This type of event has never been done from this club, but Dillon Stadther, president of the club said "We wanted to help the homeless in our community, and toiletry items are very inexpensive—especially if you go to the Dollar General."

There are drop-off bins located in two different areas. One is in front of the cafeteria, and the other is in the main entrance of Tucker Student Center. The donations will be given to Mental Health Association in Cleveland County, which will then use the items to meet the immediate needs of homeless people.

Gardner-Webb students can show that they care by donating toiletry items that will benefit local shelters in the Cleveland County Community.
