast shortage of nurses," explained Mrs. Grace Lee, director of the department of nursing. "Wakely, we have requests from Maine to Florida urging our graduates to locate with them."

GWC Enrollment Sets New Record

Gardner-Webb has an enrollment record with a total 1,567 students registered for the fall term.

The total includes 963 men students and 594 women, according to Mrs. Dorothy Edwards, college registrar. The freshman class, with 568 students, is the largest. Sophomores number 382; juniors, 501, and seniors, 555.

Enrollment includes students from 37 of North Carolina's 103 counties and from 23 other states. Thirteen foreign countries are represented in students from Bermuda, Iran, Lebanon, Israel, Taiwan, Thailand, Venezuela, Brazil, Colombia, Haiti, Hong Kong, India and Nicaragua.

GWC Sports: From Gridiron To Gym

Even before the close of the football season, basketball was in the air. The Bulldog cage opened with a big victory over Pikeville College of Pikeville, Ky. 99-79.

The football team has had rough skidding this season, even though Coach George Litzan's gridiron played some fine football. With one game left on the schedule, the Bulldogs had been able to win only two of 10 games. However, it would be well to point out that the G-W football team played some of the highest rated small college football powers in the country.

Two of the teams, Carson-Newman and Presbyterian, are in the top 10 of the NAIA. In fact, the Carson-Newman team finished second and earned a play-off spot for the NAIA

national title. G-W lost to Carson-Newman 34-17 and to PC 35-14.

The Bulldogs also played Elon, the Carolinas Conference title winner, losing 20-0. The two G-W victories came over Georgetown, 35-0, and Guilford, 10-0. The Bulldogs closed out their season with a Thanksgiving afternoon game with Lenoir Rhyne.

The basketball team got off to a flying start by whipping a good Pikeville team. Coach Eddie Holbrook has a young team this year. He has three seniors, but only two will start. His other starters include two freshmen and a sophomore. This lack of experience will make it tough for the Bulldogs to repeat as district champions and fourth place finishers in the NAIA.
