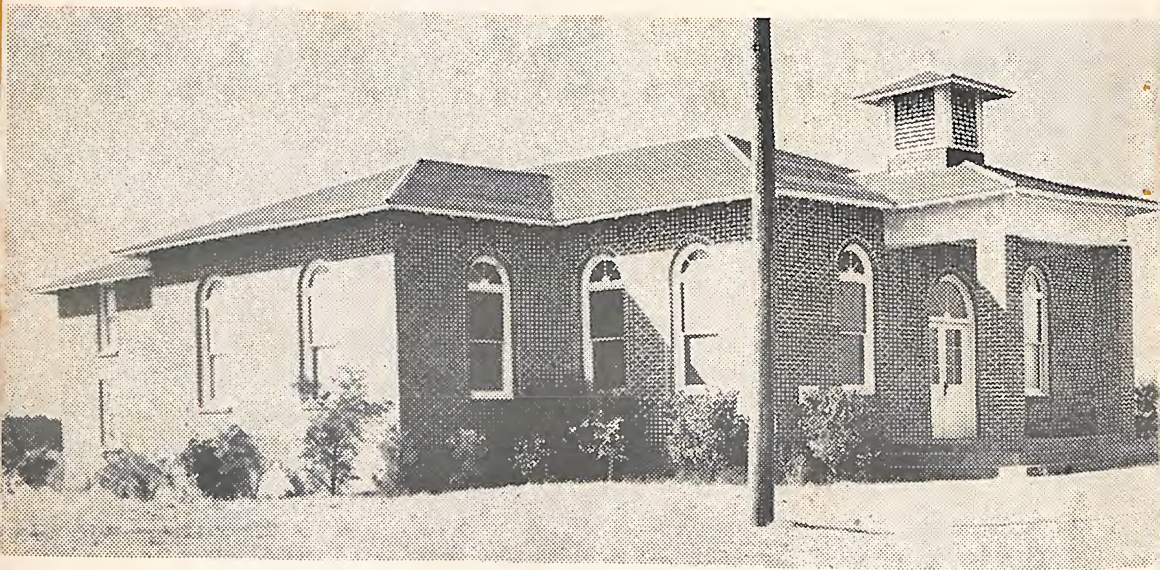

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order and rules of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

ARTICLE 1. The name of this organization shall be Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 2. The membership of the Association shall consist of such messengers as may be selected by the churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letter sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being two messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty, and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty or major fraction thereto in church membership. All pastors serving constituent churches together with all regularly ordained ministers holding membership in these churches shall be members of the body. The courtesies on the floor may be extended to representatives of the denominational interests, and also to ministers and members of other Christian organizations.

ARTICLE 3. The Association shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each annual meeting shall organize itself by enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, and Historian, whose duties shall be to serve in the usual capacity of such officers and who shall hold office, unless duly deposed by the electing body, until their respective successors are elected.

AMENDMENT (1): At the discretion of the Association, all officers may be elected at the close of one session to serve until the close of the succeeding one.

AMENDMENT (2): There shall be a nominating committee appointed at each annual session of the Association to serve during the coming year. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers of the Association as provided in Article 3 of this Constitution the Sunday School Superintendent and the Baptist Training Union Director. The committee shall make nominations to the General Board for any vacancies during the year and bring nominations to the Association of all officers herein provided.

ARTICLE 4. At each annual session a General Board shall be appointed by the Association, which shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the superintendents of the Sunday schools, and Woman's Missionary Union Work, the president of the Baptist Young People's Union Convention, the president or Gardner-Webb Junior College, the pastor of each church composing the Association, and two members from each church which members shall be nominated by the church or by delegates present

from the church and approved by the Association. This Board shall hold meetings either monthly or quarterly and shall exercise the functions and discharge the duties usually committed to an executive board or committee. At its discretion it may select out of its own members an Executive Board of not less than seven members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full board.

The purpose and plans of this General Board in all its meetings shall be to promote the interest and carry forward the work of the Association and of its constituent churches as this work is outlined in Article 5 of the constitution. The Board may select a time and place and arrange a program for holding extra sessions of the Association for inspirational and devotional meetings. In case of emergency it may also arrange for special business sessions of the body; provided, however, that no action taken in such extra business sessions shall conflict with any action of a previous regular session, and provided further that the business of such extra sessions shall be limited to the object for which it was convened, and the membership of such special business sessions shall be made up of the messengers elected by the churches and accredited to the previous regular session.

ARTICLE 5. The prime purpose of this Association shall be to counsel together for the enlargement and strengthening of God's Kingdom by promoting unity and growth among the churches composing it, and by co-operating with the programs of the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in the work of Missions, Christian Education, and Social Service, and any and all other objects. At each annual meeting one or more delegates shall be elected to represent this body in the ensuing sessions of these conventions.

ARTICLE 6. The Association may receive other churches into its fellowship on letters of dismission from other like organizations. It may also receive newly constituted churches whose articles of faith harmonize with the Confession of Faith attached hereto, and whose practice conforms to the purpose of this Association as set forth in Article 5 above.

ARTICLE 7. While disclaiming the right of authority to interfere in the affairs of any church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship, and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigation, to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

ARTICLE 8. This Association shall conduct its business sessions in accordance with parliamentary practice as set forth in any well-authenticated book dealing with the subject.

ARTICLE 9. This Constitution may be changed or amended at any regular meeting of the Association; provided, however, that each proposed change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on during the day following and two-thirds of the members present shall concur in its adoption.

CONFESSIONS OF FAITH

1. We believe the Scripture of the Old and New Testaments to be a divinely inspired revelation from God.

2. We accept the New Testament alone as revealing the only plan of salvation and as the final authority in all matters of church policy and practice.

3. We believe Jesus Christ as revealed in the New Testament to be the Son of God and the divine Savior of all who truly accept Him as such.

4. We believe in the personality of the Holy Spirit, and in His abiding presence with the spirit of all the elect of God, in His quickening presence with the spirit of the unregenerate moving to repentance and faith, in His witnessing presence with the spirit of the regenerate comforting and guidance throughout life in His sustaining presence in the experience of death, and in His continuing presence in the life to come.

5. We believe salvation is attained through spiritual regeneration in the act of repentance and acceptance of Jesus as Savior.

6. Sincere spiritual redemption was made available by the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus, we believe that every regenerate person should symbolize his own salvation by being buried with Him in baptism.

7. We believe that a local church modeled after the New Testament order is a company of regenerate persons voluntarily joined together for the purpose of extending God's Kingdom on earth.

8. We believe that each church should from time to time, as a congregation, celebrate the Lord's Supper as a memorial to Him.

9. We believe in the ultimate triumph of God's Kingdom over all opposing powers, and that every regenerate soul shall have a share in that triumph.

RULES OF ORDER

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

ARTICLE 2. The Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk - Treasurer shall be chosen annually by the majority of the members of this body present at any stated meeting.

