New GWC Radio Station On The Air

Gardner-Webb College has a new "voice," a 5,000-watt educational FM radio station which went on the air in late January.

WGWC has a radius of about 50 miles and can be tuned in at 88.3 on the FM dial from 8 a. m. until midnight daily. The studios are located on the campus and the 200-foot tower is just north of the college in Boiling Springs.

College President Dr. E. Eugene Poston said that Gardner-Webb hopes the station will be a community asset and resource, offering Chris-

tian and educational features as well as stereo music and broadcasts of Bulldog sports. The station also will provide training opportunities for students in the radio broadcasting field.

Much of the equipment for the station was made possible by a gift in excess of \$30,000 by the family of the late Lee P. Frans of Hickory, N.C. The Frans family has been a supporter of the college for many years.

Ellis Greenway, a veteran of 30 years in radio, is the station manager.

WGWC began broadcasting Jan. 22 with a "sign on" ceremony at which Dr. Poston presided. He was joined by several representatives of the college administration, students, trustees, board of advisors and the board of associates.

GWC alumni are cordially invited to tune in the station and send along ideas for station programming and features, reports Jerry Walker, director of development and alumni activities. Suggestions can be sent to the alumni office on campus.

Mrs. Swofford Honored For Service

Mrs. Maggie Camp Swofford '39 of Gaffney, S.C., was honored with a special citation at Gardner-Webb's first mid-year graduation ceremony, held in December.

Mrs. Swofford, who attended the Boiling Springs institution when it was a high school, was cited for the financial help she and her late husband, C.F. Swofford, have given to many students at Gardner-Webb and other colleges.

Since her husband's death in 1968, the citation states, Mrs. Swofford has continued to share her time, talent and means with others.

"Perhaps motivated by a sense of Christian duty, perhaps because of a son who was unable to go to college due to an untimely death—whatever the reason—Mr. and Mrs. Swofford stand as example to all of us, and indeed the world, of those who share their concerns, their affections and their means with their brothers and sisters in Christ," the citation states.

Seventy-five students received diplomas during the commencement exercises. They included 36 who earned bachelor of science degrees, 17 granted bachelor of arts degrees, and two earning associate in arts degrees.

Dr. E. Eugene Poston, college president, challenged the graduates to find God's place for them and do the very best they can, never being satisfied with anything less than their best effort.

Program Honors Baptist Youth

Two hundred and fifty senior high school students were to be honored by Gardner-Webb at a Baptist Youth Appreciation program at the college Feb. 14.

Members of college's Board of Ministerial Associates, made up of 125 Baptist ministers of North and South Carolina, Georgia and Virginia, were each asked to bring two young people, a boy and girl, from their churches to the college for a program including one of America's top entertainers, Ray Stevens, and his group.

The Rev. Hatcher Elliott, chairman of the board of associates, and the Rev. Eugene Epperson, chairman of the board's ministerial education and scholarship committee, worked with college officials in planning the program and other activities.

Young people were to be chosen on the basis of their service to church and community. Churches were asked to recognize the young people in the local church and then the college was to honor them with the presentation of

specially prepared certificates when they visited the college.

The Feb. 14 program was scheduled to include a banquet for the young people, their pastor and his wife prior to the Ray Stevens concert.

"We feel that we have some very fine young people in our churches and we want them to know that we appreciate their service to the church and the community," said the Rev. Elmore, superintendent of Junior Order Children's Home, Lexington, N. C.

The idea of the appreciation day originated with the board which worked with college officials in the details.

"Too often we do not give enough recognition to those young people in our churches and communities who do give of their time and effort to make it a better place to live," said the Rev. Mr. Elliott, pastor of Beverly Hills Baptist Church, Asheville.

They're Seeking An 'Individual' GWC Experience

Gardner-Webb's student body this year includes children of the presidents of two other Southern Baptist colleges.

The students are Laura Lindsey, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Harold Eugene Lindsey, and Steve Johns, son of Dr. and Mrs. John Johns. Dr. Lindsey is the president of North Greenville College in Greenville, S. C., and Dr. Johns is president of State University in Deland, Fla.

While expressing a deep respect and appreciation for the schools their fathers serve, both Laura and Steve indicated they wanted a college experience in which they would be treated as individuals and not as the president's daughter or son. They feel they're getting this environment as members of GWC's freshman class.

