This copy of the Minutes is dedicated to John W. Suttle -

- As a Preacher of the Word: One who preached fearlessly, and yet in love, the "unsearchable riches of Christ"; one who has inspired about sixty-five "preacher boys" to follow him in the proclamation of the Gospel.
- As a Pastor: In his sixty-five years of active service he has ministered to his flock in times of joy and sorrow, and has exercised uncommon common sense in his counsel. He has preached more than 30,000 sermons, baptized 10,000 converts, and conducted approximately 4,000 funerals and has married 2,000 couples.
- As a Denominational and Civic Servant: Among other contributions in this sphere one could name service as Moderator of this Association for 40 years, as President of the State Convention, on its General Board, and numerous other Committees. He has been in the forefront of all efforts to better the community where he lived, serving in Civic Clubs and other enterprises.
- As a Person: He is a living example of the faith he preached, radiant, outgoing, with a richly developed sense of humor, firm and yet kind, a devoted husband and father, a prince in Israel."



PLEASANT RIDGE BAPTIST CHURCH


Route 3, Shelby N. C.

The Church was constituted in 1915 with a membership of 26 male and 29 females, a total of 55 members. This church was accepted as a member of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association September 24, 1915 in its 65th session at New Hope Baptist Church. The Messengers were Mr. J. B. McSwain and Mr. J. J. Sperling.

The Night Session of the One Hundred-Fifth Annual Meeting was held with the Pleasant Ridge, October 20, 1955. The One Hundred-Tenth Sessions were with the Church October 20-21, 1960.

The Pleasant Ridge Baptist Church congregation lost its building by fire in December 1957. They have worked earnestly, faithfully and sacrificially in constructing a beautiful, spacious and serviceable building on the same site in which the Sessions of the Association were held.

The Pastors that have served the Church since its organization were B. Monroe Bridges, Isaiah D. Harrill, W. G. Camp (two times), Jesse Blalock, Albert R. Hastings and the present pastor, James Stamey.

THE CONSTITUTION

Kings Mountain Baptist Association

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order and rules of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

NAME

ARTICLE 1: The name of the organization shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

MEMBERSHIP

ARTICLE 2: The Association shall be composed of Missionary Baptist Churches of Cleveland County and adjacent territory which are now members, and any other Missionary Bapitst Churches which may hereafter be admitted as herein provided.

ARTICLE 3: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Missions Council and if recommended by this Council and accepted by the Association shall agree to come under the watch care of the Association for a period of one year. At the end of one year upon recommendation of the Mission Council, membership within the Association of such churches shall be confirmed by vote of the Association. During this period such churches shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except holding office and voting.

ARTICLE 4: Each church shall annually elect messengers to the appointed meeting of the Association. Such messengers must be duly certified in the annual church letter to the Association, and appointed on the following ratio: Two messengers, in addition to the pastor, for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty, and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty or major fraction thereof, provided that the total number of messengers shall not exceed ten.

PURPOSE

ARTICLE 5: The purpose of this Association shall be to counsel together for the enlargement and strengthening of God's Kingdom and for the promoting of unity and growth among the churches composing it.

To this end the Association will cooperate with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention and their agencies in the work of Missions, Christian Education, and Social Service.

MEETINGS

ARTICLE 6: The Association shall meet annually on Thursday after the third Sunday in October and continue for two day sessions or longer in the judgment of the Committee on Order of Business, subject to the approval of the Association. The place of meeting shall be determined at the previous session.

OFFICERS

ARTICLE 7: The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, and Historian. These shall be elected annually by the Association at its annual meeting and shall hold office until their successors are elected.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

ARTICLE 8: It shall be the duty of the Moderator:

- (1) In advance of the annual meeting, to communicate with the host churches requesting that they appoint from their church membership a committee on enrollment.
- (2) To open the meetings punctually at the appointed time.
- (3) To appoint a committee on committees in the opening session.
- (4) To enforce the rules; to preserve order; and to exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage.

ARTICLE 9: It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence.

ARTICLE 10: It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and report at the annual session of the Association.

ARTICLE 11: It shall be the duty of the Clerk-Treasurer:

- (1) To keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (2) To superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes.
- (3) To keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.

- (4) To receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed directly to the Association.
- (5) To make an annual report concerning such to the Association.

For his services he shall be paid annually an amount recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Association.

COMMITTEES AND THEIR DUTIES

ARTICLE 12: The committees of the Association shall be divided into four categories, and shall be composed of members from our churches.

SECTION A. Those appointed in advance of the annual meeting:

1. A Committee on Enrollment appointed as prescribed in Article 8, and any others which the Moderator may deem advisable or necessary.

SECTION B. Those named to report at the annual meeting at which they were appointed:

- A Committee on Committees, consisting of five messengers, appointed as prescribed in Article 8. It shall be the duty of this committee to appoint the following committees which shall report at the annual meeting at which appointed.
 - a. Committee on Place and Preacher, consisting of three members, the duty of which shall be to recommend to the Association churches at which the next session shall meet and preachers that will preach at the next session. This committee shall serve from appointment until a new committee is appointed at the ensuing annual association meeting, and, in the event of a church having to rescind its invitation or a preacher's being unable to deliver a designated sermon due to sickness, death, or other providential circumstances, or his removal from a church in the Association, will make provision for such substitution as may be necessary subject to the approval of the General Board.
 - b. A Committee on Resolutions, consisting of three members, the duty of which shall be to draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions of appreciation and expression on sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to by the Association. This committee shall serve from appointment until a new committee is appointed at the ensuing associational meeting.

SECTION C. The Committee on Committees will appoint the following committees which will serve throughout the year and which shall report at the next annual session of the Association.

1. A committee on Order of Business, which shall consist of five

members including the Vice-Moderator who shall be chairman. It shall be the duty of this committee to report a suggested order of business as soon as feasible after the opening of the Association. When adopted, its report shall become the order of the Association and cannot be changed except by majority of the body.

2. A Committee on Nominations, consisting of five members, the duty of which shall be to nominate, with the help of the Nominating Committees of these various organizations, all officers of the Association except those listed in Article 7. Those to be nominated shall include general officers of the following organizations: Baptist Training Union, Sunday School, Brotherhood, Music Organization, and members of the Missions Council.

This Committee shall also nominate an Ordination Advisory Committee, consisting of five members, the duty of which shall be to examine all candidates for ordination who shall be referred to it by churches of the Association. Upon concluding such examination, this Committee shall notify the church requesting the examination as to the results thereof and shall make a full report concerning the same at the next meeting of the General Board.

It shall also nominate the Committee of Evangelism, consisting of five members, the duty of which shall be to devise plans whereby evangelism will be promoted throughout the churches of the Association.

Nominations by this Committee shall not preclude nominations from the floor.

- 3. A Committee of Trustees, consisting of three members, the duty of which shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other securities of said Association.
- 4. An Auditing Committee, consisting of three members, the duty of which shall be to audit the Clerk-Treasurer's books annually and report to the Association.
- 5. The House and Grounds Committee for the Home of the Missionary, consisting of three members, the duties of which shall be to make recommendations concerning the upkeep and repair of the home of the associational missionary to the General Board as such needs may arise, and to put into effect any recommendations concerning such which may be authorized by the General Board.

The Chairman of each of these committees, with the exception of the committee on Order of Business, will be designated by the committee on committees.

SECTION D. An Associational Calendar Committee to be composed of Vice-Moderator, Associational Missionary, Sunday School Superintendent, W. M. U. Superintendent, Brotherhood President, Training Union Director, and Music Director.

SECTION E. When a member of a committee or a general officer of the Baptist Training Union, Sunday School, Brotherhood, Music Education Committee, or the Associational Missions Council moves out of the Association or moves his or her membership from a cooperating missionary Baptist Church of the Association, he thereby relinquishes his committee membership or office, as the case may be. The vancancy thus treated will be filled by the standing Committee on Nominations designated at the previous associational meeting.

THE GENERAL BOARD

ARTICLE 13: At each annual session a General Board shall be appointed by the Association, which shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the Associational Missionary, Superintendent of Sunday School, Director of the Baptist Training Union, President of the Woman's Missionary Union, President of the Brotherhood, President of Gardner-Webb College, members of the Associational Missions Council, the pastor of each church composing the Association, retired ministers residing in and belonging to a church of the Association, and two members from each church, which members shall be nominated by the church and approved by the Association.

ARTICLE 14: This board shall hold meetings quarterly, or when called by Moderator, and shall exercise the functions and discharge the duties usually committed to an executive board or committee. The purpose and plan of this General Board in all its meetings shall be to promote the interest and carry forward the work of the Association and of its constituent churches as this work is outlined in Article 5. The General Board shall act for the Association between sessions except as specifically limited by the constitution.

ARTICLE 15: In case of emergency the General Board may select a time and place and arrange for a special business session of the Association; provided that the business of such extra session shall be limited to the object for which it was convened, and the membership of such special business session shall be made up of the messengers elected by the churches and accredited to the previous regular session.

THE MISSIONS COUNCIL

ARTICLE 16: The Association shall elect annually an Associational Missions Council composed of sixteen members.

ARTICLE 17: Said Council shall meet at least three times annually. The first meeting shall be convened by the Moderator within ten days following the annual associational meeting at which the council was elected. At the first meeting a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Secretary shall be selected and the council shall divide itself into such committees as seem necessary to provide a well rounded and worthy associational mission program and emphasis. It shall have at least the following committees:

- (1) Administration and Finance. This committee shall have general oversight of the work of the associational missionary and shall report to the Association in Annual Session and to the General Board as deemed necessary by the Committee. In case of a vacancy occurring in the office of associational missionary, this committee shall bring recommendations to the General Board as to replacement. This committee shall also make an associational budget to be presented to the Association providing for financing the work for the coming year.
- (2) Missionary Planning. This committee shall survey communities in need of Baptist work and ministry; seek to enlist churches to sponsor work in such communities; give guidance and assistance in proper location and organization of new Baptist work; provide information for and make recommendations to the Association to missionary needs which might be met by cooperative efforts; provide information to the State Mission Board which might be helpful in meeting missionary needs; consult with churches anticipating membership in the Association and make recommendations to the Association in matters of this kind; and to review requests coming from churches for loans and church assistance funds, as to their validity.
- (3) Institutional and Interracial. This committee shall seek to enlist churches to have a worthy part in ministry to folks in our public institutions, and to be of service as friend and brother in Christ to people among us of other races.

RULES OF ORDER

RULE 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

RULE 2: All officers shall complete their work as soon as practicable after the closing of the session. The newly elected officers shall assume, at the close of the session, all duties incumbent upon said officers relating to the work of the ensuing associational year.

RULE 3: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

RULE 4: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject, except by the permission of the Association.

RULE 5: Messengers present from one-third of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

RULE 6: All questions shall be decided by majority vote of the members present except changes in the constitution, which shall require two-thirds vote of those present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association the first day it is in session and voted on the second day.

RULE 7: All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided by general parliamentary laws by Kerfoot.

RULE 8: The term of the office of the moderator shall be limited to two years.

