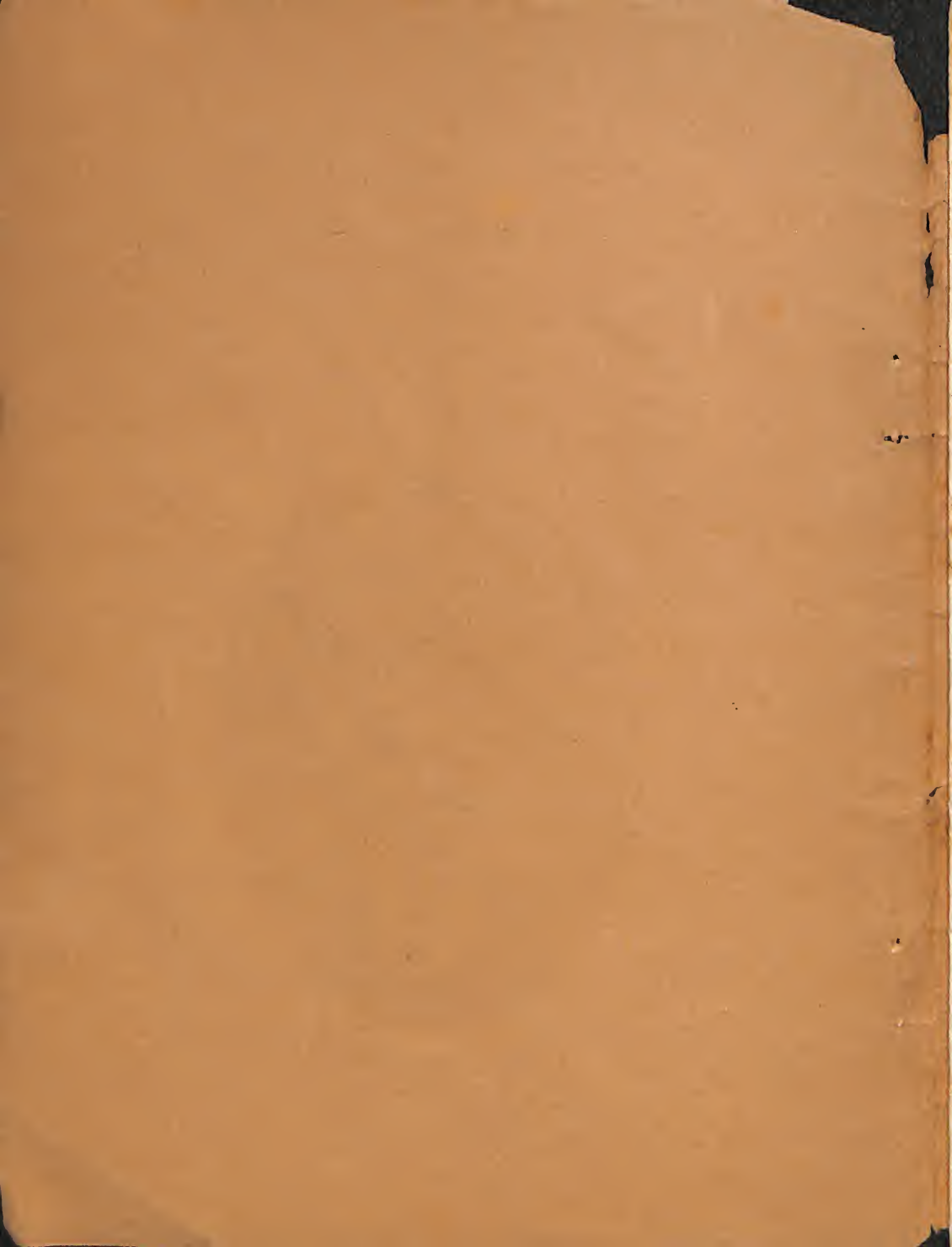

ary physicians treated 48,464 patients, and all of our Missionaries baptized 12,542.

