Craig Classroom To Be Dedicated

The Habet M. Craig Classroom Building will be formally dedicated on Saturday, May 17 on the Gardner-Webb Campus. The ceremonies, to be presided over by Trustee chairman J. L. Nichols, will be held in conjunction with the Alumni Banquet at 7:00 p.m. in the Charles I. Dover Campus Center dining room. Many family members and friends of the late Mr. Craig are to be in attendance.

The building, which formerly housed the Dover Library, has been completely remodeled to house the Art, Education and Mathematics Departments.

These facilities, made possible by a generous gift from the late Mr. Craig's family, has been in use since the beginning of the current school year.

The plaques on the front of the building read:

Family of Mr. Habet M. Craig. Mr. Craig was a staunch believer in Christian Higher Education. He served on the Board of Trustees of several Baptist colleges, including Gardner-Webb. As president of Gaston

County Dyeing Machine Company, he used his influence and personal assets to further the cause of Christian Education. His influence will be continued in this building.

GWC Annual Alumni Dinner Set For May 17

Gardner-Webb College's annual Alumni Association Banquet will be held on the campus Saturday, May 17. All former students, faculty, staff and board members are invited and now's the time to make reservations.

Seniors who will graduate the next day as the class of 1975 will be special guests at the buffet dinner, to be held at 7:00 p.m. in the Charles I. Dover Campus Center's main dining room.

Climaxing the event will be the presentation of the annual "Alumnus of the Year" award, conferred by the college's Board of Trustees for service to the school and fellow man.

Officers and directors will be elected during the business session. Ten directors will be named to three-year terms and 10 others to one-year terms.

Spring Sports

The spring sports teams at Gardner-Webb have gotten off to a fast start.

Leading the four sports is baseball. Coach Jerry Bryson's diamond squad has compiled a 15-0 record to date including Bryson's 2004th career win at the college.

The Bulldog baseballers opened the season with a 9-6 loss in Clemson then came storming back with 19-1 and 16-0 wins over West Virginia Tech. Other wins have come over Oklahoma, Cal State, Slippery Rock State, New York State, and Lincoln Rhyne.

Leading hitters after eighteen games were Dave Rogers, left fielder batting .438; designated hitter, Greg Harter, .404; and center fielder Rasty Huffman, .400.

The track team coached by Ed Freeman is one of the best ever to represent Gardner-Webb. The record to date is 3 wins against 1 loss. Many new school records have been set and old ones broken since the spring.

G. T. Johnson set school records in both the long jump (27'7") and the triple jump (44'5"). Alan Howell, Roger Reaty, Johnny Walker, and Devin McAllister set a new mark in the 400 yard relay (48.9). Alan Howell lowered his own record time in the 400 yard hurdles (55.1), and Phil Seady broke his own record in the mile with a 4:29.2.

The golf team has an even 2-2 record in matches with wins over Penn State and Lincolnton. The losses were against Wofford and UNC Charlotte. In recreational tournament play the 'Dogs of Coach Garland Allen have finished 15th in the Furman Tournament, 6th in the Red Fox Invitational; and 4th in the North Carolina Collegiate Invitational.

The tennis team coached by Jim Taylor has posted a 3-4 record early with high hopes of finishing above .500 on the season.
