## Bulldogs \* Accept New Bowl Bid

Gardner-Webb's gridiron lopers to promote with a bid to play in the first annual Poultry Bowl in Gainesville, Ga., Dec. 8.

They were packed by bowl officials to compete against the powerful Stephen F. Austin University team of Nacogdoches, Texas, in the new event, officially sanctioned by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

As this issue was prepared, the excited Bulldogs and their head coach George Linton were enthusiastically ready to represent the college and the Southeast as host team is the bowl, to be played in the 10,000-seat City Stadium. The college family, students, Bulldog Club members and other fans arranged bus trips and car pools for the game.

The Bulldogs closed their season with a 33-20 win over Wofford College and a 22-20 win over Lenoir-Rhyne College, for a 7-4 won-lost record. Bob Smallwood, executive director of the bowl, and those two wins within six days brought the Bulldogs to the attention of the selection committee.

Coach Linton said that his team voted without any dissent to accept the bowl bid. The game began practice immediately for the game, close to home for us Bulldog players who live in the greater Atlanta area.

The Stephen F. Austin team was rated the game favorite, winning seven of its last eight games for an 8-3 season. This college has an enrollment of 10,527 students, as compared to GWC's 1,257, and it is a perennial power in all NAIA sports.

Eddie Heilbrook, GWC athletic director, said the Bulldogs didn't mind being considered the underdog, however.

"The forecasters have been wrong about us all season," he quipped.

For most fans, the bowl bid marked the coming of age for the Bulldog football program in senior college status.

## Student Writes Theme Song

Many people shy away from becoming involved with problems of other people. Danny Cook of Boone does not shy away and for his efforts is receiving national recognition.

Cook, a freshman at Gardner-Webb College, has been addressed by the heartsick that birth defects bring to a family since his elementary school days when he first became aware of the problem. As a sixth grader Cook became involved with the March of Dimes and since then has become a youth leader in the organization.

During his junior and senior years in high school he served as the Blue Ridge council chairman for six counties in Western North Carolina. The summer of 1973 he was appointed as the Western North Carolina chairman over the March of Dimes' Teen Action Program (TAP) and College Action Program (CAP).

As the Western North Carolina youth chairman, Cook attended the March of Dimes Convocation in Boulder, Colorado, the past summer where the trend to his national recognition began. While at the convention, he and Tammy Martin, delegate from Louisiana, sang a song which had been written about Kathy Garver, the national youth chairman, for the March of Dimes.

Miss Garver, better known as Suzy on the television program, *Family Affair*, had served the organization for six years. Cook composed the song in two days. He was asked to write another song.

Recently the organization adopted a new youth symbol. It was felt by the national leaders that a theme song was needed to simplify the meaning of the March of Dimes symbol. Cook was contacted by Mrs. Lucille Ray, the director of youth activities for the national foundation, to compose a theme song for the national organization.

Cook wrote "Moving Mountains" which has been adopted naturally as the March of Dimes youth theme song.

Cook has many responsibilities in the National organization. He helps coordinate youth programs for the state. He makes appearances throughout the state speaking to civic organizations and school on the role of the March of Dimes.

Beside a heavy academic load at Gardner-Webb, Cook wants to work with high schools in the area and let them know about the March of Dimes. He also hopes to hold a symposium on the March of Dimes at Gardner-Webb.

He spoke recently on the organization's activities to a statewide youth symposium.

"The March of Dimes is an educational and fund raising organization that works to combat birth defects," said Cook. "The March of Dimes serves the public by providing funds for research, offers medical services, provides professional education and public health education and offers valuable community services. Now the polio has almost been eliminated the efforts of the organization are aimed toward birth defects."

"After seeing kids mentally and physically defective and seeing what the March of Dimes was doing to combat this I wanted to become involved. The more I saw the more I wanted to do. I hope to make these problems the center of my life's work."
