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

The list begins and could extend indefinitely. So many things — varied and often adversarial — combine to make up the business of life. Yea, even the business of a college, that ivory tower exempt from the tensions with which the rest of the world must contend. (A prominent churchman once told me he envied me; that he, too, would love to step aside into a college position and be able to reflect on the meaning of life.)

The business of life isn't really business at all — it is civilization. Each component makes its offerings to the other, and in concert civilization progresses.

How easy it is to focus so intently on the mechanics of the journey that the ultimate destination is obscured. How easy it is to focus so intently on the destination that the journey itself is overlooked or dismissed as a burdensome chore. Can we conceive of life's destination without reference to the journey?

The weekend when this issue of **The Web** went to press typifies the questions. On Thursday the finishing touches for the 1982-83 budget were added. On Friday, the Board of Trustees and Board of Advisors met. (This is why I had to complete the budget on Thursday; the Board has to approve it!) On Saturday, it's off to Camp Caraway to address 150 high school seniors. On Sunday, I speak at the ordination of a Gardner-Webb alumnus.

And so the question returns, is it the journey or the destination that really matters? My answer is: Yes.

"Lent and Springtime"

in selfishness, greed, envy . . . the list is endless.

Lent reminds us that there is potential for new life. The days do get longer and brighter; beauty bursts forth and a refreshing breeze fills the air. It is an appropriate time to examine our faith in the future and the opportunity to plant good seeds . . . now.

Lent is the season of forty days between Ash Wednesday and Easter. The word means "The lengthening of the days." Lent's meaning for the Christian Church is linked to the fasting of Christ for forty days in the wilderness.

The climax of Lent is the cross. One would think that the season should be burdensome and dreary. It does call for sacrifice and discipline — but more in terms of taking on tasks than in giving up pleasures. The significance of Christ's fasting was not in what he "gave up" but in what he was preparing to give.

Lent prods Christians to a higher level of devotion and generosity. It calls us to review the fundamentals of our faith; to revive the presentation of the Good News that God was in Christ giving new birth to the world. Lent calls us from the rigidities of ritual to the basic qualities of love and faith. It's the time for sacrificing seed in the anticipation of fruit and flowers.

For the Christian, Lent is the vivid reminder of Christ's Atonement. Lost is opposite Lent. Christ described separation from God as being lost. Men become lost

. . . Honor Dr. Bruce Whitaker

At the February 26, 1982, dinner of the Board of Trustees and Board of Advisors Dr. Bruce E. Whitaker was honored for his twenty-five years of service to Christian higher education. Dr. Whitaker, a native of Cleveland County, has been President of Chowan College since 1957.

Dr. Whitaker graduated with the B.A. from Wake Forest University and Ph.D. from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. He received the D.D. from Campbell College. Prior to coming to Chowan, Dr. Whitaker was State Secretary, Student Department of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

He is past president of the Association

of Independent Colleges and Universities and National Council of Independent Junior Colleges. He is presently a member of the Board of Directors of the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges and the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities.

In addition to his service to higher education, Dr. Whitaker is currently serving as a member of the North Carolina Commission for Mental Health and Mental Retardation Services. He is active in the North Carolina Family Life Council, and is a member of the Murfreesboro Baptist Church.

. . . Approve 2 + 2

The Trustees approved a recommendation which will establish the only "Two-Plus-Two" Nursing Program in North Carolina. The special ADN/RN/BSN (Associate Degree in Nursing, Registered Nurse and Bachelor of Science in Nursing) will enable registered nurses to complete requirements for the BSN at either the college's main campus in Boiling Springs or in Statesville, N.C. The Trustee approval takes the college another step closer to the establishment of the Davis School of Nursing.

On Thursday, February 18, a Letter of Intent was signed between officials of the college, officers at the Davis Hospital in Statesville, and the L.C. Wagner Foundation of Statesville. This agreement, when fully approved by the three respective boards, will provide significant annual financial support for the college's School of Nursing. The generous support will enable the college to conduct the full programs simultaneously at both locations. Thus RN's in the Cleveland County area will be able to complete degree requirements in Boiling Springs and RN's in the Iredell County area can pursue the BSN there.

