### THE HOST CHURCH

### **THE HOST PASTOR**

#### **Rev. J. WILSON HARMON**

A graduate of Furman University and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Rev. Wilson Harmon served churches in South Carolina and in Texas before becoming pastor of the Waco Church, October 1962.

The church auditorium, under his leadership, was completely renovated, air-conditioning was installed and a steeple added.

Not only has he served his church well but Rev. Harmon has also served responsible offices in the Association in both Sunday School and Training Union organizations. Southwide, he and his wife Dorothy Stone Harmon, have served as writers for Intermediate Training Union Quarterlies; both Rev. and Mrs. Harmon have served on the staff of state assemblies in Texas and in North Carolina and on the faculty at Ridgecrest.

The Harmons have three children: Jim 8; Craig 4; and Katrina 1.



**Dr. ZENO WALL**

Dr. Zeno Wall was born August 20, 1882, near Mooresboro, North Carolina. A son of Mr. & Mrs. S. F. Wall, he was educated in Rutherford County schools and also attended a private school operated by Mr. A. B. Flack. Furthering his education he went on to Mars Hill College and later was graduated from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky.

Upon completion of his education in Rutherford County he set out on a business career with a textile firm in Cliffside, North Carolina. While in Cliffside he received an invitation in 1906 to speak in the nearby Mount Pleasant Baptist Church which he accepted. It was this experience which confirmed in his heart his call to preach. His pastorates have been:

Marshall, North Carolina

Mount Olive, Mississippi

First Baptist Church, Columbia, Mississippi

Pastorate at the Mississippi Baptist College from which he entered the Military Chaplaincy in 1916, during World War I.

In 1922 he became pastor of the First Baptist Church, Goldsboro,

North Carolina. From Goldsboro he came to the pastorate of the First Baptist Church, Shelby, in 1925 where he remained pastor for 23 years.

While pastor of the Shelby Church his ministry was a fruitful one, greatly blessed by the Lord. The membership of the church grew from 736 to over 2,500. There were 14,484 received into the church by baptism and 2,095 uniting by transfer of letter. The church also increased in gifts to the Lord's work from an annual budget of \$28,000.00 to \$131,225.57.

While serving the Shelby Church as pastor and during the trying time of the depression he served without pay as president of Boiling Springs Junior College, (now Gardner-Webb College) for two years.

In 1948, already serving as president of the Board of Trustees at the North Carolina Baptist Children's Homes, he was invited to become General Superintendent which he accepted and in which capacity he served until 1950. After he reached retirement age, he came back to Shelby; but shortly thereafter received a plea from the Elizabeth church to become their pastor. He accepted the pastorate which he held for five years.

He has served many churches since his retirement as supply pastor and has held the following interim pastorates:

Eastside, Shelby

Pleasant Grove

Shady Grove (Gaston Association)

Kings Mountain Baptist Church.

Many honors have come to him during his fruitful ministry. Among them his name appeared in "Who's who in America" in the 1948-49 edition; he served as president of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention for four terms — 1933-36.

His faithful service in the churches which he served as well as in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association has been outstanding.



**Dr. W. WYAN WASHBURN**

Among many faithful laymen in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association is W. Wyan Washburn, M. D., a deacon and a Sunday School teacher at the Boiling Springs Baptist Church. A son of Mr. & Mrs. J. C. Washburn, he was born June 22, 1912, in the area of the Double Springs Baptist Church.

Doctor Washburn was an honor student at Wake Forest College and served a newspaperman with the Shelby Daily Star as city editor prior to entering medical school.

After finishing Bowman Gray School of Medicine and internship at the Baptist Hospital, he entered the U. S. Army Medical Corps, served during World War II, and was discharged as a Captain in 1946.

Since 1946 he has been engaged in the general practice of medicine and surgery in Boiling Springs, North Carolina, and is now administrator of the Royster Memorial Hospital. He is widely known for his work in medicine and is frequently called upon to serve in capacities of leadership in medical and civic organizations.

His interest in the Lord's work has been evident for many years. Besides his work in his local church he served on the Board of Trustees

and advisory committee for Gardner-Webb College, and also on the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging.

In 1958-59 he, with his wife Emily Davis Washburn, took a year's leave of absence from his medical practice and visited 20 countries in Africa, Asia, and Europe. During this time he and his wife worked for three months as a physician-nurse team in a hospital in Ogbomoso, Nigeria, under the auspices of the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board.

Another contribution of spiritual wealth is his book, *Canaan in Carolina*, a biography of the late Rev. J. W. Suttle.

In 1958 Dr. Washburn was elected historian of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. It is particularly for his work as historian that this special tribute is offered. During the past year historical records of 47 churches in the Association, along with other historical documents have been microfilmed and are available for study in the library at Gardner-Webb College. At his recommendation this year the Historical Committee was enlarged to 10 members for the purpose of exploring the possibility of writing a history of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

**Rev. CHARLES EARL OXFORD**

**I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith.**

Charles Earl Oxford, born April 1, 1911 at Morganton, N. C., was a son of the late Isaac and Leola Grady Oxford. He became a Christian in 1938 and was ordained a Baptist Minister in 1945.

A graduate of Gardner-Webb College, his first pastorate was at Smyrna Baptist Church in the Catawba River Association. He helped organize Southside Baptist Church in Morganton in 1947 and served as its first pastor until 1949. Rev. Oxford came to the Kings Mountain Association in 1950 as pastor of Oak View where he served until his death February 19, 1964.

During his tenure at Oak View an addition was built to the Church building and the church purchased additional land to be used in future expansion.

Rev. Oxford suffered a stroke in June, 1962, but through faith and a strong determination he recovered to again carry on his duties as pastor.

He was married to the former Juanita Moore and they had three

children — two daughters, Bobbie Gaye (Mrs. Andrew Wray), Morganton; Nancy (Mrs. James Rhyne), Kings Mountain; and one son, Charles Earl Jr., Clover, S. C., a student at Gardner-Webb College.

He was known as husband, father, pastor, neighbor, friend, but above all, and the name that gave deeper meaning to the others, he was known as a dedicated Christian with a concern for the Lost.

He shared Christ through his visits with shut-ins and many were won to Christ through his Ministry in the homes. He was a man that loved people — sharing the joy and grief of each, and was loved by all that knew him.

**THE CONSTITUTION****Kings Mountain Baptist Association**

**PREAMBLE:** We, the messengers of Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order and rules of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

**NAME**

**ARTICLE 1:** The name of the organization shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

## MEMBERSHIP

ARTICLE 2: The Association shall be composed of Missionary Baptist Churches of Cleveland County and adjacent territory which are now members, and any other Missionary Baptist Churches which may hereafter be admitted as herein provided.

ARTICLE 3: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Missions Council and if recommended by this Council and accepted by the Association shall agree to come under the watch care of the Association for a period of one year. At the end of one year upon recommendation of the Mission Council, membership within the Association of such churches shall be confirmed by vote of the Association. During this period such churches shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except holding office and voting.

ARTICLE 4: Each church shall annually elect messengers to the appointed meeting of the Association. Such messengers must be duly certified in the annual church letter to the Association, and appointed on the following ratio:

Two messengers (in addition to the pastor and retired ministers who are members of the congregation) for each Church having a membership not exceeding fifty, and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty or major fraction thereof, provided that the total number of messengers shall not exceed ten.

In computing the total number of messengers allowed from any Church, the pastor and retired ministers who are members of said Church shall not be included.

## PURPOSE

ARTICLE 5: The purpose of this Association shall be to council together for the enlargement and strengthening of God's Kingdom and for the promoting of unity and growth among the churches composing it. To this end the Association will cooperate with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention and their agencies in the work of Missions, Christian Education, and Social Service.

## MEETINGS

ARTICLE 6: "The Association shall meet annually on Thursday after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of."

The place of meeting shall be determined at the previous session.

## OFFICERS

ARTICLE 7: The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, and Historian. These shall be elected annually by the Association at its annual meeting and shall hold office until their successors are elected.

## DUTIES OF OFFICERS

ARTICLE 8: It shall be the duty of the Moderator:

- (1) In advance of the annual meeting, to communicate with the host churches requesting that they appoint from their church membership a committee on enrollment.
- (2) To open the meetings punctually at the appointed time.
- (3) To appoint a committee on committees in the opening session to serve for the following associational year.
- (4) To enforce the rules; to preserve order; and to exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage.

ARTICLE 9: It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, and to be Chairman of the Association Calendar Committee and Chairman of the Committee on Order of Business.

ARTICLE 10: It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and report at the annual session of the Association.

ARTICLE 11: It shall be the duty of the Clerk-Treasurer:

- (1) To keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (2) To superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes.
- (3) To keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.
- (4) To receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed directly to the Association.
- (5) To make an annual report concerning such to the Association.

For his services he shall be paid annually an amount recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Association.

## COMMITTEES AND THEIR DUTIES

ARTICLE 12: The committees of the Association shall be divided into three categories, and shall be composed of members from our churches.

