On motion of Brother J. H. Quinn, the rules were suspended and all the old officers of the Association, to-wit; J. W. Suttle, Moderator, Jno. P. Mull, Vice Moderator, J. J. Lattimore, Clerk and George Blanton, Treasurer, were re-elected.

Brother W. G. Moore, who was appointed to preach the Introductory Sermon, being absent, Brother W. G. Camp proceeded to preach the Introductory Sermon, reading the 10th chapter of Luke. His text being the 36th verse: "Which now of these three thinkest thou was neighbor unto him that fell among the thieves". His subject being: "The Good Samaritan." This subject he very ably presented, likening the travelers unto humanity, the Priest and Levite as our religious leaders and the Good Samaritan as a good neighbor, clearly showing us a neglected duty we owe to humanity.

Following the sermon Brother W. O. Johnson led in prayer.

Brother J. J. Hicks read the following:

REPORT ON BIBLICAL RECORDER.

For 88 years the Biblical Recorder has been the organ of North Carolina Baptist. During these years its influence which it has wielded over the Baptist in this state, has done much toward the promotion of every department of the denominational work. Its pages are used freely by the servants of the denomination who have charge of our institutions and varied enterprises. The paper is true to its name. It is Biblical in its teachings and records the acts of North Carolina Baptists from week to week. It stands for the Baptist cause and the winning of souls for Christ, for the enlightenment and edification of the soul and for the enlistment of our people for service in the various phases of the denominational and world wide Christian work. It stands for the true Baptist doctrines, as we hold and interpret it according to the teaching of the new Testament. It stands ready at any time to go to the defence of our great principles when necessity demands it. The Recorder is more than a denominational paper. It is also a family paper of the best type. In its columns it carries the most wholesome matter to the family circle. It gives notes on the current events and publishes a digest of the important acts that occur during the week. The news letters that it gives from the various churches and pastors are very important and in a large way is a helpful feature to the paper and its many readers. Its columns, which contain notes from the mis-

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sionaries on the foreign fields, enables its readers to respond more readily to the great mission work. The last page in the Recorder is for the home, and we believe that much care is taken by the editor in selecting matter for this page. The Recorder is owned and controlled by a joint stock company, which was organized by request of the Convention about 21 years ago, to own and publish the paper. But while it is under private ownership, a committee of seven, appointed by the Convention, act with the seven directors, when the election of an editor is necessary. This puts the selection of an editor practically in the hands of the Convention. Since the high cost of printing has returned to its normal state, again the Recorder returns to its normal price \$2.00 per year. In some of our Churches the budget plan has been adopted for the Recorder. If all our Churches would adopt the budget plan, and see to it that at least 75 per cent. of the members have access to the Recorder, in their homes, then the collection could be taken for the Recorder as it is for State Missions, or any other object. By this plan we believe that a greater and more efficient work will be done by the Recorder for the Baptist cause in this state. Believing that the work that the Recorder has been and is doing is far reaching in its effort upon our denominational life and prosperity, therefore, we your committee, recommend and urge that every pastor and leading member in our Churches of the Association make a greater effort than ever before to place the Recorder in every home in this Association.

Brother Jno. P. Mull read the following:

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Sunday school is one of the most important parts of the church work. It is the one department of the work of the church which is open to all classes and ages of the church and community. Some one has said that 75 per cent. of all the members received into the different churches comes through the Sunday school. In view of these facts it is surprising to see how little interest the members of the churches take in Sunday school. From the report in the Minutes of last year we see that the enrollment of the Sunday schools of this Association was a little more than 71 per cent. of the total membership of the Churches of the Association. Taking it as a fair estimate that at least 20 per cent of the enrollment of the Sunday schools is composed of children and others who are not church members we find that only about 50 per cent. of our Church members are in any way engaged in Sunday school work. By the report in the minutes of last year only five churches report a larger number in the Sunday school than members in the Church, when if we were really interested in Sunday school work as we should be, every Church ought to report a larger Sunday school enrollment than the Church membership.

What are the causes of this lack of interest in Sunday school work in the churches? First the indifference of the Church members to this branch of the work and; Second inefficiency of the Sunday school workers to get the Sunday school lesson properly presented to the people.