The College will continue to operate its 16 year-old ADN program on the Boiling Springs campus.

Ralph Bentley, M.D., President of the Davis Hospital Medical Staff and a member of the Gardner-Webb Board of Trustees made the recommendation which was unanimously approved. Bernard Parker, Vice President of Nationwide Insurance in Raleigh and Chairman of the Board of Trustees, stated his pleasure that the college would be able to offer this distinctive nurse education to residents in both areas of the state. "We expect this program to directly address the problem created by the nation's nursing shortage," said Parker.

In November, the college received a grant of \$143,060 from the Kate B. Reynolds Health Care Trust of Winston-Salem to launch the program. "This arrangement with the Statesville Institutions will assure generous perpetual support for the program," College President Craven Williams reported to the Trustees.

Under his leadership as president, Chowan College has grown to over 1,000 students with assets of more than \$17 million. The campus master plan, which was begun under his administration and called for the construction of eighteen buildings, has been fulfilled with the recent completion of the Helms Center, a gymnasium-physical education facility.

In his remarks honoring Dr. Whitaker, President Williams referred to Dr. Whitaker as "a quiet, powerful advocate of private higher education, the personification of the ideals of a Christian College, and a

true friend and counselor. Cleveland County and North Carolina can take pride in this public servant," added Williams. "Gardner-Webb College is honored to have this opportunity to express publicly its appreciation for his accomplishments." The two Gardner-Webb College Boards presented Dr. Whitaker a pewter tray in recognition of his service to education.

Dr. Whitaker is married to the former Esther Adams of Conover, who is a professor in the Department of Religion and Philosophy at Chowan College. They have two sons, Barry and Garry Bruce.

. . . Promote Three Faculty Members

Three faculty promotions were approved by the Board of Trustees on February 26, 1982, for Dr. Joyce C. Brown, Dr. Leslie M. Brown, and Dr. Launita E. Proctor.

Dr. Joyce C. Brown has been promoted from Associate Professor of English to Professor of English. Dr. Brown earned the B.S. and M.A. Degrees from Appalachian State University and the Ph.D. Degree from the University of Southern Mississippi. She has done additional study at Appalachian State University.

Dr. Brown came to Gardner-Webb College in 1966 after having taught in Queen Anne's County, Maryland. She was on leave for two and one-half years to complete the doctorate. Dr. Brown is advisor to "Reflections," the college literary magazine.

Dr. Leslie M. Brown, Associate Professor of Biology was promoted to Pro-

fessor of Biology. Dr. Brown earned the B.S. and M.A. Degrees from Appalachian State University and the Ph.D. Degree from the University of Southern Mississippi.

Dr. Brown has taught in the Lenoir City Schools and Queen Anne's County, Maryland. He came to Gardner-Webb College in 1966 and was on leave for two and one-half years to complete the doctorate. Dr. Brown serves as advisor to Alpha Chi Honor Society.

Dr. Launita E. Proctor, was promoted from Associate Professor of Health Education and Physical Education to Professor of Health Education and Physical Education. Dr. Proctor has an A.A. Degree from Kansas City Junior College, B.S. Degree from Oklahoma Baptist University, M.R.E. from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, M.Ed. from Texas Christian University, Ed.S. from Appalachian State University, and Ph.D.

Degree from Vanderbilt University. She has done additional study at the University of Virginia.

Before coming to Gardner-Webb College in 1969, Dr. Proctor taught at North Greenville Junior College, Forest Oak

Junior High and Northside High Schools in Ft. Worth, and Hickory Grove Elementary School in Mission, Kansas. Dr. Proctor has received national recognition for her outstanding work with Special Olympics.