SECTION A: Those appointed in advance of the annual meeting:

1. A Committee on Enrollment appointed as prescribed in Article 8, and any others which the Moderator may deem advisable or necessary.

SECTION B. Those named to report at the annual meeting following the one at which they were appointed:

1. A Committee on Committees, consisting of five messengers, appointed as prescribed in Article 8. It shall be the duty of this committee to appoint the following committees which shall report at the next annual meeting of the Association.
  - (a) Committee on Place and Preacher, consisting of three members, the duty of which shall be to recommend to the Association churches at which the next session shall meet and preachers that will preach at the next session. In the event of a church having to rescind its invitation or a preacher's being unable to deliver a designated sermon due to sickness, death, or other providential circumstances, or his removal from a church in the Association, this committee will make provision for such substitution as may be necessary subject to the approval of the General Board.
  - (b) A Committee on Resolutions, consisting of three members, the duty of which shall be to draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions of appreciation and expression on sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association.
  - (c) A Committee on Order of Business, which shall consist of five members including the Vice-Moderator who shall be chairman. It shall be the duty of this committee to report a suggested order of business as soon as feasible after the opening of the Association. When adopted, its report shall become the order of the Association and cannot be changed except by majority of the body.
  - (d) A Committee on Nominations, consisting of five members:
    - (1) A Committee on Nominations, consisting of five members, the duty of which shall be to nominate a Sunday School Superintendent, a Training Union Director, a Brotherhood President and a Chairman of Music. These nine persons shall then form one committee and nominate all officers of the Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Music and Education Organization and Members of the Missions Council.
    - (2) This committee shall also make recommendations to the General Board of the Association for members of the General Board of North Carolina Baptist State Convention when vacancies occur. The General Board will then send its recommendations to the Committee on Boards of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.
    - (3) This Committee shall also nominate an Ordination Advisory Committee, consisting of five members, the duty of which shall be to examine all candidates for ordination who shall be referred to it by churches of the Association. Upon concluding such examination, this Committee shall notify the church requesting the examination as to the results thereof and shall make a full report concerning the same at the next meeting of the General Board.



- (4) It shall also nominate the Committee of Evangelism, consisting of five members, the duty of which shall be to devise plans whereby evangelism will be promoted throughout the churches of the Association. It shall also nominate any other committees which the Association in session may authorize.
- (e) A Committee of Trustees, consisting of three members, the duty of which shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other securities of said Association.
- (f) An Auditing Committee, consisting of three members, the duty which shall be to audit the Clerk-Treasurer's books annually and report to the Association.
- (g) The House and Grounds Committee for the Baptist Center consisting of three members, the duties of which shall be to make recommendations concerning the upkeep and repair of the home of the associational missionary to the General Board as such needs may arise, and to put into effect any recommendations concerning such which may be authorized by the General Board.

Nominations by the Committee shall not preclude nominations from the floor.

The Chairman of each of these committees, with the exception of the committee on Order of Business, will be designated by the committee on committees.

**SECTION C.** An Associational Calendar Committee to be composed of Vice-Moderator, as Chairman, Superintendent of Missions, Sunday School Superintendent, W. M. U. Superintendent, Brotherhood President, Training Union Director, Music Director and Librarian.

When a member of a committee or a general officer of the Baptist Training Union, Sunday School, Brotherhood, Music Education Committee, or the Associational Missions Council moves out of the Association or moves his or her membership from a cooperating missionary Baptist Church of the Association, he thereby relinquishes his committee membership or office, as the case may be. The vacancy thus created will be filled by the standing Committee on Nominations designed at the previous associational meeting.

## **THE GENERAL BOARD**

**ARTICLE 13:** At each annual session a General Board shall be appointed by the Association, which shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the Superintendent of Missions, Superintendent of Sunday School, Director of the Baptist Training Union, President of the Woman's Missionary Union, President of the Brotherhood, President of Gardner-Webb College, members of the Associational Missions Council, the pastor of each church composing the Association, retired ministers residing in and belonging to a church of the Association, and two members from each church, which members shall be nominated by the church and approved by the Association.

ARTICLE 14: This board shall hold meetings monthly at 10 o'clock on Monday after third Sunday in each month, or when called by Moderator, and shall exercise the functions and discharge the duties usually committed to an executive board or committee. The purpose and plan of this General Board in all its meetings shall be to promote the interest and carry forward the work of the Association and of its constituent churches as this work is outlined in Article 5. The General Board shall act for the Association between sessions except as specifically limited by the constitution.

ARTICLE 15: In case of emergency the General Board may select a time and place and arrange for a special business session of the Association; provided that the business of such extra session shall be limited to the object for which it was convened, and the membership of such special business session shall be made up of the messengers elected by the churches and accredited to the previous regular session.

### THE MISSIONS COUNCIL

ARTICLE 16: The Association shall elect annually an Associational Missions Council composed of sixteen members.

ARTICLE 17: Said Council shall meet at least three times annually. The first meeting shall be convened by the Moderator within ten days following the annual associational meeting at which the council was elected. At the first meeting a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Secretary shall be selected and the council shall divide itself into such committees as seem necessary to provide a well rounded and worthy associational missions program and emphasis. It shall have at least the following committees:

- (1) Administration and Finance. This committee shall have general oversight of the work of the Superintendent of Missions and shall report to the Association in Annual Session and to the General Board as deemed necessary by the Committee. In case of a vacancy occurring in the office of associational Superintendent of Missions, this committee shall bring recommendations to the General Board as to replacement. This committee shall also make an associational budget to be presented to the Association providing for financing the work for the coming year.
- (2) Missionary Planning. This committee shall survey communities in need of Baptist work and ministry; seek to enlist churches to sponsor work in such communities; give guidance and assistance in proper location and organization of new Baptist work; provide information for and make recommendations to the Association to missionary needs which might be met by cooperative efforts; provide information to the State Mission Board which might be helpful in meeting missionary needs; consult with churches anticipating membership in the Association and make recommendations to the Association in matters of this kind; and to review requests coming from churches for loans and church assistance funds, as to their validity.

- (3) Institutional and Interracial. This committee shall seek to enlist churches to have a worthy part in ministry to folks in our public institutions, and to be of service as friend and brother in Christ to people among us of other races.

## **RULES OF ORDER**

RULE 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

RULE 2: All officers shall complete their work as soon as practicable after the closing of the session. The newly elected officers shall assume, at the close of the session, all duties incumbent upon said officers relating to the work of the ensuing associational year.

RULE 3: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

RULE 4: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject, except by the permission of the Association.

RULE 5: Messengers present from one-half of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

RULE 6: All questions shall be decided by majority vote of the members present except changes in the constitution, which shall require two-thirds vote of those present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association the first day it is in session and voted on the second day.

RULE 7: All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided by general parliamentary laws by Kerfoot.

RULE 8: The term of office of the moderator shall be limited to two years.

## **CONFESSIONS OF FAITH**

1. We believe the Scripture of the Old and New Testament to be a divinely inspired revelation from God.

2. We accept the New Testament alone as revealing the only plan of salvation and as the final authority in all matters of church policy and practice.

3. We believe Jesus Christ as revealed in the New Testament to be the Son of God and the divine Saviour of all who truly accept Him as such.

4. We believe in the personality of the Holy Spirit, and in His abiding presence with the spirit of all the elect of God, in His quickening presence with the spirit of the unregenerate moving to repentance and faith, in His witnessing presence with the spirit of the regenerate, in His comforting and guidance throughout life, in His sustaining presence in the experience of death, and in His continuing presence in the life to come.

5. We believe salvation is attained through spiritual regeneration in the act of repentance and acceptance of Jesus as Savior.

6. Sincere spiritual redemption was made available by the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus, we believe that every regenerate person should symbolize his own salvation by being buried with Him in baptism.

7. We believe that a local church modeled after the New Testament order is a company of regenerate persons voluntarily joined together for the purpose of extending God's Kingdom on earth.

8. We believe that each church should from time to time, as a congregation, celebrate the Lord's Supper as a memorial to Him.

9. We believe in the ultimate triumph of God's Kingdom over all opposing powers, and that every regenerate soul shall have a share in that triumph.

## PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE HUNDRED-FOURTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

**Thursday Morning, October 22, 1964.**

1. As the messengers of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association gathered at Waco Baptist Church for the one hundred-fourteenth Annual Session on October 22, 1964, Mrs. Dennis Larkins played a 10 minute organ prelude.

2. At 9:00 A. M. the moderator, James Holder, called to order the 114th annual session.

3. Mr. Joe Blanton of Second Church, Shelby, accompanied by Mrs. D. Larkins and Mrs. Joe Blanton, led in singing "O Worship The King."

4. Rev. Floyd Willis of Westover Church led the opening prayer.

5. The Clerk announced that 275 messengers had registered and made the motion that these and others who will register be elected to constitute the 114th annual session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. It was so ordered.

6. Rev. Ernest Arnold presented the program with following changes:

(1). That under the items at 10:15 the name, Hubert Huneycutt be changed to Morris Jordan.