ARTICLE 3. The Moderator shall preside and decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Association. He shall appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered.

ARTICLE 4. Brethren invited to seats with us shall have the privilege of discussion, but not of voting.

ARTICLE 5. Speakers shall rise and address the moderator and shall confine themselves to subject under discussion. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without the permission of the Association.

ARTICLE 6. Any church failing to be represented in this body either by messenger or letter for two years will be subject to the discipline of the body. A committee shall be appointed to visit the church and aid them in any way possible and in case the church shall not report for the third time it shall be excluded from the fellowship of the Association.

ARTICLE 7. No question shall be discussed without a motion thereon first being made and seconded. Motions made and seconded shall be stated by the Moderator previous to any discussion thereon. If a motion contains two or more points it shall be divided by request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote.

ARTICLE 8. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be considered authority in cases not provided for in these Rules of Order.

ARTICLE 9. No member shall absent himself permanently from the session of the Association without the permission of the Moderator.

1. The Ninety-Eighth Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association met with Casar Baptist Church, Nine O'clock A.M. Moderator Suttle called for a hymn. The Hymn, "O Worship the King," was sung by the congregation, standing. W. W. Harris led the song with Mrs. Roy Propst at the piano.

2. C. C. Crow was called to lead the prayer. After which the Hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name," was sung.

3. Introductory Sermon was given by D. Boyd Cannon, Pastor of Elizabeth Baptist Church. The Scripture and Text were from Hebrews 2:14-7. Text: Verse 17. Theme: "Our Great High Priest."

4. The Enrollment Committee having been appointed by the Clerk under instruction of the Moderator, who called for the organization of the body. The following composed the Enrollment Committee: Misses Mazel Walker, Louise Pruitt, Mary Nolan and Hadden Downs.

5. W. P. Biggerstaff, chairman of the program committee, presented a suggested program for order of business for the session. It was adopted as the order of business for the Association.

6. Upon the recommendation of the Fellowship Committee of the Missionary Advisory Committee the following Churches were accepted into full membership of the Association: Bethany and Plains View. They were accepted a year ago under watchcare. These churches were accepted by the body.

7. Visitors, New Pastors and New Churches were recognized. The names of the visitors will appear elsewhere in the minutes. New Pastors and workers were New Camps Creek, Rev. George Leigh; North Brook, Coy H. Dellinger; Patterson Grove, G. C. Teague; Shelby First, Harlan H. Harris; Shelby Calvary, W. T. Furr; Shelby Eastside, E. B. Hicks; Shelby Highland, J. R. Howe; Victory, G. R. Davis; Assistant Workers: New Buffalo, J. E. McGinnis; Shelby Second, Miss Sara Posey and Mrs. Mary H. Dellinger.

The following New Churches were recognized: New Camps Creek, Shelby Highland and Victory. The Fellowship Committee recommended that these Churches be accepted into the fellowship of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association under watchcare for the coming year. They were so received.

8. The Report on Christian Education—Gardner-Webb College.

The Report on Christian Education was read by Dr. Wyan W. Washburn of Gardner-Webb College. Dr. Washburn and Ben Fisher spoke to the Report. Dr. Sankey L. Blanton, Director of Religious Work at Wake Forest College, spoke on Christian Education. The Report was Adopted.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND GARDNER-WEBB COLLEGE

Baptists in North Carolina have six colleges and a school of nursing and several large summer assemblies to assist the churches in their teaching program. The colleges are Wake Forest, Meredith, Mars Hill, Gardner-Webb, Wingate and Campbell. The School of Nursing is at the N. C. Baptist Hospital. Another college, Chowan, a landmark in Christian influence in eastern North Carolina for nearly a century, has announced it will re-open its doors this fall.

Building and enlargement of physical plants seems to be the most prominent activity just now. Wake Forest is in the midst of a campaign to raise money for the erection of an entirely new set of buildings near Winston-Salem to care for at least 2,000 students. The present goal is \$6,000,000, and the Convention has authorized the removal of Wake Forest to Winston-Salem by 1952. The erection of the new plant and removal to Winston-Salem is part of an agreement under which Wake Forest will become chief beneficiary of a foundation set up by the Reynolds family.

Meredith is erecting a combination auditorium and music and arts building at a cost of nearly half a million dollars. Mars Hill is just completing a magnificent student union building at a cost of around \$300,000, and only last year built two new large dormitories, one of which was named for Mrs. Rush Stroup of Shelby who was chairman of the building committee. Wingate has just completed a new dormitory and the spacious Efrid Library. Campbell has a large new dormitory and the school of nursing at Winston-Salem has a new home.

Friends of Chowan have raised \$100,000 and are in process of raising another \$100,000 to re-condition and re-equip her plant. Officials hope to enroll around 200 to 300 students this fall. Currently, there are nearly 4,850 students in North Carolina Baptist institutions for higher learning.

One of the most potent forces for the advancement of education by the denomination is the Council On Christian Education, a Convention-appointed body which has been quite active since its incep-

tion in 1943. Head of this brilliant body of education minded men is Dr. C. Sylvester Green of Durham, and Executive Secretary is Clyde Gaddy of Raleigh. One of the leading members is Phil Elliott of Gardner-Webb. This Council seeks to co-ordinate and direct the powerful forces involved in the entire education program of the denomination and to make special recommendations to the Convention concerning character, curriculum, finances, and future planning for all the schools.

Let us come home to Gardner-Webb where more than 400 students are enrolled this year. To some that means simply we have the biggest enrollment in the history of the college. It means more than that. It means that 400 separate young men and women from 41 North Carolina counties, two other states and Puerto Rico have come from scores of homes and church communities for a two year period of character building, to learn how to be better Christians the Baptist way. It means even more than that. It means that a large percentage of these people eventually will go back into their respective homes and communities to take up positions of leadership and responsibility. For a great many of these students their only experience in the elevating, purifying, moulding crucible we call a college education will have been at Gardner-Webb.

Our enrollment is no longer confined to the Kings Mountain, Sandy Run or Gaston associations. Twenty seven have come from South Carolina, and others have come from as far North as Ohio, as far East as Bladen county, and as far West as Murphy. Cleveland, Rutherford, Gaston and Burke counties have the most students in that order.

Baptist lead in affiliation and preference, having well over 300, Methodists next with 64. In addition, there are seven other church groups represented, while a few have no affiliation with any church.

Most significant to me is the fact that 40 of these people are preparing for the Ministry, 19 for Missions, 22 others for religious education, 16 for music and 42 for Christian teaching. There are 30 other vocations for which our students want special preparation.

By the end of this year approximately \$250,000 will have been spent for new buildings on the campus at Gardner-Webb. Dormitory space has been provided for nearly 100 girls. In the next few weeks a handsome new student union building will be completed as a memorial to the late Governor and Ambassador O. Max Gardner, one of the most devoted and valuable friends the college ever knew. This building is being provided through the generosity of the Gardner Foundation and members of the Gardner family. Work has just begun on the much needed President's Home with funds being provided by the Womans Missionary Societies of the Kings Mountain, Sandy Run and Gaston associations and through special gifts by friends of the college.