The Heart Association has announced the acceptance of Gardner-Webb College as a Teacher Training Center for Cardiovascular Health Education. Gardner-Webb is the only training center in North Carolina. The national network of centers also includes Florida State University, Auburn University and the University of Georgia.

President Craven E. Williams has named Dr. Robert Blackburn, Chairman of the Health Education and Physical Education Departments as the Instructor-Trainer.

Dr. Blackburn sees the program as an enhancement to the Department of Health Education and Physical Education "by providing current up-to-date materials to promote comprehensive Health Education."

The college training center will specifically serve the North Carolina public schools in training Health Education and Physical Education teachers in the proper implementation of a Heart Health Curriculum. This includes providing facilities and materials for teachers and other groups of people interested in Preventive Health Education. First hand experience will be offered to visitors through this facility in the form of film presentations and printed material. Gardner-Webb will assist by providing in-service training and making materials available for loan. Dr. Blackburn has already confirmed the interests of Cleveland County and Kings Mountain School Systems in the program.

W. James Logan, Executive Director of the American Heart Association, North Carolina Affiliate, Inc. expressed great confidence in the quality of Gardner-Webb's program and the Competence and performance of Dr. Blackburn in Health Education.

Dr. John R. Drayer, Acting Vice President for Academic Affairs says that "Gardner-Webb is appreciative of the assistance which the National Center of the American Heart Association is giving to Health Education in the area of Heart Health. We believe this strengthens what

we are presently doing in this area, and it gives an opportunity to serve the community through Heart Education, which we are most anxious to do."

The North Carolina Affiliate views this plan as an opportunity to properly implement Cardiovascular Health Education in the School Health Education Curriculum through quality trained Health Educators. The Gardner-Webb Training Center will be monitored by the North Carolina Medical and Community Program Committee. Mr. Pat Mitchell, Associate Executive Director will serve as the staff liaison.

The establishment of training centers throughout the United States should better insure the future inclusion of American Heart Association program concepts and materials in public and private schools, grades K-12. The North Carolina Affiliate plays a vital role in the functioning of the program with the National Center funding the materials and the initial training.

The National Center will provide complete sets of audiovisuals and print materials to Gardner-Webb. They will also be responsible for updating materials and assisting in summer workshops. The American Heart Association Component will provide speakers for special seminars and monitor the training center. Gardner-Webb will present American Heart Association philosophy in appropriate health, physical education, and elementary education at the undergraduate level.

College-Owned Newspaper Receives Equipment

"It's taking the clamor and the clatter out of the newsroom," says Dave Robertson, editor of *The Foothills View*. Robertson was referring to the sweep across the country from the regular noisy typewriting and justifying equipment to the

pecking of computer keys throughout newsrooms.

Only recently, the generosity of the *Shelby Daily Star* updated the typesetting equipment at *The Foothills View* office located on the Gardner-Webb campus.

A Compuedit console, with the capabilities of composing, displaying and editing type, was received as a loan from the Star Publishing Company in Shelby.

"To my knowledge, Gardner-Webb College and the University of North Carolina are the only two institutions in the state that offer training on a CRT (Cathode Ray Terminal)," stated Robertson. He noted advantages to Gardner-Webb students in that they will be able to acquire experience on the CRT, which should be an asset when applying for employment at a newspaper. Since this equipment requires not simply a mechanical skill but also an editing skill, the students will gain experience in writing and editing on the CRT. It is definitely a vocational skill," he said.

Robertson, an instructor of journalism, joined Gardner-Webb in June 1981. He instituted the first journalism class in the liberal arts college and became editor of one of only two college-owned community newspapers in the United States, *The University of Missouri* is the other. Journalism students will begin assuming responsible roles in the development of the newspaper as their journalism knowledge broadens.

The journalism class is one of the basic steps encompassed in the development of a communications major at Gardner-Webb College.

Dear Friends at Gardner-Webb,

May 14, 1981 I left U.S.A. by "Varig" international flight to **Brazil** to visit my Southern Baptist Missionary son, Roger W. Cole who is state music promoter for the state of Sao Paulo. That was the 3rd trip across the Atlantic and Mediterranean for that plane since it was made! Leaving Spartanburg on Eastern was my very first plane ride!