(2). That Mr. Cyrus Bazemore, representative of the Biblical Recorder, be given 5 minutes at 11:25.

(3). That under the reports at 1:55 P. M. the name, Dr. Zeno Wall be changed to Rev. Roger Williams, representative of the Children's Homes.

(4). That at 9:35 on Friday, Rev. T. W. Bray, be given time to bring a report on the American Bible Society.

(5). That time also be given to Rev. Lawrence Roberts for a report on Church World Service (C. R. O. P.)  
The program was approved as changed.

7. The moderator appointed the Committee on Committees (To report in 1965 as changed in the constitution last year). They are: Rev. Max Linnens, Chairman, Rev. Norman Brown, Rev. Floyd Willis, Rev. Oscar Funderburke, Rev. Richard Plyler.

8. Mrs. James Stamey, introduced by Joe Blanton, came with

special music, "I'll Tell The World I Am A Christian." She was accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Joe Blanton.

9. The moderator introduced Dr. A. B. Wood (Retired), who brought the inspirational message, "For Such A Time As This." He used Esther 4:14 as a text.

10. Brother Blanton led the hymn "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing."

11. Rev. Leroy Sisk, Associational Clerk-Treasurer, referred to the General Board report, auditors report, the proposed budget, and the statistical information in the advanced book of reports and moved its adoption. After a period discussion the Clerk-Treasurer's report was unanimously adopted.

12. Dr. W. Wyan Washburn, Historian, unable to be present, sent word for the Clerk to offer his report. In his report he asked that the Historical Committee be enlarged to ten members for the purpose of studying the possibility of writing a history of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. He also called attention to the microfilming of church records this past year and offered a display showing a microfilm reader and microfilm from 47 churches in the Association. The adoption was unanimous.

13. The moderator instructed Allen Jolley, Chairman of the Nominating Committee to enlarge the historian's committee as directed. It was so ordered.

14. James Stamey, Chairman of Evangelism, presented his report which was adopted.

15. The following persons came to give reports with special emphasis on contribution to worship:

(1). Report on Sunday School work was given by Rev. W. V. Tarlton who emphasized the job of the Sunday School as bringing people to the high hour of public worship. His report was adopted.

(2). Rev. Marion DuBose, spoke of contribution of the Training Union to worship. In his report he stressed that Training Union trains members in the true meaning of worship. His report was adopted.

(3). Mrs. W. E. McSwain, Associational W. M. U. leader, presented her report in the form of a choral reading with quiet music in the background. The report emphasized what the W. M. U. can do to aid worship. Her report was approved.

(4). Mr. J. C. Bissette presented the contribution of the Brotherhood to worship. He expressed deep concern for decline in the work of the Brotherhood and asked that each church open itself wide to the blessing that Christ offers to each one. His report was adopted.

(5). In the absence of Mr. Hubert Huneycutt, Morris Jordan brought the report on Church Music. He spoke on the contribution of

Music as a vital part of worship from the prelude throughout the entire service, and also should be used in family and private devotions. His report was adopted.

(6). Mr. A. W. Kincaid from First Baptist Church in Kings Mountain spoke on the contribution of Christian Stewardship to worship. He pointed out that one without the other is an impossibility. The report was adopted.

(7). Bringing the contribution of the Home to Worship was Mrs. C. D. Forney, Jr. She referred to Matthew 7:24-27 and related the need for strong Christian Homes. Her report was adopted.

16. Joe Blanton led congregation in singing the hymn "Come We That Love The Lord."

17. The moderator recognized new pastors who came into the Association since last year's meeting. There were 16:

18. Pastor of the host church came with welcome and instructions on the noon meal. He expressed appreciation to all the churches in the Waco group for their help in preparing the noon meal.

19. Mr. C. W. Bazemore brought words of greeting from the **Biblical Recorder**. He praised the Kings Mountain Association for its high subscription percentage.

20. The Clerk made a motion that special tribute be given to Dr. Zeno Wall, retired, former pastor of First Baptist, Shelby, for 23 years, and to W. Wyan Washburn, M. D.—layman from Boiling Springs Church who has spent many hours and unceasing effort in the collecting and recording historical information of the Association. The motion was unanimously adopted.



21. The moderator offered a word of thanks to Rev. Ernest Arnold, Chairman, and other members of the Committee on Order of Business for the excellent program.

22. Joe Blanton led the congregation in singing the Hymn "Ready."

23. The Gardner-Webb Ensemble Choir, led by Jerry Hill sang the following numbers: "O Sacred Head Now Wounded", "God So Loved The World", "Jesus Said to the Blind Man".

24. Rev. C. O. Greene came with the report of the Superintendent of Missions and moved its adoption. In his message, "The Contribution of the Association to Worship", he stressed, the definition of worship, the definition of the church, and how the Association seeks to contribute to all the members of all the churches. The report was unanimously adopted.

25. Rev. C. O. Greene closed the morning session with prayer and thanksgiving for the noon meal.

### Thursday Afternoon

26. The afternoon session began promptly at 1:15 P. M.

27. Mr. Yates Pearson, Minister of Music at Bethel Church, led the messengers in singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name."

28. Rev. Bill Shytle, pastor of Allen Memorial Church, led in the opening prayer.

29. Ministers of Music, Yates Pearson, Joe Blanton, Morris Jordan, Allen Jolley, Bob Decker, with Roland Leath at the piano sang "A Mighty Fortress."

30. The Doctrinal Sermon, brought by James Stamey, was on the "Doctrine of Sin."

31. The hymn "Fairest Lord Jesus" was led by Yates Pearson.

32. Dr. W. Wyan Washburn brought words of appreciation to the messengers for accepting his earlier report and for approving the additional members of the committee. He called attention to the set-up of the micro-film and invited messengers to personally examine samples of the historical records.

33. Dr. John Hamrick, referred to the Report of the Baptist Hospital and asked its adoption. Chaplain Kenneth Burnette spoke on the report and emphasized that the hospital ministry was three-fold: spiritual, physical and mental health. The report carried.

34. In the absence of Dr. Zeno Wall the moderator asked for adoption of the report on the Children's Homes. Rev. Roger Williams spoke on the report. The report was unanimously approved.

35. Mr. Walter Davis, representative of the Homes for the Aging, called attention to his report in the book of advanced reports and called

for its adoption. He pointed out that 49 churches made contributions to the Homes this year. He introduced Rev. William Poole, Superintendent of the Homes, who spoke on the report. It was adopted.

36. Dr. Eugene Poston, president of Gardner-Webb College brought the report on Christian Education and moved its adoption. He emphasized the word "Christian" as descriptive of the education which our Baptist Colleges seek to maintain. The report was approved.

37. The clerk presented a request from Emmanuel Baptist Church that they be received into the fellowship of the Association under watch care for one year. There were no opposing votes, and Emmanuel Church became the 70th church in the Association.

38. The Nominating Committee named additional members to the Historical Committee. They were unanimously elected. The full committee will appear in the section of the Associational Committees in the annual minutes.

39. Yates Pearson led the messengers in singing the hymn "Majestic Sweetness".

40. Joe Blanton accompanied by Mrs. Blanton sang, from the "Messiah", "If With All Your Hearts".

41. The moderator introduced Dr. Forrest Feezor, interim pastor, First Church, Shelby, who brought the closing message of the day. He spoke on, "Dedication: A Requirement for Worship".

42. Dr. Feezor offered the benediction and prayer of adjournment.

### **Friday Morning, October 22, 1964.**

43. Mrs. Dennis Larkins played a 5 minute organ prelude.

44. Morris Jordan, accompanied by Mrs. Larkins and Mrs. Blanton, led the messengers in singing the hymns "For The Beauty of the Earth", and "Jesus Shall Reign."

45. The opening prayer was led by Rev. Hugh Borders.

46. Bringing the missionary message was Rev. C. A. Kirby, Jr. He spoke on "The Power and the Prize."

47. Rev. James Wilder brought the report on the Annuity Board and explained the new "Life Benefit Plan."

48. Rev. Dennis Larkins, substituting for Rev. Tom Bray brought a report on the American Bible Society.

49. Rev. Lawrence Roberts gave a report on Church World Service (C. R. O. P.). He reported that up to date our area had contributed \$900.00.

50. The Clerk offered words of appreciation to Mrs. Fred Crisp, Association secretary, and to Mrs. Leroy Sisk for their efficient work in preparing the book of advanced reports.

51. Morris Jordan announced a change in time for the Christmas Carol sing from the twenty second of December to the fifteenth of December, to be held at the Double Springs Church.

52. Dennis Larkins offered a motion that beginning with the 116th annual session of the Association (1966) to begin on Thursday Evening after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association was disposed of. A second, by W. V. Tarlton, was heard. There was no opposition and it is so ordered.

53. Lawrence Roberts, Chairman of Committee on Committees brought a slate of Committee members for the coming year. They were all elected and will appear elsewhere in the minutes.

