LAWNDALE BAPTIST CHURCH

Host Church, Thursday

The Lawndale Baptist Church was organized in 1899 with forty charter members. For a number of years the Baptist and Methodist churches met jointly in the mill chapel. By May, 1953 the new Lawndale Baptist Church was completed and the congregation met for worship in its new building. All indebtedness on the church building and pastor's home had been liquidated by 1961. In the following year the church began support of Rev. William H. Cain, Missionary to the French West Indies. The people of the Lawndale Baptist Church have experienced great joy as they have endeavored to advance the cause of Christ throughout the world and are to be commended for their accomplishments both at home and abroad.



REV. RAYMOND C. NEEDHAM

Host Pastor, Thursday

Rev. Raymond C. Needham became pastor of Lawndale Baptist Church in 1961, coming from Deep Springs Baptist Church in the Dan Valley Association. He is a graduate of Gardner-Webb and Wake Forest Colleges and Southeastern Seminary and has completed the course in Pastoral Care at the Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem.

Rev. Needham is married to the former Miss Linda Hudspeth, a graduate of Meredith College. They have two children, Aaron (8) and Mirian (3). Both Rev. and Mrs. Needham are native North Carolinians.

Since coming to the association, Rev. Needham has been active in all phases of the work of the association. During the past year Rev. Needham has served as chairman of a committee which has successfully organized a class for pastors in the Seminary Extension Program. He continues to head this committee and is also involved in other associational duties.



ZION BAPTIST CHURCH

Host Church, Friday

Having been organized in August, 1816, the Zion Baptist Church is the oldest church in Kings Mountain Baptist Association. During the history of the church there have been five buildings, the present one having been built in 1953. Zion Church has been host to the association six times (1855, 1873, 1890, 1913, 1931, and 1955) prior to this year. It has been instrumental in the organization of a number of other churches in the association and its members rejoice in the progress of these churches.



REV. W. V. TARLTON

Host Pastor, Friday

Rev. Tarlton is a graduate of Wake Forest College and Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Before coming to Zion in 1950, he had served the following churches: Rich Square (1931-38), Cliffside (1938-44), and McGill Street, Concord (1944-50). During his ministry at Zion the present building has been erected, a caretaker's home built, and the church grounds graded and sodded.

Rev. Tarlton is married to Mrs. Letha Carter Tarlton. They have three children: Janet, Durham, N. C., Carroll, Chicago Ill., and Libby, Southern Seminary.

Rev. Tarlton has served in various capacities in our state: moderator of the Sandy Run and Cabarrus Associations, Trustee of Gardner-Webb and Wingate Colleges, and member of the N. C. General Board and Education Council.

THE CONSTITUTION

Kings Mountain Baptist Association

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order and rules of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

NAME

ARTICLE 1: The name of the organization shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

MEMBERSHIP

ARTICLE 2: The Association shall be composed of Missionary Baptist Churches of Cleveland County and adjacent territory which are now members, and any other Missionary Baptist Churches which may hereafter be admitted as herein provided.

ARTICLE 3: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Missions Council and if recommended by this Council and accepted by the Association shall agree to come under the watch care of the Association for a period of one year. At the end of one year upon recommendation of the Mission Council, membership within the Association of such churches shall be confirmed by vote of the Association. During this period such churches shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except holding office and voting.

ARTICLE 4: Each church shall annually elect messengers to the appointed meeting of the Association. Such messengers must be duly certified in the annual church letter to the Associationn, and appointed on the following ratio:

Two messengers (in addition to the pastor and retired ministers who are members of the congregation) for each Church having a membership not exceeding fifty, and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty or major fraction thereof, provided that the total number of messengers shall not exceed ten.

In computing the total number of messengers allowed from any Church, the pastor and retired ministers who are members of said Church shall not be included.

PURPOSE

ARTICLE 5: The purpose of this Association shall be to council together for the enlargement and strengthening of God's Kingdom and for the promoting of unity and growth among the churches composing it. To this end the Association will cooperate with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention and their agencies in the work of Missions, Christian Education, and Social Service.

MEETINGS

ARTICLE 6: "The Association shall meet annually on Thursday after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of."

The place of meeting shall be determined at the previous session.

