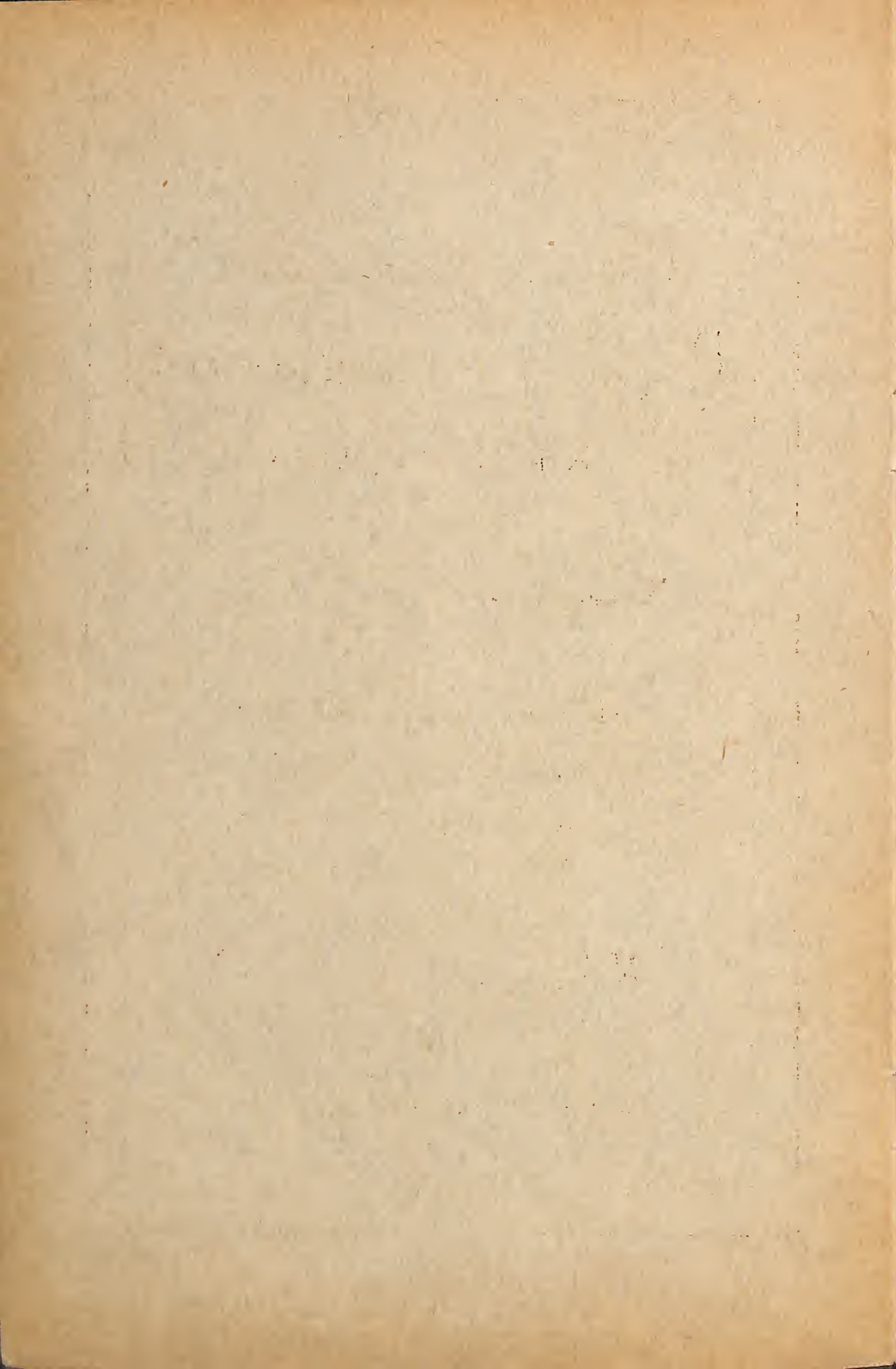

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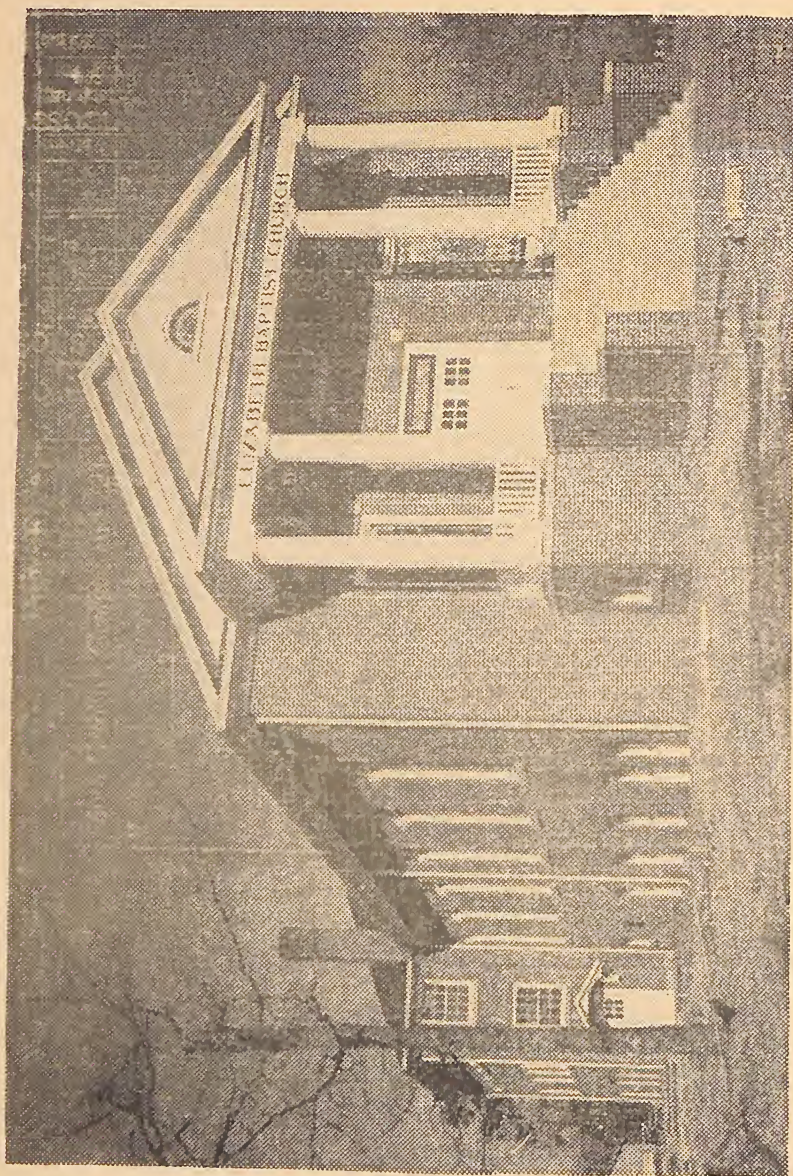

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order and rules of a District Association in conformity to the following plan:

ARTICLE 1.—The name of this organization shall be Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 2.—The membership of the Association shall consist of such messengers as may be selected by the Churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the Churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being two messengers for each Church having a membership not exceeding fifty, and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty or major fraction thereto in church membership. All pastors serving constituent Churches together with all regularly ordained ministers holding membership in these churches shall also be members of the body. The courtesies of the floor may be extended to representatives of the denominational interests, and also to ministers and members of other Christian organizations.

Article 3.—The Association shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each annual meeting shall organize itself by enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Historian, whose duties shall be to serve in the usual capacity of such officers and who shall hold office, unless duly deposed by the electing body, until their respective successors are elected.

AMENDMENT [1]—At the discretion of the Association, all officers may be elected at the close of one session to serve until the close of the succeeding one.

AMENDMENT [2]—There shall be a Nominating Committee appointed at each session to serve during the coming year. This committee shall come to the Association prepared to make the usual nominations.