CONFESSIONS OF FAITH

- 1. We believe the Scripture of the Old and New Testament to be a divinely inspired revelation from God.
- 2. We accept the New Testament alone as revealing the only plan of salvation and as the final authority in all matters of church policy and practice.
- 3. We believe Jesus Christ as revealed in the New Testament to be the Son of God and the divine Saviour of all who truly accept Him as such.
- 4. We believe in the personality of the Holy Spirit, and in His abiding presence with the spirit of all the elect of God, in His quickening presence with the spirit of the unregenerate moving to repentance and faith, in His witnessing presence with the spirit of the regenerate, in His comforting and guidance throughout life, in His sustaining presence in the experience of death, and in His continuing presence in the life to come.
- 5. We believe salvation is attained through spiritual regeneration in the act of repentance and acceptance of Jesus as Saviour.
- 6. Sincere spiritual redemption was made available by the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus, we believe that every regenerate person should symbolize his own salvation by being buried with Him in baptism.
- 7. We believe that a local church modeled after the New Testament order is a company of regenerate persons voluntarily joined together for the purpose of extending God's Kingdom on earth.
- 8. We believe that each church should from time to time, as a congregation, celebrate the Lord's Supper as a memorial to Him.
- 9. We believe in the ultimate triumph of God's Kingdom over all opposing powers, and that every regenerate soul shall have a share in that triumph.

1960 — Sessions Of The Association

October 20 - 21

Thursday Morning Sessions

THEME: "And they went forth and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them, and confirming the word with signs following."

- 1. The 110th Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association of Cleveland County was called to order by the Moderator, Oscar Funderburke, at 9:00 o'clock on the morning of October 20, 1960. All Sessions of the Association were held in the spacious new building of the Pleasant Ridge Baptist Church.
- 2. The hymns, "My Faith Looks Up to Thee", "Footsteps of Jesus", and "He Leadeth Me" were sung by the congregation. Mr. Roland Leath, Minister of Education of Shelby First Baptist Church, directed the music. Miss Joyce Porter, Secretary and Organist of Shelby Eastside Church, accompanied at the organ.
- 3. The Moderator had previously instructed the Pleasant Ridge Church to appoint an Enrollment Committee. This Committee was working enrolling the messengers and visitors as they arrived at the church. The committee was composed of the following: Mrs. Grover McClure, Mrs. Shelton McSwain, and Mrs. Bill Green. The following ushers of the church were: J. Z. Walker, Shelton McSwain, Bill Green, Elmer Delozier, Hix Gettys and Hoyt Carrol.
- 4. Scripture and Prayer: Robert Cantwell, the new pastor of Fallston Baptist Church, read a selected passage of scripture from the twelfth chapter of Romans and offered the prayer.
- 5. A call was made by the Moderator for the Association to organize for work. Horace B. Easom, Vice Moderator and Chairman of the Program Committee, presented a printed Order of Business and moved that it become the order of business with any necessary changes that may be needed. The motion was approved. A motion was made that the messengers enrolled, and messengers that would be enrolled constitute the members of the Association for business. W. C. Hill, Chairman of Missionary Planning Committee, moved that the Kings Mountain Baptist Church be accepted into full fellowship of the association. The church was accepted by vote of the Association. Both the Kings Mountain Church and Kings Mountain Piedmont messengers were given the hand of fellowship and seated as co-workers.
- $6.\ A$ visitor, Rev. L. H. Hollingsworth, Chaplain of Wake Forest College was present.
- 7. Our Missionary, C. O. Green, presented the secretary of the Association, Mrs. Betty Boggs Cornwell, who works in the office of the Baptist Center, 1003 Buffalo Street, Shelby, N. C.

- 8. The Pleasant Ridge pastor, James Stamey, gave words of welcome to the Messengers, and visitors. Pastor Stamey announced that the Lattimore group of churches, which are Beaver Dam, Boiling Springs, Double Springs, Flint Hill, Lattimore, Mt. Sinai, Poplar Springs, and Sandy Plains were assisting the Pleasant Ridge Church in entertaining the Association.
- 9. Rev. L. H. Hollingsworth spoke a few minutes concerning Wake Forest College, and the work of the school and students.
- 10. The Moderator appointed the following members as a Committee on Committees: Jack Weaver, Chairman, Mrs. T. W. Estes, Coleman Watkins, A. C. Phipps, and Wilson Padgett.
- 11. The first report, "The Lord Working With Them", through the Cooperative Program, was presented by Aaron C. Phipps, pastor of Buffalo Baptist Church.
- 12. The Report on State Missions was presented by Dennis Larkins, pastor of Ross Grove Church.
- 13. The new pastor of Carpenter's Grove Church, D. Boyd Cannon, brought the Report on the Home Missions Work.
- 14. "The Lord Working With Them", through Foreign Missions was presented by Russell Fitts, pastor of Double Shoals and New Bethel Churches. These reports were accepted and approved by the vote of the Association.
- 15. Hymns, "The Morning Light is Breaking" and "Send the Light," were sung by the congregation as they were standing.
- 16. Horace B. Easom introduced the speaker for the hour, Rev. Harold C. Bennett of Nashville, Tennessee, assistant to Dr. C. C. Warren of the Thirty Thousand Movement. Rev. Bennett is a native of Asheville, North Carolina. His theme "The Thirty Thousand Movement," was the challenge of the hour for missions.
- 17. The report, "The Lord Working With Them", through the Woman's Missionary Union was given by Mrs. Charles D. Forney, Jr., president of the Woman's Work of the Association. This report was approved.
- 18. Fred C. Crisp, pastor of Churchill Drive Church, brought the report on Evangelism. The report was approved by vote of the Association.
- 19. The Clerk of the Association distributed printed copies of the Digest of Church Letters to the Messengers.
- 20. James Stamey announced plans for the noon lunch, stating the meal would be served in individual box lunch style.
- 21. Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Suttle were present in the morning and afternoon sessions. He served as moderator of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association for 40 years, from 1912 until 1952.
 - 22. Jack Weaver, chairman of the Committee on Committees, recom-

mended the following to serve on the Place and Preacher Committee: Dennis M. Larkins, chairman, Mrs. Fred Crisp and Norman Willie; Fred H. Beam, chairman, Marion DuBose, and Stuart Johnson on Committee on Resolutions. The other committees that were named by the Committee on Committees will be found under Associational Directory in front of the Minutes. The recommendation was approved by vote of the Association.

- 23. The following announcements were made: Burley S. Turner, Chairman of the Region Eight Campsite, called for a meeting of the members of the committee at the noon hour. Edd Calhoun, Training Union Leader of the Lattimore group, called for a meeting during the noon hour of the officers of the group.
- 24. Hymn—"Forward Through the Ages" was sung while the congregation was standing.
- 25. The Gardner-Webb College Choir, directed by Mrs. Robert Gidney, sang the following numbers: "Now Let Every Tongue Adore Thee" and "My God and I." Larry Hicks accompanied at the organ.
- 26. The Missionary Sermon was delivered by John Lawrence, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Shelby, North Carolina. He selected and read a portion of II Kings 6:8-11 for the scripture lesson and offered the prayer. Text: II Kings 6:17, "Lord, I Pray thee, open his eyes that he may see." Theme: "Give us a Vision of a Lost World and its Need for the Gospel."
- 27. Prayer for the noon meal was offered by W. C. Hill, pastor of the Shelby Calvary Church.
 - 28. Adjourned for the noon hour.

Thursday Afternoon Session

- 29. An organ prelude was rendered by Miss Joyce Porter.
- 30. Hymns: "To God Be Thy Glory" and "I Love Thee" were sung by the gathering congregation. Horace Easom was the leader, and Miss Joyce Porter was at the organ.
- 31. The scripture, John, chapter 17, was read and prayer was brought by C. E. Oxford, pastor of Oak View Baptist Church.
- 32. W. V. Tarlton, chairman of a committee appointed by the General Board to study the Constitution of the Association, presented copies of suggested changes. The report was received for consideration and was to be discussed and approved or rejected on Friday. The addition was that the General Board hold meetings quarterly instead of monthly, or when called by the moderator. These suggested changes will be found incorporated in the constitution.
- 33. The Historian's Report was brought by Dr. Wyan Washburn of Boiling Springs. The report with its recommendations were approved by the vote of the Association.

- 34. The Christian Education Report was presented and read by John E. Lawrence. This report was approved.
- 35. The Gardner-Webb College Choir sang, "All Hail The Power of Jesus Name" and "Lo! A Voice To Heaven Sounding."
- 36. Dr. Phil L. Elliott, president of Gardner-Webb College, gave a report of the work of the college for this year and its needs for the future.
- 37. Hymn, "Praise Him! Praise Him!" was sung. Allen Jolley of Calvary Church was the leader.
- 38 The Moderator asked W. V. Tarlton to introduce the next speaker on the program. He presented to the Association his brother, Mr. J. J. Tarlton of Rutherford County, who is a public school official. He spoke of the need for the Advanced Program for our Christian Colleges to expand within the next six years.
- 39. The report on Sunday Schools was given by A. V. Nolan, the retiring Sunday School Superintendent of the Association.
- 40. James Hutson, new pastor of Pleasant Hill Church, read the Baptist Training Union report for Mike Lowery, who was absent from the meeting. The report on Sunday Schools and Baptist Training Union work were approved.
- 41. Hymn, "Rise Up, O Men of God," was sung. Norman Willie of Second Baptist Church of Shelby led the singing.
 - 42. The report on Brotherhood work was given by Edward Willis.
- 43. Allen Jolley, Royal Ambassador leader, brought the report for the year.
- 44. Dr. Zeno Wall, Children's Home Representative of the Association, presented a report. These three reports were approved.
- 45. The editor of the "Charity and Children" and a resident of Mills Home, Thomasville, N. C. and a native of Cleveland County, John E. Roberts, spoke of the work of the Children's Home.
- 46. Dr. Zeno Wall led the closing prayer and the meeting was adjourned until Friday morning at 9:00 a.m. at the same place.

Friday Morning Session

- 47. On this bright, clear, and cool morning the Association was called to order by Oscar Funderburke, the Moderator of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.
- 48. Hymns: "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross", "Majestic Sweetness Sits Enthroned" and "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing," were sung by the assembled messengers. Roland Leath directed the songs, and Miss Joyce Porter accompanied at the organ.

- 49. Thomas D. Taylor, pastor of Plan View Baptist Church, read the 116th Psalm and offered the morning prayer.
- 50. For the first time in the history of the Association, a Report of Juvenile Rehabilitation was presented. The Director of Juvenile Rehabilitation, Dr. A. B. Wood, brought the Report. This Report was adopted by vote of the Association.
- 51. Hugh Harrill, pastor of Sandy Plains Church, presented the report on Christian Literature. He yielded his time for the report to a visitor, Ben Fisher, from the Southeastern Seminary, Wake Forest, N. C., and a member of the Board of Directors of the Biblical Recorder, who spoke of the report.
- 52. Walter Davis, Association Representative for the Homes for the Aging, gave a report. It was approved. The new Superintendent of the Homes for the Aging, Albemarle, N. C., Rev. Charlie P. Burchette, Jr., brought reports from the three North Carolina Homes.
 - 52, Hymn: "Alas and Did My Saviour Bleed."
- 54. Two members of the Resolutions Committee, Fred H. Beam and Marion Dubose, were absent. The Nominating Committee recommended the following to replace them: B. L. Raines and Norman Brown. It was so ordered.
- 55. W. V. Tarlton, Chairman of Constitution Revision Committee, presented for the second time the changes suggested, refer to page 105. The recommendations were approved by vote of the Association.
- 56. In the change of the meeting of the General Board from monthly to quarterly meetings, C. O. Greene moved that the General Board meet November 17, 1960. This motion was approved by vote.
- 57. Mrs. Theda Branton, member of Ross Grove Church and J. W. Suttle, Moderator Emeritus, were recognized. They were both in their 88 years. C. C. Crow, former Moderator of the Kings Mountain Association and now Moderator of the Sandy Run Association, was recognized. Mrs. Joe Stamey of the South Fork Association, mother of James Stamey, pastor of Pleasant Ridge, the host church, was present.
- 58. A report on our Baptist Hospital was given by C. Rush Hamrick, Sr. Rev. Albert L. Meibury of the North Carolina Baptist Hospital spoke of the work being done by the hospital. The report was approved.
- 59. Frittz Hemphill, president of the Fruitland Preachers School near Hendersonville, N. C., spoke of the work being done by the school.
 - 60. Hymn: "More Love to Thee."
- 61. The report of the General Board of the Association was read by Lawrence Roberts, Clerk of the Association and of the General Board. The report was approved with its recommendations. They were as follows: A budget for the Associational year October 1, 1960 to September 30,

1961 and a suggested amount of one dollar per church member from the church.