Miss Lindsey, an 18-year-old sociology major who plans to study toward a master's degree in special education or social work, and she chose Gardner-Webb after visiting two other campuses because "I felt I could be the most at ease here."

"I feel I am being exposed to an complete a college experience as any other student," she added. "If I had attended North Greenville, it might have been hard on me as well as to my fellow students and the faculty."

Johns said he wanted to go to a church-related school and that he found the Piedmont Carolina area in which GWC is situated.

"Having relatives close by in Shelby and Forest City also was a determining factor in my decision to attend Gardner-Webb," he said. "I wanted a small school and one in which the atmosphere would be as friendly as it is here."

Johns is a 19-year-old history major who hopes to obtain advanced degrees in special education.

In Memoriam

D.W. Register, Sr. of Shelby died Dec. 31, 1973, at the age of 79. A well-known Tar Heel basketball and civic leader, he served on Gardner-Webb's advisory board and was a lifelong supporter of the college. His guidance, service and philanthropies had an impact on hospitals, mental health care, the trucking industry and safety, schools and education throughout the state and nation.

Garric Lee Kendrick, 78, of Gastonia died Jan. 2, 1974, after a life given to service to church and community. He served as a Gardner-Webb trustee and was one of the college's most devoted supporters. Mr. Kendrick was president of Kendrick Brick & Tile Company of Mount Holly and honorary chairman of Home City Products, which with his company merged. Gardner-Webb staff members remember him as a "special person" who extended them all a warm interest and friendship.

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Bulldogs Lose Poultry Bowl

Three second half touchdowns spoiled the hopes of the Gardner-Webb Bulldogs in the Poultry Bowl, as they went down to defeat at the hands of the much heavier Stephen F. Austin Lumberjacks of Texas, 31-10.

The score was 10-3 at halftime with the Bulldogs still very much in the game. The Bulldogs lost two first scoring chances, one when they advanced to the four-yard line and another when they had a first down on the six and had to settle for a field goal in the first half.

The Bulldog running game was slowed by the early first period injury to Frank Taylor. On Taylor's first carry of the game he received a leg injury and was unable to return for the final 55 minutes of playing time. Taylor gained more than 1,000 yards for the Bulldogs during the season.

The first Bulldog score came on a 23-yard field goal by Mike Stephens. The Gardner-Webb touchdowns was scored by junior half-back, Scott Thompson from the two-yard line. The Bulldogs worked the ball 61 yards on the scoring drive.

Bulldog sophomore George Gilliam gained 118 yards in 16 carries and quarterback Dock Davis passed for 197 yards hitting 12 of 26 attempts.

The Lumberjacks' scoring came on a 31-yard field goal in the first period, one touchdown in both the second and third periods, and two touchdowns in the fourth period.

The game closed out the Bulldogs' most successful season in sense college history with seven wins and five losses, including the trip to the Poultry Bowl.

Cagers In Midst Of Good Season

The Bulldog basketball team is having its best season in the school's history as a senior college. Coach Edith Holbrook's cagers were riding the crest of a 14-game winning streak as they took a ten-day break for a three-game tour of Europe.

The Bulldogs were to play two games in Rome and one in London before returning for the final five regular season games.

The high-flying Dogs have won 17 games and lost only two. Both of the losses were early in the season and both were by two points. One loss, a 63-61 defeat by Creighton, came just as the final buzzer was sounding. Marymount of Salina, Kansas, dressed the Bulldogs 81-79 with only eight seconds left on the scoreboard clock. This game was played in Hays, Kansas.

The 17 wins have seen the likes of such as Morris, Lesos Rhyne, Belmont Abbey,

Presbyterian, Keanee State, Livingstone, Catawba, Fort Hays and others go down before the onslaught of the fast running Dogs.

This year the Bulldogs will play, before the regular season comes to an end, teams from nine states and two foreign countries as Holbrook's men take to the road as well as inter-area at home.

In District 26 play the Bulldogs had a perfect 7-0 mark and in NAIA play they were 13-0. Tournament defeats do not count in determining which teams qualify for the district play-offs.

In the weekly NAIA poll the Bulldogs had grabbed fifth spot and as they win it is possible this ranking shall be improved. The NAIA is made up of more than 100 colleges in every state in the continental U.S.