ARTICLE 4—At each annual session a General Board shall be appointed by the Association, which Board shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the superintendents of the S. S. and W. M. U. Work, the president of the B. Y. P. U. Convention, the president of Boiling Springs Junior College, the pastor of each Church composing the Association, and two members from each Church, which members shall be nominated by the Church or by delegates present from the Church and approved by the Association. This Board shall hold meetings either monthly or quarterly and shall exercise the functions and discharge the duties usually committed to an executive board or committee. At its discretion it

may select out of its own number an Executive Board of not less than seven members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full board.

The purposes and plans of this General Board in all its meetings shall be to promote the interests and carry forward the work of the Association and of its constituent Churches as this work is outlined in Article 5 of the Constitution. The Board may select a time and place and arrange a program for holding extra sessions of the Association for inspirational and devotional meetings. In case of emergency it may also arrange for special business sessions of the body; provided, however, that no action taken in such extra business sessions shall conflict with any action of a previous regular session, and provided further, that the business of such extra sessions shall be limited to the object or objects for which it was convened, and the membership of such special business sessions shall be made up of the messengers elected by the Churches and accredited to the previous regular session.

ARTICLE 5—The prime purpose of this Association shall be to counsel together for the enlargement and strengthening of God's Kingdom by promoting unity and growth among the Churches composing it, and by co-operating with the programs of the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in the work of Missions, Christian Education, and Social Service, and any and all other objects. At each annual meeting one or more delegates shall be elected to represent this body in the ensuing sessions of these conventions.

ARTICLE 6—The Association may receive other Churches into its fellowship on letters of dismission from other like organizations. It may also receive newly constituted Churches whose articles of faith harmonize with the Confession of Faith attached hereto, and whose practice conforms to the purpose of this Association as set forth in Article 5 above.

ARTICLE 7—While disclaiming the right or authority to interfere in the affairs of any local Church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving Churches into its fellowship, and in withdrawing fellowship from any Church found on careful investigation to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

ARTICLE 8—This Association shall conduct its business sessions in accordance with parliamentary practice as set forth in any well-authenticated book dealing with the subject.

ARTICLE 9—This Constitution may be changed or amended at any regular meeting of the Association; provided, however, that each proposed change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on during the day following, and two-thirds of the members present shall concur in its adoption.

CONFESSION OF FAITH

1.—We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be a divinely inspired revelation from God.

2.—We accept the New Testament alone as revealing the only plan of salvation and as the final authority in all matters of Church policy and practice.

3.—We believe Jesus Christ as revealed in the New Testament to be the Son of God and the divine Savior of all who truly accept Him as such.

4.—We believe in the personality of the Holy Spirit, and in His abiding presence with the spirit of all the elect of God, in His quickening presence with the spirit of the unregenerate moving to repentance and faith, in His witnessing presence with the spirit of the regenerate comforting and guiding throughout life, in His sustaining presence in the experience of death, and in His continuing presence in the life to come.

5.—We believe salvation is attained through spiritual regeneration in the act of repentance and acceptance of Jesus as Savior.

6.—Since spiritual redemption was made available by the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus, we believe that every regenerate person should symbolize his own salvation by being buried with Him in baptism.

7.—We believe that a local Church modeled after the New Testament order is a company of regenerate persons voluntarily joined together for the purpose of extending God's Kingdom on earth.

8.—We believe that each Church should from time to time, as a congregation, celebrate the Lord's Supper as a memorial to Him.

9.—We believe in the ultimate triumph of God's Kingdom over all opposing powers, and that every regenerate soul shall have a share in that triumph.

On motion the Association proceeded with the business while the Enrolment Committee continued with its work to be reported later. The committee later reported an enrolment of 265 regular appointed Delegates that came during the two days session.

At this time the report on Boiling Springs Junior College was brought by President J. R. Cantrell. He presented Rev. L. H. Hollingsworth of Wake Forest College, a former student of Boiling Springs, who brought words of indorsement from officials at Wake Forest College for the Students that have, and are enrolled at Wake Forest. The speaker also spoke in glowing words as to the contribution Boiling Springs College had made to his life. President Cantrell also presented Rev. Boyd Cannon, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Spruce Pine, North Carolina. Mr. Cannon also paid a beautiful tribute to Boiling Springs College, and what the School had meant to his life while a student there. The College Glee Club under the direction of Miss Jessup accompanied by Miss Miller rendered two heart-touching numbers. President Cantrell closed with a very encouraging message as to the progress of the College.