We have 176 in the homeland, 40 of these are detained on account of sickness, and the others, I regret to say, are having to remain here because no funds are available to return them, for our Foreign Mission Board is, as most of you know, struggling under a staggering debt of over one million dollars. This debt must be paid, and sufficient additional funds provided to enable us to send back the nearly two hundred of our trained and called and experienced missionaries now in the homeland. Brethren, we MUST do more for the cause of Foreign missions.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM AND CHURCH FINANCE

To the Kings Mountain Baptist Association—

Your committee recommends the adoption of the budget system of finance, and the use of duplex envelopes by the members. In order to carry into effect the budget system, a finance committee of the church ought to be appointed, who together with the pastor, should consider the necessary local expenses of the church, estimating each item thereof, and estimates the amount to be given by the local church to the co-operative program, and such committee submit its report to the full church for discussion, amendment and adoption. The finance committee should then conduct an every member canvass for pledges to the budget. We recommend as a minimum to the co-operative program an amount equal to the budget for local expenses, including pastor's salary.

THE CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

The General Board of the Baptist State Convention at its regular June meeting adopted as the goal for North Carolina Baptists to raise in 1929 for all the objects included in the Co-operative Program, except the Orphanage, \$700,000, which is \$100,000 more than the goal adopted for this year. This increased goal was sug-

gested in view of the fact that our State will not go into the special debt-paying Campaign at Christmas as authorized by the last Southern Baptist Convention, but in lieu of that we are hoping to raise in thank offerings at this season a hundred thousand dollars extra for the whole Co-operative Program.

Each dollar sent to Walters Durham, Treasurer, Raleigh, that is undesignated is divided among the six objects fostered by our denomination as follows:

In co-operation with the other Associations in the State we recommend that this Association accept as its part of the State's goal \$21,000 which is based on the regular ratio of increase in the State's goal, around 40 per cent in advance of what we gave last year. We recommend that this amount be divided among the churches of the Association upon as equitable and fair basis as possible by the Executive Committee of the Association, or by a special committee appointed for the purpose; that each church earnestly endeavor to raise its objective by making a thorough every member canvass December 2--9, the Southwide date suggested, or at such other time as each church may elect, or to raise it by some other method adopted by the church.

We would recommend further that the most thorough preparation be made several weeks in advance of the every member canvass through prayer, preaching and instruction of all the people about the objects included in the Program.

We would recommend also that a simple organization

be set up in the Association consisting of the Executive committee or a special committee appointed by the chair to function in putting on the every member canvass in every church in the Association and in conserving the results; that a similar organization in each local church be set up consisting of a committee from the Board of deacons or a special committee appointed by the church to act with the pastor in directing the canvass in the local church.

Following is Mr. Greene's report:

For years North Carolina Baptist pastors have preached the gospel with great power. The Master has graciously bestowed His blessings upon our efforts to win the lost. He has given us thousands of young people in our churches. With the coming of every new life into the church membership comes a new and added responsibility to that church to guard, care for and train that life and so far as possible make it useful in Kingdom work. Each new member in God's Kingdom in just a babe in Christ and does not always know how to walk, talk and work. He needs to be taught how to walk the new path, how to give testimony to the goodness of God and how and when and where to work for the Master. These babes in Christ need the tenderest love and care from the church as they begin their work of growth in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

The church, then, needs to exercise the closest and tenderest watchcare over them. There should be a place in every church where these young members can develop and grow. A denomination without a training department is like a crop planted but not cultivated, or an army enlisted but no place to train the soldiers.

The Baptist Young People's Union is the greatest training agency of the young people in our denomination. Its object is to increase the spirituality of young Christians; to train them in all essential church activities; their edification in Scriptural knowledge; to instruct them in Baptist doctrine and history; to enlist them in all forms of missionary endeavor; to help young Christians find themselves in Kingdom service. This is a great aim and a task that should challenge the best in us. We shall save our churches for tomorrow by saving our young people of today. We will be no longer wise if we neglect longer this task of training in

every church in our state.

To accomplish this great task our Sunday School Board at Nashville, and the General Board of our Baptist State Convention foster this work of training. In the state we have two state-wide secretaries in the field, Mr. James A. Ivey, General Secretary, and Miss Winnie Rickett, Secretary of Junior and Intermediate work. We also have a field worker, Miss Marguerite Harrison, in the Eastern half of the state, and another, Miss Mary Frances Biggers, in the Western half. There are also four Associational workers maintained by the Baptist Sunday School Board at Nashville and the Associations employing them. These workers conduct study courses training schools, conferences and conventions. Their services can be secured for work in city, town and rural churches.

In the state there are 2368 churches. Approximately 1150 churches have unions with a total of 1997 unions.