I really enjoyed my summer (their winter). I wore winter clothes—heavy coat, etc. . . . but temperature did not get down to freezing, quite — however it did snow south of us — it was shown on T.V.

I certainly did see and experience, **everyday** something all along that was **new** to me. I could talk two lifetimes, I believe and not get it all told! So many things seemed like it was in the south in U.S. (Boiling Springs) **fifty years ago!** Cheap labor, everybody working so hard, poor people everywhere. Of course, there's "filthy" rich living there — from other countries. If you have seen the Commission Magazine — the newest issue **on Brazil**, it has pictured the slums in Brazil. My! Looks exactly like issue on **Brazil**, it has pictured the slums in Brazil. My! Looks exactly like that picture, too. 20% of all children are abandoned there! No place or hospital for windows and big heavy doors, **kept locked**, doorbell at the sidewalk gate. Missionaries pay out of their own pockets for guards to guard their houses while they sleep. From 10 p.m. to 5 a.m. they blow a home-made wooden whistle to let you know they're guarding.

Every woman does needlepoint there. I was at a missions meeting on Saha Negra Mountain (all missions in Brazil met there last year) and celebrated the 100th anniversary of first missionaries who went to Brazil from U.S. (Texas). They are celebrating their first Baptist Church built 100 years ago in October. They've **already** started the celebration and my son Roger W. Cole led the music for 5,000 people! I think that is an honor to Southern Baptist Missionaries that wanted **him** to lead the music for that celebration, don't you? His wife Betty said "**I was proud!**"

They have two children, Lawrence and Liz. Lawrence had 2 years at Clemson and is now a Junior at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama. He studied engineering at Clemson. He's studying religious education for the ministry now at Samford. Liz, his younger sister, is a freshman at Samford.

I didn't mean to write so much — but I can't seem to stop talking about it all!

I'm proud of Gardner-Webb! I'm always boasting about you to others. That's where I obtained inspiration from teachers, friends and relatives that has help-

ed me rear three fine Christian children.