Rev. H. B. Easom was recognized as chairman of the \$100,-000.00 drive that was already on the way to success. Mr. Easom praised those who have carried on at the College in the face of many discouragements during the past years. The Association voted its indorsement of the move that is in progress to insure the permanency of the College. The question of Boiling Springs College closed with the College Quartett singing "Have Thine Own Way Lord."

The Sunday School report was read and spoken to by Mr. N. L. Whisnant, associational superintendent. The following is the report:

The report of Woman's Missionary Unions was read and spoken to by Mrs. John Wacaster, superintendent of the Kings Mountain Baptist Woman's Work.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

For more than fifty years Woman's Missionary Union has been the "going" organization in our Southern Baptist Churches.

Going along and co-operating with the Church and pastor in all plans.

Going, yes out in front in missionary work, both at home and abroad.

Going ahead to pay our debts.

Going to the uttermost parts of the earth with our gifts and our prayers.

Going, thru personal service in His name.

And, *going* as stewards of what we possess.

"Go tell"; "go publish"; "go proclaim." These words were often on the lips of the master as He walked on earth. A great need today is a new zeal for proclaiming the Gospel, a new concern for souls, a new joy in service and a keener realization on the part of

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each individual, of our task as publishers, by word, by deed, by gift, by life.

The words of Jesus "Go, tell", on that Easter morning were a charge, a comfort, a challenge and an electrifying command that changed forever the status, life and program of women, calling them to share with the disciples in telling the story.

It also changed the program of the Church for one of the glories of the Church is the way "certain women" are aiding in holding high the banner of the cross, and today are mighty factors in helping establish God's Kingdom on earth.

Christ's call to Mary that morning, was a definite, personal, individual call. Her answer, "Master" revealed her surrender, her submission, her willingness for Him to direct her paths, permitting Him to use her powers in telling the sweetest story ever told. Jesus is seeking today for "certain women" on whom He can depend to heed His call. Before we can have sufficient grace and power to "go tell" there must be a submission to Him as master of our lives and talents. We must crown Him Lord of all.

We have in this Association 86 women and young people's organizations who are going with the message. As a proof of their love and devotion to the master they gave last year to missions \$6,540.40. We have 41 organizations engaged in doing definite organized personal service and our records show that we have 274 tithers and 87 memberships in the 100,000 Club.

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Rev. H. B. Easom sang "Speed Away," closing the W. M. U. report.

The report on the Cooperative Program was prepared and read by Rev. W. A. Elam. The following brethren discussed the various causes; State Missions, Rev. Lawrence Roberts; Home Missions, Rev. L. L. Jessup; Foreign Missions, Rev. A. G. Sargeant. At this time Mr. M. A. Huggins, General Secretary of the Baptist State Convention, was recognized. Mr. Huggins presented Rev. Carter Pipes, State Missionary to the Western part of North Carolina. Mr. Pipes spoke briefly but with forcefulness as he urged a fully surrendered life in the cause of the Gospel of the Son of God. Mr. Huggins then spoke as usual, bringing us face to face with the emergency of providing the necessary places of worship in the communities where the U. S. Training Camps are. This of course, must be done through State Missions. Mr. Huggins also showed the great need in the Western part of North Carolina of preaching the Gospel to the many there who are deprived of an intelligent interpretation of the Scriptures in unchurched communities.

REPORT ON CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Co-operative Program continues to grow in favor with Southern Baptists. Some reasons why:

The Co-operative Program is scriptural; it includes all the causes in the Great Commission and these only. It is comprehensive and unifying. It is concrete. Every cause included challenges us. We do not give to the Program, but *Through* the Program.

The Co-operative Program is democratic and Baptist. It recognizes the rights and independence of the churches and members. It appeals to the minds and hearts of christians. It is economical; it seeks to care for all the causes together, thus saving much overhead expense.