In our association we have 77 unions in 34 churches. This is a splendid record for our association, but at the same time must remember that there are 7 churches which have no unions and are without this valuable training service. We recommend and urge that the pastors and leaders in churches without B. Y. P. U.'s make a special effort to organize same at the earliest possible time.

We recommend that the churches elect the officers of unions, publicly install and recognize them as church officers, call upon them regularly for reports and make them responsible to the church. We further recommend that each individual church support this work financially, prayerfully and sympathetically.

The program of the B. Y. P. U. is one of enlargement, enlightenment and enlistment. The aim of this organization is to train and keep our young people in touch and in line with every movement fostered by our denomination. The work is truly educational and is bearing rich fruit from year to year in preparing our young people for active, intelligent and capable service in the work of the churches and the full program of our great denomination.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

G. G. Page, superintendent of the Kings Mountain Baptist Sunday School Association, was called upon for a verbal report of the work. He reported that when the body met last year there were only thirteen Standard Sunday schools in the association. Under the auspices of the executive committee and in compliance with request from the administration department of the Sunday school board, he reported, that on October 23, 1927, the Sunday schools of the association were organized into the Kings Mountain Baptist Sunday School association for the purpose of developing better Sunday schools throughtout the association. He displayed charts showing that at this session 28 of the schools have reached the Standard, with two others lacking only one point each. He also displayed a felt pennant issued

by the Baptist Sunday School Board of Nashville, Tenn. recognizing the association as a Standard Association. The speaker explained that the Kings Mountain was the first association to reach the Standard of Excellence and that only one other had yet attained it; that is the Corsicana association in Texas.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

(By W. E. Lowe)

During the last ten years marvelous growth has been made along every line of Sunday School work. God has wonderfully blessed us in our efforts to win the young people to Christ. We have a right to rejoice in the great and far-reaching work of our Sunday School Board. The value of our church buildings has been greatly increased by the growth of our Sunday Schools and other educational work. In the last ten years we have increased the value of our church property from \$62,820,056 to \$184,719,387 and have made a net gain in our church membership of one million, and in our Sunday School Enrollment of 900,000. In 1926 there were 2,683,331 in our Sunday Schools, in 1927 there were 2,780,043 in our Sunday schools, an increase of 96,712. In North Carolina in 1926 our Sunday school enrollment was 322,861. In 1927, 341,488, an increase of 18,627. North Carolina made the greatest increase of any state within the bounds of the Southern Baptist convention. Florida comes next with an increase of 13,471.

Kings Mountain association stands at the head of the list of all the associations of North Carolina. We have 41 churches in our association and 28 have been recognized as Standard and with the possibility of having 35 Standard Sunday Schools by January first.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

(By C. J. Black)

Christian Education is one of the most important subjects we have to consider today. If our nation considers education so important as to spend the money it does to educate its citizenship, should we not feel and realize the place it has in our denominational affairs? If we do not we are going to suffer irreparable loss—a loss we are going to feel keenly in the years to come, and one that is going to cause disaster to much of our work. Our state cannot give our children all the education they need. What kind of predicament would we be in if our state schools undertook to teach religion. What religion would it teach? Would it be Jewish, Protestant, or Catholic? It is utterly impossible for us to conceive the idea of such a thing.

But what is the denominational school, and what does it teach that cannot be taught in our public schools? To these questions, we wish to say that denominational schools, if they are conducted as they should, are those in which the principles of Christianity are taught. Nothing is taught contrary to the teaching of our Lord. He has the foremost place in the entire program of the school. Every teacher must be a loyal Christian, and must live such a life that the student may follow in his or her footsteps with all safety. A Christian school is one in which the Bible is taught and especially its fundamental teachings. But you say, "Does not the state school do the same thing?" By no means. In some of our northern cities the Bible cannot be mentioned as the Word of God, and in many sections of the south it cannot be read in our public schools. The Christian school is the only safe place for Bible teaching, and it is the only place

we can hope for it to be taught to our children by those who believe it to be the word of God.