- 62. The Treasurer of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association, Lawrence Roberts, presented printed copies of his report on receipts from the churches and disbursement of funds received. The Report of the Auditing Committee was also in these printed copies of the report.
- 63. James Stamey, the pastor of the Pleasant Ridge Baptist Church, announced the plans for the noon meal. Yesterday the church served between 650-700 box lunches, and there were around 375 present on Friday to be served. The box lunches were prepared by the nine churches of the Lattimore Group.
- 64. The Committee on Place and Preachers presented its report: that the place for the Sessions of the 111th Annual Meeting of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association was to be Zoar Church, South of Shelby, N. C., and the Shelby Group of Churches to assist the host church. The preachers named Rev. J. A. Bracey, Missionary Sermon; Rev. T. Max Linnens, Doctrinal Sermon; and Rev. B. L. Raines, Inspirational Sermon. The members of the Place and Preachers Committee were Rev. Dennis M. Larkins, Mrs. Fred Crisp and Mr. Norman Willie. The Report of the Committee was accepted and approved by the Association.
- 65. Special Music was given at this time by Mr. Woodrow Funderburke, son of Rev. and Mrs. Oscar Funderburke. He sang "How Great Thou Art."
- 66. The Rev. T. Max Linnens was to have preached the Doctrinal Sermon at this hour, but he was not able to attend the Association because of ill health. One of his members, the Rev. J. T. Gillespie, who is also a teacher at the College, brought the Doctrinal Message. The scripture was from Revelation 12th chapter and other selections from the following chapters. The message discussed and proclaimed was "The Doctrine of the Devil," "The Devil's Plan for the Ages," "The Lord's Plan for the Ages," and "Our Part with the Lord in his Plan."
- 67. The prayer and thanks for the noon meal was offered by J. T. Gillespie.
 - 68. The Session was adjourned for lunch.

Friday Afternoon Session

- 69. An organ prelude was rendered by Miss Joyce Porter.
- 70. Hymn: "My Jesus I Love Thee" was sung. Allen Jolley was director and Miss Porter was at the organ.
- 71. Rev. J. W. Suttle spoke of the experiences of his life's work in the ministry. He requested the congregation to sing "On Jordan Stormy Banks, I Stand." He asked, "Will you please emphasize, 'I am bound for the Promise Land; O who will come and go with me?'" The song was sung by the congregation.

- 72. Scripture and Prayer: Rev. Fred Hicks was absent from the meeting. The moderator asked that Jack D. Weaver lead in the Devotional. He read in the Responsive Reading, "The Holy Spirit," John 14: 16-18, 26: 16: 7-14. Rev. C. C. Crow offered the prayer.
- 73. The report, "The Lord Working with Them," through Associational Missions was read by C. O. Greene due to the absence of T. Max Linnens.
- 74. C. O. Greene, Associational Missionary, gave report of his work for the year. These reports were approved by the Association.
 - 75. Hymn: "I Am Thine, O Lord," was sung.
- 76. Rev. Wilson Padgett, pastor of Shelby Eastside Church, brought the report on Public Morals and Civic Righteousness.
- 77. The report on Minister's Annuity and Security Plans was brought by Rev. Bryan Putnam, pastor of Union Baptist Church. These reports were approved.
- 78. The reports on Radio, Visual Aid and Beautification were read by the Clerk since Mr. D. W. Kiser and Hackett Wilson were absent. The reports were approved.
- 79. The Nominating Committee, James E. Holder, Chairman, presented the nominations for committees and officers for different departments of Associational Work. These nominations were approved by vote of the assembly. This list is recorded in the Associational Directory in the front of the minutes.
- 80. The Resolution's Committee Report was presented by Norman Brown and was approved.
- 81. The General Board members listed in the church letter reports and other reports were approved.
- 82. The Association elected the following as officers of the Association to serve for the year: Mr. Horace B. Easom, Moderator; Rev. E. M. Smith, Vice Moderator; Lawrence Roberts, Clerk Treasurer; and Dr. Wyan Washburn, Historian.
- 83. The retiring Moderator, Oscar Funderburke, presented the gavel to the incoming Moderator, Horace B. Easom. Mr. Easom said in his acceptance of the leadership of the Association, "Pray that we may know the will of the Father and how to do it."
- 84. Mrs. E. G. Spurling, member of the Fallston Church, led in the Memorial Service honoring our dead. Hymn, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," was sung as the congregation stood. She offered the prayer of thanksgiving for their lives.
- 85. The Inspirational Message was brought by Jack D. Weaver, pastor of the Kings Mountain Temple Baptist Church. The theme of his message was "For We Are Laborers Together with God."

- 86. A motion was made and seconded that the minutes of 1960 be dedicated to the Rev. J. W. Suttle. The motion was approved.
- 87. The Sessions of the one hundred-tenth Associational meeting was adjourned at Pleasant Ridge Baptist Church to meet with the Zoar Baptist Church and the Shelby Group for the one-hundred eleventh session on October 19 and 20, 1961.
 - 88. The closing prayer was offered by Jack D. Weaver.

"THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM"

The Cooperative Program is a plan through which every Baptist church in the Southern Baptist Convention and every individual who is a member of one of these Baptist Churches may support the world ministry committed unto them by the Lord Jesus in the Great Commission. "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." Matthew 28: 19-20.

Some one has suggested that, "The Cooperative Program is the love of God in action; the hands of Christ at work." Churches as well as individuals that participate in the Cooperative Program may enjoy the thrilling experience of preaching the Gospel to the lost multitudes in forty-four different countries where our 1,454 Missionaries are serving. At the same time have the experience of sharing in the ministry of our various institutions at home and abroad as they minister to the body, the mind and the soul. This is the only program known whereby an individual or a local church may perform such a tremendous task.

Southern Baptists have discovered through years of experience, that the Cooperative Program provides the most practical way of meeting all needs with the least effort and the lowest cost to produce the greatest results.

The Minutes of the Kings Mountain Association reveal that each year the gifts to World Missions through the Cooperative Program have increased. However, the increase has fallen short of the two percent of the offering plate dollar as suggested by our Baptist Leaders. Another revelation of the minutes is that a number of our churches each year do not give any amount through the Cooperative Program. For example, in 1958 the churches of this Association gave \$118,082.00 but there were four churches which did not take part. In 1959 the gifts increased to \$144,779.00 and seven of the churches did not participate in the giving.

Through June 30, 1960, or the first half of this year the gifts were \$78,-183.44 which suggest an increase but there were fourteen of the churches which had not shared in the giving.

Surely the love of God constrains us and world conditions challenges us as pastors and church leaders to work toward the goal of planning and adopting an adequate budget in each of our churches. In this budget we will want to place a definite percent to be given through the Cooperative Program for World Missions. With prayer and dedication we can have one hundred percent of the churches in the Kings Mountain Association supporting the lifeline of World Missions, the Cooperative Program.

STATE MISSIONS

State Missions is the missionary effort on the part of N. C. Baptists to reach the unsaved for Christ and to teach, enlist, and train the saved in giving, living and serving through the churches and throughout the world. There are 4,600,000 people in the state. About 2,100,000 of these above the age of eight are affiliated with some kind of church. 2,000,000 above the age of eight are unchurched. We have about 900,000 Baptist church members in North Carolina. Perhaps 40 percent of these are enlisted and are being taught and trained in Christian giving, living and serving. This means that 60 percent of our church constituency is not dedicated in the Christian profession. In this undeveloped area the churches have their primary challenge. The above interpretation of the purpose and challenge of State Missions demand a varied program of mission activity.

Our people need to be trained and taught. Therefore, five of the most important phases of our State Mission work are promoted through the Sunday School, Training Union, Church Development and Music Departments, and Brotherhood.

Over 60 percent of the people in North Carolina are lost and need the Saviour. State Missions provide a Division of Evangelism. We face a tremendous challenge in evangelism.

A growing population demands new and stronger churches. State Missions provide a necessary and important ministry through aid on some church buildings and the purchase of sites for new churches. North Carolina is a coming state. By 1980 our total population is expected to reach 6,300,000. Dr. Douglas M. Branch says we need 600 new Baptist Churches now.

A more highly developed and intelligent congregation demands a better trained pastor. Pastor's Schools are provided through State Missions to meet this growing demand. Many pastors are receiving better

training at Fruitland. Refresher courses are offered from time to time at Mars Hill for the benefit of all pastors.

The Colored Races in our midst constitute a large percentage of our population. State Missions seek to minister in a limited degree to the Negroes and Indians. We should do more, not because the Catholics are winning them, but because we should. Ours is the major denomination in North Carolina, and, therefore, they are largely our responsibility. The program of interracial cooperation is a program of cooperation of the Baptist State Convention, The General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, (1,700 Negro Baptist Churches, with a membership of 325,000) and the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Department of Church Architecture works in cooperation with The Department of Church Architecture of the Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn. Last year these departments served 1,025 churches in North Carolina through counsel and guidance in planning for beautiful and adequate church and educational buildings.

Our Church and Denominational Leaders of tomorrow need to be taught and trained in cooperation and loyalty now. State Missions promote a Baptist Student Program among the 24,000 sons and daughters from our Baptist Homes who are attending 58 Colleges and Universities and 80 Professional Schools. These young men and women constitute a great potential leadership for all areas of tomorrow's world.

Other areas of need constantly challenge the resources of State Missions, namely: The Christian Action League, P. O. A. U., The Silent People, Summer Student Work, Student Aid, Ministry through Correctional Institutions.

What are the sources of support whereby State Missions can function effectively and fruitfully in all these phases of work? Here they are:

Will you as an individual and your Church and Sunday School do your best so that the first part of the Great Commission might be obeyed and that these rich ministries might be continued to the extent that next year North Carolina and the world might have many more Christians and be more Christian? Dr. A. V. Washburn in his recent book Outreach for the Unreached says, "The light that burns the brightest at home shines the farthest."

HOME MISSIONS

Southern Baptists support a missionary force of more than 2,000 on home mission fields according to Courts Redford, Atlanta, executive secretary of the Home Mission Board. In addition there were 470 student summer missionaries. These missionaries reported 44,649 professions of faith in 1959.

The Annie Armstrong Offering and the Cooperative Program provided \$4,151,389.58 for home mission work during 1959.