54. Wilson Harmon, Chairman of the Place and Preacher Committee nominated the following for the meeting of 1965:

Inspirational sermon, Rev. Coy Dellinger

Missionary Sermon, Rev. Wilson Padgett

Doctrinal Sermon, Rev. L. M. Tenery

The places of meeting were designated, for the first day, Lawndale; for the second day, Zion. It was so ordered.

55. Allen Jolley, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the list of Nominations for the Associational offices for the coming year. They were duly elected and will appear elsewhere in the minutes.

56. Rev. Hamlin Cathey, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, offered resolutions which are found elsewhere in the minutes. They were approved as read.

57. The moderator called attention to the need for extended time if other business is considered. A motion was heard that time be extended five minutes. The motion passed.

58. The moderator called for the election of Associational Officers:

(1). Rev. Wilson Harmon placed in nomination James Holder for moderator. Brother Raines make a second to the motion. No other nomination was heard and Dennis Larkins moved that the nominations cease. Rev. C. O. Greene came to moderate the motion and James Holder was elected by acclamation.

(2). Rev. E. M. Smith placed in nomination Rev. Ernest Arnold for vice-moderator. The motion received a second by Rev. Phipps and Rev. Summey made a motion that nominations cease and that Rev. Arnold be elected by acclamation.

(3). Rev. C. A. Kirby nominated Rev. Leroy Sisk for Clerk-Treasurer. The nomination received a second and Rev. Floyd Willis moved that nominations cease. The vote was by acclamation.

(4). Nominations for Associational Historian was heard and Rev. Max Linnens nominated Dr. Wyan Washburn who was unanimously

elected with the suggestion that he be commended for his work as Associational Historian.

59. Visitors were recognized and Rev. Carl Greene, a former pastor in the Association, was among those visiting.

60. Mr. O. P. Hamrick brought the report on Memorials. Three ministers were among those who have gone on to be with the Lord this year. A page in memory of Rev. C. E. Oxford, an active pastor at the time of his death, will appear in the minutes.

61. The following reports were given with special emphasis on their contribution to worship.

(1). The Report on Christian Literature, in the absence of Max Burgin, was referred to by the moderator who called for its adoption. Mr. John Roberts, Editor of Charity and Children spoke on the report. It was adopted.

(2). Home Mission Report was brought by Dr. J. T. Gillespie. He spoke specifically on the work in the Chicago area. His report was adopted.

(3). Foreign Mission report was given by Rev. R. L. McGaha who gave a comprehensive description of the phases of our foreign mission work. His report was unanimously accepted.

(4). The Cooperative Program report was brought by Dr. E. L. Spivey. He spoke convincingly on the plan of the Cooperative effort of Baptists to carry out the command of our Lord.

62. With no other business or announcements to come before the Association, the moderator called on Rev. Ernest Arnold to lead in the closing prayer of the 114th Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

## BY-LAWS FOR ASSOCIATIONAL

## WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

## ARTICLE I

## NAME

The name of this organization shall be Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

## ARTICLE II

## OBJECT

The object shall be to promote Christian missions through the organizations of Woman's Missionary Union in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

## ARTICLE III

## RELATIONSHIPS

Section 1. Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to Kings Moun-

tain Baptist Association, shall be the liaison organization between church organizations and the N. C. Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 2. This associational Union shall recognize the autonomy of church organizations as provided in the Baptist democratic process of operation.

Section 3. Church organizations shall be recognized as units through which the object of this Woman's Missionary Union is accomplished, each responsible for its own program, and contributing to the work of the association.

Section 4. This associational Union shall be guided in its plan of work by the associational aims for Advancement.

#### ARTICLE IV

##### MEMBERS

The members of Woman's Missionary Union organizations in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association shall constitute the membership.

#### ARTICLE V

##### OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, YWA Director, GA Director, Sunbeam Band Director, and others as needed. These officers shall be elected annually in a meeting of the associational WMU and shall hold office for one year or until their successors are elected. The tenure of office shall be 5 consecutive years.

Section 2. These officers shall perform the duties set out for them in these By-Laws and the leaflet, "The Associational WMU."

#### ARTICLE VI

##### NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

Section 1. The nominating committee composed of 5 women shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee, and elected by the associational WMU to serve for one year.

Section 2. The nominating committee shall nominate officers and promotional directors. Other nominations may be made from the floor.

Section 3. The nominating committee, in event of a vacancy, shall present a nominee for the unexpired term for election by the associational WMU (or the Executive Committee).

#### ARTICLE VII

##### MEETINGS

Section 1. Day and/or night Associational WMU meetings (including business women) shall be held annually.

Section 2. Other meetings shall be held as authorized by the Executive Committee.

## ARTICLE VIII

### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the officers, promotional directors and any others desired.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall schedule the regular meetings of the organizations, plan the program of activities, hear reports and check progress on the Aims for Advancement.

Section 3. Regular meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held quarterly.

## ARTICLE IX

### PROMOTIONAL DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be directors of mission study, prayer, community missions, stewardship, and others as needed.

Section 2. These directors shall furnish information for corresponding local chairmen, hold conferences, and carry out other plans as authorized by the Executive Committee.

## ARTICLE X

### COMMITTEES

Section 1. There shall be committees standing or special as needed.

Section 2. Committees, except those otherwise provided for, shall be appointed by the president.

Section 3. The president shall be ex-officio member of all committees except the nominating committee.

Section 4. The duties of these committees are such as are set forth in these By-Laws and the leaflet, "The Associational WMU."

## ARTICLE XI

### FINANCES

Section 1. The associational WMU shall adopt an annual budget, funds to be provided by WMU organizations in the Association.

Section 2. These funds will be on a 25 cents per member basis, and are to be sent to the Associational Treasurer within two months following the Annual Associational meeting.

## ARTICLE XII

## PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained in Robert's RULES OF ORDER, REVISED or the Parliamentary section in the WMU Year Book shall govern the Union in all cases to which they are applicable.

## ARTICLE XIII

## AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the associational WMU provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.

1. Perhaps we cannot stand material prosperity—No nation ever has for long. Like Israel after every great advance came a falling away. Perhaps the world is too much with us.

2. The three shift and rotating shift economy. Many people are working while we are having our service at church. Many others are sleeping. In many homes the only time the family is together is on Sunday.

3. The Week-End Vacationists that is tending to become more and more a pattern of life for millions of people.

4. Our shifting population that sends our young people away and replaces them with people of other or no faiths.

5. Our neglect of adults.

Our dependence upon Government rather than God and the church. Things don't look too good. Yet God is in his heaven and would control our hearts. Our denominational leaders are becoming aroused. Our churches are becoming anxious. Our hearts are beginning to move. Our prayers are beginning to rise for help and strength.

The "Adult Thrust" is being planned and pursued with the fervent hope and prayer that we may be roused before it is too late.

We have chosen a fine leader for the coming year to lead us out and up.

Let us wake up to the seriousness of the problems that face us. Let us pray the Lord of the Harvest for workers dedicated to God and to others. Let us give ourselves to the finding and winning the multitudes who flee from home to the resorts, the feasts and recreation spots; that God's house may be filled with worshipping, witnessing willing servants of God. We dare not do less than our best.

## REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSIONS

The call of our Lord almost two thousand years ago, "Go ye into all the world and make disciples—", is just as new, vibrant, important,

and authentic today as it was when first issued. Baptists of all areas of America, including our's have moved without excitement, but very gently and carefully in response to this supreme and urgent request of our Lord. As a result of our careful movement, when this call was one thousand, nine hundred and forty eight years old, and one hundred and seventy two years after the Declaration of Independence of Christian America, we had six hundred and twenty five Missionaries in nineteen countries of the world. Today, with our continued careful movement, we have at present, one thousand, eight hundred and eighty four Missionaries serving in fifty six countries of the world.

We rejoice in that we have over eighteen hundred valiant souls serving our Lord in foreign lands, however, it is definitely time for us to share in the excitement of Dr. Cauthen and all missionary personnel in the fact that in the world there lives three billion, two hundred and fifty million people, and all are in foreign lands except one hundred and ninety million. Per capita in the foreign land, in response to our Lord's call, we have one witness per every five hundred thousand souls. That means that since our Lord's appeal, billions have died never hearing of Jesus and billions living today will die never hearing the story of our precious Saviour.

What to do about a lost world? Face the facts and be guided by a spiritual consciousness:

Fact one; Read again and reappraise the authenticity of the command of Jesus.

Fact two; Analyze the sorrow that must be in heaven when our sixty-nine churches in the Kings Mountain Association gave the past year for all missions; Home, State, Foreign, Community, Associational, Schools, Hospitals, Homes for Children, Aged, etc.—a total of 28 cents per week per capita membership. Is the approximate price of one package of cigarettes per week per Kings Mountain Baptist, spent for the appeal of our Lord in behalf of three and a quarter billion people a correct barometric reading of our convictions in the atoning blood of Jesus, and the veracity of His statement—"Go tell?"

Fact three; place world missions in our worship; let the knowledge of foreign missions be secured by every pastor, Sunday School teacher and officer, Training Union leader, Brotherhood leaders and W. M. U. officers. Let leaders learn the tenets of World Missions and place them in every week's services. Thus, bringing knowledge to those we serve will increase gifts over 28 cents per capita for a lost world.