In the Christian school, education and Christianity go hand in hand, and without this, education is a very dangerous thing. An educated man without Christ is a very uncertain factor in any community. The mind educated exclusive of the soul, cannot be productive of good. To think that education is all that we need is folly, but to know that no civilization can be stabilized without putting Christianity at the very base of it is safe. Christianity and education must go hand in hand to make sure our civilization. No state, or nation is safe without Christian schools, and let me add this word here, the schools that mean most are those that do elementary work. We may think that our denominational high schools have served their day and purpose. This writer does not agree with those who think so. There can never be a day when they cannot do a wonderful work for our young people. They offer advantages to our young preachers and volunteer workers that no state school can ever give. It will be disastrous for them to die.

In considering this important question we are made to think as to what our Christian schools have done in the past. Have they been worth while? Have they been worth what they have cost? Have they led the way for our great system of schools in America, or have they followed in the foot prints of others? Let us look into this matter just a little. By just a little investigation, we find that Christian schools have led the way for other schools. Christian schools were here before public schools were dreamed of. Religious educators had to blaze the way for our public schools. Before the first boy was born in America was twenty one years old, Harvard had her doors open to him, inviting him to accept college training. Who took the lead in this great school? Was it not John Harvard? What did he have placed above its entrance? Was it not, "THAT A TRAINED MINISTRY MAY NOT PERISH FROM THE EARTH."

One hundred and four of the first one hundred and nineteen colleges to be founded east of the Mississippi

were denominational schools. The old settlements over our country gathered around a log church and an old time school house. These often grew to be high schools and some times, they gave a fair college education. Who was the teacher? Nearly all the time it was the humble pastor of the community church. What kind of education was this? May we not say with safety that it was Christian? These community schools gradually gave way to the public schools, and finally they became educational centers as we have them today.

But what have we as educational assets today? Do we have anything that we may be proud of? Do we have any institutions that have made reputation enough to have a place among the leading institutions of learning in our state? What about Wake Forest that has been sending out a constant stream of educated men for nearly one hundred years? What about Meredith, Chowan, Mars Hill, Wingate, Sylva, Fruitland Institute, and our own school at Boiling Springs? Do we have anything in our state that has excelled them in the numbers they have taught, or in the class of work they have done? Most assuredly not. They stand unexcelled. It is impossible to estimate the good these schools have done. What would our denomination have done without them. Where would Yates, Green and many others who have blessed this land, or have gone to the foreign fields to tell the heathen about Him who died for them? Let us give honor to whom honor is due.

Now, let us look at this noble question from another angle, an angle we are hard to get to see. It is beyond our mental powers to estimate the good our schools have accomplished within the last fifty years, but what have we done for them? Have we nourished them as we should have done? Have we given them our moral and financial support as we should have done? If we have, why did thirteen of our high schools have to cease to operate? Why do we have to borrow money now to carry them on with? Why do we have to put on rousing campaigns to raise money to pay for our equipment and other necessary conveniences? Do we not stand guilty before God for disregard for them? We have patronized state schools because they were cheaper, as we thought,

we have criticised them because they were not conducted as we thought they ought to have been, many have used their influence against them when it was to best interest to support them. These are facts that we are stating, and facts are stubborn things when we have to confront them as we do in this case.

In the last place, your committee desires to make the following suggestions:

1.—That the Baptists of this association give to our schools their most loyal support in every way they can, and especially Boiling Springs Junior College.

2.—That we pay every cent of our pledges to the Centennial Campaign Funds as quickly as possible because it is needed now.

3.—That we invite President Davis to our churches as often as we can so that he may learn the folks and that the folks may know him.

4.—That we cooperate with the Trustees and Faculty of Boiling Springs Junior College in everything they undertake for the advancement of Christian Education in our section of the state.

5.—That we pray regularly for the faculty and school that it may be kept close to the Master.

REPORT BOARD TRUSTEES BOILING SPRINGS

HIGH SCHOOL

(Read by J. H. Quinn)

To the Kings Mountain, Sandy Run and Gaston County Baptists Associations:—

On May 2nd, 1928, your School closed its twenty-first year of actual work. These have been strenuous years, marked by sacrificial devotion and unrelenting efforts on the part of faithful and loyal friends of the institution

but in these years we have made history for Christian education in this section where the Baptist cause so largely predominates. We point with pride to the achievements of the High School as a justification of the wisdom of these Associations in entering the field of Christian education. More than 5000 students have enrolled here since the opening of the School and 590 have graduated, many of whom later graduated from higher institutions of learning. As a rule, these are making good in every line of human activity in Church and State.