The Remedy: We your committee recommend to the different churches that you immediately try to enlist every member of the church in the Sunday school and that the Association make an effort to arouse interest in teacher training and better equipment for Sunday school workers and we suggest that one or two of the fifth Sunday meetings of the Association be devoted exclusively to Sun-

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day school work under the direction of the State Department of Sunday School work.

Brother J. M. Walker read the following:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

The Baptist State Convention was organized 91 years ago for the evangelization of the state and the education of our young preachers. As the needs became apparent new departments were added until our present splendid organization has been reached. Slowly the work went for a long time, but the rapid developments in recent years show how wisely and well the foundations were laid.

At least two-thirds of the money contributed by the Baptists of the state comes from Churches that were planted and fostered by the State Board of Missions. It is estimated that one-half of our churches were organized by the missionaries of the State Board and they have baptized more than 75,000 people, several of our foreign missionaries among the number. A bequest of \$100,000 was made to our Orphanage by a business man led to Christ by a State Missionary.

Many churches, once weak, and aided by the Board, are now pouring their thousands into the Lord's treasury among them, Asheville, Charlotte, Raleigh and Wilmington.

In spite of this splendid record there is still destitution in the East, and great need of development in the West. Leaving out children nearly half of our adult population are not Christians.

Our Denominational schools must have the support of our Baptist people.

Hyde county with only two Baptist Churches is now a strategic point.

In spite of the financial depression, our people are heroically

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trying to meet the pledges made to the Seventy-five Million Dollar Campaign.

It is gratifying to witness the success of our Baptist Assemblies, the Mobile Schools, the Baptist Foundation, and the new School of Applied Stewardship.

With confidence in God, we look forward to the "Win One Campaign" in October, and the "Half-a-million Tither's Campaign" in December.

Our people are being taught to give systematically and regularly and they did it last year to the amount of \$1,153,731.42—almost ten times as much as during any previous years.

Brother W. G. Camp being absent from the afternoon session on account of sickness, Brother W. A. Elam read the following:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, with headquarters in Atlanta and with Dr. B. D. Gray as its corresponding Secretary, seeks to operate throughout a vast territory. Its tasks have been gigantic. Its successes glorious and still its opportunities are many and golden. The Home Board aids in many fields of labor. Time allows us to consider only a part of them, namely: Co-operative Missions, Evangelism, work in Cuba and Panama, Church Building Gifts, Building Loan Fund, Mountain Schools, Baptist Sanitorium, Missions among Soldiers and Sailors, also regular work among Foreigners, Indians and Negroes. Please let us note briefly each of these departments:

Cooperation Missions is the cooperation of the Home Board with each separate state. This department has nearly 1,400 Missionaries who baptized last year 25,000 people.

Evangelism deserves and holds a large place on the program of the Home Board. In the year 1919 the Missionaries of the Home Board baptized 25 out of every 100 who joined our churches.

Both Cuba and Panama are receiving aid and attention from our Board. Some of the Cuban churches are making rapid strides

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toward self-support. Last year the Havanna church alone raised for all objects \$5,000.

Gifts to Churches are being discouraged. It is preferred that loans be made. Three quarter of a million dollars were given for building last year, while about half a million was loaned for building purposes. There remain five thousand congregations among Southern Baptist who have no house of worship, no Church building.

The Mountain Schools—39 in all, are wielding an untold influence. They employ 229 teachers and enroll more than 6,000 students. Eight of these splendid schools are in North Carolina.

The Southern Baptist Sanitorium is located at El Paso, Texas. The building and equipment have cost about \$400,000. More than 100 patients have already received treatment there.

Among our borne Soldiers and Seamen there is a great need of missionary effort. This need is being met only in part. Seventeen faithful workers have gone to labor among them.

Among the foreigners who have come to our shores we have 81 Christian workers, 11 among the Indians, and 33 among the Negroes. If the foreigner can be brought to know our Christ, the Indian to trust our Savior and the Negro to serve our Lord, many of our present day problems will solve themselves.

From the 75 million campaign the Home Mission Board received last year over \$1,500,000 and paid out almost that amount. It is estimated that if every Baptist in the South would give one-tenth of his income to the Lord's cause, we would raise not only \$75,000,000 in five years but four times that much in one year. There are in the South 36,000,000 people, 22,000,000 of them do not profess to know Christ.