One of the goals of President Elliott and the trustees for a number of years has been membership in the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges. As the school has grown and improved its physical and financial rating, standards for the Association also have been raised,

and until now this coveted membership has been a sort of rainbow chase. . . . always in the hazy future. This year we have high hopes that membership will be granted, following a final inspection of all aspects of the college this month.

The college has no debt, no outstanding notes; in fact, nothing but current financial obligations, which are being met as they fall due. However, in all frankness this state of affairs can not last long since operating costs are increasing by the month. I have been informed that revenues totalling approximately \$25,000 more than the current budget will be required to keep the school operating without a deficit next year.

For Baptists of this area and friends of the College to set a goal of \$250,000 for an Endowment fund, and get it, is a magnificent victory for Christian education. Ben Fisher, chairman of this drive, has assured me that with faith and prayer and a little overpayment of all outstanding commitments by individuals and churches, we can go to the Convention with full hands and glad hearts. At the last meeting of the Trustees the Board was so impressed with the work of Mr. Fisher, it was decided to retain him in the capacity of Executive assistant to the President with specific duties to direct public relations, Alumni activities, and after completion of the Endowment drive, to implement the new Living Endowment plan under which alumni, churches and friends of the college will systematically give to the support and endowment of the school for many years to come.

Gardner-Webb's public relations department is unique in that it is the only Junior College in the Southeast which has remote control studies on the campus which connect with two radio stations, and regularly gives programs of religious, cultural and educational interest.

Morale at Gardner-Webb is excellent. I have never seen a better "esprit de corps" in any organization. This is due in no little measure to the leadership of the fine faculty, not in the least amount to the fact that we have a football team which is holding its own against the best in North Carolina Junior College football, though the players have a minimum of physical equipment.

In closing I want to point out some misconceptions or fallacies in the thinking of some people regarding Christian education:

1. That Christian education is found only in our denominational schools. It must be there, but it also must be in all the homes, churches, public schools and secular organizations in the land. It must be on an individual level. One Christian must tell another. . . . as of old.

2. That the state will teach people how to make a living and the church must teach us how to live. Besides being basically wrong, this idea must fail when we see that no more than 1 in 10 goes to college, either state or Christian, and no more than 1 in 3 goes to church with any regularity.

3. That there is no competition for denominational junior colleges. While it is true there are only one or two tax-supported junior colleges

in the state now, an authority no less than our president in Washington has proposed to Congress that in the near future a junior college education be given free in state schools and paid for with tax money.

4. That morality and character can be taught separately and apart from facts and information. Baptists believe this is impossible and that all learning has implications of good or evil from which it can not be detached. We have only to consider the immense amount of learning and mountains of scientific facts which produced atomic power for this world, to reflect that were it not for the elements of character and morality and the humanizing forces of Christianity, that possessors of the ideas without goodness, might destroy us, themselves and the world.

A more practical reason for character education is shown in a recent survey by editors of "Who's Who In America" wherein it is proved that graduates from Christian colleges have four to seven times the average chance for success.

It is obvious, then, that we are challenged to do several things. When Confederate General Nathan B. Forrest once was asked how it happened he always won his battles, he replied, "I allus gits thar fustest with the mostest. . ." So, we must get there first with the most. Other denominations are getting there, teaching, training, spending, building. One denomination spent four and a half million dollars for a high school in New York state, and that same denomination spends nearly \$183,000,000 for education alone every year. This is a greater amount than any Protestant denomination spends for all purposes, not to mention schools. Last year the Southern Baptist Convention spent a total of only \$132,000,000 for all purposes, perhaps not a tenth of that sum for schools.

We have got to use all the modern training aids, visual and manual, at our command; reach out and teach more people and teach them better than ever before. At the same time we must maintain the integrity and character of Christ in all our teaching, else the teacher, student, school and the cause will be lost. At all times we must preserve personal and religious freedom, the dignity of personality and all the basic human liberties.

I paraphrase one of the mottoes of a great newspaper syndicate which says "Give the people enough light and they will find a way," with "Give the people Christ through Christian teaching and they will have both a Light and a Way."

REPORT OF WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

If we catch the vision of the world's need we must realize that

Jesus must reign over the whole world. The sun must never set on His Kingdom, for "of His Kingdom there shall be no end."

He must reign, and it is our privilege as redeemed people to bring about His universal reign. The message must be carried by individuals and by groups working together. May we remember that while the plan is for redeemed people to carry the message that shall bring the lost of all nations to worship at His feet, we are nowhere promised that the opportunity of being chief among the messengers will always be given to America. Just now we are the nation most able to provide messengers and the money needed to send the messengers. However, we only need to read our mission magazines to realize how far short we are falling in answering the call. May God open our eyes and arouse us to a sense of obligation and privilege lest it be taken from us and given to another.

When we think of world-wide responsibilities such as God has placed on American Christians the question is; how can I, one Christian woman, help meet the needs, and seize the opportunities, or can one small group made up of women like me accomplish anything at so great a task? What are some of the qualifications we need if we are to have a part in hastening the day when He reigns?

First, we must have convictions. We hear so often, "It don't make any difference what you believe, just so you are right." It does make a difference what we believe; right living depends on right believing; convictions are important. Have strong convictions and the courage to stand by them.

We must believe that men and women are eternally lost without the Saviour. The women sixty years ago had strong convictions concerning the lost state of those who know not the Saviour in the pardon of their sins. Despite the laughter of cynics these women continued to meet to pray, to sew and to read letters from the unknown missionary friends their money had sent into the heathen world.

Because, "He must reign," and we have a responsibility to discharge, we must have willingness in our hearts. We must be willing to pay. The Disciples were commanded to tarry in Jerusalem until endued with power from on high, and they spent ten days in prayer, in preparation for carrying out the Master's command to make disciples of all nations. We cannot begin our task until we have received power through prayer. "Be still and know that I am God." Pray more! meditate more! We must not let activity take the place of waiting on the Lord for power.

If we are truly convinced that He must reign, and that unless He does reign in human hearts, people are lost, we will be eager to do His bidding. No task will be too small to merit our best effort if done for His glory; no assignment too large to daunt our faith if we have waited for the power of His Spirit. A missionary in China prayed every day for seventeen years for the conversion of a Chinese woman who was an opium addict and a gambler, at last she gave her heart to the Lord and became a winning witness for Him. It took seventeen years.

The leader of the Sunbeam Band with its group of wiggly, book throwing little boys was perhaps many times discouraged but she didn't give up and from that band came Dr. Arthur Gillespie, missionary in China. If we are to help bring in His reign we must be patient and perserving.