The total enrollment of the School for the year 1927-28 was 138, a decrease from that of the previous year but no greater than was anticipated in view of the rapid invasion of our territory by the State high schools. There were 47 in the graduating class, only one short of the number the previous year, while there was a marked decrease in the two first and second year classes. This unmistakably marks the drift toward higher education.

This is the second year in which we have had the unpleasant duty of reporting a deficit, but it is slightly below that of last year. This deficit is contingent upon our collecting in full balance booked for the year. Some arrangement should be made at this meeting of the Association to discharge this deficit.

BOILING SPRINGS JUNIOR COLLEGE

In the annual reports of 1926 and 1927 of this Board we urged the pressing demand for a Junior College at Boiling Springs. In our last report we presented an agreement which had been tentatively adopted by this Board and the General Secretary of the Convention, subject to the ratification of the Convention at its meeting last November. That agreement, with a few slight amendments, was unanimously adopted by the Convention. Accordingly, a joint campaign was launched and vigorously prosecuted during the summer within the Kings Mountain and Sandy Run Associations to reach a goal of \$250,000 for the Centennial Fund and to make Boiling Springs High School a Junior College. While a little less than half the goal was reached, it was a marked success and fully demonstrated the deep interest of our people in the movement for the College. Out of the funds coming from these two Associations will first be paid the bonded indebtedness of \$40,000 against our School and the remainder will be divided between College and the Centennial Fund on the basis of 60 per cent to the former and 40 per cent to the latter. Half the sum going to the College will be applied to equipment and the remainder to the endowment. It is earnestly hoped that before the termination of the Centennial Campaign in 1930 that we shall reach our goal of \$250,000.

So impressed were the officers of the Baptist State Convention with the success achieved in the Campaign and loyalty of our people to our School, that your

Board was authorized, at the beginning of the present term, to launch a Junior College, putting on the first year of College work. The action of the officers will be submitted to the Convention in November for ratification. Accordingly, the Junior College was launched and is now a reality. The High School, for the present, will be continued. A second year of college will be added next year. No effort will be spared in making ours a Standard Junior College. Only such persons have been employed for teachers in the College Department as will meet this requirement.

Although late in announcing definite plans for the College Department, we now have 68 college Students with others still coming. This is in excess of the minimum requirement for standardization. The Dean has submitted to the Board the following data relative to present term: High School, by classes—Freshman class 20; Sophomore 30; Junior 28; and Senior 41. Total enrollment to date, all departments, 187. Classified by Association, we have from the Kings Mountain 91; Sandy Run 33; and Gaston County 12. There are 51 from territory outside these Associations, 26 being from South Carolina. Six States—North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, Florida, Alabama, and Massachusetts, are represented with ten counties in this State. By denominations, we have 173 Baptists, 5 Methodists, One A. R. P. and one Catholic. Bible Department has 123.

To meet the requirements for standardization, certain equipment has been added and is being added. It is the purpose of the Board to meet this expense, ultimately, from the funds pledged in the recent campaign, but this fund will not be available for some time to come. Hence, this Board is confronted with the necessity of borrowing a sum sufficient to meet present need for improvements and equipment which will be no less than \$5,000. We, therefore, request authorization from the Association to negotiate a loan, or loans for such sum, or so much thereof as may be found necessary, for the purpose named.

WHEREAS, it is apparent, as much as we regret it, that our beloved brethren and co-workers on this Board, who are members of the Gaston County Association,

feel embarrassed to take a part in our Board meetings since they were not included in the recent campaign in the other two Associations in behalf of our Junior College movement; and, whereas, we believe the pastors and churches of the Gaston County Association would now appreciate an opportunity to extend financial aid to our Junior College which it greatly needs, therefore,

This Board hereby memorializes the Gaston County Association to launch at this session a movement to raise such sum for permanent improvement and equipment of Boiling Springs Junior College as that body may deem wise and proper. This fund would meet the pressing needs for these purposes, and, at same time, enable the membership of that Association to know and feel that they had a definite and worthy part in the establishment and maintenance of a Christian College which will mean everything to our worthy and struggling youth whose financial condition will prevent their going to one of our Senior Colleges or Universities.