Facing these startling facts, should any one of us be too selfish to give, too faint to pray, too weary to work, or too impatient to wait until His Kingdom come in our beloved Southland?

In the absence of Brother W. G. Moore, who was to have made the report, Brother W. O. Johnson read the following:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The year 1920-21 marks an epoch in the growth, expansion,

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and efficient and effective organization of Foreign Missions. We wish in this report to mention some few of the things that make the year epochal. The Foreign Mission Board sent out last year the largest number of missionaries ever commissioned in a single year. In the going out of these volunteers Southern Baptists gained recognition as a positive and vital missionary force, such as we had not had heretofore.

In the London Conference of July 1920 we came into vital touch with other Baptists in the great enterprise of giving the New Testament Gospel to Europe. We assumed the obligation of evangelizing the following countries of Europe, Spain, Jugo-Slavia, Hungary, Roumania, Russia and the Ukraine, together with work begun in Palestine several years ago by the Baptists of Southern Illinois. Since this Conference Baptists have made more advancement in Europe than in any ten years of modern Baptist endeavor in Europe.

Southern Baptists gave last year, as a free-will offering for the suffering of Europe and China more than \$250,000.00 through the Foreign Mission Board. This does not take into account possibly, as much or more given through other channels.

The Foreign Mission Board is now at work in 18 nations, with a combined population of 900,000,000. We sent out 72 missionaries last year, and have already appointed 52 this year. More converts were baptized on foreign fields, and the churches made greater financial advancement last year than ever before. A total membership of 59,438 gave last year in contributions \$295,438.00. An average of nearly \$5.00 per member. We have now 457 Missionaries and 611 mission churches.

Our golden age in missionary effort seems to lie just ahead of us. We are sure that under the leadership of Him, who gave us the great commission, we are going more rapidly and surely than ever before to carry His commission into execution.

We your committee would recommend:

1. That we make an extra effort to meet our obligations to the 75 Million Campaign.
2. That we as a people strive to become better informed about recommend mission study classes for all church members, our work and what we are accomplishing, and to this end we would
3. That we pray for our workers and trust that God shall lead

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us into our very best accomplishments in His name.

Dedmon and G. W. Kendrick, life long members of the Association, both of whom are desperately ill, and also prayer for the beloved Pastor of Bethlehem Church, Brother W. G. Camp, who was stricken with sickness at the noon hour today.

THURSDAY MORNING

The Association met at 9:30 o'clock, according to order of adjournment, and after several selections by the choir, Brethren A. H. Sims and F. G. Walker led the Association in prayer.

Song: "Lift Me Higher"

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Brother J. M. Kester read the following REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

When Jesus placed the command to teach the principles of religion alongside the command to evangelize, He gave Christian education a distinct place in the world. Today education is receiving much thought and money in order that civilization may be lifted to the highest plane. But education of the state cannot be Christian. It can educate the mind but it cannot educate the heart in the precepts and principles of Christianity. Hence, Christian education must be supported by the Christian Churches.

The need for leaders, safe, sane, and Christian in the world of today is urgent and paramount. The world is being re-adjusted. It will be adjusted according to its leadership. It should and must be adjusted on Christian principles if it is to be permanent and to carry forward the great purposes of God. The need therefore for Christian leadership is beyond question.

In order that our Christian schools may turn out as many and as well equipped leaders as possible they must be supported by the churches and equipped with the best and latest equipment. They must have the moral support of the membership. They must have the financial support of the membership. They must be upheld in prayer to the Lord. To criticise and scantily support the schools means death to their efforts.

Therefore, we urge that constant and earnest prayer be made for the faculties and student bodies in all our schools, and that all those who have children to educate consider carefully the importance of sending them to the Christian schools and colleges, and also that such financial support as necessary be given willingly and cheerfully to equip the Christian schools to carry out in the best possible way the Lord's command to "teach all things whatsoever He has commanded."

Brother J. H. Quinn read the following ANNUAL REPORT BOARD TRUSTEES OF BOILING SPRINGS HIGH SCHOOL.

To the Kings Mountain and Sandy Run Baptist Associations:

The fourteenth year of our school closed April 18th. Considering

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the financial depression of the country, your school succeeded well.

Total enrollment for the year, 309—167 girls and 142 boys, a decrease of 57 from the previous year. Number in graduating class, 45—30 were girls and 15 were boys. Largest graduating class in history of the school. Total graduates to date 226.