The Co-operative program is fair and equitable. It seeks to provide for all the work in proportion to their needs. Our State convention determines the percentage each cause shall receive from the funds contributed from the churches.

It would not be too much to say, that all the institutions maintained and supported by the Southern Baptists are now doing the best work in their history.

Special mention should be made concerning Home and Foreign Missions.

The Ninety-Sixth annual report of the Home Mission Board reveals:—Total receipts from all sources, \$560,168.09; Number of Missionaries, 391; number of churches and stations, 915; new stations opened, 71; new pieces of property acquired, 14; number of professions made, 5,375. Thousands of Bibles and tracts were distributed.

The most marked achievement of the year financially was the refinancing of the Board's total debt of \$850,000 by obtaining a lower rate of interest, thereby saving \$9,000.00 a year.

Despite actual war and the threat of war, the Foreign Mission Board is able to report for the convention year just closed, one of the best of its long history of 96 years. Through its 457 active missionaries and the nearly 3,000 native workers the Board has been doing the work of preaching and teaching and healing in 16 countries of Africa, Asia, Europe and South America. 35,291 students have been taught, 136,994 patients have been ministered to and multiplied thousands have had the Gospel preached unto them. 18,342 came into the churches by baptism last year. The 251,734 members contributed a total of \$379,896.00.

When Dr. Maddry was elected as Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board the debt was \$1,110,000.00. At the present time the debt is only \$205,000.00.

It is confidently expected that the Foreign Mission Board will be a debtless institution when it observes its 100th anniversary in 1945.

Recommendations

In order to do the work of the Lord to the fullest, we wish to recommend to all the churches:

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1. That we preach and teach continuously, Evangelism, Missions, Christian Education and Christian Stewardship.

2. That each church every year make out a worthy budget that will include all the work of the convention. That each church give every member a chance to share regularly in the offerings.

3. That each church do its part in bringing about a debtless denomination by the year 1945.

4. That all denominational funds be sent every month properly marked to M. A. Huggins, General Secretary, Raleigh, N. C.

THURSDAY NIGHT

The evening session began promptly. The congregation joined in singing "Zion Stands with Hills Surrounded," led by Mr. Herman Mauney, of Elizabeth Baptist Church. Prayer by Rev. W. A. Hoffman. The following report was read by Rev. John A. Hallman, associational president of the Training Union Work.

BAPTIST TRAINING UNION REPORT

More than nineteen hundred years ago, when the Master Teacher was praying in a certain place, one of those present, who was interested in the Master's way of life, said, "Lord teach us to pray." This disciple was anxious to be a learner and develop his Christlike personality. Some Christians, in other ages, have been anxious to grow in Christian graces and become better informed, but have not always found an answer to the cry of their souls.

In more modern times, our Baptist Training Unions have provided an opportunity for a Christian to enrich his Christian experience and grow into an active, useful church member. It helps a church to become a happy, dynamic, soul-winning force instead of a "lukewarm," inactive, indifferent organization. However, the thrill of joy in accomplishment is marred by the vision of the still unreached church multitudes.

In this association of 48 churches, there seems to be a Training Union organization in 32 of them and one in Boiling Springs Junior College, making a total of 33 organizations in the association. The other 16 churches offer a challenge for sacrificial work, but I would remind you that only a small percent of the church members in these 32 churches avail themselves of Training Union opportunity to become greater, happier Christians. There are at present about 15 Story Hour Groups, 30 Junior Unions, 30 Intermediate Groups, 25 Young Peoples Unions, and 20 Adult Groups.

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Some of the above named department groups include other ages in churches that do not have the full "set up."

On the financial end, a collection was taken at the September mass meeting and a contribution from one church since that time has helped pay *part* of the mailing expenses and the expenses of two visiting speakers.

In the spring, a conference meeting, headed by Dr. Clay I. Hudson of Nashville, Tennessee, was held in Shelby. In April, an association-wide mass meeting was held with Dover Church in which we had Rev. J. D. Marler of Lowell, who is our regional director. In September, we held a second associational-wide mass meeting with the First Baptist Church of Shelby in which we had Rev. Boyce Brooks of Spindale. Three meetings of the program and executive committee were held. The associational organization desires to encourage and help the present church organizations where possible, and plant the work in other new fields.