We cannot educate our people, nor inject into our worship and training, something that we do not know about. Few churches of our sixty-nine has a combined leadership staff that can name over 6 of the 56 countries served by foreign missions, or over 12 of the 1800 plus Missionaries, or over 3 types of services rendered. If the thousands of leaders in sixty-nine churches will learn and inject world missions in every program, Kings Mountain Association will double North Carolina

Baptists' reach by the power of Him who said—"All power is Mine—go tell—".

## VISUAL AID REPORT

During the past year the use of Audio Visual Aids was accelerated in the Kings Mountain Association. "The Education Division of Broadman Films Department" of the Sunday School Board launched a New Program Service to the churches called: "Church Audio Visual Education" plan or "CAVE" plan. In such plan, associations with 20 churches participating in the new plan could acquire films and equipment at greatly reduced cost.

Mr. Neil E. Jackson, Broadman Films representative, working in our association in the distribution of the Visual Aids equipment, reported that 22 of our churches entered the Visual Aids plan offered by the Sunday School Board. Eighteen of these churches purchased the 16MM projectors under the new discount plan. Several more of the churches are planning to enter the "CAVE" plan.

A recent letter from the Films department to your representative, states that 1,040 churches have taken advantage of this opportunity of Films service. The Kings Mountain Association was the second association in the state of North Carolina to enter the plan. Careful and prayerful use of Visual Aids will greatly bless our churches.

## REPORT OF THE MUSIC EDUCATION COMMITTEE

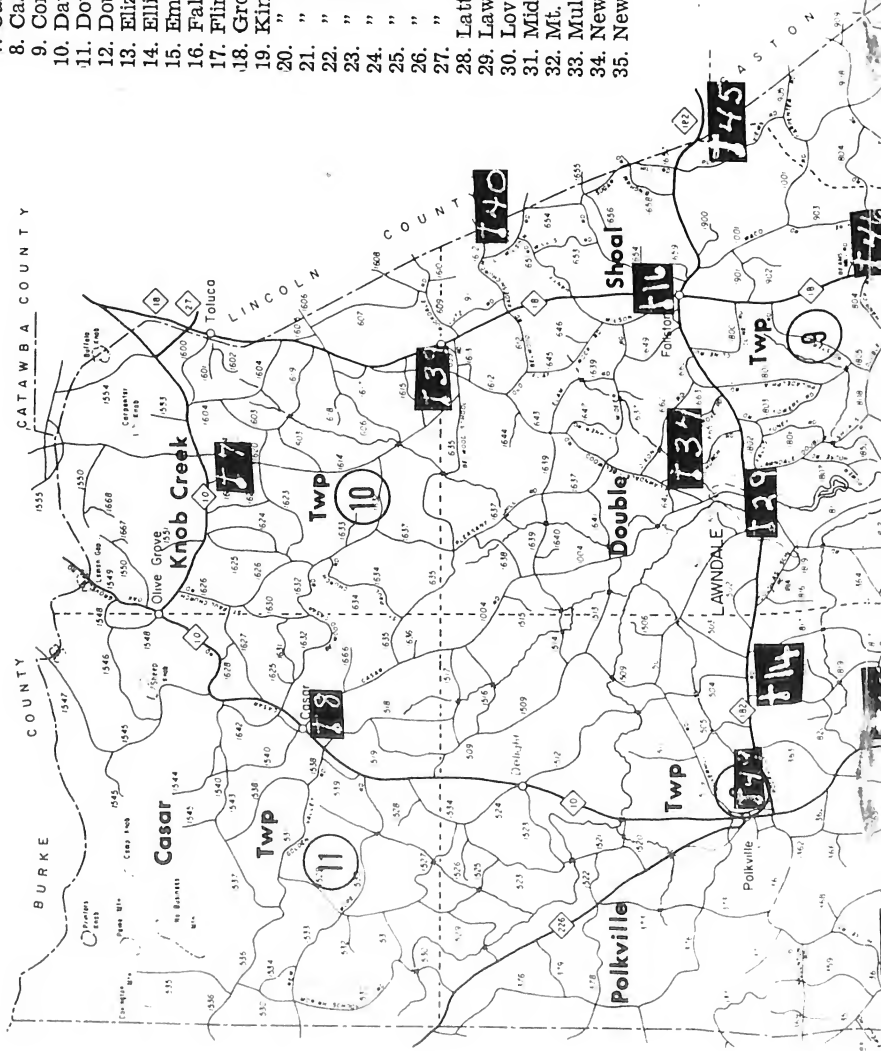

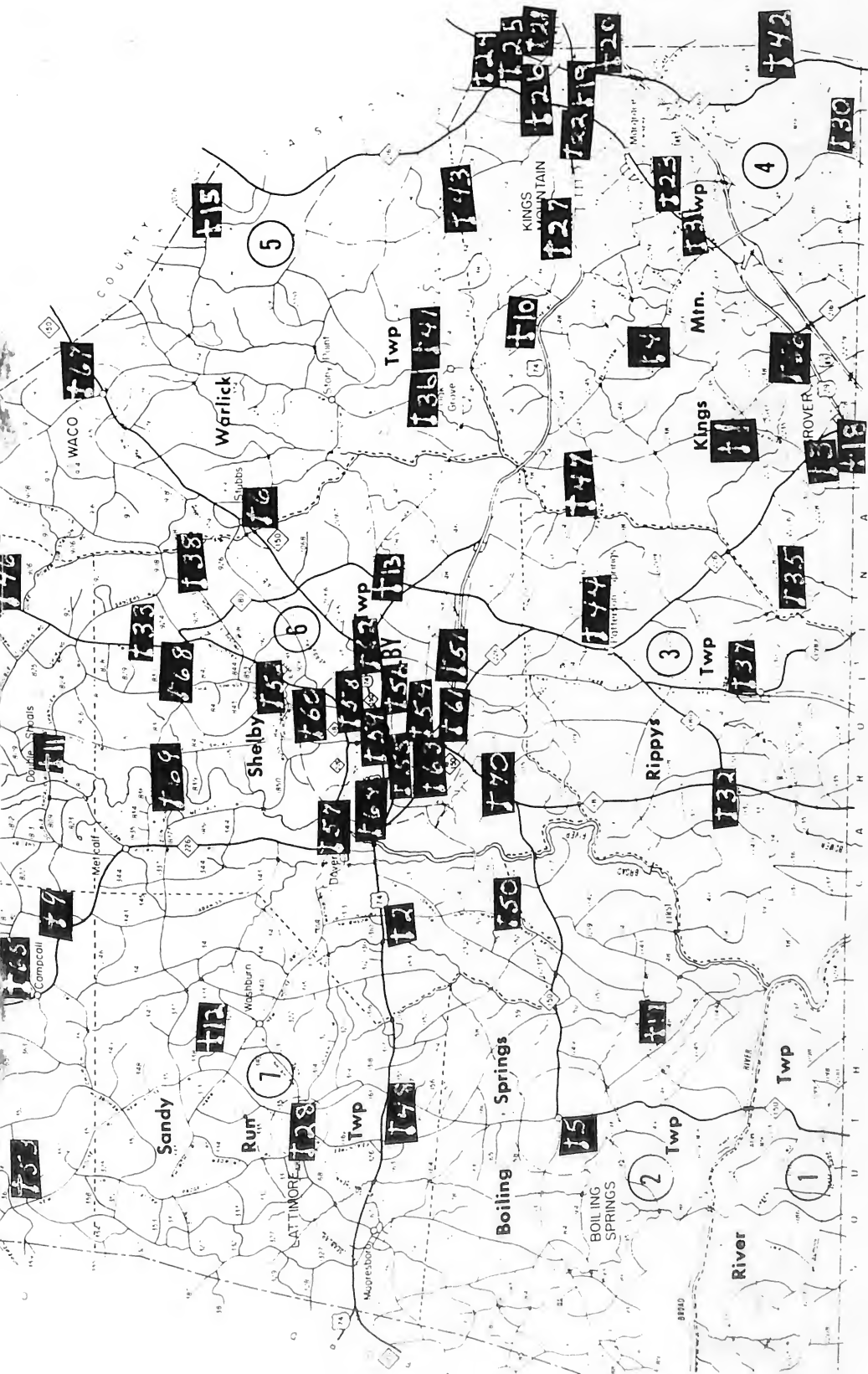
Many Choirs from several churches attended the Regional Festival held at the Elizabeth church and later attended the State Festival.

## BROTHERHOOD REPORT

Out of much research and prayerful study has come a wider and more adequate concept of the nature and work of Brotherhood. This new concept may be stated as follows: "A Brotherhood is a fellowship of Baptist men, members of the church, organized to advance the cause of Christ through a program of missionary education and the promotion of missionary activities, designed to inform, motivate and involve men in the mission task of their church."