A major emphasis of home mission work, which is active in all states, has been seven programs outlined by Redford as: evangelism, church loans, chaplaincy, pioneer and associational missions, city missions, National Baptist, and language group missions.

At the end of 1959, 74 city mission programs were in operation. Seattle, Wash., became the fourth major city to be included in Southern Baptists' "Big Cities" program with the appropriation of \$100,000.00 for church sites.

The 30,000 Movement is progressing toward the 1964 goal. More than 10,000 new churches and missions had been started by May 1960. 1959 was a year of evangelism. Southern Baptists alone baptized 430,000 and reported $1\frac{1}{2}$ million church members signing soul-winning commitment cards and a record-breaking number taking soul-winning study courses. The Division of Evangelism will give increased emphasis on personal soul-winning and Christian growth.

Let us continue our out-reach by the great arm of Home Missions.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

For the calendar year of 1959 the Foreign Mission Board received from all sources of Southern Baptist States a total of \$15,985,116. Of this amount, nearly 7,000,000 came from the Lottie Moon Offering.

The Foregin Mission Board continues to define its work from the Great Commission. From this concept, the primary work of the Foreign Mission Board is the sending of missionaries to foreign lands.

An Advance Program was started in 1948 when there were 625 missionaries under appointment. At the close of 1959, there were 1,381 serving in 44 countries. The goal of the mission board is to have 2,000 serving by the close of 1964.

The program of work the missionaries engage in is as follows:

- 1. Evangelism and church development.
- Schools, including kindergartens through senior colleges and theological seminaries. There are 1,002 schools with 151,276 students.

- 3. Medical work, including hospitals, clinics, and dispensaries ministering to more than 260,000 patients each year.
- 4. Publication work in which more than 14,000,000 pieces of printed materials are annually made available in many languages.

Under these divisions are many subdivisions and varieties of work. The concept of the Foreign Mission Board being that everything that is needed in the work here is needed in the work there.

The Board has projected for this current year a program that will slightly exceed \$20,000,000 dollars. There is no knowledge of where \$3,000,-000 of this amount will come from. One can well suppose that many prayers are going up around our world right now for the Lottie Moon Offering this year. Then, of course, the major source of income is from the Cooperative Program. A world-wide ministry is a tremendous thing. The figures already cited in this report can seem great or small according to our vision of the world. This is the supreme task of the church.

The Iron Curtain, International tension, and unconcern on the part of many christians make this world-wide task difficult. Our missionaries work with their lives dedicated to the faith that all men must have opportunity to hear the good news of God.

May we then offer this summation to the report. Foreign Missions is:

- 1. Living the christian life. This is the basis of foreign missions for any christian society. The church in this nation that becomes thoroughly dedicated to God will be heard about around our world. When a group of christians live the christian life to please Jesus Christ, the word will spread behind the Iron Curtain.
- 2. Foreign Missions is education. We must know before our hearts ache to spread the glad tidings.
- 3. Foreign Missions is giving. The cost in money is much.
- 4. Foreign Missions is praying. This is constantly the first request of missionaries. Please ask the people to pray for us.

BY-LAWS FOR ASSOCIATIONAL WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object shall be to promote Christian missions through the organizations of Woman's Missionary Union in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE III

RELATIONSHIPS

- Section 1. Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to Kings Mountain Baptist Association, shall be the liaison organization between church organizations and the N. C. Woman's Missionary Union.
- Section 2. This associational Union shall recognize the autonomy of church organizations as provided in the Baptist democratic process of operation.
- Section 3. Church organizations shall be recognized as units through which the object of this Woman's Missionary Union is accomplished, each responsible for its own program, and contributing to the work of the association.

Section 4. This associational Union shall be guided in its plan of work by the associational Aims for Advancement.

ARTICLE IV

MEMBERS

The members of Woman's Missionary Union organizations in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association shall constitute the membership.

ARTICLE V

OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, YWA Director, GA Director, Sunbeam Band Director, and others as needed. These officers shall be elected annually in a meeting of the associational WMU and shall hold office for one year or until their successors are elected. The tenure of office shall be 5 conescutive years.

Section 2. These officers shall perform the duties set out for them in these By-Laws and the leaflet, "The Associational WMU."

ARTICLE VI

NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

Section 1. The nominating committee composed of 5 women shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee, and elected by the associational WMU to serve for one year.

Section 2. The nominating committee shall nominate officers and promotional directors. Other nominations may be made from the floor.

Section 3. The nominating committee, in event of a vacancy, shall present a nominee for the unexpired term for election by the associational WMU (or by the Executive Committee).

ARTICLE VII

MEETINGS

Section 1. Day and/or night Associational WMU meetings (including business women) shall be held annually. Date to be set by State WMU office.

Section 2. Other meetings shall be held as authorized by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VIII

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

- Section 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the officers, promotional directors and any others desired.
- Section 2. The Executive Committee shall schedule the regular meetings of the organizations, plan the program of activities, hear reports and check progress on the Aims for Advancement.
- Section 3. Regular meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held quarterly.

ARTICLE IX

PROMOTIONAL DIRECTORS

- Section 1. There shall be directors of mission study, prayer, community missions, stewardship, and others as needed.
- Section 2. These directors shall furnish information for corresponding local chairmen, hold conferences, and carry out other plans as authorized by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE X

COMMITTEES

- Section 1. There shall be committees standing or special as needed.
- Section 2. Committees, except those otherwise provided for, shall be appointed by the president.
- Section 3. The president shall be ex-officio member of all committees except the nominating committee.
- Section 4. The duties of these committees are such as are set forth in these By-Laws and the leaflet, "The Associational WMU."

ARTICLE XI

FINANCES

Section 1. The associational WMU shall adopt an annual budget, funds to be provided by WMU organizations in the Association.

Section 2. These funds will be on a 25 cents per member basis, and are to be sent to the Associational Treasurer within two months following the Annual Associational meeting.

ARTICLE XII

PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained in Robert's RULES OF ORDER, REVISED or the Parliamentary section in the WMU Year Book shall govern the Union in all cases to which they are applicable.

ARTICLE XIII

AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the associational WMU provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Our emphasis for the past year has been Leadership Training. We have had many worthwhile opportunities through state promoted workshops, camps, and Associational meetings. Jesus demonstrated the necessity of training leaders. When He began gathering together his disciples, He chose very ordinary and untrained men. His only requirement was that they be willing. There has been much talk about natural-born leaders, but for the most part, people are not born leaders. we study the Master's method, it becomes evident that leadership must be developed. His followers were ordinary men with an extraordinary dedication, average men with above average faith, common men with uncommon devotion. Under Jesus' guidance their abilities and energies were trained and directed into channels of leadership. The basic idea in leadership is guidance. Steering the energy and ability of a group into channels of activity which accomplish group purpose. For Woman's Missionary Society this purpose is the promotion of Christian Missions.

The W. M. S. Leadership program is designed for every member. There is a place for every person to serve using every talent and ability. We must not lose sight of the motivating force in our organization—Missions, and God's promise to help those who engage in His service. Responsibilities vary among officers and committees but every person who serves in any way should give her best. This year for the first time a Leadership course is offered. It may be taken either in class or by individual study. Upon completion of this course, a Leadership card is given and may be renewed each year by taking a refresher course. The

number of cards in our Association grew from 17 to 110. An excellent beginning! But with our 4,164 members there is still a great challenge.

Also, we have a new Woman's Missionary Society Manual, the first to be published by W. M. U. It explains the organizational framework and the program of work carried on by our organization. The use of it will contribute much to an already effective program of work.

This year marks the 75th anniversary of the Sunbeam Band. Four Associational officers attended a workshop at First Baptist Church, High Point. As a result of information gleaned here, an Associational Sunbeam Day Camp was held at Sandy Plains Church in June. There were 65 in attendance. At the Annual Leadership Conference, there were three workshops for Sunbeam Band Leaders. Let us continue, not only through this Anniversary year, but throughout future years to promote work in our youngest group of young people. Remembering always, "As the twig is bent so grows the tree."

In July, the second Girl's Auxiliary Camp was held at Gardner-Webb College. 187 girls attended. Miss Faye Tunmire, Missionary to the Philippines, was with us for the entire week.

The various Societies responded well to the Special Weeks of Prayer and Offerings. The Lottie Moon Offering was \$20,077.61. Annie Armstrong \$5,912.55. Heck-Jones \$2,143.94. As women learn more about the many needs the joy of giving increases.

Emphasis for the coming year will be on sharing possessions. As we move forward into a new year, we covet your prayers and efforts that we may experience a truly great year in Mission advance.

EVANGELISM

"The Lord Working With Them"-Through Evangelism

In this report I do not wish to talk to you about our gains and losses for last year, which can be found in the tables near the end of our associational minutes, nor do I choose to talk with you about how often our baptistries have been wet. But I would rather talk with you about one side of evangelism which we hardly recognize as evangelism: The Lordship of Christ. The Apostle Paul put it another way in Philippians 1:21, "For me to live is Christ."

Evangelism has been talked about a great deal. Many books have been written concerning evangelism, but I like a short dictionary definition which is, "an earnest effort to spread the gospel of Christ." This being true, our task is a great one, not only in getting people to accept Christ as Saviour, but also in getting people to accept Him as Lord over their lives and walking with Him daily. This is Evangelism.

We are told that there are over 2,000,000 lost people in North Carolina, so you see, ours is a tremendous task to witness to the saving power of God in Christ Jesus. Even with this huge number of lost people in our own state I believe, especially in our own association, our larger task is to witness to the Lordship of Christ. This Is Evangelism.

To be sure there is a great need for salvation, but salvation covers all of the Christian life not just the beginning of it. What is salvation? Basically it is health. The words "holiness" and "health" in English come from a common root. The Greek word translated "to save" has as its primary meaning "to make well, heal, restore to health." Men have called Jesus not only "Saviour," but also "The Great Physician." Salvation in its fullest sense means physical, mental, moral, spiritual health. As we take a good look at our sick world, both in and outside our churches, can we not agree that this is our greatest field of evangelism?

The task is so great that the only way we will come anywhere near getting it done is to spend some time, a great deal of time, in getting

those already in our churches to accept the Lordship of Christ. It is serious business to take Him, and serious business to refuse. I do not see Him as a hard and arbitrary Judge. But I see Him as the leader of humanity in its march toward the fullness of the Kingdom of God, standing here with His arms stretched out to us saying, "I need you . . . and you . . . and you . . . and you I have laid my hand on you and called you for a follower and a soldier and a friend. I want your whole life, every bit of it, for the Kingdom. Will you come?"

When Jesus says "Come" it is a personal invitation and calls for decision and an answer. When Jesus says "Follow me" our answer must be obedience or disloyalty. When Jesus says "Go" it is a personal directive to go in His name to point the way. This Is Evangelism. Will you go? God help us all to be evangelists and to say along with the Psalmist: "I have not hid thy righteousness within my heart: I have declared thy faithfulness and thy salvation: I have not concealed thy loving-kindness and thy truth from the great congregation." Ps. 40:10.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

If I were a banker I could talk about History. Yesterday is a cancelled check; tomorrow is a promissory note; today is cash for us to spend as we please.

We are spending today. We are making history, but we are not keeping too good a record of it. Less than 10 percent of our churches have active historians. The Clerks write down the data, but not the history.