The State Training Union will sponsor a conference at the First Baptist Church of Shelby in the evening of November 27. The General Board of our association has endorsed an associational-wide study course for the latter part of March, 1942.

If ever our people needed to be better informed and more consecrated in "FOLLOWING THE LIVING CHRIST" surely it is in this time of turmoil and strife. This is an hour of opportunity and appealing challenge for the Baptist Training Union.

The Annual Doctrinal Sermon was preached by Rev. J. L. Jenkins, pastor Boiling Springs Baptist Church. The association adjourned to meet on Thursday morning, October 24, at 9:00 o'clock. J. L. Jenkins led the closing prayer.

FRIDAY MORNING

The Association was called to order at 9:00. Rev. W. A. Roberts, host pastor, led in singing "Higher Ground." Rev. D. F. Putnam led in the morning devotion. At the close of Mr. Putnam's message the association joined in a special prayer

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for Mrs. Putnam who was at that time a patient in the Shelby hospital.

The report on Hospitals was prepared by Rev. W. A. Hoffman who failed to bring the report. He was permitted to speak and was given the privilege to mail it to the Clerk later.

OUR HOSPITAL

"Our Hospital," how these words should stir our souls and cause us to rejoice with joy unspeakable as we think of the North Carolina Baptist Hospital located in Winston-Salem, and ministering in the name of Jesus. In Acts 10-38 we have a very brief but comprehensive description of the ministry of Jesus while here in the flesh, a ministry that we are to carry on in His Spirit until He comes back again, "How God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power, who went about doing good." How more appropriately and appealingly could Jesus have been introduced to this Gentile gathering?

The "going about and doing good" was the service rendered by Jesus to a sick and dying humanity, and consisted in physical, mental and spiritual healing. The door into the hearts of men was thrown open to Him as the Messiah because of His sympathetic heart and healing touch. His works proved His Messianship, and he was able to throw out the challenge "If I do not the works of Him that sent me, believe me not;" and again He said "I have greater witness than that of John for the works which the Father gave me to finish, the same works I do bear witness of me that the Father hath sent me."

How long will it take us to learn and fully realize that our Christianity to recommend itself to and be believed in, and received by a lost, blind and dying world must be a Christianity that manifests itself in service to the whole man. A religion that is not vitally interested in the physical mental welfare of people, as well as their soul, is not Christianity and will not commend itself to the blind, the bruised and the dying. We will hardly be recognized as "Followers of Christ," merely by dressing up on Sunday, going to Church, singing our hymns, making our prayers, and often times quoting, parrot like, pious platitudes.

We are living in an age of hospitalization. Hospitals are a very vital part of this complex age in which we are now living, and will become more so. So often the physician's statement following his diagnosis is "You must go to the hospital." What a burden this places upon many who have little or no means for meeting this added expense. We have no criticism for any hospital, but pray God's blessings upon them in their healing ministry; but our hearts turn in a very definite way to the North Carolina Baptist Hospital in Win-

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ston-Salem, owned and operated by the Baptist of North Carolina in the name and for the sake of Jesus Christ.

The motive in operating this hospital is not financial profit, but service to the needy. The only entrance requirements are two, a sick person and a place to put him. How grateful we should be to know that with increasing need our facilities for meeting these needs have been increased. The Hospital now has a 300-bed capacity; a staff of 100 physicians, a training school for nurses with 150 nurses now in training. The Bowman Grey Medical School of Wake Forest now operates in close connection with the hospital. In connection with all the above there is the spiritual ministry now of a full time hospital pastor, Rev. Chas. E. Parker.

With this enlarged program of the hospital may we meet it with increased contributions, with special emphasis on the Mother's Day Offering, that the doors of the hospital may be thrown wide to the sick, and especially for those who have no means of paying for their treatment. Remembering with joy that in that day we shall hear "I was sick and ye visited me."