A study of the developing programs of the other church organizations reveals that the only organization in the church with a program of missionary education and missions promotion involving men (and boys) is the Brotherhood. This means, of course, that if a church is to accept the recommendations of our denominational leaders to provide men and boys with missionary education opportunities and missionary service opportunities, such opportunities will be offered through the Brotherhood.

The new concept of Brotherhood points to the following great objectives for Brotherhood: To lead men to—

1. A deeper commitment to missions
2. A more meaningful prayer life for missions
3. A larger stewardship on behalf of missions
4. A personal involvement in missions

No change in the present Brotherhood organizational structure will be necessary. However, there will be a development and a new alignment of the four major Brotherhood emphases, and the setting of each on a solid missionary base. World Missions, for instance, will emphasize missionary education and commitment to missions. Developed in the area of Personal Stewardship will be an added emphasis on the support of missions. The area of Christian Witnessing will be tied on



directly to Christian service through missionary activities and involvement; and work in Royal Ambassadors will be pointed towards missions advance.

### HOME MISSION REPORT 1964

According to Webster worship means "reverence paid to worth." Reverence means "profound respect mingled with love and awe." Respect means "consider worthy of esteem." Esteem means "warmth of feeling or close attachment." The greatest worth known to man is God. And hence a practical definition of worship is an act or declaration of warm feeling of love and awe from one who has a close personal attachment to God.

This kind of worship is the supreme objective of the Home Mission Board in all its programs of service. I mention three of those programs by way of illustration.

1. Evangelism or spiritual enlightenment. The natural man is in spiritual darkness, blind, dead in sins. Except he be born again he cannot see kingdom truths. To be born again one must approach Christ not from the understanding but from the heart - not by sight but by faith. Warmhearted preaching the gospel is essential to the generation of such faith.

The Home Mission Board's Department of Evangelism was started some 15 years ago. Since that time the number of baptisms in Southern Baptist churches has increased from around 250,000 to about 400,000 per year. This has been brought about largely through evangelistic conferences held in cooperation with state personnel and local pastors.

This work in evangelism is also carried on by chaplains who work with our armed forces in various parts of the world and under the general direction of the Home Mission Board. In more recent years the chaplain is finding his place in hospitals, penal institutions, and industrial plants. Thus worship is finding its way into the everyday affairs of men. And in many instances churches are being born as a result of the chaplain's work.

2. Establishing new churches. This effort has been emphasized in the West and North. The need for new churches has been brought about primarily by the phenomenal growth of our cities. The population of our cities since 1900 has increased from 30 million to 120 million—a 400% increase. From 1950 to 1960 85% of our population growth has been in the cities. By 1975 it is predicted that our city population will be 60 million more than in 1950. This kind of growth is not without its dangers.

Henlee Barnette has pointed out that Catholicism and secularism often accompany increased industrialism and organization. For example, New England has become highly industrialized. Its people were once 95% Protestant but are now 95% Roman Catholic. Evidences of this type of change are showing up in different parts of the nation.

These nation-wide changes demand nation-wide plans for providing worship. To let the cities grow without Baptist churches is to encourage secularization. With a sufficient number of churches among the people worship has a chance; without them worship has no chance. This is the philosophy prompting the Home Mission Board in its program of starting new churches throughout the nation. Its accomplishments in this realm are impressive.

Look at Chicago for example. Southern Baptist churches have increased in number in this city from 6 in 1950 to more than 150 now. The Chicago Southern Baptist Association was formed in 1957 with 11 churches. Their territory includes 2 counties with approximately 6 million people. They now (7 years later) have 56 churches with a total membership of 8,942 and gifts last year of nearly  $\frac{3}{4}$  million dollars. In its annual meeting last week this 7-year old association reported 9 new churches, 8 missions, 2305 additions to the churches, 968 baptisms, S. S. enrollment 8567, T. U. 4136, total value of property \$2,781,600.

The Big City Program of the Home Mission Board has been responsible for eleven of these churches, while the board has helped otherwise in most all of the others. One of the eleven is the First Baptist Church of Hoffman Estates, a community of 13,000 people with no Baptist church when Lewis Lowe of Atlanta began work there in a new mission, on May 25, 1958. There were 17 people present in his first service. By September 20 the next year they were ready to constitute the church with 46 charter members. The church now has 200 members - 57 of them added during the last year - 37 by baptism. The church has a budget this year of \$315 per Sunday and the offerings to date are a little ahead of the budget requirements. Within this same time the church has sponsored 2 missions, both of which have now become churches with 81 and 43 members respectively.

In these few years the Home Mission Board has seen churches increase in Chicago as follows: 1957, 11 churches, the next year 18. Then 25, 31, 38, 43, 48, and this year 56. Of the 12,692 members added 5,105 of them were by baptism. And Chicago is only one of the cities where the Home Mission Board works.

3. In the third place the Home Mission Board has been aiding in worship through the rehabilitation of rural churches. If the preaching of the gospel is the greatest aid in worship then the frequency of gospel preaching would seem to be a fair measure of the progress of worship in the churches. In its Rural Church Program the Home Mission Board has considered that full-time preaching should be the norm for all churches - even rural churches. To that end it set its efforts. Steadily through the years we have seen the decreasing number of churches

with part-time preaching. For example, in 1951 there were 11,927 churches in the Southern Baptist Convention with part-time preaching. In 1963 this number had been reduced to 4,501. At the same time the number of full-time churches increased from 16,362 to 28,604.

In many of our rural communities church attendance had lost much of its deep significance. In others the church had never reached its highest potential in worship. An editorial in last month's Moody Monthly says that "one of the most dangerous things a Christian can do is to attend church casually." The argument is that "not only has God been robbed of what was rightly his; but the capacity of the Christian to commune with God and enjoy real fellowship with Him has been sadly impaired."

Too many churches retained the form of worship but were lacking in power. They recognized the importance of ritualism in worship but permitted their lack of ritual to become a ritual within itself, and thus their attention to form (whether ritualistic or free) robbed the meetings of the deepest benefits of real worship. The Home Mission Board's prayer and hope has been that the increased frequency of preaching in the churches will help the people to gain or regain some of the power of real worship in a society so greatly in need of the demonstration of the power of our spiritual God.

## REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

"Life being very short, and the quiet hours of it few, we ought to waste none of them in reading valueless books." Ruskin

This is not a report as much as it is an urgency for more and better church libraries. More than fifty per cent of the churches in our Association are without this service.

The church library has the special privilege of bringing books to serve people who ordinarily do not seek them in other places. The churches as divinely constituted are the world's greatest institutions.

The church is so very important being the only eternal business in the world and should have the best trained and best qualified staff of workers that any institution could have. Church workers are volunteers, and of course, it is impossible to get together a force of workers already thoroughly trained for the task. It cannot be hoped that as they enter service they shall have all the mental and spiritual preparation that is needed, but it can be hoped that they will study to become well trained and informed. And that their spiritual lives may be deepened and strengthened as they study.

These workers cannot personally afford, nor be expected to afford, a private library of all the books and periodicals which they need to help them to grow spiritually and better fit them for this task.

Books can lift their readers to the heights or plunge them to the depths. Printing presses are daily pouring out thousands of books and magazines. At sometime in the past they have turned out pictures of crime and evil, of "isms" and false teachings, and today there is a harvest of the sowings. They have also turned out word-pictures of beauty and goodness, and there are, likewise, fruits from them. What a blessing it would be to have some part in saving readers from that which will harm them, and substitute that which will strengthen and beautify their lives.

Every church is sorely missing a real opportunity for spiritual service until it establishes and utilizes a good library of its very own.

## GARDNER-WEBB COLLEGE

Mr. Toliver Davis, Chairman, Board of Trustees

Gardner-Webb College began the 57th year with an enrollment of 838 students in the regular college, 81 students in the evening college, and 22 students in a graduate course offered by Appalachian State Teachers College on the Gardner-Webb campus. This is a total of 941 students being served by the college. There are 64 members of the faculty, the staff, and the administration.

The above enrollment figures represent 57 counties in North Carolina, 14 states and the District of Columbia, and four foreign countries. We have foreign students from Lebanon, Cuba, Peru, and Scotland. A student from Jordan has been accepted and will enroll for the second semester.

A review of the faculty reveals that 54 of the 64 are Southern Baptists. The other 10 represent the Presbyterian, the Methodist, and the Lutheran denominations. We have one foreign teacher, Dr. Mario A. Suarez, who taught for 33 years in a Presbyterian College in Cuba. Our faculty, administration, and staff represent 119 degrees and have studied at 51 colleges and universities.

Baptists make up approximately 71% of the student body at Gardner-Webb College. However, the following denominations are represented: Methodist, Presbyterian, Episcopalian, Lutheran, Catholic, Moravian, Church of Christ, United Church of Christ, A. R. P., Society of Friends (Quaker), Free Will Baptist, Congregationalist, Jewish, Brethren, Southern Methodist, First Church of God, Congregational Christian, Christian, Christian Missionary Alliance, Greek Orthodox, Wesleyan Methodist, and Non-Denominational.

Registration records revealed a total of 30 unchurched students. A program of personal and mass evangelism is underway to lead these students to experience the Christian birth.