Therefore, I have some recommendations for this great old Association. They will cost a little money, if you approve them, but I am convinced that, if they are carried out, they will be worth much more than we spend. I recommend:

First, that the Moderator, upon nomination or recommendation from the General Board, appoint a Historical Commission for the Association, this commission to consist of no less than four or more than seven persons, and whose duty it shall be to work and counsel with the Historian in performing the duties of his office.

Second, that the Association microfilm the first 110 years of its records, including minutes and such copies of programs or other official records as may be available.

Third, that the Historian and Historical Commission be authorized and empowered to establish a Museum or Repository for the preservation of valuable books, papers, photographs, memorabilia, and relics, which, though they may not be official records, will have lasting educational and spiritual value for generations to come.

Fourth, that the Historian and Historical Commission be authorized and instructed to make a preliminary study of the need for a full, complete and comprehensive history of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association; then study the possibilities, problems and ways and means of writing such a history, and report on this study at the next annual meeting of this body.

Fifth, that the Association appropriate and authorize the expenditure of a sum not to exceed \$500 for the current fiscal year to begin the above mentioned projects, with the understanding that microfilming the records have priority.

4. The Carpenter's Grove Baptist Church called D. Boyd Cannon as pastor and he came on April 1, 1960.

The Propst family had two cement walkways made in memory of their late parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas C. Propst.

- 5. The Rev. C. O. Greene resigned as pastor of the New Bethel and Double Shoals Baptist Churches in November 1960. These churches calld the Reverend J. Russell Fitts as pastor in February 1960. He came March 15, 1960.
- 6. The Rev. and Mrs. Robert Cantwell came to serve the Fallston Baptist Church February 1960.
- 7. The Eastside Baptist Church of Kings Mountain called W. M. Helms as pastor. He began his duties June 1, 1960 and due to health, he resigned September 25, 1960.

A Pulpit Bible was given and dedicated to the Church by Mr. Henry Lewis in memory of the late Rev. R. L. Chaney.

- 8. Faith Church was given lot by Burlington Mills for the construction of new building.
- 9. In 1960 the First Baptist Church of Kings Mountain completed its new building which was begun in 1959. The congregation entered the new structure on July 3, 1960. The remainder of the year has been utilized completing our organizational structure, adopting the constitution and with other matters of laying a physical and spiritual groundwork.
- 10. The Kings Mountain Baptist Church undertook a \$60,000.00 renovation program. Work was started on September 1, 1960 and will be completed in early November.
 - 11. Rev. Wayne Ashe was called as new pastor at Macedonia.
- 12. Kings Mountain Second Church wishes to report the following physical improvements in the equipment of the church.

The Church has spent \$3,500.00 installing and equipping a Beginner Department, ages 4 to school age, and three primary departments, ages 7, 8 and 9 years.

The installation of a \$4,700.00 Wurlitzer Organ in the sanctuary.

The organization of two new choirs, a cherub choir and a carol choir.

The entire educational plant of our church now accommodates a fully departmentalized Sunday School patterned after the suggested grading system of the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

- 13. The Lawndale Baptist Church established a Church Library.
- 14. The Kings Mountain Temple Church built a new Educational unit. This new unit increased the Sunday School facilities to a capacity of some 450 people.
- 15. The Midview Church called Rev. John S. Frazier as pastor in July 1960.
- 16. On November 29, 1959, at the annual harvest day, the Mount Sinai Church observed a note burning service to commemorate the liquidation of the church debt.
 - 17. The New Camp Creek Church dug a new well for a water supply.
- 18. The Oak Grove Church installed and dedicated a new Hammond Organ in the sanctuary.
- 19. The Pleasant Hill Baptist Church called James A. Hutson as pastor. He assumed his duties September 4, 1960.

20. A Homecoming celebrating the tenth anniversary of Putnam Memorial Church was observed October 11, 1959. The Rev. Lawrence Roberts, first pastor, brought the message. The pastor, Richard Spencer, read the History of the church. This was the first anniversary observed by the church.

Mr. and Mrs. Z. V. Cline, Jr., Betty Jane, Nancy, and Steve, gave a lot 100 by 200 to the church for a parsonage April 3, 1960.

- 21. The Sandy Plains church erected an educational plant for Cradle Roll department up through the Junior department.
- 22. The Shelby Lily Church, in September, approved plans to build a new parsonage for the church. The construction of the building to begin soon.
- 23. In January 1960, pastor of Shelby Second Baptist Church, Rev. W. T. Roberson and family left for Foreign Mission work in Saigon, Vietnam. The church voted to give \$100.00 per month toward support of the former pastor and family.

The Shelby Second Church voted unanimously to construct a new church building. The construction of the building to be completed by November 1960.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

At the meeting of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention last year in Greensboro, a committee was appointed to study the physical needs of our seven Baptist colleges. This committee, ater much deliberation, initially recommended a campaign to secure \$45,000,000 during the next five years. The money to be thus raised would be used for the purposes of expansion and capital improvements and would be in addition to the regular support of over a million dollars annually through the Cooperative Program. After further study, the committee recommended that the campaign be in two phases. The first phase should be to secure \$25,000,000. The second phase, to secure the remainder of the money, would be conducted as soon as possible after the completion of the first phase.

The needs of our colleges are very great, particularly in view of the increasing enrollments which most of them are experiencing. In addition, it should be observed that if the expansion programs recommended by the Committee of 25 to the convention during 1959 are to be achieved, a great amount of money must be raised. It will be remembered, in this connection, that the Committee of 25 recommended that certain of

our junior colleges become senior colleges when practicable, and that Wake Forest College move toward the establishment of a graduate school as soon as possible.

The calling of a special convention to consider the recommendations concerning the financial campaign is being proposed for early 1961. This convention, if called, will deal with a matter which will be of momentous significance to our denominational life for many years ahead. Our Baptist churches should be much in prayer concerning this convention and should seek the will of God and His wisdom as they reach a decision concerning the recommendations of this special committee.

In weighing the relative merits of the proposal, there is one thought that must be paramount in our minds. This thought is ably expressed by Ralph A. Phelps, Jr., writing editorially in the March, 1959 issue of "The Southern Baptist Educator." "If Christian education is to justify its existence and the tremendous outlay of money which it necessitates, it must do a job qualitatively different from and superior to that done in tax supported institutions." He then goes on to point out the distinguishing marks of a Christian school.

"First, its denominational relationship must be sincere. It must believe in and practice the principles of the church whose name it bears.

"Second, faculty and staff members must themselves be Christians.

"Third, the program of the school should be consistent with Christian principles. This area ranges all the way from admission policies to social activities, to faculty attitudes toward counselling students.

"Fourth, the school's objectives should be Christian. While trying to instill the basic values that any institution of learning esteems—intellectual curiosity, creative thinking, an understanding of the world in which one lives, an appreciation for culture in its many forms, etc.—the Christian institution of learning needs to go beyond these. It should consciously strive to see that every student believes in God through Jesus Christ, that he holds spiritual values as superior to purely material considerations, that he recognizes service to God and his fellow man as primary responsibilities in life."

Since our seven Baptist colleges in North Carolina are endeavoring in a splendid way to provide quality education with a Christian plus—then the Baptist constituency of North Carolina should give its best to such proposals as may be adopted to help our colleges even to the point of sacrifice.

Certainly, we of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association should be sympathetic with and concerned about the needs of all of our colleges, for we have seen at firsthand, in the achievements and contributions of Gardner-Webb College, the value of Christian education. Surely we will

do what we can to support our Christian colleges in the proposed expansion programs—to the end that future generations will look back upon the year 1961 as the year in which North Carolina Baptists made the momentous decision to march forward in Christian education.

REPORT ON GARDNER-WEBB COLLEGE

Gardner-Webb's assets are listed in the present audit at \$2,500,000.00 plus. This comprises a campus of eighty-eight acres, a forest of approximately eleven hundred acres, ten college buildings, one of which is twenty years old. There are sixteen other residential and service buildings. Debt on the College, being liquidated this year, is now less than \$100,000.00.

The present student enrollment is 587 from 50 counties of North Carolina and eight other states; 85 per cent are Baptist, 177 from Cleveland County. This is an increase of slightly more than ten per cent. The faculty who teach these students have an average of two and eight tenths years graduate study, and an average of six plus years of experience teaching on the college level. From eighty to ninety per cent of our graduates transfer to higher institutions for additional training. People who make good here have encountered no difficulty in transferring credits, and consistently make good elsewhere.

That which matters most is the atmosphere of spiritual greatness in which our young people may grow. As I have observed it, that atmosphere on Gardner-Webb campus compares favorably with that in the best of our churches; but here that isn't enough.

God expects great things from us here in this Association. If we accomplish what He wants us to do, we will have to be trained. No one can do any job right without first being trained for that job. B. T. U. is the greatest training program that we have in our churches today. I would say that 75% or more of our church leaders and officers are and have been members of the Training Union. So I beseech you as Pastors, Deacons, and Church members to support your Training Union in your church in order that we may train our members to do God's work.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

It has been said that from 65 to 75 per cent of the men on the rolls of Baptist churches may be classified as inactive. It is at this point that the Brotherhood will meet the greatest need of our day. When these inactive men are sought out and enlisted in the ministry of the church, the resurgence of strength will be felt on every mission field in the world.

Our chief weakness lies with the majority of men who have never grown beyond their willingness to be numbered among the church membership; therefore, the Brotherhood stands at a strategic point and faces the greatest challenge ever presented to Baptist men.

The Brotherhood Department is endeavoring to bring the Brotherhood work in North Carolina to the highest level of efficiency to accomplish its aims - that of discovering men and their talents and enlisting them in every phase of the program sponsored by the church and denomination.

Now that the organizational structure has changed, there is a great need for Brotherhoods that make adequate provision for Royal Ambassadors. The rising emphasis upon out-door sports, camping, etc. by other groups is making a strong appeal to our boys. The Royal Ambassador program provides everything offered by these groups plus missionary training. Our churches cannot compete with other groups unless they have outstanding Christian men to lead the Royal Ambassadors.

The future of the Royal Ambassador program of North Carolina is dependent largely upon the willingness of the men in our churches to give of their time, talents, and possessions to a vigorous program of missionary education for boys. In a real sense, the future of our churches will be influenced greatly by that which we do for our boys today.

The Royal Ambassador program has a great influence on World Missions. These young men will become the laymen who will provide the necessary tithes and offerings to sponsor World Missions in the future. The increased need of well trained young men who are willing to give their lives on the mission fields increases the importance of this program. North Carolina Baptists are making a contribution to World Missions by supporting the program of Brotherhood and Royal Ambassadors.

Our most inspiring meeting during the year was a message from Rev. W. T. Roberson, who along with his wife have already left for the foreign mission field. His stirring words were a challenge to the men of our great association.

During the coming year, your Associational Brotherhood will have a new president, Brother Felix Hamrick of Boiling Springs. I am confident that he will lead the Brotherhoods in this association to heights not achieved in the past years.

Men of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association, I urge you to give him your whole-hearted support in Brotherhood work during the coming year.


REPORT ON JUVENILE REHABILITATION


The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has ushered in a new day in the field of missions. It is now promoting a specific program of juvenile rehabilitation in cooperation with the local Baptist churches of a city or association. It is doing this in response to a felt-need to do something to help stem the tide of increase in juvenile delinquency which has been on a decided increase for the past two decades and the trend continues upward. The situation has become so acute that the President called a White House Conference on Children and Youth the early part of this year.