The report on Christian Literature was read by Rev. W. A. Roberts. Mr. Roberts yielded his time to Rev. C. H. Satterfield of the Biblical Recorder and Rev. Wade Bostic of Shelby.

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

On the subject of religious literature let us recognize the Bible as being the greatest book on the subject. Let us recognize that all other religious books, magazines, papers, and publications are based upon the Bible, and should be looked upon and dealt with as secondary to the Bible. With this word of introduction, let us consider some of our denominational literature which is so vital in the lives of all North Carolina Baptists.

In Ephesians, the fourth chapter and third verse, we find these words: "Giving diligence to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." Paul made unity of the Spirit one of the definite objects of church life. It is important in the life of the church, and equally important in the life of the denomination. The Biblical Recorder, our denominational paper, contributes to the unity of the Spirit among North Carolina Baptists, as it draws us closer to the living Christ, as it informs us about our brethren, and as it challenges us to the great work of spreading the gospel of the kingdom.

Speaking on the subject of Church Papers, Bacon said: "If I might control the literature of the home I would guarantee the well-being of Church and State." During these times when some people fear that the home is losing some of its sustaining influence and that the minds of our young people are being filled with un-

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worthy information and ideas, we wonder whether parents are providing for their homes the proper reading material. To help remedy this problem, every home should receive its church paper.

Southern Baptists have many publications informing our people. Sunday School literature, Baptist Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union. Our missionary magazine such as The Commission, Royal Service, Home Missions and many others. If we are to lead our people to be more missionary minded, and to enlist them in the great task of evangelizing the nations, we must insist that they study missionary literature.

According to the digest of the 1940 church letters there were 28 of our churches that had subscribers to the Biblical Recorder. There were 18 churches that reported no subscribers to the Recorder. The total number of subscribers from the 28 churches was 454. There was an increase of 13 over the previous year (1939).

According to the digest of the 1941 church letters there are 29 of our churches that have subscribers to the Biblical Recorder. There are 19 churches that report no subscribers to the Recorder. The total number of subscribers from the 29 churches is 290. There is a decrease of 164.

The circulation of the Recorder in the state of North Carolina is a little less than 11,000, about one-fourth of what it should be. We have approximately 500,000 Baptists in the state of North Carolina, certainly we should have 50,000 taking the Recorder. If it is to have a large place in the Baptist life of this state, we must increase the circulation.

The report on Baptist Orphanages was read by Rev. Jesse Blalock. Mr. Blalock yielded his time to Superintendent I. G. Greer of the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina at Thomasville. Mr. Greer, as usual, held the great audience with all ease as he pled the cause of the Orphan Child in our State.

REPORT ON THE BAPTIST ORPHANAGE OF NORTH CAROLINA

No other institution lies so close to the heart of North Carolina Baptists as does the Baptist Orphanage. This is as it should be, for James tells us that "Pure, unsoiled religion in the judgment of God the Father means this: To care for orphans and widows in their trouble, and to keep oneself from the stain of the world," [James 1:27. Moffatt]. The Baptist Orphanage was born in the hearts of men and women who had that kind of religion and the work is being sustained and carried forward by those of like faith today.

Time would fail to tell of the stories of physical, social and

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spiritual needs which are being poured into the ears of the officials and in the office of the Baptist Orphanage. Only those who must listen to these stories of human need, and deal with these problems first hand know what sympathy, long suffering, patience and good judgment this requires.

The Orphanage is caring for three classes of children, full orphans, half orphans and victims of desertion of wrecked homes. This service is being rendered through Mother's Aid, boarding homes and the orphanage proper. In addition to this the Orphanage authorities are rendering a fine service by helping children and parents made adjustments with neighbors and relatives.

The demands upon the Orphanage have never been greater. The authorities receive upon an average forty-five applications every month of the year. However great and urgent the demands, the policy of the Orphanage is not to make special appeals. The average cost of running the Orphanage is about \$500 a day. Special appeals for other worthy causes may come and go, but this constant stream of human need must go on day after day and year after year until the purpose of Christ through His Church has been fulfilled.