Not only will we willingly and patiently pray, and serve, to hasten His universal reign, but we shall also joyously give our time, our strength, our money; anything He needs. We must be a people of convictions. Gladly take the task He gives you.

When we give all we have, and serve and pray to our utmost ability, we shall not only find the deepest satisfaction day by day, but we shall be anticipating the unspeakable joy of the glorious time when, our tasks finished.

"At the name of Jesus laying
Falling prostrate at His feet
King of kings in heaven we'll crown Him
When our Journey is complete."

MINUTES OF THE FIFTY-FOURTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE KING'S MOUNTAIN WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

MORNING SESSION

The Fifty-Fourth Annual Session of the Women's Missionary Union was held with the Poplar Springs Baptist Church, Shelby, North Carolina, April 21, 1948.

Mrs. W. P. Biggerstaff, the Superintendent presided over the meeting which opened at 10 o'clock for the morning session. The Theme for the day's program was "For Ye Serve the Lord Christ." The Women's Missionary Union hymn for the year "Jesus Shall Reign" was used for the opening hymn.

Mrs. Smoot Baker, and Mrs. B. F. Bird of Grover Baptist Church gave the morning devotion and Mrs. L. C. Pinnix sang "Oh Master Let Me Walk With Thee" as a part of the devotional.

Gracious words of welcome were given by Mrs. J. R. Cantrell of the hostess church.

11. Associational Missions: The Associational Missionary, Lewis E. Ludlum read the report. After discussion by Missionary Ludlum, the report was adopted.

REPORT OF ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY

In his book "Working Together In A Spiritual Democracy" Dr. Gaines S. Dobbins says that unquestionably the District Association is the most important unit in our Baptist denominational system. Its function, he says, is fourfold: (1) To disseminate information, (2) To provide inspiration, (3) To promote fellowship, and, (4) To secure co-operation.

In this report I propose to try to evaluate some attainments and needs in terms of the present, and help you discover some needs, opportunities and possibilities in terms of the future.

As I see it, the task of the church is to evangelize the world. I use the term evangelism in its larger or inclusive meaning. It means not only winning to Christ, but helping individuals to grow into strong, happy, and servicable christians.

The first and most obvious phase of this job, from the standpoint of the local church, is to evangelize the local church community. The other phase of this job is to join hands and hearts with other churches to do the same thing beyond the borders of the local church community. The term commonly used for this phase of the task is MISSIONS. Locally the work is to be done with our own hands, our own lips, our own hearts and personalities. We do the other by proxy. Week by week we offer to God a part of our earnings to be used to advance His Kingdom around the world.

Every church represented here today has a job to do in its own community. Proof of this is the fact that we have in the Southland about 35,000,000 people not attending Sunday School. About 20,000 of these reside within the borders of our association.

A study of our present attainments reveal some encouraging facts. A study of our needs reveal some tremendous opportunities and responsibilities.

(1) Reports at this session of our association will reveal that membership of the churches and all church organizations are on the increase. Yet, great multitudes of lost people are still unreached, and a large percent of our church membership is yet unenlisted and untrained.

(2) Particularly encouraging is the progress being made by some of our younger churches. Christian heroism and faith exhibited by leaders in some of these is thrilling and inspiring. The glorious service rendered by these in winning and serving people that otherwise would not have been reached has revealed the need for still other church

communities. For instance, the combined Sunday School enrollment of our eight newest organizations is about 1000. A large percent of these are people who previously were not attending church with any degree of regularity. The most interesting feature of this is, that, in no case, has any adjacent church been made smaller or weaker by these new organizations. Already we have discovered other communities which need a local witness and testimony for Christ. Increase of population and formation of new communities reveal larger opportunities and responsibilities for the future. We must remember that this is a corporate responsibility, and thus a mission task. No unchurched community ought to have full responsibility in locating and beginning a new church.

(3) Progress is likewise being made in what institutions call capital assets. I am thinking primarily of buildings being erected or enlarged, both for present and future needs. At present we have at least 11 churches in the process of building, either new or enlarged church houses. About 22 others have building funds. The fact that we excel in this does not behove us to be content with present worship and teaching facilities.

Centuries of experience has revealed that a well located and comfortable pastor's home is a good investment for any church or field of churches. In this we have not excelled, but some progress is being made. We now have 18 homes for pastors, provided either by the church or some local industrial firm. Five of these are in the open country. Five are in villages. Eight are in the towns of Shelby and Kings Mountain. At least six others are in the talking stage of being realized. Hard for many of our beautiful rural churches there ought to reside the pastor and shepherd of the flock, who will invest his life and influence in the community where he serves.

In or near most of our village communities there now resides three men, whom, by virtue of their service and influence, have become an indispensable part of the community life. These three are, namely, the village doctor, the high school principal, and the Methodist minister. We Baptist should strive to add another—the Baptist minister.

(4) But these tangible things are not all that indicate progress. We have a spirit of christian fellowship and cooperation which is priceless and of mutual help and inspiration to each and all. This we must nurture and preserve. It will be indispensable in the challenging and critical days ahead.

Naturally, in this report major emphasis has been given to our associational task. But it would be a false emphasis if we failed to at least mention the great statewide, southwide, and worldwide responsibilities as represented by the work of our three mission boards.

In conclusion, I want to sound a warning of some hidden dangers which we face: (1) To live on the reputation of past attainments. We must never let pride of attainment blind our eyes to possibilities of the future. (2) To be bound by lack of vision and limitations of the past. This is a new day in which we live, and God will judge us in terms of the use we make of present and future potentialities. (3) The danger

of nearsightedness. We must not lose the world vision—even during a worthy building program. Our new Baptist slogans, "Every Baptist A Tither," and "Fifty-Fifty by 1950" are not idle dreams, but worthy ideals to set before us and work toward, if we are to fulfill the purpose of God.

Finally, let us remember that Southern Baptist have a Biblical and common sense plan for carrying on our work. We call it our Cooperative Program. Simply stated it is a plan whereby each and every worshipper can make an offering each and every Lord's Day, and by this act have a part in every phase of our Baptist work around the world. It is God's plan wrought out in the experience of man. We must use and thus preserve it.

THE REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD

The General Board of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association had ten Meetings and one Call meeting during the Associational year. It has promoted the work of the Association through the departments as follows: Co-operative work among the Churches, the Simultaneous Schools of Missions in the churches last March, the Sunday School work, The Baptist Training work, The Women's Missionary Union, The Laymen interest, help in an advisory way through the Missions Committee in organizing new churches and worked with other denominations of the county to rid the county of beer and wine.

Again the Churches of the Association have responded to the Missionary program and have supported it financially. The General Board recommends that the Association continue the Missionary Program and that the Churches continue to send the 7% for the Associational Year. The budget for the year is as follows:

The report was read by W. P. Biggerstaff. At this time a Duet, "Grace, God's Grace," was rendered by L. C. Pinnix and Woodrow W. Harris. The Report On Public Morals was discussed by W. P. Biggerstaff, O. S. Long, O. M. Mull and Rev. R. M. Hauss of the Allied Church League of North Carolina.