Some of the causes for this increase in juvenile delinquency are listed as follows: increase in divorce and broken homes, increased consumption of alcoholic beverages, the mad rush for pleasure and recreation, working mothers, the emphasis upon goods and material things, the lack of concern for things spiritual. To be sure there are other contributing causes. More than any other cause according to J. Edgar Hoover "the failure of the home more often than not is the chief cause of juvenile delinquency."

This program is a work of juvenile rehabilitation at the court level









in cooperation with local churches. For it is the churches that must lead the way in finding a solution to the problem of delinquency. One eminent Georgia judge has said, "I feel that the problem of delinquency is primarily the problem of the churches."

This is the first organized effort of Southern Baptists aimed at rehabilitation. The plan is to set up a Christian Sponsorship Program in the association that will use carefully selected men and women sponsors from the churches. These sponsors will seek to rehabilitate the delinquents who are members of their Sunday Schools and churches or who are prospective members. The plan also calls for a director of juvenile rehabilitation who will serve as liaison between the home, the court, and the church. He is not a sponsor for the delinquent but is to work with the churches in securing and developing the sponsors.

We would recommend that each church in the association set up a juvenile rehabilitation committee of three persons, preferably one each from the Brotherhood, the W. M. U., and the church at large. This committee will work with the pastor and director in finding and training sponsors. These sponsors are not to be volunteers at random but are to be selected on the basis of specific qualifications.

1960 REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATION ON THE BIBLICAL RECORDER AND OTHER BAPTIST LITERATURE

This has been a year of change and transition for the Biblical Recorder, your Baptist state paper since 1833.

On January 1, J. Marse Grant became editor, succeeding Dr. L. L. Carpenter who retired after 17 years in the editor's chair. Editor Grant came to the Recorder after 10 years as editor of Charity and Children.

Since the first of the year, a number of changes have been made in the **Recorder**, including larger type and full-page pictures on the cover. In a study made by a nationally-known professor of journalism, the **Recorder** was rated among the top three state papers in the Southern Baptist Convention. The Recorder staff will not be satisfied until it rates No. 1 among the 27 state papers.

For the price of a 3c or 4c postage stamp, the **Recorder** can come into your home each week. For only \$1.50 a year, or 3c week, the **Recorder** can be sent to every family in your church. For a 4c stamp each week, or \$2.00 a year, you can receive the paper in the Club Plan of four or more subscribers in the same church.

Certainly our Baptist families are worth 3c or 4c a week. Most of us subscribe to at least one daily paper at a cost of more than \$20 a year.

For one-tenth of that amount, or less, you can get the **Recorder** and never miss the small amount it costs. With the many crucial issues coming up in the world almost daily, it is imperative that Baptists be informed about them. The best source is your Baptist state paper.

A continuous campaign is being made to put the **Recorder** in more church budgets. Deacons and finance committees are urged to consider this at the earliest possible moment. As every pastor knows, an informed membership is essential if a church makes progress.

Make no mistake about it. The printed page is going to win the battle for men's minds and hearts. The great movements of this world depend heavily on printer's ink to get their messages across. Baptists can do no less if we are to stay in this battle to win the loyalties of men and women, boys and girls.

In this crucial year in American history, the following quotation is so pertinent as we think of the importance of the **Biblical Recorder** and other Baptist publications: "If religious literature is not widely circulated among the masses in this country, I do not know what is to become of us as a nation. If truth be not diffused, error will be; if God and His Word are not received, the devil and his works will gain the ascendancy; if the evangelical volume does not reach every hamlet, the pages of a corrupt and licentious literature will; if the power of the Gospel is not felt through the length and breadth of our land, anarchy and misrule, degradation and misery, corruption and darkness will reign."

REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

God's gift to the Homes for the Aging during the past nine years has been James M. Hayes, Sr. No man could have worked harder, or accomplished more, than this dedicated man of God. On July 1, he relinquished the heavy and challenging responsibilities of the office of general superintendent to his successor, William A. Poole.

The new superintendent is diligently at work and is finding a solid foundation on which to build and expand our ministry to the aging in our midst.

Great blessings are in store for us in this tenth year of our Homes for the Aging. The new Infirmary Annex, constructed at a cost of \$193,000, and with 28 new rooms, will be in use by September 1. It is hoped that the construction of the proposed new Hamilton Home can be started by late summer, with facilities for around 30 additional residents. Our hats are off to all who have given so liberally and worked so tirelessly in bringing this fourth Home to fulfilment!

At the present, there are sixty applicants on the waiting list, and new inquiries and applications pouring in daily. We now have a total of 106 residents in our three Homes—Resthaven, 20; Albemarle, 34; Headquarters, 52. Even with our new facilities, it is not unrealistic to say that we could fill rooms up to 500 in the next two years. We must attempt great things for God and expect great things from God as we plan for the future in our ministering to the ever-growing number of the aging who need the loving care of North Carolina Baptists.

One of the life-lines in our work is the vital relationship that we have with the pastors and churches of our Convention. We could not operate without this very important and blessed tie that binds. We are increasingly dependent upon the prayers and the financial support of the churches. During the fiscal year, October 1, 1959, to August 1, 1960, we have received \$82,521.20 from the churches. Of this amount, \$76,352.70 was contributed through the Special Day Offering in February. Although this amount is \$123,000 short of our goal of \$200,000, we are profoundly grateful to God and to everyone who has had a part in contributing to the worthy cause which we represent.

We are constantly experiencing mixed emotions in the Homes, We rejoiced with Aunt Fannie Drumwright on her 99th birthday in July, and were saddened by the deaths of Miss Lillie Herring in October, Mrs. Mary Holder in April, Mr. T. J. Castevens in June, and Mrs. Annie Smith in July.

We shall welcome a visit to the Homes from our fellow Baptists at any time and stand ready at all times to render the service that God has called us to render to the aging.

Let it be known throughout the bounds of our fair State that there is nothing to hinder any needy aging person in our midst from coming to the North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging except lack of space. Let us, therefore, dedicate ourselves to the end of making more space available at the earliest possible moment.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

This has been a good year. The Sunday School officers have followed the Baptist Convention program, adapting it to meet the needs of the local churches. After planning for the year ahead, the department leaders and group superintendents met by the calendar, continuing to plan for each month. Early in January the association qualified for the Standard of Excellence, this being the fourth year to attain this distinction.

Dr. Herman Ihley, Secretary of North Carolina Sunday School Department, and all the associates and workers from the Department were

present and participated in the Associational Recognition meeting May 29th. This meeting was at the suggestion of Dr. Alvis Strickland, Superintendent of Associational Promotion.

The churches reaching the standard this year are: Bethlehem, Boiling Springs, David, Double Shoals, Flint Hill, Kings Mountain Faith, Kings Mountain Second, Lawndale, Mull's Chapel, New Bethel, New Prospect, Patterson Springs, Pleasant Grove, Pleasant Hill, Churchill Drive, Shelby Dover, Shelby Eastside, Shelby First, Shelby Highland, Waco, Zion and Zoar. Double Shoals and New Bethel were on the advanced Standard for the third consecutive year.

Again training was the most important factor in the Church Sunday School program. Group schools were held November 2nd-6th. They were well attended by teachers and officers. The curriculum was rich. This training made possible our being able to apply for the Standard in January. Associational and conference meetings were held. These were well planned.

Early in the year the committee on nominations went diligently to work securing officials for this associational year. At the same time each worker was given Dr. E. Stanley Williamson's book "Helping Churches Through Associational Sunday School Work." A clinic was held August 22nd, all officials present. September 13th, Action Night was observed for all churches.

October 2nd, the Sunday School officers met and set the following objectives which were approved by the General Board October 17th: 1,500 study course awards from catagory 17, January Bible Study, V.B.S. Clinic February 1st-3rd, an enlargement campaign for 1962, 5% increase this year, enlist churches to observe Preparation Week, Operation Home Folk, 50 new departments, 100 new classes, one new Sunday School, 100% V.B.S., continued use of Standard as a guide with goal of 40 Standard Sunday Schools, and that Action Night, September 12th, be observed with all churches represented.

The Sunday Schools have promoted every aspect of the church program. Evangelism, spiritual and mental growth, stewardship, and a compassionate fellowship for one another in the Lord Jesus has been felt and witnessed.

At all times I feel greatly indebted to the superintendents, teachers, pastors and all church people for devotion and support in this great work. I want to commend Rev. C. O. Greene, our Missionary, for his vision and help. May we now go forth in the spirit "The Lord Working with them."

VISUAL AID, TELEVISION, AND RADIO

Visual Aid in our churches should come up front now. When this subject is mentioned many think in terms of motion or still pictures. Pictures, posters, charts, graphs or any type material presented attractively are our most effective, as well as inexpensive, means of keeping interest.

All churches should have some type active Visual Aid Program. This work is not designed for one department alone, but it should be used in each department beginning with the youngest member and extending to the oldest member in the church.

There are numerous sources of Visual Aid material. Some have rental charges while others only require postage. We list addresses of a few Visual Aid Catalogues: Audio Visual Aids, Baptist Building, 301 Hillsboro Street, Raleigh, N. C.; Religious Film Service, 2804 Anderson Drive, Raleigh, N. C.; and Filmstrips Catalog, Society for Visual Education, Inc., 1345 Diversey Parkway, Chicago 14, Illinois.

Our radio stations have been very cooperative by allowing free time to our pastors that they may present church services over the air. We are listing the schedule of our two Shelby stations: From WADA, two morning services, each 4th Sunday at 11:00 the Baptists participate and each Friday at 7:30 a.m. "The Baptist Hour." From WOHS, three morning services, Sunday at 9:00 "The Protestant Hour", Sunday at 7:30 and 11:00, FM, "First Baptist Hour." Menday through Friday, FM, 6:15, "Gardner-Webb Vespers"; Saturday, FM, 6:15, "Gardner-Webb Bible Study"; and Saturday, FM, 6:30, "Tomorrow's Sunday School Lesson."

Many Christian programs are being presented over television which are helpful and impressive. These programs reach those who are unable to hear the message otherwise. May we become more Visual Aid conscious.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES

This year marks the 75th anniversary of our Orphanage work—our Child-caring work—in this state. In 1884 our Baptist State Convention felt that the time had not come to establish an Orphanage in our State but the indefatigable John H. Mills, and a few other interested friends, felt that the time had come to begin caring for orphan children in North Carolina, hence Thomasville Orphanage was founded and on November 11, 1885 the first child was received, and Mr. Mills became the first General Superintendent, and six others have followed him: J. B. Boone, M. L. Kesler, I. G. Greer, Zeno Wall, W. C. Reed and now W. R. Wagoner.

This great work, with its humble beginning was supported by gifts from faithful friends, and by once-a-month offerings from interested Sunday Schools.

In 1914 Kennedy Home, near Kinston, was opened on the 1200 acre tract of land given by Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Kennedy for the purpose of establishing a home for orphan children in Eastern North Carolina at which time the name was changed to The Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina.

In 1942 the Burnt Swamp and Robeson associations operated a home for homeless Indians, and this work was taken over by our Convention in 1958. We now, therefore, have three child-caring homes: Mills Home at Thomasville, Kennedy Home at Kinston, and Odum Home at Pembroke, N. C. and these homes have tenderly cared for over 8,000 children, some staying but a few months while others have stayed as long as fifteen years.