Expenses of operating the school for the year were as follows: Teachers' salaries \$13,435.74; Equipment and repairs, \$921.87; Night watchman, \$600.50; Fuel, \$3,036.45; Light, \$624.25; Incidental expenses, \$8,075.36; and boarding department, \$19,470.41; making a grand total of \$46,164.55 for all expenses.

The income booked for the year was as follows: from Tuition, \$10,172.50; from board, \$19,470.41; for room rent, \$1,197.75; from heating, \$3,036.45; from light, \$624.25; from incidental, \$5,651.68; from special departments, \$5,022.79; from the state educational board, \$2,630.00, and from interest on endowment \$64.60, making a grand total of \$47,870.43. Of this sum, a total of \$44,836.36 has been collected, leaving a balance of \$3,034.07 yet due, the greater part of which is thought to be collectable. If all is collected, there would be a surplus of \$1,705.88, which the school greatly needs. The Kings Mountain Association is yet due sum of \$111.79 and Sandy Run \$197.70 on Ministerial Tuition for the last two years.

Through the earnest efforts of Professor Hamrick and his co-workers, we now have a complete and much needed system of electric lights in all the buildings.

Fall term of school opened August 8th with much larger attendance than was expected, under existing circumstances. The following changes in Faculty were made on account of resignations: Prof. H. D. Powers succeeds Rev. W. G. Moore in the Bible Department, Mrs. Wallace succeeds Miss Banks in Household Arts, and Miss Taylor, a graduate of Meredith College, succeeds Miss Martin in History Department.

Present class enrollments as follows: Intermediate Dept. 20; Freshman class 49; Sophomore, 43; Junior, 51; Senior 42; Specials, 9; making a total enrollment to date of 214. Of these, 103 are girls and 111 boys. There are 154 boarding students. The following states are represented: North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, Georgia, Connecticut, and Oklahoma. Eighteen North Carolina and six South Carolina counties are represented. Classified by churches, there are 148 Baptist 7 Methodists and 1 Presbyterian. We have 118 students from Cleveland and 20 from Rutherford county. There are 102 from the Kings Mountain; thirty-nine from Sandy Run, and two from the Gaston association. In the Special departments, we have as follows:

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Bible, 65; Music, 63; Art, 17; and Household Arts, 17. There are 10 Ministerial students and 119 in the B. Y. P. U.

The brick work on the beautiful Memorial building is completed and the work of covering is now in progress. As soon as the roof is on and the sash placed in windows, work will again stop, unless additional funds are provided at this term of the Associations. The exceedingly high price of labor and material last year made the building much more expensive than was anticipated by the architect. When completed, the building will cost approximately \$60,000. Total amount pledged to date, \$43,500. Collected by treasurer on subscriptions to date, \$27,420.36. Due on pledges \$16,079.64. Estimated additional sum needed to complete the building \$15,693.73. In other words, we need \$32,721.20 to repay borrowed money, to pay outstanding bills and to finish the building.

The terms of the following members of the Board of Trustees expire with this session of the two Associations: Kings Mountain Association—B. T. Falls, J. H. Quinn, J. Y. Irvin, D. J. Keeter and C. B. Wilson. Two other vacancies occur from resignation, viz: Carme Elam, whose term expires in 1922 and E. C. Borders, whose term expires in 1923. Sandy Run Association—W. T. Tate, G. B. Pruett, J. J. Edwards, J. F. Alexander and D. M. Harrill.

Although our young sister, the Gaston County Association, appointed a special committee in 1919 to visit our school and report back to that Association in 1920, relative to accepting our invitation to become one of the joint owners of our school, and although said committee made a favorable report, the Association did not finally act upon the matter but appointed another committee to make further investigation and report back this year. It is to be hoped that that Association will take favorable action on this matter at its approaching session and our beloved school will soon have three strong Associations at its back. If the South Fork Association has not definitely connected itself with one of our other Baptist schools, we recommend that the invitation be renewed to that Association to join with us also.

The Boiling Springs Baptist Church, appreciating the need of adequate accommodation for our student body has erected a new house of worship that would be a credit to any church or to any city. It is well arranged in every way for Sunday School work and all Church organizations. The total cost of the building will amount to \$. The church contemplates calling a pastor at an early date for his full time. With our school buildings forming a semi-circle around this church building, the Christian character

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of our school will always be emphasized.