The terms of the following members of this Board expire this year and their successors must be elected, to-wit: Kings Mountain Association—Geo. M. Gold, J. F. Moore, E. B. Hamrick, J. L. Putnam, and T. A. Stamey. A successor to C. B. Wilson, whose term expires in 1930, and who has removed from the Association, must be elected. Sandy Run—A. I. Jolly, T. M. Holland (dead). Rev. C. C. Matheney, M. M. Green, P. C. Hawkins. Gaston County—D. P. Stowe and N. B. Kendrick. A successor to Rev. W. C. Barrett, whose term expires in 1932, and who has removed from the Association, must be elected.

Your Board announces with distinctive pride the election of Dr. J. B. Davis to the Presidency of the College. Dr. Davis is a native North Carolinian, a graduate of Mars Hill, of Wake Forest, of our University, and of the Southwestern Seminary. A young man with striking personality, a profound scholar, an exponent of Christian Schools, we believe we have in Dr. Davis a President worthy of the highest esteem of our people and whom we shall be glad to follow. Under his able leadership and by the co-operation of his true and tried co-workers, we believe Boiling Springs Junior College

will have a great future.

In the presence of the association they pledged each other their loyalty and co-operation in carrying forward the work of the institution. "Hidden Treasures in World Redemption" was Dr. Davis' subject. At the close of the address prayer was led by Walter M. Gilmore of Raleigh.

15 ministerial students of the college were exhibited.

The report on Boiling Springs showed a deficit of \$1362.22 in last year's accounts, and tuition for ministerial students of \$825.00, making a total of \$2187.22. It was calculated that our part would be \$936.00.

THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

(Read by D. F. Hord)

The Baptist Hospital is located on ten acres of land in the corporate limits of Winston-Salem, on one of the most beautiful spots in the state. There are two buildings, the Hospital plant and the Nurses Home. The property is worth about \$375,000, with a bonded indebtedness on the plant of \$125,000 which is being retired annually. The four percent from the co-operative program goes to retire these bonds and pay the interest on the indebtedness. The amount thus received just about takes care of this.

CHARITY WORK. The charity work of the hospital has grown very rapidly. Last year about 500 patients received free treatment, and this year the number will reach 600, at a cost to the institution of about \$30,000. The recourses for this work are as follows: Mothers' Day offerings, gifts from the Duke Endowment Fund, and a small amount from the cash receipts from pay patients.

The only money the denomination puts into charity is the money received from the Mother's Day offering, if a church fails to give to this cause on that of some other Sunday, it has no part in the care of the unfortunate sick who need the care and help of his brother Baptist. Our response is the measure of our interest in and love for those in their pitiful need, it is the expression of our loyalty to Him who said "Heal the Sick." For His sake and for their sakes we earnestly hope every church in our association will make a worth while offering to our Baptist Hospital on next Mother's Day.

ORPHANAGE REPORT (Furnished by D. G. Washburn)

This resembles a report on a home, only it is many times multiplied.

The last annual report gave 618 children present; of these 117 were at the Kennedy Home. With 68 mothers there were aided 282 children, making in all 900 children care for.

On account of shortage of funds were cared for by mother's aid than a year ago.

Some six or eight hundred were turned away for lack of room, and no more could be helped by mother's aid for lack of funds.

For 43 years this stream of children has been coming in and passing on out into life with added preparation for the struggle there. That they be fitted and fortified for real living is the matter of chief concern. Our infirmary with a trained nurse and skilled physicians, who come at a moment's call, look after the health; our housekeeping, farm, dairy, printing office and other form of industry, give skill to their hands; a standard school looks after their minds; and the religious life led by pastor E. N. Gardner, also a teacher of the Bible, is not neglected.

There is a painful discrepancy between the number of pressing applications for help and the contributions coming in. So far we are not as badly in debt as we were a year ago at this time, but contributions are far below our expenditures.

Again every Baptist Sunday School is asked to make a contribution once a month. In some schools single classes support a child. Remember the Thanksgiving offering measured by one day's work or income as an expression of gratitude and thus enable the Orphanage to do its work. We would encourage a club of Charity and Children in every school, 60 cents a copy in clubs of ten or more to one address. It is one dollar to a single sub-

scriber. We ask that a special Orphanage representative be appointed to aid the institution in keeping in touch with the Sunday school.

From the church letters to the Association we learn that 73 of our members have died. Of this number the committee knows of only one minister, Rev. A. H. Sims, who has died during this year. His pastor, Rev. C. J. Black, has an obituary prepared which we wish to have read in connection with this report.