During the past year the college lost one of her dearest friends and benefactors in the death of Mr. I. A. McLain of Marion. However, his Christian influence will live on in the lives of the faculty, the staff, and the administration and a host of others who knew of his dedication to his church, denomination, and Gardner-Webb College. He was serving as a member of the Board of Trustees of Gardner-Webb College at the time of his death. His widow, Mrs. I. A. McLain, is presently serving on the Board of Advisors of the College.

The trustees of the college made a forward move during the past year when they authorized the administration of the college to employ a professional fund raising organization to make a survey of the area to determine whether or not a capital needs campaign would be successful at this time. The survey revealed that such a campaign would be well received by the people of the area. Therefore, the firm of Marts and Lundy of New York City has been employed to conduct such a campaign beginning November 1, 1964. We hope to build the following buildings: Fine Arts - Chapel Building, Campus Center, Dormitory, and a Classrooms Building. Plans are underway to increase the college endowment to \$3,000,000. We must do these things if we are to meet the demands and needs of our Baptist people. At the present time we are forced to conduct the same chapel program twice each day in order to serve our students and faculty. Our other facilities are crowded to the limit.

During the past year the college endowment funds increased \$141,061.61 through gifts, bequests and savings, and the plant fund assets increased \$126,736.45. At the present time our endowment fund is valued at \$535,826.08. The physical plant at Gardner-Webb College is valued at \$3,000,000. All current bills were paid promptly and our total debt as of July 31, 1964, was \$185,000, which is being amortized monthly.

An analysis of Gardner-Webb College's outstanding loans as of October 1, 1963, shows the following picture:

Security—Endowment and Funds

### SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS REPORT

If I could sum up in two words the feeling which I sense in the work of our churches now, it would be "cautious optimism." As of this report there are few statistics available for comparison but there is a general feeling that our work is more encouraging.

To mention a few: For the first time 67 of our 69 churches have supported Associational Missions. The total given is the largest ever.

It is gratifying to notice that the balance, while not too large for a work such as ours, is better than it has been many times before. The Baptist Center has been put in nice shape with the outside painted, termites eradicated, and a new roof. Some much needed office equipment has been bought.

Beyond this, though, we are grateful for the greatly increased use of the Center. More and more Baptists are learning about it and are using the many resources found there.

There are encouraging notes in our church life. Most of the pastors and their people seem to sense the serious plight of our world and are making plans to increase the impact of the Christian faith in a world which so sorely needs it. Many of our churches have seen the need for increased support of their pastors and are accepting the challenge by financial increases. Pastors, in turn, are giving of themselves in whole-hearted devotion. There is increasing awareness on the part of the church that it must not only wait in worship but go in witness. The "Adult Thrust" has captured the imagination and enthusiasm of our people and these are moving toward reaching the adults in our church fields.

A word of appreciation is in order for the nearly 200 Associational officers who have served so well in the past. We are grateful to them and look forward to working with the new ones in the future.

This year in our Associational work we are beginning a shift in emphasis from the central, mass-meeting, type approach to one which seeks to meet specific needs in a local church or small group of churches. These workers, as resource persons, stand ready to help. Together let's explore the area of our needs and then try to meet them.

## BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT

In the modern world nothing stays around very long that doesn't have some definite purpose and mission. The BIBLICAL RECORDER, now 131 years old, grows in strength and stature because its course is fixed upon the primary purpose of service to the Baptists of North Carolina.

Never has there been a day when the Christian witness was more needed in dealing with the problems of the world. The church at work in the world needs all the information and insight it can get. Our democratic form of church government is founded upon the belief that people

will do the right thing when properly informed. To help Baptists fill these needs, the RECORDER seeks to do the following:

1. TO INFORM. Baptists cannot properly do until they properly know. With special attention to the interests and needs of Baptists in this state, the RECORDER staff gathers, sifts and publishes significant news from as many sources as possible. It keeps abreast of the important activities of the State Convention and its agencies and institutions. As much as possible, news from the wider circles of the Southern Baptist Convention and the entire Christian world is presented.

2. TO INTERPRET. Increasingly it is becoming necessary for responsible publications to help readers understand the meaning of events. The reasons are many. Daily the world becomes more complex and events and personalities become more entangled. Most people face such a flood of information and propaganda from every direction that it is hard to sort out the important things, set them in proper context and understand them. With the resources of full information, close contact with denominational leaders, pastors and others, plus many years of experience, the RECORDER seeks to say something about the meaning of events as well as reporting them.

3. TO INFLUENCE. Like the individual Christian, a Baptist paper has a responsibility to let its light shine in the world. A long record of service, integrity and courage has earned respect for the voice of the RECORDER both within and without the denomination. Proper use of that voice, lighted by the New Testament and conscience, is both a service and a sacred trust. Take the lead in seeing that every family in your church receives the RECORDER.

At present there are 2,650 copies of the RECORDER received each week in the Kings Mountain Association. We have 21 churches that have the Every Family Plan and 25 churches that have the Club Plan. This leaves a total of 13 churches in the Association which do not receive the RECORDER by any plan.

With vital issues facing our denomination each day we need to be well informed. We hope that in the coming year each family in each church will receive the RECORDER.

## HOMES FOR THE AGING REPORT

Our Baptists Homes have just completed their 13th year of operation and are entering into the 14th year with eager anticipation and with much enthusiasm. God has blessed these brief years with an abundance of His love and with the good things of life. Growth has been rapid, the development of facilities amazing, and the need for additional space staggering. We have come from 1 resident and 1 building, since the

March of 1951, to 160 residents and 4 buildings in 1964. Today there are 170 people waiting for admission. There are hundreds of inquires during any given year from aging persons who are sick, for whom we cannot care because of lack of bed patient space. We must give an answer to these good people and begin now making plans for a nursing facility that will be large enough to receive some of these who are sick, or invalids, at admission.

The choicest bit of news for 1964 is the development of a 5th Baptist Home, to be located at Yanceyville, North Carolina. We are hoping to begin construction on this new project during this year, and thus, the burden of our hearts will have been relieved, in a measure, by being able to care for 30 additional residents. The Home at Yanceyville is the greatest single bequest that has ever been left for us in our ministry. Enough land at Yanceyville and money were given to the Baptist Foundation of North Carolina for us, by the late R. Sterling Graves and his sister Mrs. Sallie Willie Graves Bradsher, to build and equip the Home there. Even so, we will still need to look to our Baptist people for the maintenance of this Home and for assistance in supplementing needy residents who will live there through the years.

Today North Carolina Baptists are contributing an average of \$90.00 a month on the cost of care of 90% of the residents who live in our four Baptist Homes at Resthaven and the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem, at the Albemarle Home and Hamilton Home. This support comes through the Special Day Offerings, received in the Churches on the third Sunday of February each Year, through designated gifts from church budgets, and through the Homes' share in the Cooperative Program. These needy residents could not possibly be with us, nor could they receive the loving care that they do, if it were not for the gifts from our 3400 Baptist churches. Earnest heed should be given by each church, therefore, towards increasing the amount of Special Day Offerings and designated gifts to the Homes. This should be emphasized especially in view of the fact that there was a 5% decline in gifts to the Homes during 1963. We will not have an accounting on gifts for 1964 until September, but we can only hope that there will be a considerable increase.

Life among the residents these days is most interesting and filled with a variety of experiences. The youngest resident celebrated her 66th birthday in January, and the oldest her 103rd birthday in July. Some are doing creative writing, others sewing, gardening, teaching, painting, and living a good life in general. All are praying for a world and its needs. All are expressing thanksgiving to God for the people called, "Baptists," and for the happiness and security of the Homes that our Baptist people are helping to make possible for them.

There is nothing to prevent our receiving any needy aging person, 65 years old and above, who is reasonably well, mentally, and physically, except lack of space. Let us join our hearts in prayer and our lives in dedication that we may give a good account of our stewardship

in this great area of human concern and give an answer to as many of these dear people as possible.

## REPORT ON BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES 1964

Following the war between the states (1860-63) the need of establishing a home for orphan children became apparent and the need was championed by John Haynes Mills. In 1884 the N. C. Baptist Orphanage Association was located in Raleigh, N. C. and John Haynes Mills was elected General Manager and the work was supported by interested friends, by once-a-month offerings from interested Sunday Schools and by a generous Thanksgiving offering.

In 1914 Mr. W. L. Kennedy gave his large and attractive home and 1200 acres of rich land to the Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville. Since 1958 we have operated Odum Home for Indian children at Pembroke. In 1963 a small home was established at Chapel Hill for children in need of specialized medical service.

During the past year 574 children have been cared for in these four homes, 171 cared for in good foster homes and 20 mothers have received aid in caring for their children at home and 90 have received case-work supervision. We, therefore, have cared directly or indirectly for over 1000 children.

And this expanding work is supported by your prayers, and by your gifts; supported by your gifts to the cooperative program, your once-a-month offerings, your individual gifts, your large Thanksgiving offerings, and by our farms. At Thomasville, we have an 800 acre farm with an "A" grade dairy of Holstein cattle; at Kennedy Home we have 1200 acres producing corn, beef cattle and hogs; and at Odum Home we produce strawberries and garden crops; and these farms help in the development of our children.