PUBLIC MORALS AND SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT

The introductory statement in this report would emphasize the fact that a report adopted by a group of people means that they have put their stamp of approval upon what is contained in the report. It is something more than a paper to be read and printed in the minutes. When approved it should be used as a guide for action in daily conduct by those approving, and in the case of a body like this it should serve as a guide to the churches in their attitudes and conduct on the issues presented. We ought to heed the words of Scripture: "Be ye doers . . . and not hearers only."

Perhaps it will be well to re-define our terms in order that we may have a clear conception of the issues herewith presented. In using the term "morals" we mean that which pertains to character and behavior from the point of view of right and wrong. The conception of modern philosophy understands the term to cover the entire sphere of human conduct as coming under the distinction of right and wrong. When we use the term "social service" we are thinking of our responsibility to correct wrong wherever it exists. We believe, therefore, that it is the duty of the Christian community to take a stand on any issue that has to do with the molding of character, or that threatens to destroy the principles for which we stand. We would commit ourselves anew to stand against the evils that threaten to destroy the lives of people.

MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE

"Since the Civil War the American divorce rate has increased more than 2000 per cent. In 1880, the ratio of divorces to marriages was one to twenty; in 1915 the ratio was reduced to one to ten, and in 1946 the ratio was two to five. If the present rate continues until 1965 one out of every two marriages will fail."—Southern Baptist Convention Annual.

It is our conviction that Baptists should teach and preach that marriage is sacred. We call upon our pastors and churches to fight this evil which will eventually destroy our homes.

CRIME

The time has come when Christians can no longer afford to disregard the alarming increase of crime in our land. We ought to make a thorough study of the whole field; of the causes, the conditions, and the classification under which crime takes place. Especially must we undertake to halt the upward trend of crime among young people. In this connection we would point to the amazing number of so-called comic books that portray crime as a thrill and as an adventure. It is the testimony of some that many of the young criminals get their ideas from these comic books. We also call attention to the many immoral pictures to be seen on the modern screen. Not all, but a large number of the present day movies make a mock of the great principles for which the church stands. A majority of the pictures to be seen glorify drinking and gambling. We believe that our parents should show more interest in what their children are reading and seeing. The churches likewise should be more concerned with the problems of youth and should seek to provide for more wholesome entertainment and recreation as a means of diverting their interests to better things.

In some sections the crime comics are being boycotted, while in others those who handle such items are voluntarily refusing to sell them. We would commend any dealer in our section who would be willing to take such a stand.

THE ALCOHOL PROBLEM

Alcohol has come to be public enemy number one. It is now our worst plague, and a national disgrace. It is the cause of most of the crime that is committed, and is the basis for much of the trouble in the divorce problem. There is no way of estimating the suffering and heartache that comes to the victims of alcohol, and of course we have no way of knowing the loss in moral and spiritual values. It is now a great curse in our land and seriously threatens to wreck our society. It has already done much to corrupt the political life of the land.

The Civic Bulletin, published by the Christian Civic League of Albany, N. Y., gives the following figures in the September 1948 issue. "During 1947 retail liquor sales netted \$9,600,000,000. Is this the largest business enterprise in the United States today?" Some statements from police authorities and court officials are quoted in the same issue. "About 75 per cent of assaults with deadly weapons would not have occurred, if either the suspect or the victim had not been drinking." Another, "About 90 per cent of wife beaters are drunk at the time of assault." A court official, "It is a conservative estimate that liquor is involved in 5 per cent of all felonies handled. In the last 12 homicides liquor was involved in 10 on the part of the victim or the suspect." A judge, "Ninety per cent of all criminal cases tried before me have liquor in the background."

Judge Wilson Warlick of Newton, N. C., said recently, "Ninety per cent of the cases coming before me are attributed to liquor either directly or indirectly." He said a Greensboro newspaper had taken exceptions, saying the percentage was too big. The judge said the next week he and the solicitor kept strict account of all cases heard during that time, and found that not 90 per cent but 100 per cent of the trouble came directly or indirectly from liquor."

The consumption of all distilled spirits in the U. S. in 1946 was 231,215,390 gallons according to the Distilled Spirits Institute, Inc. This was an increase of 21.6 per cent over 1945. In the same year the amount spent for all distilled spirits was \$8,700,000,000.

The records in Recorders Court in Cleveland County shows how the number of cases involving liquor have increased for the following years:

Listed below are the types of violations that appear in the same court most frequently.

- Driving drunk
- Drunk and disorderly
- Manufacturing
- Possession for beverage purposes
- Possession for purpose of sale
- Public drunkenness
- Selling beer without license
- Selling wine without license
- Transporting

These statements furnished by the clerk of Recorders Court prove beyond question that alcohol is the number one problem in the courts in our own county.

We call upon our people to rise up and do something about this terrible condition in our country. We are known as the drunkest nation in the world today. This condition could not exist if Christians would exercise their privilege at the ballot box and elect men who will fight this evil. Soon after the first of the coming year we are to have the opportunity in Cleveland County to drive out beer and wine. We urge all our people to register if you are not already registered, and vote when the time comes. Let us be done with the legal sale of that which is debauching and debasing our citizens. There are enough Baptists in Cleveland County to carry the election with an overwhelming majority. Let the messengers attending this Association go back to their churches determined to lead the fight to a successful conclusion.

The Report was prepared by Rush Hamrick, Sr.; but he was not present to make it. The Clerk was asked to read the Report. O. M. Mull spoke to the Report on the Hospital. The report was adopted.

REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Our North Carolina Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem ministers to the sick from all parts of our state. It is our good Samaritan, in the name of the Great Physician, to those who suffer and do not have sufficient money to pay the large cost of the best medical care.

From among those of limited means 26,000 visits were made to the Out-Patient Department for examination, diagnosis and treatment last year. There will be 35,000 visits this year. This is one of the most important services of our Hospital and it is being enlarged as rapidly as possible.

Of this large number coming to the Out-Patient Department, there is room for only about one-fourth of them to be treated in the Hospital as bed patients. Money is now being raised from interested friends and businesses to build a new enlarged hospital. This will be located on a beautiful 100 acre tract in Winston-Salem which has been given for this purpose. It is hoped that the money needed for the enlargement will come speedily so that space may be provided for many sick people for whom there is not room now.

As the services of our Hospital have grown, the Mother's Day offerings from our churches likewise have grown. Those offerings are all used to help pay the cost of caring for those who receive this ministry and do not have the money to pay the total cost themselves. In order to provide such help for as many as possible, our Hospital adds to the Mother's Day offerings all the funds it can get for this purpose from the welfare agencies of the state and counties, the Duke Endowment, contributions from individuals, and any other available sources. The calls for help are far beyond the means of our Hospital to supply, however. We hope the Mother's Day offering will continue to grow in our churches in order that our Hospital may provide more service for more people.