REV. A. H. SIMS

Rev. A. H. Sims, one of the most noted citizens of Kings Mountain, passed away quietly August 29, late in the afternoon. He had been in declining health for some

months but his friends thought that possibly he would get out once more since he lingered so long. All was done for him that mankind can do. The very best doctors and nurses were called, and his faithful wife stood by his bedside constantly, but the time for his departure was at hand, and he had to go.

Rev. Allen Hampton Sims was born in Towns county, Georgia, June 6th., 1855, and died August 29, 1928, making him seventy three years, two months and twenty three days old. He was a son of John Littleton and Ann Byers Sims and a grand son of Elder Joseph Byers who labored with Elder Humphrey Posey who did such a great work in western North Carolina and Georgia.

Rev. A. H. Sims was converted the first of October 1869 during a meeting at Old Tokoah Baptist church in Fanning county, Georgia, and was baptised the first Sunday of the same month by his grand father, Elder Robert Byers.

He felt called to preach early in life, but was not ordained to the full work of the gospel ministry until October 10th, 1881. This was done at Shoals Creek Baptist church, Jackson county, North Carolina. The presbytery was composed of Elders E. D. Grinnell and W. H. Conner.

Brother Sims was an active pastor for many years doing the major part of his work in Western North Carolina.

He served as pastor at the following places: Oconee Lufta, Swain county, Shoals Creek, Scotts Creek, Webster, and Cullowhee, Jackson county, organized Sylva and Dillsboro Baptist churches in Jackson county, and worked as the associational missionary for the Tuckaseegee Baptist association one year. He was pastor for some time at Clyde in Haywood county, and also at Franklin in Macon county.

Brother Sims had considerable evangelistic gifts and held many very remarkable meetings in this state and also other states. He held one of the best meetings Kings Mountain ever experienced. More than a hundred people professed faith in their Lord and joined the church.

Brother Sims became pastor of the First Baptist

church at Kings Mountain early in 1901, and moved to this place where he remained as pastor for six years. His coming to this place marked a new day for the church here. New seats were placed in the church building and many other needful and useful improvements were made. It was during his pastorate that the church decided to go to full time preaching. While pastor here, he served several church in the vicinity of Kings Mountain; viz, Bethlehem, Patterson Grove, and Elizabeth. He was called from here to West End Baptist church, Asheville, N. C., but did not remain there very long. His ministry there was very fruitful, and he often spoke of it as one of his most pleasant pastorates. The church gave him a Morris chair which he prized very highly and sat in it as long as he lived. He move from Asheville, to Shelby, N. C., and while he lived in this place he served the following churches; Poplar Springs, Beaver Dam, and Mount Pleasant, in Cleveland county and one church in Rutherford county. This was Southern Baptist church and possibly Bostic also. He was pastor of Bessemer City Baptist church at one time, and he may have been pastor of other churches for a short time. If he was, I have not gotten the information concerning the places and the time.

During the last years of his life, he did not serve as pastor, but was in great demand as supply. If we remember correctly, he served as supply for Clover Baptist church, and also for Mount Holly. I believe that he was supply for other Baptist churches in this section, but I do not remember which they were.

His ministry covered a period of forty seven years and was full of service for the Master. He was not a highly educated man, but had a most wonderful supply of natural ability and a knowledge of the Bible superior to that of most men. He loved the old Book and believed every word of it. He was a preacher of the old type and believed in the old order of things. He loved his Lord and his church. He went to church just a few days before he left us and seemingly enjoyed the service very much.

Besides being a loyal Baptist, he was an ardent mason and was buried with masonic honors.

His funeral was conducted by the writer from the First Baptist church on the afternoon of August 30th. A very large congregation assembled to pay their last tribute of respect to their old pastor and friend. The casket was covered with a mound of the most beautiful flowers expressive of the high esteem in which he was held.

His body was laid to rest in Mountain Rest cemetery at Kings Mountain.

He leaves a widow and two sons and one daughter. His sons are, Virgil Sims of Charlotte, N. C., and Harold Sims of Gastonia, N. C. His only living daughter is Mrs. Gladys Sims Smith of Raleigh, N. C.

His going has taken from our town one of our most honored citizens and one we are going to miss so much because he took an active interest in everything that tended in any way toward the uplift of our community.
