A well known South Carolina Baptist minister and a state denominational leader of North Carolina Baptists will speak during graduation exercises at Gardner-Webb May 12.

Dr. H. Edwin Young, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Columbia, S.C., will be the commencement speaker, and T. Robert Mallin, executive secretary of the Council of Christian Higher Education in Raleigh, will be the commencement speaker.

Dr. Young is a native of Mississippi and earned his bachelor of arts degree from Mississippi College. He earned the bachelor of divinity degree from Southeastern Seminary and was awarded an honorary doctorate by Furman University.

The Rev. Mallin is a native of Georgia and earned his associate of arts from Gardner-Webb College and his bachelor of arts degree from Wake Forest University. He earned the bachelor of divinity degree from Southeastern Baptist Seminary.

## Summer Courses

Four summer workshops for college seniors and public school teachers will be offered this summer at Gardner-Webb. The workshops will be tuition free to school teachers who have signed their 1974-75 contracts.

The following courses will be offered:

**Free Enterprise Today**, taught by Dr. LeRoy F. McDonald, June 17-June 21, three semester hours credit, 9 a.m. daily.

**Introduction to Basic Principles of Transformational Grammar and Their Practical Application to the Teaching of Composition**, taught by Dr. Betty Cox, June 24-July 18, 9 a.m., three semester hours.

**The Study of Recent Innovations in the Secondary School Mathematics Curriculum**, taught by Dr. Paul Jolley, July 20-Aug. 9, three semester hours, 1 p.m.

**A Study of Relations Between Various Racial and Cultural Groups in the United States**, taught by Professor Cecil Wilho, July 9-July 26, three semester hours, 9 a.m.

A summer travel study program will be conducted June 27 through July 31 with a group of selected students studying in Salamanca, Spain, at the University of Salamanca. This course is under the direction of Professor Alvin Setzer.

Other workshops may be offered if enough interest is shown.

## Grant Funds Fly Ash Research

A Gardner-Webb College art professor has been awarded a grant by Duke Power Company to do research in the use of waste products from power plants, lumber yards, and mines.

James Rush, director of the college's art department since 1965, will use the money to research the use of fly ash, a waste product of the steam operated electrical plant, as a constituent in ceramic glazes, ceramic artwork bodies and structural clay products such as brick and terra cotta products.

Professor Rush will be experimenting with the use of fly ash as a component in ceramic products and as an ingredient with other waste products found in the Piedmont area such as Italian olive waste from Kings Mountain, lime waste from Cherokee County, S. C. and wood ash from South Carolina lumber yards.

The waste products will be incorporated into ceramic compositions using native clays and other ceramic minerals from the Piedmont area of the Carolinas.

Professor Rush has been working with waste products and native minerals more than 15 years dating back to his student days at Clemson University when he began experimenting with wood ash in ceramic glaze.

Six months ago Rush, working with Max Moser, Jr., superintendent of the Duke Power Company's Cliffside steam station, began experimenting with fly ash deposits from the power plant. The two men, along with Wayne C. Beaver, Duke chemist, made some encouraging discoveries in the field.

Through this study and experimentation with the waste product from the steam plant, Rush obtained enough tangible evidence to re-

quest a research grant in order to do further investigation in bringing his theoretical objectives to a satisfactory conclusion.

Professor Rush said that he believes the problem of pollution and ridding the environment of waste can be solved only when industry, educational and research institutions and the government join together to solve this problem.