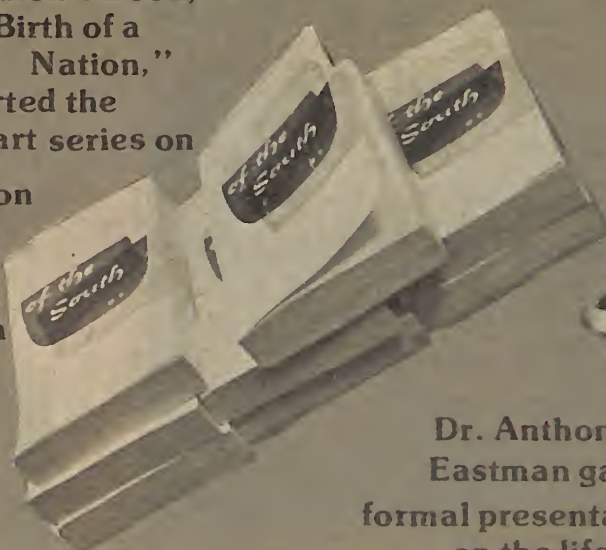

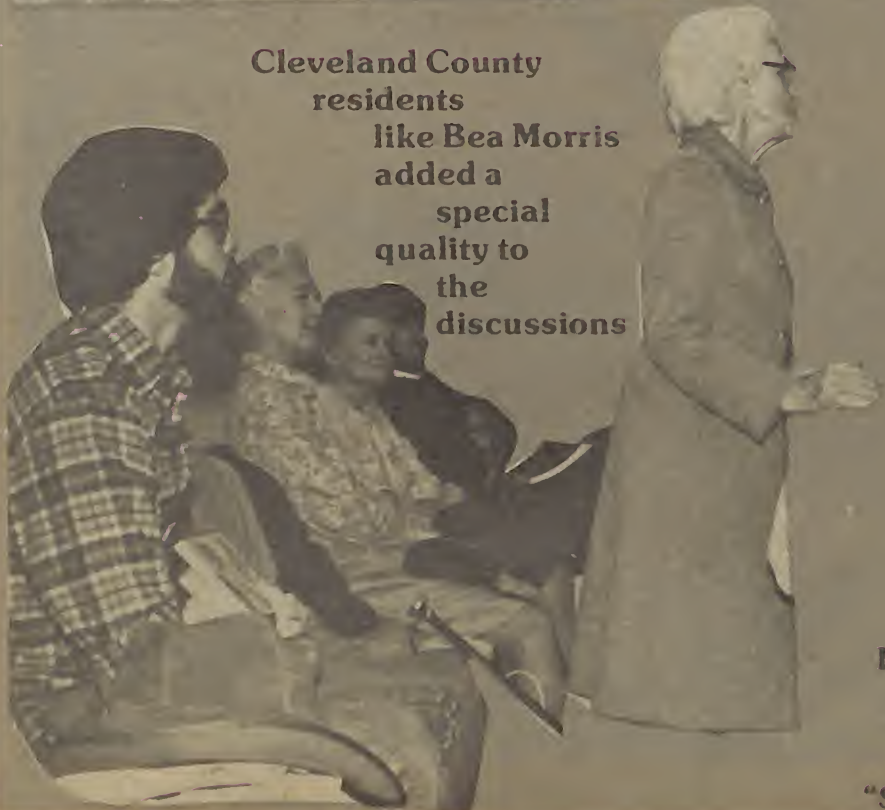

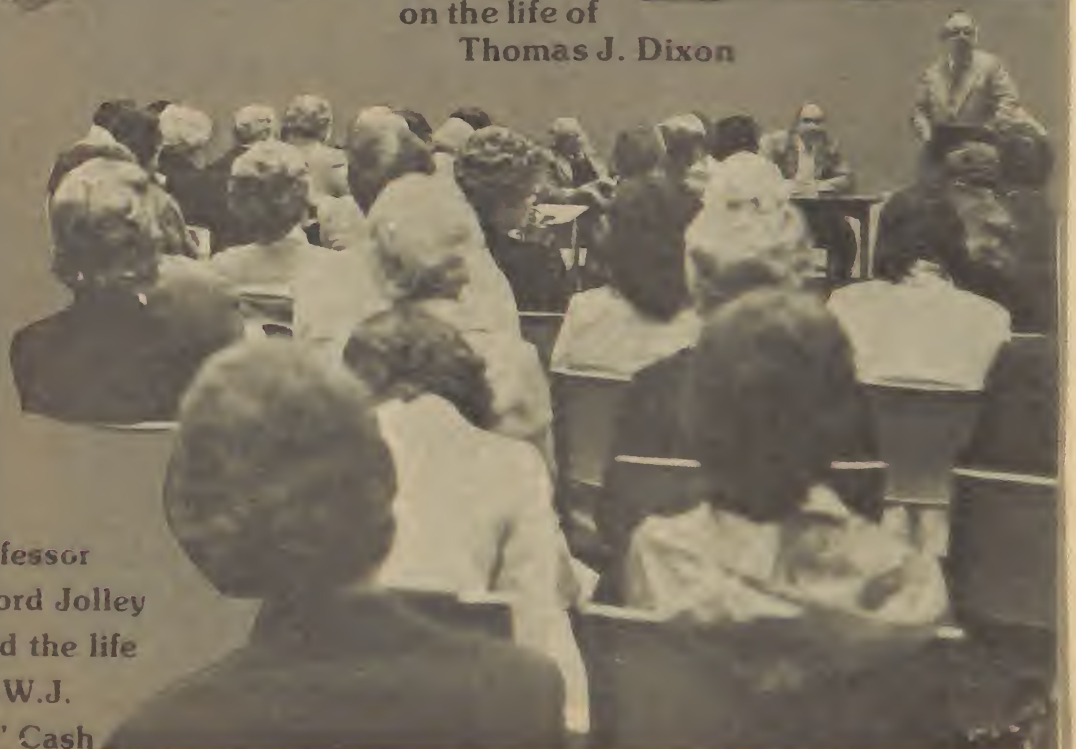

Faculty Members Has Article Published



Stanley R. Smedley, Assistant Professor of Sociology at Gardner-Webb College, has had an article published in the *Educational Administration Quarterly*.