We point with pride to the effective work that is being done in our Bible Department under Prof. H. D. Powers, who specialized on Bible in college. For the accommodation of all grades of the school, a Junior Bible Class has been organized and we now have two classes daily in the Bible. The student body has organized three separate B. Y. P. U. Unions, a Y. M. C. A. and a Y. W. C. A., all of which are well attended. As a rule, the moral and Christian influence of the Ministerial students has a healthy influence over the student body.

We take great pleasure in expressing to the pastors and ministers of the two Associations our hearty appreciation for their kind co-operation in all things pertaining to the best interest of our school. The success of the school is largely due to their influence and co-operation. Your board would be glad to have all pastors of the two Associations made advisory members of this board and to have them meet with the board at least once each year for consultation.

REPORT ON CHURCH FINANCE.

In comparing our financial report of the past year with that

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of the preceding, we are forcibly reminded of the fact that one year ago we met at the close of a year of great abundance; while we are now meeting at the close of a lean year, marked by declining prices and a scarcity of money.

The gratifying part of the financial reports coming to us at this time is the splendid generosity that has been manifested in maintaining the local work of the churches. Fourteen churches made slight reductions in pastors' salaries, but nine churches increased the payment for this object, with result that total pastors' salaries paid this year amount to \$21,049.34, compared with \$17,995.67 the preceding year. We are pleased to report that all the local activities of our churches have apparently been generously financed.

The disappointing part of the report is found in the large decrease in our contributions for benevolence. The total amount contributed for the 75 million fund this year is \$16,744.91; while that reported for the preceding year was \$33,554.32. From this it appears that our contributions for benevolence during the past year were only about one-half of that paid during the preceding year. We recognize the fact that it is of first importance that the local work of our churches be liberally financed. Yet, as missionary Baptists we cannot afford to be selfish in our contributions.

Your committee would recommend that a personal canvass be made annually and every member of every church be urged to make a definite pledge for both local objects and for benevolence.

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The Thomasville Baptist Orphanage was the first Church Or-

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phanage to be established in the state. There was a great fight made on it, before it was born. Its founders were called "narrow" bigoted, selfish, and other complimentary things, but they had faith in God and men, also foresight to keep right on and silently endure the abuse that was heaped upon their heads, knowing that their cause would triumph in the end. Mr. John H. Mills, the father of the orphanage work in North Carolina, was placed at the head of the institution and began to form an organization, that for efficiency and reliability, has hardly been surpassed by any other in the state. Mr. Mills found the people of the state, wherever he went, eager to help along the work. Mr. Noah Biggs of Scotland Neck, gave the first thousand dollars for a building, and this brother was one of the greatest benefactors the Orphanage ever had. Other buildings followed and in a short time a half dozen cottages had been constructed. Mr. Mills was a powerful personality and for ten years he guided the Orphanage through the treacherous waves and out into the open sea, and when he left the work in 1895, it was thoroughly established in the hearts of the Baptist people of North Carolina. Mr. Mills did foundation work, upon which the present splendid structure rests. Rev. J. B. Boone succeeded Mr. Mills and began his work September 1st, 1895. He was the Orphanage builder and reconstructed every building on the hill. Mr. Boone was not a great speaker, but he was a man of rugged strength and could build a house. His crowning work as general manager, was the re-organization of the Orphanage school, making it one of the most efficient and best in the state. After a term of service for 10 years, Mr. Boone retired in 1905, and was succeeded by Rev. M. L. Keesler the present general manager. Coming to the office in 1905, he has given 16 years of service to the institution. During this time there has been immense development. The plant with the invested fund, represents a half million dollars; maintaining 446 children at Thomasville, with a branch home in Lenoir county known as the Kennedy Home, with 85 children there, making a total of 531 children. The grounds have been beautified and the social life of the institution has been uplifted. The general manager, has in a large measure, eliminated the bleakness and dreariness of the old time Orphan Home and has made the Orphanage a beautiful and attractive place to live. Mr. Keesler has had excellent success in his aim to develop and cultivate the finer things, so that the Orphanage is now a beautiful, clean, wholesome, healthful place, with fine opportunities for practical training along many lines for the children who go there. The current fund

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has reached the enormous sum of \$150,000.00 and it comes as regular as the seasons. The Churches and Sunday schools are trained to listen to the cry of the Orphanage and they promptly respond with tender joy. Since one of the buildings has been destroyed, by the recent fire, it is prayerfully hoped that the churches, Sunday schools and individuals of the Kings Mountain Association will do their full part in replacing the building which was burned. Our denominational life will be, and has already been, greatly strengthened and enriched by our devotion and loyalty to the Orphanage.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE, SOCIAL EVILS AND PUBLIC MORALS.

