Chapel Organ Given

A masterful rental by Michael E. Arnswood, organist, was to highlight an October 27 service dedicating the new pipe organ in the John B. Dover, Jr., Memorial Chapel on campus.

The organ is a gift to Gardner-Webb in Mr. Dover's memory from his family—Mrs. Dover, Mr. and Mrs. John B. Dover III, Mr. and Mrs. G. J. Vinson, Mr. and Mrs. Charles I. Dover—and The Dover Foundation.

The rental organist is presently associated with one of the foremost music programs in the United States at Trinity Presbyterian Church in Charlotte, under the direction of Gossypa Darr. He has studied extensively under American and European masters.

The new instrument was built by the Reuter Organ Company of Lawrence, Kansas, and specifically designed for the Dover Chapel. The organ has 22 full ranks of pipes and two extensions. One of the two manuals of the organ is under expression, and there is a total of 1,161 pipes in the instrument. The ranks, or rows of pipes, were chosen to allow all historical periods and styles of music to be played authentically. Dr. James Good of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary served as the voicing consultant, working with the organ company's voicing technician. Specifications and design of the organ were prepared by Mrs. Sandra W. Jerrell, college organ instructor, in consultation with Russell Dyer, the organ company's area representative.

The organ is suitable for choral and congregational accompaniment, for teaching purposes, and for solo and recital performances.

U.S. Marine Band To Perform At GWC Nov. 5



The U.S. Marine Band, shown here in the nation's capital, will appear in concert on the Gardner-Webb campus Nov. 5 as a part of its national tour. Such tours have been held annually since John Philip Sousa organized the first one in 1880 so that Americans might hear "The President's Own."

The approximately 50 superbly-gifted musicians will perform at 7:30 p.m. in West Physical Education Building for students, the college faculty and the public. General tickets at \$3 each are on sale at usual outlets within a 50-mile radius of the college.

A 1:30 p.m. matinee has been scheduled, in addition. It's primarily for members of area high school bands.

The performance is being held under the auspices of the Student Center Board of the college. Proceeds will benefit college activity.

The program will include marches, classics and popular music. The opening strains of a fanfare announce the arrival of Major Jack Sims, director, onstage, and the traditional "The Marines Hymn" closes the concert.