The article consists of a study conduct-

ed by Smedley on "Principals' Pupil Control Behavior and School Robustness."

The main purpose of the study was to examine the relationship between students' perceptions of the behavior of principals and their perceptions of the school's environment.

The sample of principals included 24 secondary and 23 elementary principals selected randomly from schools in Pennsylvania. More than 2900 students completed evaluation forms on their principal.

The study showed that school principals' behaviors toward students do make a difference in how students perceive the environments of their schools. Of course, other factors influence the environment; but there is a reasonably strong statistical relationship between how the principal behaves toward students and the students' perceptions of the school's environment.

The *Educational Administration Quarterly* is published with the sponsorship of the University Council for Educational Administration in cooperation with the University of Rochester.

Smedley is a Business Administration graduate of Wesley Junior College, Dover Del., and Wittenberg University, Springfield, Ohio. He received a M.S. in Sociology from North Carolina State in Raleigh and a Ph.D. in Educational Administration from the Pennsylvania State University in University Park, Pennsylvania.

Smedley was a teaching assistant in leadership at North Carolina State and in administration at Pennsylvania State.

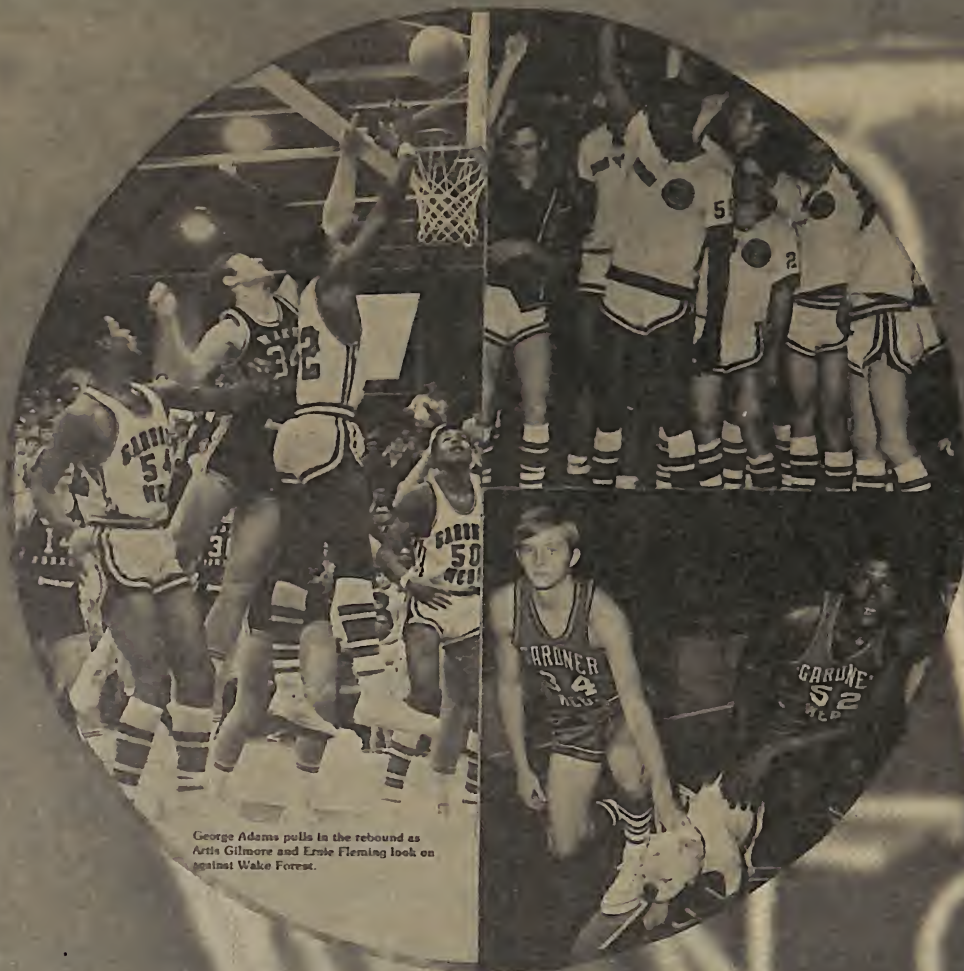

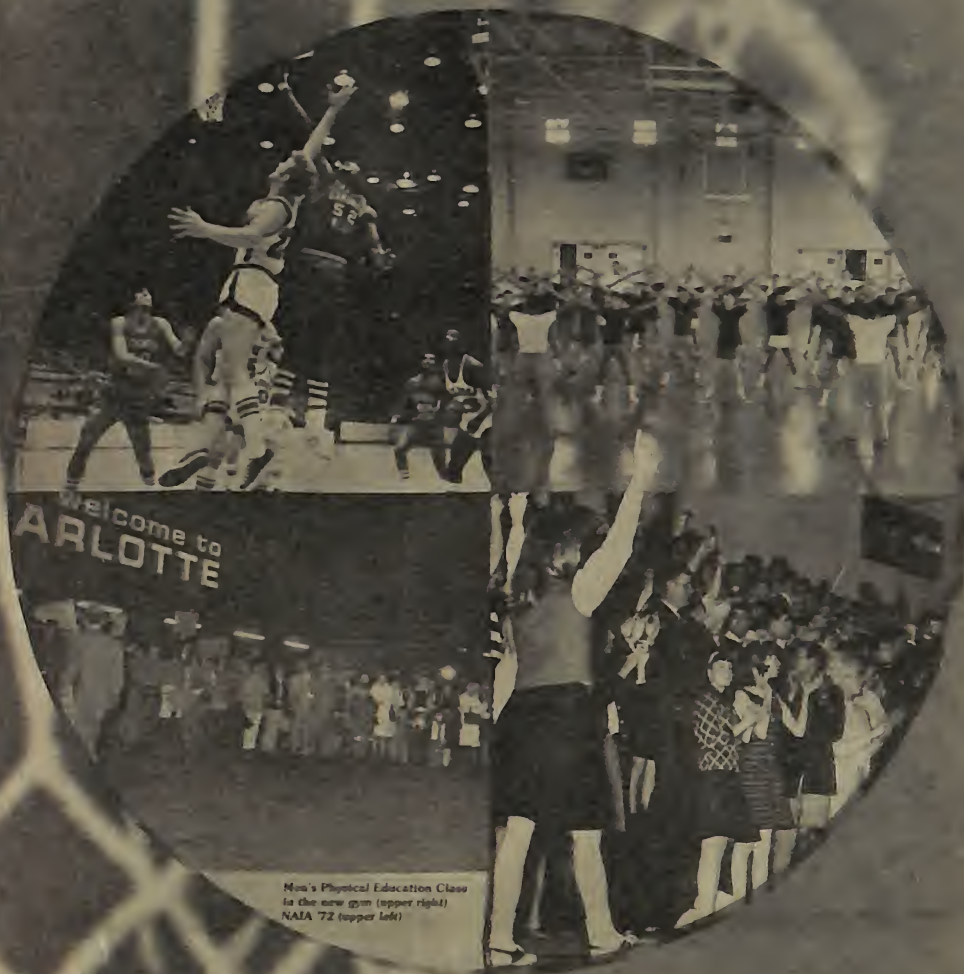