This scriptural work is supported by the Cooperative Program, by once-a-month offerings from our Sunday Schools and churches, and by a big Thanksgiving offering in November, by special gifts, by endowment, and designated support of certain children. This year, then, you have an old institution, and hundreds of homeless children pleading with you for help. We must not turn a deaf ear. A Big Thanksgiving offering is imperative.

We are now caring for 730 children in the following ways: 311 at Mills Home, 165 at Kennedy Home, 24 at Odum Home, 160 in Foster homes and 40 other children are with their mothers.

Charity and Children is ably edited by John E. Roberts, one of our Cleveland County boys, and he is not only well trained but he "has the courage of his convictions," and speaks out for the truth as he sees it. This valuable paper goes into over fifty thousand homes featuring the work being done in our three homes, and it greatly helps with all of our work throughout this state and the south. You ought to have it in your home. The Club rates are 60 cents per year, and individual rates \$1.00 per year. I would not be without it.

May we adequately care for this important and rewarding work, and may each church make a big Thanksgiving offering in November.

ROYAL AMBASSADOR REPORT

According to the associational records there are 38 chapters of Junior Royal Ambassadors and 30 chapters of Intermediates with an enrollment of 822.

Last February, 22-23, a clinic for Royal Ambassador workers was held at the Boiling Springs church. Bill Jackson, the State Royal Ambassador secretary, was leader for this meeting. Eighty-five men attended. Approximately one hundred boys attended the annual R. A. Camp at Gardner-Webb College in August. The camp pastor was the Rev. B. L. Raines, of Kings Mountain First Baptist Church, and the Rev. Deaver Lawton, Missionary to Thailand, was camp missionary. At the beginning of the week, eight boys indicated on their enrolment cards that they were not Christians. Before the week ended, all eight had accepted Christ as Savior.

Possibly, we could do a better work in the camp if more churches would promote it. The college is so generous with their facilities, and it would be good if more would take advantage of this opportunity. For the first time the study of Royal Ambassador camp craft was offered during this week. This is new and it seems to be very appealing to the boys.

Royal Ambassador baseball leagues operated with 32 teams taking part. Four trophies were given. The Eastside Intermediates and the Dover Juniors winning first round awards and the Calvary Intermediates and the Mount Sinai Juniors winning the playoffs.

The baseball program was administered by a committee of four men: Tom Wright, Ralph Mitchem, Bobby Devinney, and Gilbert Crowe. These men are to be commended for the fine job that they did.

More interest is being shown in Royal Ambassador work. In the new Brotherhocd organization, the Royal Ambassador committee is of great importance to the work in the church. It is difficult, if not impossible, to have R. A. chapters functioning as they should without these active committees within the sponsoring organizations.

In these days when the things of the world are competing for the lives of our young boys, we must re-examine our Christian appeal. The only thing that limits Royal Ambassador work in any church is the lack of consecrated men who will take the responsibility. There is no lack of boys; they are interested, and they will follow those that will lead.

Our prayer is that our men will feel the burden of this task, and will face up to the opportunity and responsibility that is rightfully theirs.

REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The Ministry of our Baptist Hospital touches every area of our state. Last year it served more than 17,000 bed patients, with 150,000 visits being made to the clinics and offices. They came for examinations, medical treatment, skilled surgery, and spiritual guidance. Many of our homes, most of our churches, and almost all of our communities have been served by this ministry of healing. It touches the family life of about a quarter of a million of our people each year.

Sickness is no respector of persons or pocketbooks. It strikes the rich and poor alike - the widow, the orphan, the aged. There are times when they need such specialized care as that available at our Baptist Hospital. The Mother's Day Fund provides money with which our Hospital gives assistance to those who cannot pay the full cost of their care. Our Hospital almost doubles our gifts with matching funds from welfare agencies and other gifts. In addition to this, the medical staff gives its services without charge to all service patients, except for available insurance payments.

Probably we should ask ourselves if we as Christians should provide such a ministry for our needy, sick neighbors. Jesus and the New Testament writers give us the answer. But do we really want such a ministry? It cannot be provided except at great cost. Our Hospital receives about $3\frac{1}{4}$ % of our Co-operative Program funds for payments on the buildings, purchase of expensive equipment, such as heart-lung machines, and for the Department of Pastoral Care. Our Mother's Day Fund provides the money to help pay the hospital bills of needy, sick persons. The amount of this fund determines for the most part the amount of help our Hospital can give.

If we are serious about this ministry which was so close to the heart of our Lord, and want our Hospital to give help when our people need it, we are going to have to become serious about our giving to the Mother's Day Fund. Our Hospital is facing a grave financial problem, and if it is to give free service we are going to have to contribute the money to finance the program.

The only way we can support this work is to plan for it, to make somebody in each church responsible for it, to let our people know about the need, and to challenge them to give of their means. Some of our churches over the state have been doing this, and our people have demonstrated that when this is done they will provide the necessary support.

We come to ask you to do it in your church - not for the hospital, but for sick people who are in need.

REPORT OF GENERAL BOARD

The General Board of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association has had its regular monthly meeting during the year. There has been an average attendance and the spirit has been good. The following matters have come before the body for consideration and approval:

An application for \$420.00 for pastoral aid for Midview Baptist Church, to the North Carolina State Board, was approved on November 16, 1959.

The Second Sunday of January (10, 1960) was designated as "W. T.

Roberson Day" in the churches of the Association for offerings and prayers in their behalf. The Robersons left for Foreign Mission work in Vietnam. The Associational Treasurer received offerings from 43 churches, totaling \$1,637.64.

The General Board approved applications for student aid for the following: Max Pendleton, a member of Mull's Chapel; Herman L. Thomas, pastor of Bethany and member of Calvary; Phate W. McSwain, a member of Union; and Charles W. Freeman, a member of Patterson Grove. Application for student aid for Herman L. Thomas, a member of Calvary and a student at Furman University this year was approved.

Two scholarships to the Fruitland Preachers School for \$110.00 each was granted John S. Frazier, pastor of Midview Church, and James E. Williams, pastor of Piedmont-Church for this year.

The following recommendations from the Finance and Administration Committee was approved: "That an amount up to \$1,500.00 of the Missionary's compensation is to be considered as reimbursement for housing, utilities, and necessary household costs."

The General Board granted by motion to the Missionary 75.00 and to the Clerk-Treasurer 50.00 for Christmas gifts.

A discussion was had in the February Board meeting as how to deal with the problem of Juvenile Delinquency and the need for a domestic Relations court for Cleveland County. The General Board asked that a committee composed of T. Max Linnens, Mrs. C. D. Forney, Jr., Edward Willis, Allen Jolley and C. O. Greene to draft a letter or letters to proper authorities endorsing the establishment of a Domestic Relations Court for the County. That the said committee was to study this work and to present to the General Board the facts and figures of the county needs. After their study, the committee offered the following recommendation: "That Dr. and Mrs. A. B. Wood be appointed to direct in the Juvenile Rehabilitation work in the county. The recommendation was approved.

The following were appointed to fill the vacancies that occurred during the year: D. W. Kiser as Visual Aid Chairman, to replace Floyd Loudermilk and Ernest Arnold to serve on the Missions Council instead of Charles Rabon.

The Moderator appointed a committee to study the constitution of the Association and make a report to the sessions of the Association of any changes that may be necessary. The committee appointed was composed of the following: W. V. Tarlton, E. M. Smith, and James E. Holder.

The Standing Nomination Committee presented the following nominations to the General Board for approval subject to the action of the Association in session: J. E. Bishop, as Associational Sunday School Superintendent; Norman Brown as Baptist Training Union Director; and Felix Hamrick as Brotherhood President.

The Resolutions Committee was asked to prepare suitable resolutions for the following: A. V. Nolan, C. L. Devine, William Jones, Charles Rabon, Wray Barrett, Carl Greene, Floyd Loudermilk, Don Cabaniss, J. D. McClellan, and Thomas D. Taylor.

The General Board recommended the following budget for its financial program for this associational year October 1, 1960 to September 30, 1961, and recommended that the churches give \$1.00 per church member for the mission program of the association.

REPORT OF SOUTH MOUNTAIN BAPTIST CAMP

Our Region 8 camp director, Rev. T. A. Lineberger, reports a very successful season. There were 329 boys who attended R. A. Camp and 417 girls who attended G. A. Camp. 633 attended other types of meetings during the summer which made a total of 1,379 participating in a meeting of some kind during the camping season. In addition to these, there were hundreds who came to visit the camp and were in one or more of the services. 650 made some type of decision for Christ, including 58 professions of faith, 364 were star campers and 186 were honor campers.

Activity at the Camp included Ranking Study for the R. A.'s, Forward Steps for the G. A.'s, Mission Study, Worship and recreation. Each activity was well supervised.

The food, much of which was donated, was delicious and abundant. Although the first servings were ample, many of the campers returned for "seconds," which were gladly served as long as the food lasted. The concession stand was only opened for a brief period morning, afternoon and night.

The camp was staffed with consecrated and efficient workers. Johnny Enloe, a ministerial student from Gastonia and Beulah Huffman, a teacher in the School for the Deaf at Morganton, served as assistants to the director. Each group furnished their own counselor which also gave direction and supervision to their group. The services of the camp were free to all counselors. The campers paid \$6.00 for the four days. This amount included board, room, and a mission study book. Missionaries on furlough were used in the camp and they greatly enriched the programs.

Improvements at the camp during the past spring and summer included the building of one memorial cabin. Plans are under way to add two or three other buildings before camp opens next season. The lake has been improved and beautified. Four church cabins have been built in the residential area of the camp, High Peak and Mt. Hebron in the Catawba River Association, Tuckaseegee in the Gaston, and Waco, in the Kings Mountain.

With the persistence and patience of a few churches and a few individuals scattered over the ten associations, the camp has made real progress. With an indebtedness of only \$4,000, the camp is set to do a magnificient job in the coming years. The progress that has been made with the limited co-operation given to it is evidence of the blessings of God upon it. Your committee hopes that more of the churches of this association will put something in their budgets or make special gifts to the camp this next year. The camp has been able to operate in the black for the past three years, but much remains to be done by way of improvements.

THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The American Bible Society was organized in 1816. Its supreme concern is to get the Bible into the hands of those who do not have it and to do so in a manner to secure serious interest and a receptive mind. From its inception until 1957 the American Bible Society had

distributed over 500,000,000 copies of the Scriptures. Its average annual circulation for a recent ten-year period has been somewhat over 12,000,000 volumes.

Its principal processes are four:

- 1. TRANSLATION: The Society constantly aids translators by counsel, supervision and contributions towards expenses. Translation projects are going on almost continuously on every continent and the islands of the sea.
- 2. PUBLICATIONS: Long experience together with skillful and constant supervision results in the publication of readable, durable Scriptures at low cost. In a recent year printing orders reached almost 16 MILLION volumes of Gospels, Testaments and Bibles.
- 3. DISTRIBUTION: Through the Society's own staff and dedicated colporteurs, hundreds of thousands of Scriptures are distributed worldwide. Many more go out through Christian workers, missionaries, pastors and evangelists. Many thousands of copies of Scriptures are carefully given away without charge where conditions warrant. In addition numerous thousands are sold at subsidized prices low enough to be afforded by interested people. In America, English Gospels may be had for 3c, New Testaments for 15c, Bibles for 75c. In 125 years of service to the Blind, the Society has distributed over three-quarters of a million volumes of embossed Scriptures in more than 400 different languages and systems. Volumes that cost from \$4.00 to \$8.00 to produce are provided to the Blind at 25c each.
- 4. PROMOTION OF BIBLE USE: Because an unused Bible is of no value the Society considers that it must encourage the use of the Scriptures. It seeks to accomplish this through the annual World-wide Bible Reading Program, from Thanksgiving to Christmas, including the observance of Universal Bible Sunday.