We are in the aftermath of the war and are reaping the crop of evils that always follow wars. There is an apparent wave of

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crime and lawlessness sweeping country. We have sufficient laws to cover all the cases that may arise even in abnormal times, but in some instances these may need modification to conform to the Federal statutes. What we are in need of now is a savory sentiment in favor of law enforcement. Hardly a week passes that does not record the death or serious injury of some enforcement officer at the hands of men who are engaged in the illegal liquor traffic, while every community has its problems to meet in this respect. The menace to proper law enforcement is that large element in every community which seems to be indifferent, but are rather inclined to aid the traffickers with sympathy and sometimes with material aid.

We your committee would call every member of every church align themselves on the side of right in regard to all the social evils and especially that of strong drink, which is in many ways the hand maiden and foster mother of them all. No church member can afford to hold a compromising attitude on any of those things that are so demoralizing to our people and especially our young people.

We would recommend to the churches of this association:

1. That they strive to create a more vital moral sentiment in each church community respecting slack Sabbath Observance, the social card party, the public and private dance, the indulgence in strong drink and the participation in its manufacture and sale.

2. That we call on the parents represented in our churches to be more diligent in leading and training their children in respect to these evils.

3. That the pastors shall consider in conference the advisability of setting aside some Sunday or month which shall be used for creating public sentiment, by any and all the agencies of the Churches.

We endorse the work of the Anti-Saloon League in its efforts to build up a better sentiment for law enforcement and urge our people to use their speakers wherever it is possible to help strengthen such sentiment. We earnestly urge the Baptists of North Carolina to take an uncompromising stand against this evil in our country, and to stand by the laws.

(1) That each church of the Association be asked to raise an amount equivalent to \$1.50 per member; it being understood that the Churches that have already contributed to the special amount be credited with same.

(2) That the Association ask its Moderator, Rev. J. W. Suttle, to direct the raising of these funds, and see that the matter is presented to every church; and that his expenses and a reasonable compensation be paid by the trustees of the School.

(3) That the pastors of the churches of the Association, in cooperation with Brother Suttle, bring this matter before their churches before November first, and report results to the director, Rev. J. W. Suttle.

During the last State Convention year there were 241 new Societies organized in the state, making a total of 1,633 in the state. Number of subscribers to Biblical Recorder and Mission Magazines 9,637.

The women of State gave last year to all objects \$314,004.00.

The educational work among our women both in State and Association is going to lead the women into larger and better service.

The women need the cooperation of the men and let us not be satisfied until the women are organized in every church.

The problem that now confronts us is, what are we going to do with this great host of new converts that have come into our churches? How are they to grow and become active workers in His Kingdom? They must be given something to do. They must be trained in active Christian work while they are young. Where are they to get this training? It must come largely through the B. Y. P. U. This movement has reached a stage in its development when all thoughtful Church leaders recognize its necessity.

To what extent are our Churches taking advantage of the training of our young people offered by the B. Y. P. U.? The number of unions in our association has gradually increased but a great many of our churches have not taken advantage of the opportunity the B. Y. P. U. affords for training in active Christian work. They are still depending on a few gray-headed deacons to lead the public prayers, conduct the prayer meetings, lead the singing, and give most of the money that is given. A church that has an active B. Y. P. U. will begin to use some of the young people to take some of these duties. A B. Y. P. U. that lives up to the standard set for it will develop members who will naturally ask, "What Can We Do?"

In view of the fact that there is an urgent need for interesting our young people in the work of the church we recommend the following:

First, that every church in the association consider the advisability of organizing a union.

Secondly, that all unions be urged to strive to reach the standard of excellence set for them.

Thirdly, that we heartily indorse the organization of an associational B. Y. P. U.
