Psychology Intern Course Begun

An innovative psychology intern program is creating much enthusiasm in its first year at Gardner-Webb.

Six students were involved in the program this semester. Three of the students are working with guidance counselors in the public schools. Three other students are involved in a residency program at Gardner-Webb.

Student interns in the public schools system are located at Shelby Junior High, Kings Mountain High School and Central Junior High in Kings Mountain. The interns work with the school guidance counselors in the area of individual counseling and group counseling.

Interns involved in the campus residency program help teach introductory counseling classes for non-majors and are in charge of a one-hour counseling lab per week. The student interns also receive valuable experience by counseling students who are interested to them.

Qualifications for the program require that the intern be a senior psychology major and that he has had courses in psychopathology and counseling.

The interns are also involved in a seminar in

which they discuss the situations dealt with. Valuable guidance is given not only by Dr. James Haghighi, chairman of the intern program, but by other interns as well. Actual and theoretical issues and situations are discussed. Often counseling sessions are videotaped so interns can evaluate their own counseling effectiveness.

"Much time is spent in self exploration," commented Dr. Haghighi. "One must understand himself before he can effectively relate to others."

Twelve students have been involved in the program, six last fall and six this spring. The consensus is that the intern program is an "eye-opening" experience. The interns have received valuable experience that otherwise would not have been possible without the program.

Future plans and possibilities for the program are many and varied. It is hoped that the program will lead into other areas, such as industry and non-academical institutions. Also, the possibility of student counselors on campus could become a reality. The student counselors could lead self-exploration groups and handle some counseling.

Charting The Future

What's ahead for Gardner-Webb College as it faces the challenges of the Seventies and beyond? Goals for the future are a coordinating area of planning for the administration and faculty who chart the college's progress.

At the beginning of the school year, a "Seven K" program for future growth was advanced for consideration and recommendations. Plans call for a concrete program to be created by this fall.

The "Seven K" program as now outlined includes the following:

- Every department with 60 per cent faculty doctorates.
- Enlargement of the library to a size sufficient for a master's degree program.
- Every department with a detailed plan for future implementation of a master's degree program.
- Every building air-conditioned and brought up-to-date.
- Emphasis on academic excellence and Christian commitment.
- Enlargement of the college's endowment fund.
- Emphasis on campus beautification.

Curtis Joining Coaching Staff

A successful young high school coach, Shelby, N.C., native Steve Curtis, has joined Gardner-Webb as an assistant football coach.

The 31-year-old Curtis will assume his duties as offensive line coach in the summer. He comes to GWC from a position as head football coach and athletic director at Barnes High School in Cleveland County. He previously was freshman coach at Western Carolina, and also coached five years at East Rutherford High School in North Carolina.

Curtis received a bachelor's degree at Appalachian State University and a master's degree at Western Carolina University. He lettered three years as a football guard while attending ASU.

Athletic director Eddie Hollbrook and football coach George Litton were pleased with the addition of Curtis to the staff.