All of our children are properly housed, fed, clothed, educated, and they live in a spiritual atmosphere, and from 75 to 100 are baptized each year. And all of this wonderful work is featured in *Charity and Children* each week, by editor John Roberts and other reporters. Each week 55,000 copies go out to churches and Sunday Schools. The General Superintendent W. B. Wagoner is a man of education and dedication and is wisely caring for the work in all the homes. We are very proud of him.

Pray for this important work, and make a worthy offering at Thanksgiving, through the cooperative program, and your once-a-month offering, support the great work.

## REPORT OF SOUTH MOUNTAIN BAPTIST CAMP FOR 1964

The South Mountain Baptist Camp is desolate, lonely, and quiet since the 1964 season is over. However, the echoes of the singing happy boys and girls still ring out through the hills. It seems as though we can hear the Lord still saying "It is Good" to the donors of the property, to those who have labored so hard, and to those who have contributed to make our camp a reality.

Thanks to a wonderful staff, dedicated counselors, missionaries, and the Spirit of God who enabled us to have another successful year of camping. Including the staff we had 1630 who attended the various activities this season from 90 different churches. Ninety attended from this association.

Our theme this year, "Going Deeper With God" aided the boys and girls to see that the Royal Ambassador and Girl's Auxiliary work was really a very significant part of their Christian experience. There were 610 Star campers and 307 Honor campers. This indicates the quality and the attitude of the campers and the amount of R. A. or G. A. work that they learned.

It is gratifying to see so many campers coming back from year to year to our camp. Some have not missed a camp in seven years. The parting words of our friends this year sounded like a broken record, "We don't want to go home; we will be back next year." Nothing but a deep experience with God could draw campers back from year to year to the same place.

As we participated in worship, Bible and mission study, listened to missionaries and discussed "Going Deeper With God" we had spiritual experiences that we will never forget. About 90% of the campers made advancement in their organizational work.

Due to increasing interest in longer camping periods we are planning to have some four day camps next year. Since I am employed by the camp the year round, I will be available to help any of our associations or churches to promote a good camping program or to speak to youth groups to encourage them to attend camp. It is hoped that the youth leaders in all of our associations will help plan and work with us in filling our camp again next year.

South Mountain Baptist Camp is conveniently located and has one of the best natural beautiful out-of-doors settings for camping that can be found anywhere. So, we wish to encourage every church and all of our associations to support prayerfully our camp and to help finance its growth and development.

We have attended 4 coronation services this year: Kings Mountain, Zoar, Flint Hill, and Eastside, Shelby. We are proud of our G. A.'s.

The Executive Board held a leadership conference with Kings Mountain First Church. Fifty ladies from 18 churches received cards of accreditation. Mrs. Clyde Dover as Community Missions Chairman and two others attended Human Relations Conferences in Charlotte.

We have a young girl in our Association of whom we are very proud. Mary Elizabeth (Libby) Tarlton, daughter of Rev. & Mrs. W. V. Tarlton. She is now studying for her degree in Religious Education at Southern Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky. We are proud to have a small part in helping with her education. A gift of one hundred and fifty dollars was given her.

Our Leadership conference was held with Bethel Baptist, Shelby. Conferences were held for all offices in W. M. U., including our youth organizations. Two hundred and ninety ladies attended.

Let us end this report by saying a thank you to Mrs. Fred Crisp who has helped all of the Executive Board, especially me. Thanks to Rev. C. O. Greene, and all the ladies of the W. M. U. in our Association and the pastors who have helped promote and encourage our young people in missions.

## REPORT OF BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The trustees and administration of our Baptist Hospital have expressed their appreciation for the interest and concern our churches have shown in the ministry of the hospital. In behalf of thousands of our people who cannot pay for the skilled care received at our Medical Center, they express their thanks for our Mother's Day gifts which make this service possible.

This is a crucial year in the life of our hospital. It is serving more sick people than ever before in its history. At the same time, the needs continue to grow faster than its capacity to serve. For more than a year there has been an average of above 700 sick people on the waiting list for beds. A number of seriously ill or injured persons have had to be sent from the emergency rooms to other hospitals because no beds were available.

Another difficult problem is that of meeting the cost of caring for those who cannot pay for the service they need. Within our state there are many older people who live on a meager Social Security or Old Age Assistance income, families whose savings and sometimes their ability to earn have been wiped out by long and serious illness, and great numbers who cannot rise above the poverty line. All who come must pay for their medical care in so far as they can, but there are great numbers who simply cannot pay the full cost. Our hospital tries to get all the help it can for these persons from welfare and health agencies, but these agencies do not pay the total cost and many persons are not eligible for such assistance.

The hospital receives a share of our Cooperative Program money, which helps to support the Department of Pastoral Care and provide equipment and facilities required in the work of the hospital; but the Mother's Day Fund provided by our churches is the only means the hospital has of bridging a wide gap between the funds available and the cost of caring for those who cannot pay for their medical service.

Our hospital and medical school are beginning a large development program greatly to increase the capacity of our Medical Center to care for our sick people and to train additional doctors, nurses, and other personnel to serve in our communities, on our mission fields, and wherever these trained persons are so badly needed. The people of the Winston-Salem area have expressed their confidence in our Medical Center by pledging more than seven million dollars to this enlargement program. Our great concern is that, when our hospital has increased its capacity to meet our specialized medical needs, will our churches provide the money to take care of those who need these services but cannot pay for them.

This is a heavy burden on those who are responsible for the operation of our hospital. We are confident that if our people are informed of the work and the great need, they will provide the necessary means. We call upon our pastors and other church leaders to lay this upon the



hearts of their members. It is a greatly needed and wonderful ministry to which Jesus gave himself without reserve. We who are His followers must not fail those to whom he would minister through us.

## HISTORIAN'S REPORT

### What Mean Ye These Stones? Joshua 4:6

The stones Joshua spoke of were from the bottom of the Jordan River, and formed a memorial for the successful crossing of the Ark of the Covenant over the Jordan River into Canaan, the Promised Land.

The Association this year has gathered some "stones" which may make us remember the times past, deeds done and seed sown by our forefathers, the founders of the churches in this association.

I speak of microfilmed records of some 47 churches of Kings Mountain Association which were obtained during the past year. These records include church minutes, bulletins, original records like deeds, photographs, sketches of the lives of prominent ministers and lay persons and hundred of other items of historical interest.

Oldest records are from the oldest church, Zion, beginning in 1816. Some are complete, and unfortunately, some of the churches reported missing sections of their records.

All are valuable, beyond any value in money, because they are the only picture we have of the past.

As your Historian I can proudly report we now have enough data, enough facts and figures and enough documentation to begin a definitive history of the Association. One copy of these microfilmed records is being stored in the Gardner-Webb College Library. Some of the items are on view here today for your interest and pleasure, by favor of Mr. Robert Trexler, college Librarian.

As a part of this report the Historian recommends that the Association will enlarge the present committee of five members to a Commission of at least ten or more members and that this Commission during the coming Associational year be instructed to do the following.

1. Recommend to the Association whether or not a History should be written and published.
2. If so, when it could best be done.
3. Recommend a person or persons to write it.
4. Make some study of other Associational histories and make a general recommendation about the scope, depth, and extent of such a history.

5. Give the Association some estimate of the possible cost of such a project and suggest some method of financing it.

6. Set a tentative publication date, if the project is approved.

## REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD

Many important phases of work were handled by the General Board this year. Norman Brown, Chairman of the Interracial and Institutional Committee, in the November meeting told the Board members of the Maple Springs Negro Baptist Church near Flint Hill, which was in need of financial aid. A suggestion from the moderator was that the Committee look into the matter and make specific recommendations to a future Board meeting. This was done and in the light of the Committee's recommendation the Board voted to send out letters to the churches inviting them to make voluntary contributions to the Maple Springs Church. A total of \$765.50 was received during the church year.

An item of business from the previous year concerning Emmanuel Baptist Mission, organized by Rev. Fred Cartee, Pastor, culminated in the recommendation and subsequent organization of the mission into a church in July of this year with a charter membership of 35.

Mr. Neil Jackson, a representative of the conventions Audio-Visual Aids Department, attending the January Board meeting and introduced the new Audio-Visual Aids plan and by mid spring more than the 20 required churches had joined the plan, thus putting it into effect in this association.

Another important emphasis during the Spring months was the Simultaneous Revival meetings in the Association. Rev. James Stamey, Chairman of the Committee on Evangelism reported that more than 50% of the churches participated in the meetings.

The Board voted in its February meeting to make extensive repairs on the Baptist Center. This includes termite treatment, a new roof, repairs on the porch, painting, and beautifying of the grounds.

Among the many pastors leaving our Association this year was John Lawrence, Shelby, First Church, who was also Moderator of the Association. He turned the gavel over to Vice Moderator James Holder in the June meeting.