Here is a Christian responsibility which our Sunday Schools and Churches cannot afford to shun. We believe that every Sunday School and Church could, and would give something each month if led to see their responsibility.

We recommend that this Association name an Orphanage representative who will see that a representative is named in every Sunday School to keep this worthy need before the people once a month and at Thanksgiving.

The report on Relief and Annuity was read by Rev. L. W. Cain, pastor of Carpenters Grove Baptist Church. The report was spoken to by Rev. Rush Padgett, Mrs. Blanton and the Writer:

REPORT ON RELIEF AND ANNUITY

Some progress has been made in the King's Mountain Association as to ministerial relief. However, may we understand that only a beginning has been made. A moment with these figures will show what we have done, and perhaps show what is being done at present.

1940, or the Associational year that ended a year ago, shows that eleven out of a possible forty-eight churches contributed to the relief of old ministers—the ones who have spent a long and useful life in the Master's Service. The sum contributed by the eleven churches was \$161.47. Compare these figures with, for example, the year of 1937. Out of a possible 43 churches, only 3 contributed to these disabled heroes of the Cross. The amount that year was only \$26.84.

Fellow workers, to face facts as facts are, every one of us will have to admit that despite the fact that these figures show a noticeable gain, we are far behind what we should be doing for

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the hundreds of old ministers who are no longer able to stand in the Holy places to proclaim the Everlasting Truth. A large number of these old preachers, some of their widows and orphans are depending on our Baptist churches for a part of their living, to say the least. In some instances, a few have been forced to go to homes for the poor. Do the old ministers have a right to look to their brethren in Christ for help when ill health and old age strikes them? I know that you will agree as one, and say that they do have that right. Paul says in I Tim. 5: 18, "The laborer is worthy of his hire."

Let each one of us, as we go back to our respective church see to it that a contribution is made next year to this great and worthy cause. To the old minister, we can take an offering as often as we observe the Lord's Supper. This will amount to a great deal more than has been done in the past.

To make our situation safe for the future, our Board is offering churches and pastors the Minister's Retirement Plan. If every pastor and church would adopt this plan, no pastor would ever again be forced to go to a county home or to die feeling that his church and denomination had turned its back upon him in his hour of utter need. This plan is, in brief this: The Church pays 4% of the pastor's salary, and the pastor pays 4%. In other words, 8% of the salary is paid into this Retirement Fund, the church bearing half of the burden and the pastor the other half. It seems that every messenger should take this up with your church, and do something about it. There can be but little doubt in the minds of any of us as to the need of a plan than what we have at present. Then may we all hold up the Retirement Plan as the ideal plan for the relief of pastors who will eventually be forced to give up their work on account of age or ill health.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND PUBLIC MORALS

It has been increasingly apparent that the whold world has suffered a moral slump since the World War Number One. It has been on a moral toboggan headed downward. This is more evident in America because our Country has dwelled upon a higher level, and is more sensitive to this great disturbance in its moral life.

Here we have seen things come to pass that previously we thought could not or never would be. We have seen social prac-

tices arise that were not only repulsive to the more conservative Christians but actually shocking to the spiritually minded.

Moral sanctions have been abandoned and free reign given to natural inclinations. Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, Director of Federal Bureau of Investigation, recently said: "Crime in the United States is a problem which should be viewed with alarm by every public spirited citizen."

Whata hope is there for America? I can see only one way out: That is a great sweeping Revival of New Testament Christianity. We need a Revival that will cause us to retrace our steps back to the ideals which have been abandoned or neglected; back to respect for authority; back to a recognition of the duties of parents and the sacredness of home; back to a solid moral foundation.

There are many moral problems facing our churches today but we have time for only one: namely, the drink problem.

All thinking people are more or less apprehensive of the fact that to drink alcohol is detrimental to the body. In many cases the brain is so paralyzed that the result is immorality. We refer to statistical reports, that we may better understand the evil effects of alcohol:

In 1940 there was a saloon for every seventy-one families; for every church, there were two saloons; for every three public schools there were five saloons.

We call upon all our people to arise, fight, vote, and pray until this problem is solved.