OFFICERS

ARTICLE 7: The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, and Historian. These shall be elected annually by the Association at its annual meeting and shall hold office until their successors are elected.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

ARTICLE 8: It shall be the duty of the Moderator:

- (1) In advance of the annual meeting, to communicate with the host churches requesting that they appoint from this church membership a committee on enrollment.
- (2) To open the meeting punctually at the appointed time.
- (3) To appoint a committee on committees in the opening session to serve for the following associational year.
- (4) To enforce the rules; to preserve order; and to exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage.

ARTICLE 9: It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, and to be Chairman of the Association Calendar Committee and Chairman of the Committee on Order of Business.

ARTICLE 10: It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and report at the annual session of the Association.

ARTICLE 11: It shall be the duty of the Clerk-Treasurer:

- (1) To keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (2) To superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes.
- (3) To keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.
- (4) To receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed directly to the Association.
- (5) To make an annual report concerning such to the Association.

For his services he shall be paid annually an amount recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Association.

COMMITTEES AND THEIR DUTIES

ARTICLE 12: The committees of the Association shall be divided into three categories, and shall be composed of members from our churches.

SECTION A: Those appointed in advance of the annual meeting:

1. A Committee on Enrollment appointed as prescribed in Article 8, and any others which the Moderator may deem advisable or necessary.

SECTION B: Those named to report at the annual meeting following the one at which they were appointed:

1. A Committee on Committees, consisting of five messengers, appointed as prescribed in Article 8. It shall be the duty of this committee to appoint the following committees which shall report at the next annual meeting of the Association.
 - (a) Committee on Place and Preacher, consisting of three members, the duty of which shall be to recommend to the Association churches at which the next session shall meet and preachers that will preach at the next session. In the event of a church having to rescind its invitation or a preacher's being unable to deliver a designated sermon due to sickness, death, or other providential circumstances, or his removal from a church in the Association, this committee will make provision for such substitution as may be necessary subject to the approval of the General Board.
 - (b) A Committee on Resolutions, consisting of three members, the duty of which shall be to draw up and present to the Association suitable resolution of appreciation and expression on sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association.
 - (c) A Committee on Order of Business, which shall consist of five members including the Vice-Moderator who shall be chairman. It shall be the duty of this committee to report a suggested order of business as soon as feasible after the opening of the Association. When adopted, its report shall become the order of the Association and cannot be changed except by majority of the body.
 - (d) A Committee on Nominations, consisting of five members:
 - (1) A Committee on Nominations, consisting of five members, the duty of which shall be to nominate a Sunday School Superintendent, a Training Union Director, a Brotherhood President and a Chairman of Music. These nine persons shall then form one committee and nominate all officers of the Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Music and Education Organization and Members of the Missions Council.
 - (2) This committee shall also make recommendations to the General Board of the Association for members of the General

Board of North Carolina Baptist State Convention when vacancies occur. The General Board will then send its recommendations to the Committee on Boards of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

- (3) This Committee shall also nominate an Ordination Advisory Committee, consisting of five members, the duty of which shall be to examine all candidates for ordination who shall be referred to it by churches of the Association. Upon concluding such examination, this Committee shall notify the church requesting the examination as to the results thereof and shall make a full report concerning the same at the next meeting of the General Board.
- (4) It shall also nominate the Committee of Evangelism, consisting of five members, the duty of which shall be to devise plans whereby evangelism will be promoted throughout the churches of the Association. It shall also nominate any other committees which the Association in session may authorize.
- (e) A Committee of Trustees, consisting of three members, the duty of which shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment, or other securities of said Association.
- (f) An Auditing Committee, consisting of three members, the duty of which shall be to audit the Clerk-Treasurer's books annually and report to the Association.
- (g) The House and Grounds Committee for the Baptist Center consisting of three members, the duties of which shall be to make recommendations concerning the upkeep and repair of the home of the associational missionary to the General Board as such needs may arise, and to put into effect any recommendations concerning such which may be authorized by the General Board.

Nominations by the Committee shall not preclude nominations from the floor.

The Chairman of each of these committees with the exception of the committee on Order of Business, will be designated by the committee on committees.

SECTION C. An Associational Calendar Committee to be composed of Vice-Moderator, as Chairman, Superintendent of Missions, Sunday School Superintendent, W. M. U. Superintendent, Brotherhood President, Training Union Director, Music Director and Librarian.