Southern Baptist contributions to the work of the American Bible Society in the year of 1959 showed a decline from the past year. In 1958 Southern Baptist contributed \$162,198.71. In 1959 we contributed \$144,199.72. This is not good. Is it possible that we are not now as concerned about getting the Word of God into the hands of those who are yet in darkness?

The work of the American Bible Society must continue to expand:

Because the one hope for our fear-ridden, sin-sick world is the Gospel of Jesus Christ;

Because the great masses of people in the world do not have the Bible, do not even know of it;

Because, in present world conditions, the American Bible Society

must provide hundreds and hundreds of thousands of Bibles and Testaments needed by churches and people in the underprivileged areas of the world;

Because American Christians are better able to bear the costs of the needed expansion than any other people in the world.

Will we do it?

REPORT OF THE MISSIONS COUNCIL

The Missions Council met four times during the year. In the organizational meeting the following officers were elected:

Chairman—Max Linnens Vice Chairman—Charles Rabon (replaced by Ernest Arnold when Mr. Rabon left the Association)

Secretary-Mrs. L. P. Williams

Chairman, Finance and Administration Committee—A. L. Calton Chairman, Missionary Planning Committee—W. C. Hill Chairman, Institutional and Inter-racial Committee—Carlos Young

Some of the activities during the year are as follows:

- 1. The Institutional and Inter-racial Committee has provided for services in the Cleveland County jail each Sunday.
- 2. The Missionary Planning Committee has made a survey of the West Shelby area to see if there is sufficient interest for the beginning of a new church.
- 3. This same committee was in charge of plans for the special gift to the W. T. Robersons on their leaving for Vietnam.
- 4. An Associational program of Juvenile Rehabilitation has been started with Dr. A. B. Wood as Director.
- 5. One of our churches is now conducting sign language classes with the idea of beginning a Sunday School class for the county's silent people.
- 6. Another of our churches is interested in beginning a Sunday School class for the mentally retarded of our county.
- 7. The Finance and Administration Committee served in helping to set up our new office on Buffalo Street in Shelby, has provided the suggested budget, and has generally directed the work of our Missionary.
- 8. The Council reaffirmed the working arrangement with the missionary which was in effect with Mr. Bray since 1953 and extended it to include the office associate, Mrs. Fred Cornwell. It is as follows:

"He is to have two weeks vacation each year. He is allowed two revival meetings outside the Association each year. He is to have no more than three weeks, not counting revivals, outside the Association in Study Courses, Schools of Missions, and similar work. If he is called on to supply for the pastor while he is away for revival, vacation, or similar matters, or for any work done, and he receives any gifts or remuneration he is to retain same."

9. The Council has considered a proposed Five Year Program of work for our Association and recommend its adoption:

1961 - Church Potential Survey

1962 - Sunday School Enlargement

1963 - Training Union Enlargement

1964 - Jubilee Advance Program

1965 - Brotherhood and W. M. U. Enlargement

Other emphases that may be considered during these five years are: Week of Prayer for Associational Missions, Church records microfilmed, Special Vocations Emphasis for our High School Seniors, Senior Citizens, Superintendent of Training in each church, Associational Recreation Director, Schools of Missions, Deacons' School, Signs marking each church, Deacon led Spiritual Growth Program.

Other matters have been considered but these are the main ones.

REPORT OF ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY

This first year has flown by on busy wings. When I accepted this work November 1, 1959, I suggested to the Association a sort of "platform" which would serve to guide me. Let's look again at the planks in that platform and see how well we have lived up to our campaign promises!

- 1. I expressed to my predecessor, T. W. Bray, my appreciation for his good work. That appreciation has grown even greater in this year. His wise counsel, his rich fellowship, and his untiring interest in the Lord's work have been of immeasurable worth to me.
- 2. I would attempt to be a pastor for the Pastors. Most of them I have visited at least once. (Some were not at home). Many of them have been into my office or have met me in other places and have shared with me many of their problems and concerns. I have tried to encourage the churches to support their pastors well and hold up their hands in the great work to which God has called them.
- 3. I would like to be in your churches. I have participated in some kind of service in 48 of our 68 churches. It is my hope that the other 20 will invite me to come soon!
- 4. I would emphasize teaching and training. We have arranged training schools for all our Associational officers in the Sunday School, Training Union, and Brotherhood. We have worked for Training Schools in the Groups and in the churches. I have tried to practice what I preached by teaching 6 study courses of one week each, 5 mission studies, and have earned 22 awards in class and at home.
- 5. I would seek to provide a resource center at the office. We have six display racks featuring all kinds of pamphlets and free helps in just about every phase of our Baptist work. Come by to see it and use it.
- 6. I would start an Associational bulletin. The "Beacon" is now going out twice a month to 600 leaders in our churches.

7. I would try to give my best. None of us, I suppose, could ever say that he had done his best, but I have tried—almost day and night. Statistics are cold and don't mean much but here are some that may indicate that there has been activity whether there has been achievement or not. I've averaged speaking every other day; I've averaged a meeting every day; have had more than 500 personal conferences; made more than 90 visits to homes and hospitals in times of illness or death; and have spent endless hours in planning and promoting our work. I've driven my car 27,000 miles in serving you and the Lord.

It has been a year of joyous serving in a work that grows more challenging every day - and bigger, too! As I said a year ago, "I need your love, your mercy, your prayers, and your understanding." Continue to give them to me and in faith we can move on to greater things for our Master.

REPORT ON PUBLIC MORALS AND CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS

President Eisenhower was quoted in a speech as saying, "The need of our nation is spiritual." General MacArthur said, "The great need of our Country is theological." A minister would have said, "The need of our day is for revival." Surely everyone recognizes that there is a moral decline in our nation that is of major proportions.

Here are some of the facts that jolt the eternal optimists who are sure things are getting better every day in every way. The nation now has 193,467 bartenders and only 167,471 ministers. We have more bar maids than college girls. We have 7,000,000 alcoholics and 15,000,000 heavy drinkers; while over 70% of our population drink to some extent. Three times as much money is spent for alcoholic beverages as for all religious and philanthropic purposes. Chester Swor, speaking before the Southern Baptist Convention in Miami, startled the Convention with the information that 60,000 high school girls would be forced to quit school this year to bear illegitimate children. When you add to this the number of boys involved and the number who go undetected it's enough to cause deep concern. There were 37,800 deaths last year in automobile accidents, with 1,400,000 injured. Perhaps 50% of these wrecks were caused by drinking drivers.

Christian people were jolted by two events in Cleveland County during the past year. The first being the raid of a large number of clubs and organizations by the Sheriff's Department last spring. Gambling devices and illegal liquor were found in nearly every instance. Much unfavorable publicity was focused on our County. Then just a short time ago the operators of the Cleveland County Fair announced the operation of the Fair on Sunday. These things happened in our County where 95% of our

people belong to some Church and where over 20,000 belong to Baptist Churches and Sunday Schools.

There is much evidence that our County may be faced in the near future with a vote on the sale of legal liquor. There is continuing pressure everywhere to relax the "Blue Laws" and make Sunday a day of commercialized entertainment.

The increasing participation of church people in the water sports on the Lord's Day continues to weaken our Churches and strangle spirituality of many people. Lakes and streams are filled with "Baptist Boaters," while the Church goes along at half strength.

Is there an answer to our moral decline? Jesus tells us: "Make the tree good and the fruit will be good" (Matt. 12:33). It is a conviction that many hold that we need to stress a regenerate church membership. Many believe that the greatest field of evangelism today lies within the Church. The responsibility for new convictions rests heavily upon the minister and his pulpit ministry. God's Watchmen must be faithful to sound the warning. The Sunday School teacher and lay leaders, too, must teach and live the truth without compromise. There must be a call to repentance and a return to God. In these perilous times the Church must rise to meet the challenge—praying, preaching, and above all, living our faith.

MINISTER'S ANNUITY, SECURITY PLANS

We have experienced a great awakening in the churches of our Convention in regard to the Minister's Annuity, and Security plans. These plans are designed that each church with the pastor works together in providing something for the pastor's retirement.

The Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention co-operating with the State Convention has worked out these plans to provide annuities for ministers and church employees when they reach retirement age, 65, or disability annuity if such disability occurs at any time prior to the age, 65, and also to provide an annuity for the widow in event of the death of the member before reaching the age of 65.

In our state the plan calls for the pastor to contribute 5% of his salary. Then the church puts into the plan 5% and the Convention adds 5%. The maximum salary on which one can pay is \$4,000.00. This is a protection plan for retired and disabled ministers and church employees. The objective of the plans is to provide income for ministers and church employees, who must retire because of old age or disability, or for their loved ones if they die either in active service or after retirement.

Ministers of our Association who are not participating in this plan need to investigate it immediately.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER REVISION OF CONSTITUTION

After considerable thought and discussion we bring the following recommendations:

Page 32, COMMITTEES AND THEIR DUTIES, Article 12: "The committees of the Association shall be divided into three categories, and shall be composed of members from our churches." We recommend that the word "three" be changed to "four".

Page 33, Section C, COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES, Arabic numeral 2 be changed to read as follows: (Changes indicated by underlining)

"A Committee on Nominations, consisting of five members, the duty of which shall be to nominate, with the help of the Nominating Committee of these various organizations, all officers of the Association except those listed in Article 7. Those to be nominated shall include general officers of the following organizations: Baptist Training Union, Sunday School, Brotherhood, Music Organization, and members of the Missions Council."

We recommend further that the Committee on Nominations rather than the Committee on Committees nominate the Ordination Advisory and the Evangelism Committees. Arabic numerals 5 and 6 would then become a part of Arabic numeral 2 and the following would be added:

"This Committee shall also nominate an Ordination Advisory Committee, consisting of five members, the duty of which shall be to examine all candidates for ordination who shall be referred to it by churches of the Association. Upon concluding such examination, this Committee shall notify the church requesting the examination as to the results thereof and shall make a full report concerning the same at the next meeting of the General Board."

"It shall also nominate the Committee of Evangelism, consisting of five members, the duty of which shall be to devise plans whereby evangelism will be promoted throughout the churches of the Association."

This change will mean that Arabic numerals 5 and 6 will be deleted and will become a part of Arabic numeral 2, and Arabic numeral 7 will then become Arabic numeral 5.

This will also mean that the following statement which now appears following Arabic numeral 8 will be moved to follow Arabic numeral 5.

"The Chairman of each of these Committees, with the exception of the Committee on Order of Business, will be designated by the Committee on Committees."

Page 33, that Arabic numeral 8 become Section "D" to read just as it is now except to add these words, "and Music Director."

Page 34, that Section D become Section E.

Page 34, under GENERAL BOARD, Article 14: At the end of this paragraph add these words: "The General Board shall act for the Association between sessions except as specifically limited by the Constitution."

That in the following instances the word "member" be substituted for the word "messenger." Under Section B, Arabic numeral 1, a, b. Under Section C. Arabic numerals 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 (formerly 7).

Page 34, General Board, Article 14: That the word "quarterly" be substituted for "monthly" with this addition "or when called by the moderator."

These changes were ordered by vote of the Association.