Our Baptist Hospital and Bowman Grey School of Medicine of Wake Forest College provided training for young women and young men who are called into the fields of nursing and medicine. With all the facilities available in our great hospital and medical school such as we have, there is offered a quality of training which is not generally available. A number of those now in training there are preparing for medical mission work. We urge fine young men and women from our Baptist churches who are interested in these important fields of service to consider going there for their training.

Our Baptist Hospital maintains a Department of Religion. This provides a Chaplain service for the patients, especially those with particular spiritual needs. It provides a religious program among the stu-

dents, seeking to help establish Christian faith and promote spiritual growth. It offers courses in pastoral counselling for pastors and ministerial students designed to prepare the pastor better to minister to his people in their personal needs and problems. This Department serves as a link between our hospital and our churches and people when we have needs and problems in relation to the hospital.

North Carolina Baptist have developed an outstanding medical center. It is for its ministry for those with little money that we appeal to the churches of our association to give generously on Mother's Day.

27. Cooperative Program Report.

Woodrow W. Harris gave the report on the Cooperative Program. Dr. E. L. Spivey spoke to the report. This report was adopted.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

The Cooperative Program, the financial plan promoted by Southern Baptists to support in a fair and equal manner all its agencies, has been growing in effectiveness and efficiency through the years. More and more, churches throughout the Southland have been including the Program in their plans and have come to see it in the best possible means whereby all of the work of the gospel can be supported. That it is scriptural and practical is best attested by the fact that God has smiled upon it to the extent that more people are giving, more money is being raised, and more causes are being helped than at any time in our history. At the same time that the general percentage of gifts to the Cooperative Program is increasing, we note with dismay however, that gifts of Kings Mountain Baptist Association have not kept pace. Though all but six of our churches last year gave some to the Cooperative Program we find that a great number only gave a small percentage of their total Mission Gifts through the Cooperative Program. This means that certain agencies of our work were supported liberally, while other agencies were given scarcely any support. The total Cooperative Program percentage of gifts of our whole Association amounted to only 15% of the total mission gifts. This is in striking contrast to our neighboring Gaston Association whose percentage was 55.3% and that of South Yadkin which was 48.2%.

Cooperative Program gifts in North Carolina are divided into two parts, 50% stays in the state to support state work, and 50% is sent to the Southwide office to support all the agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention. For information we list how the funds are divided this year:

The Regular Work of the American Bible Society includes all these essential tasks. It aids in translation, publishes the Scripture without note or comment, supplies them at cost or less, and encourages their use. It provides the Scripture on foreign fields at less than cost because the income level of the people is so low that they can pay only a fraction of printing the books. In cases of special need, at home and abroad, the Scriptures are given without charge.

The World Emergency Work provides without cost Scriptures to armed forces abroad, to hospitals for wounded soldiers; Scriptures for War Prisoners; Scriptures in many languages for needy people in liberated areas and in Germany and Japan.

The American Bible Society is recognized by Southern Baptists as an essential part of their program. The Southern Convention and our State Convention commend the work of the Bible Society and request our churches to contribute to its support.

The Society is grateful for substantial gifts from Baptist churches throughout the South. It is requested that we continue and increase our gifts.

BAPTIST TRAINING UNION REPORT

Our Maker expects each one to give his best in service. To be able to give his best makes it necessary for each one to have the best training possible. Our church members need to be better informed about our denominational program. We need to be better Bible readers, better missionaries and better able to participate and serve in our church program. The Baptist Training Union has for its program helping Christians develop along the lines mentioned above by fostering daily Bible reading, missionary programs, doctrinal programs and many other activities that help grow a useful Baptist church member.

Some encouraging progress has been made during the year. Our Training Union enrollment has increased about 6% during the year being now well over 2600. However, this is only about one Training Union member out of every seven church members. Also, we have not yet enlisted the number of churches that should be enlisted in the program. There is still more than one third of our churches that does not have an organization of any kind.

The work still offers a great challenge to the Christian workers of our churches. A dozen or more new organizations need to be originated early next year. In addition to this, many dozens of new members need to be added to our present unions and the work needs revitalizing in almost all of our churches. We need to hear afresh Paul's words to Timothy "STUDY to show thyself approved unto God."

On account of the absence of Tom Cornwell, chairman of the laymen's Committee, A. L. Calton read the following report:

LAYMEN'S COMMITTEE REPORT

It has been said that the Kingdom of God moves forward on the feet of little children. There is a very real sense in which the Kingdom of God moves forward on the feet of men. The purpose of the Laymen's Committee of the association in its inception was to provide opportunity for fellowship, instruction, and inspiration for the men of the church.

The method used this year to provide this was principally by Associational and group meetings. On Sunday, June 20, 2:00 P.M., a meeting was held at the Pleasant Grove Baptist Church at which the

principal speaker was Rev. J. B. Hipps, a native of North Carolina and for 35 years a Missionary to China. On Sunday afternoon August 8th., a similar meeting was held at Poplar Springs Baptist Church. The speaker was Rev. Sibly Burnette from the Sunday School Board of Nashville, Tenn.

Three Group Meetings were held September 13, 14 and 15 for the purpose of discussing church financial plans and methods in the local church. The places of meeting were respectively Kings Mountain First, Shelby First, and Fallston. The discussions were led in these meetings by Associational Missionary, Lewis E. Ludlum. On the following Sunday afternoon another Associational meeting was held. This time at the Shelby First Baptist Church. The speakers were Rev. Nolan Benfield of Hickory, N. C., and Rev. J. N. Watson of Marshville, N. C. Nolan Benfield spoke on the topic "Our Advance Program for Foreign Missions." J. N. Watson's topic was the slogan "Fifty-Fifty by 1950."

We feel that much and lasting good has come from these opportunities for our men to come together for fellowship and discussion of matters vital to the ongoing of Christ's Kingdom is helpful.

III. THE SECOND DAY—SHELBY SECOND BAPTIST OCTOBER 22, 1948 MORNING SESSION

This was a cool rainy day and the Second Baptist Church Building could not be heated so the messengers were directed across the street to the South LaFayette Methodist Church Building. The building was heated and comfortable. The messengers appreciated the courtesy of the pastor, Rev. R. L. Bass, and his fine people for this kindness.

2. The Devotional message was brought by Rev. J. L. Jenkins, Pastor of the Boiling Springs Baptist Church. The Scripture lesson: II Cor. 2:12 to 3:6. Theme: "The Qualified Witness."

3. Announcements by Woodrow W. Harris, the host Pastor. He introduced to the assembly the pastor of the South LaFayette Street Methodist Church, Rev. R. L. Bass.

