Forest University and a Masters Degree from Appalachian State University. He came to the College in 1962 as Director of Development and in 1964 was promoted to Vice President for Fund Raising and Public Relations. He has served as Executive Vice President and Dean of the College since 1969.

A native of Whitman, South Carolina, McGraw is married to the former Miss Bettye Falls of Lawndale. They have three daughters: Cindy, a Gardner-Webb student, and ten year old twins, Melanie and Mital.

During Poston's tenure as the seventh President of Gardner-Webb, the College made many advances including the transition to a four year fully accredited senior college. He proposed and then presided over the Decade of Advance during which a dozen new major campus facilities were built, campus acreage doubled, and the total physical plant assets rose by more than 200%. Poston explained his resignation to a joint meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Board of Advisors, the Wives Auxiliary, staff members, and some students by saying that "I have completed the work that God has called me here to do. I have tried to avoid this calling for more than six years. My decision was made after twice hearing evangelist Billy Graham's New Year's message that called on Christians to get involved in politics. I'm not running against anybody, I am running on a call from God and a positive program."

Northeastern United States Telethon Nets \$2202 For The Alumni Annual Fund

It was indeed a great evening for Gardner-Webb College when 12 Alumni and friends gathered on Saturday, February 7, to enjoy a meal together, to call other Alumni from 15 states to discuss the Alumni Annual Fund, and then to attend the Gardner-Webb College—Belmont Abbey basketball game. The food was delicious, the telethon very successful, Gardner-Webb easily won the game and the fellowship was outstanding.

The facilities of Goodwill Publishers in Gastonia, North Carolina were made available for the telethon and the solicitors made full use of them. During a three-hour period there was a total of 255 calls made. Of the 153 calls that were completed there were 89 pledges received amounting to a total of \$2202 for the Annual Fund.

Bulldog Basketballers End Season 27-4

Only a 116-111 loss to Guilford in a classic shoot-out prevented Gardner-Webb from making its third trip to the NAA national tournament in the last five seasons.

Still, the youthful Bulldogs, untested when the season began, compiled one of the most outstanding seasons in coach Eddie Holbrook's 12 years at the helm.

Gardner-Webb finished the year 27-4 after battling to the finals of the NAA District 26 playoffs. It was the most games played in a season and the most victories in a season. Nationally, the 'Dogs finished third in the Associated Press Small College Poll and fourth in the NAA rankings.

The Bulldogs captured three tournament titles—the Asheville Tip-Off, the WBTV Carolina Classic, and the G-W Holiday Classic—and over the season extended their home winning streak at Best Gymnasium to 54 consecutive games.

Closing the season with a memorable performance was junior wing Dave Bornmann who netted 50 points in a losing cause. Bornmann was G-W's lone representative on the All-District squad.

Gardner-Webb started the campaign with a roster of eight freshmen, four sophomores, three juniors and one senior and "defied the odds" in finishing 27-4. After losing two of their first three games, the 'Dogs captured 21 straight before losing again.