4. The Report of the Sunday School Work.

The Report was read by Superintendent J. D. Barnette. The motion to adopt was made. Superintendent J. D. Barnette, Woodrow W. Harris and Lewis E. Ludlum spoke to the Report. Report was adopted.

REPORT OF THE KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

Our Sunday School organization has held four meetings during the past associational year with a total attendance of 514. During February and March, in spite of the snow and ice, 34 of our churches were visited by teams to help them plan their work. Many attempts were made to reach the other 22, but because of the weather and bad roads the teams were forced to turn back. This year our State and Southwide Leaders recommend that the teams be sent out in October and November in order to give the necessary help to the various churches in the early part of the associational year. Your officers for the coming year are making plans for a team to visit every church within the next few weeks.

Thirty-two of our churches had Vacation Bible Schools with 3411 enrolled and an average attendance of 3050. We feel sure that under the leadership of our Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Rev. W. W. Harris along with our Associational Missionary, Rev. Lewis E. Ludlum, at least 20 other churches would have had schools had it not been for the polio ban.

Rev. E. M. Smith, our Superintendent in charge of Training, is arranging for a great Training Banquet December 3 with Mr. A. V. Washburn of the Sunday School Board as speaker. All those receiving awards October 1, 1947 to October 1, 1948 being eligible to attend.

All our associational officers and co-workers have shown a fine co-operative spirit for which we are deeply grateful. 1947 average attendance 7,421; 1948 average attendance 6,960; loss of 457.

We now have in our association 57 active Sunday Schools with an enrollment of 13,930 a gain of 195 over last year. All these things are encouraging, but when we look squarely at our possibilities and our responsibilities we see immediately that we have not yet "touched the hem of the garment." Our leaders at Raleigh and Nashville tells us that there are 40,000,000 white people within the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention not enrolled in any Sunday School. We find more than 12,000 of that number right here in the bounds of the Kings Mountain Association. Breaking that number down into ages we find that we have at least the following numbers: 850 babies, birth through 3 years of age, 400 Beginners, 4 and 5 years of age, 550 Primaries, 6 through 8 years of age, 750 Juniors, 9 through 12 years of age, 950 Intermediates, 13 through 15 years of age, 1600 Young People, 17 through 24 years of age, 6000 Adults, 25 years of age and above, 900 who cannot attend

Sunday School; making a total of 12,000 white people right here at our own-door steps not enrolled in any Sunday School.

Our leaders have set as a goal for the entire South a net enrollment gain of 600,000. Breaking this number down to fit our own local situation we suggest to you the following goal for next year: 150 babies for the Cradle Roll, 200 Babies for the Nursery, 200 Beginners, 200 Primaries, 300 Juniors, 350 Intermediates, 400 Young People, 500 Adults, 100 in the Extension Department; making a grand total of 2,400 for our goal. To reach this number each church must have a net gain of 16 2-3 per cent over last year. Surely this is not an impossible task! We have more than 12,000 waiting to be won, about 3,000 of which are already church members. Surely we can win one out of six of this number.

WHAT IT COULD MEAN TO ENROLL 2,400

- 1—Our soul-winning opportunities would be enlarged.
- 2—Our churches would be strengthened.
- 3—Our homes would be fortified.
- 4—Our Mission work would be extended.

WHAT WILL IT TAKE TO WIN 2,400?

1—Concern

It would be easy to win this number, even double this number if all our leaders, our officers and teachers had a deep conviction that people need to be taught the Word of God.

2—Obedience

The obedient worker is a powerful worker.

3—Vision

"Where there is no vision the people perish." Pro. 29:18.

4—Faith

Jesus says in Matthew 17:20 that if we "have faith as a grain of mustard seed" there shall be no impossibilities.

WHAT MUST BE DONE IF WE ARE TO REACH THIS GOAL?

- 1—Several of our church buildings enlarged.
- 2—Some new Sunday Schools organized.
- 3—At least 50 new classes started.
- 4—At least 20 new departments set up.
- 5—A regular program of visitation carried on.
- 6—At least 100 new workers enlisted.
- 7—A better Bible teaching program inaugurated.
- 8—A Vacation Bible School and Revival Meeting in each church.

WILL WE DO IT?

We Will—

If 40 pastors will lead their church in a continuous enlargement program.

If 22 Associational officers will encourage the church to accept the challenge.

If 56 general superintendents and 56 associate general superintendents will organize their Sunday School to accomplish the task.

If 100 department officers will assist worthily.

If 500 teachers will work heroically.

If 1000 class officers and group captains will visit regularly.

IF ALL OF US give our very best to the task it will be done.

WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF ALL THIS?

IT IS ALL FOR EVANGELISM

"Back of the plan for more workers and additional Sunday Schools is the command of Jesus; 'Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature.'

Back of the urge for a program of visitation in every church is the example of our Saviour; 'For the Son of Man is come to seek and to save that which was lost.'

Back of the plan for more Bible study is the declaration: 'These are written, that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through His name.'

Back of the call for Cradle Roll and Nursery departments are the homes without Christ.

So, may all Sunday School work be keyed to evangelism, for evangelism, in its fullest meaning, is the heart, the purpose and the end of all Sunday School work."

THE CHRISTIAN LITERATURE REPORT

When we think of Christian Literature we think of Literature that lead us to higher thinking and better living. If we think on a low plain we live on a low plain. We are constantly striving by Christian Literature to educate the Baptist People as to what the Baptist are doing at home and in the distant lands. One must first have knowledge to conduct himself as he should. Knowledge must precede interest, interest must precede action. If this is true our greatest concern is to place in the hands of our youth such literature that will point them to Christ and Christian Service.

We find in most of our homes the Bible, which should be placed above all other literature. The Biblical Recorder has found it's way into

1692 homes in this Association. There are thirteen (13) Churches with the Every Family Plan. Twenty-four (24) Churches which have the Club Plan which reaches only a few of their homes. There are seventeen (17) Churches that have neither the Every Family Plan or the Club Plan. It is distressing to know that the majority of our Churches reach only a minority of their family with the Biblical Recorder. The Charity and Children, Home Missions, the Commission, Home Life, and other publications are found in our homes.

We are endeavoring today to build for a better tomorrow. This can only be done as we lay well the foundation by encouraging our youth to read good literature. The cheap literature found in our news stands very often finds it's way into the hands of our youth. We should not consider the cost of placing before those that read something worth while. The failure to do this may result in a confused and broken life.

the Work of the Mills Home telling of his visit there. Report adopted.

THE BAPTIST ORPHANAGE REPORT

On a sun-dial in South America are these words: "I record nothing but sunshine." The other day after General Superintendent Zeno Wall, of the Baptist Orphanage, listened for hours as the case workers presented thirty-two cases to fill the vacancies in the Mills Home and the Kennedy Home, made possible by the closing of school, he wrote on one page of his diary these words: "If the sun-dial records nothing but sunshine, we, as the child enters, record nothing but shadows, shadows of sin, of poverty, of disease, of death and of sorrow. Oh, the tragedy of the broken home and the homeless ones!" If one could sit in on one of these conferences he would go away to agonize for and sympathize with the cause of unfortunate children.

CHILDREN IN OUR HOMES

Last year 308 children were cared for in our homes, 83 children in foster homes and 80 children were given Mothers Aid, making a total of 771 children helped directly. The case workers helped with the plans for 749 other children, thus serving 1520 children in one year.

If one could spend some time at either Mills Home or Kennedy Home he would discover that the workers take seriously their work and are giving their best to it.

IMPROVING OUR BUILDINGS

Most of the buildings in both homes are old and need constant repairs. They are now being renovated and having furnace heat installed.

ERECTING NEW BUILDINGS

At Kennedy Home a new cottage to take care of 2 children is to be built this year; also a silo and granary. At both homes frozen food plants are under construction and will be completed within a short time. Space is provided in these buildings for storing canned goods contributed by generous friends.

FOSTER HOMES

While the foster home program is still in its initial stage, it is rendering a timely and worth while service to the 83 children being cared for in these homes which would require more than three new cottages.

THE SPIRIT OF THE INSTITUTION

At 8:40 each morning Dr. Wall calls the office staff into an "Upper Room" where the word of God is read and prayers are uttered for all the workers, all the children and all of the Sunday Schools and churches. There is a spirit of cooperation and unselfishness which is most beautiful. Recently the Mills Home Pastor, John Walton, led 42 children down to the pool and buried all with Christ in baptism.

SUPPORTING THE WORK

The following message comes to us from General Superintendent Wall: We need your prayers; and on one Sunday in each month we know that you will continue to take an offering for us. Our own Sunday Schools observe the first Sunday in each month as Orphanage Day. You will rejoice to know that all our children remain for church, behave beautifully and make their own offerings regularly and cheerfully.

Let's all begin now to plan for a great Thanksgiving offering to back up the regular monthly gifts. As you do your best for us, you may be assured that we will continue to do our best for you and the hundreds of homeless children being housed, fed, clothed, educated and led into the deeper things of the Spirit.

10. A message in Song was given by Rev. L. C. Pinnix of the Kings Mountain Baptist Church: "There Is No Friend Like Jesus." Mrs. L. C. Pinnix accompanied him at the piano.

11. The Doctrinal Sermon was brought by Rev. T. W. Fogleman, Pastor of the Bethlehem Baptist Church. The scripture from Hebrews the Fifth Chapter; the Text: Hebrews 7:25. Theme: "The Competency of the Soul," or "The Right of Each Soul to Come to God Through Christ."

The closing Prayer was offered by Rev. W. A. Ayers.

12. Adjourned for the Noon Meal.

IV. THE AFTERNOON SESSION, OCTOBER 22, 1948

The report was read by W. G. Camp. Motion to Adopt. The Report was discussed by W. G. Camp, W. P. Biggerstaff, Lewis E. Ludlum and E. M. Smith. The report was passed by vote.

REPORT ON WORLD RELIEF

While our bodies are clothed, our homes comfortable, and our tables supplied with good food, millions of our fellow creatures and thousands of our fellow Christians in Europe and Asia, hardly have a sufficient shelter over their heads or enough bread and clothing to supply their needy children.

During the past few years while there has been such a lack of wholesome food, warm clothing and adequate housing, disease and suffering have come to many lands and to many homes. In one European Country, it is estimated that 25 per cent of the population has Tu-

berculosis in some form. If we turn a deaf ear to the cry of these needy millions, how can we claim to be followers of Jesus who had compassion on the multitudes?

We of America, whose land was not devastated by war and whose cities and homes knew no destructive bombs, can not be grateful enough to God nor helpful enough toward our needy brethren in other lands.

Southern Baptists recently sent a special representative to Europe to administer the relief we send there. This is Dr. Jessie D. Franks. He is stationed in Geneva, Switzerland. He knows the needs of Europe and is well qualified to distribute our gifts. Dr. Clovis A. Bradley, is in charge of the Southern Baptist Relief Center, New Orleans, Louisiana—601 South Olympia Street. If you and your church wish to send clothing, bedding or shoes to help relieve these needy peoples, you can write the Southern Relief Center in New Orleans and they will send you Duffie Bags in which to pack this material.

Cash offerings are still needed to buy food, medicine and so forth. Such offerings should be sent to the Treasurer of our Foreign Mission Board—Box 5148, Richmond, Virginia.

7. The Relief and Annuity.

This report was to have been made by A. L. Calton, but instead Mr. C. C. Padgett of Lattimore read the Report. After a Motion to adopt, he spoke to the Report. The report was adopted.

REPORT OF THE RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD

The Relief and Annuity Board is one of the Southwide Boards of our Southern Baptist Convention, located in Dallas, Texas, in the Baptist Building which it owns. At the annual Board meeting on March 10, the following officers to serve for the next year were re-elected: Dr. Wallace Bassett, president; Dr. Walter R. Alexander, Executive Secretary; Dr. R. S. Jones, Associate Secretary; Mr. Orville Groner, Treasurer—in-vestments.

The reports of the Board in reviewing the work of the past year revealed that 1947 was the greatest year in the history of the Board in service rendered, in investment earnings, and in the enlistment of new members of the plans administered by the Board. The total income for the year was over \$3,500,000; total benefits paid out were \$1,183,676.19. The total assets of the Board as of December 31, 1947, amounted to \$12,838,438.22.

The ministry of the Relief and Annuity Board is twofold: providing annuities to be enjoyed upon retirement for those gainfully employed in denominational work, and relief for those who served before there was an Annuity Board and were, therefore, deprived of any annuity at retirement. The relief also serves many of our former pastors who served in country churches and who did not go into the Ministers Retirement

Plan, feeling that they could not afford to pay the dues out of their small salaries, or the benefit which would be derived by paying dues on a small salary would be hardly worth while.

The relief department paid out \$220,956.87 to 1,336 beneficiaries. Many requests for increases from those on the relief roll were received, made necessary by the great increase in the cost of living. We would urge every church in the association to follow the Calendar of Denominational Activities of the Southern Baptist Convention and take a fellowship offering, preferably at the observance of the Lord's Supper or such other times as convenient with the church, for the relief department of the Relief and Annuity Board, that these old preachers may be more worthily cared for.

Every person who is gainfully employed in denominational work, whether pastor, missionary, employee of state or southwide board, institution, or agency, and every lay employee in our Southern Convention, such as educational director, church secretary, janitor, etc., is eligible for enrollment in one of the plans fostered by the Board; thus, with his or her personal dues and the dues of the employing agency, he can be assured of a benefit at retirement.

We would urge the officers of each association to strive, with your state secretary, to enlist all pastors and others serving in religious work to avail themselves of the opportunity of enlisting in one of the plans of the Board, that they may be provided for in old age and not become objects of charity in the communities where they live.