When a member of a committee or a general officer of the Baptist Training Union, Sunday School, Brotherhood, Music Education Committee, or the Associational Missions Council moves out of the Association or moves his or her membership from a cooperating missionary Baptist Church of the Association, he thereby relinquishes his committee membership or office, as the case may be. The vacancy thus created will be filled by the standing Committee on Nominations designed at the previous associational meeting.

THE GENERAL BOARD

ARTICLE 13: At each annual session a General Board shall be appointed by the Association, which shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the Superintendent of Missions, Superintendent of Sunday School, Director of the Baptist Training Union, President of the Woman's Missionary Union, President of the Brotherhood, President of Gardner-Webb College, members of the Associational Missions Council, the pastor of each church composing the Association, retired ministers residing in and belonging to a church of the Association, and two members from each church, which members shall be nominated by the church and approved by the Association.

ARTICLE 14: This board shall hold meetings monthly at 10 o'clock on Monday after third Sunday in each month, or when called by Moderator, and shall exercise the functions and discharge the duties usually committed to an executive board or committee. The purpose and plan of this General Board in all its meetings shall be to promote the interest and carry forward the work of the Association and of its constituent churches as this work is outlined in Article 5. The General Board shall act for the Association between sessions except as specifically limited by the constitution.

ARTICLE 15: In case of emergency the General Board may select a time and place and arrange for a special business session of the Association; provided that the business of such extra session shall be limited to the object for which it was convened, and the membership of such special business session shall be made up of the messengers elected by the churches and accredited to the previous regular session.

THE MISSIONS COUNCIL

ARTICLE 16: The Association shall elect annually an Associational Missions Council composed of sixteen members.

ARTICLE 17: Said Council shall meet at least three times annually. The first meeting shall be convened by the Moderator within ten days following the annual associational meeting at which the council was elected. At the first meeting a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Secretary shall be selected and the council shall divide itself into such committees as seem necessary to provide a well rounded and worthy associational missions program and emphasis. It shall have at least the following committees:

- (1) Administration and Finance. This committee shall have general oversight of the work of the Superintendent of Missions and shall report to the Association in Annual Session and to the General Board as deemed necessary by the Committee. In case of a vacancy occurring in the office of associational Superintendent of Missions, this committee shall bring recommendations to the General Board as to replacement. This committee shall also make an associational budget to be presented to the Association providing for financing the work for the coming year.

- (2) **Missionary Planning.** This committee shall survey communities in need of Baptist work and ministry; seek to enlist churches to sponsor work in such communities; give guidance and assistance in proper location and organization of new Baptist work; provide information for and make recommendations to the Association to missionary needs which might be met by cooperative efforts; provide information to the State Mission Board which might be helpful in meeting missionary needs; consult with churches anticipating membership in the Association and make recommendations to the Association in matters of this kind; and to review requests coming from churches for loans and church assistance funds, as to their validity.
- (3) **Institutional and Interracial.** This committee shall seek to enlist churches to have a worthy part in ministry to folks in our public institutions, and to be of service as friend and brother in Christ to people among us of other races.

RULES OF ORDER

RULE 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

RULE 2: All officers shall complete their work as soon as practicable after the closing of the session. The newly elected officers shall assume, at the close of the session, all duties incumbent upon said officers relating to the work of the ensuing associational year.

RULE 3: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

RULE 4: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject, except by the permission of the Association.

RULE 5: Messengers present from one-half of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

RULE 6: All questions shall be decided by majority vote of the members present except changes in the constitution, which shall require two-thirds vote of those present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association the first day it is in session and voted on the second day.

RULE 7: All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided by general parliamentary laws by Kerfoot.

RULE 8: The term of office of the moderator shall be limited to two years.

CONFESSIONS OF FAITH

1. We believe the Scripture of the Old and New Testament to be a divinely inspired revelation from God.

2. We accept the New Testament alone as revealing the only plan of salvation and as the final authority in all matters of church policy and practice.

3. We believe Jesus Christ as revealed in the New Testament to be the Son of God and the divine Saviour of all who truly accept Him as such.

4. We believe in the personality of the Holy Spirit, and in His abiding presence with the spirit of all the elect of God, in His quickening presence with the spirit of the unregenerate moving to repentance and faith, in His witnessing presence with the spirit of the regenerate, in His comforting and guidance throughout life, in His sustaining presence in the experience of death, and in His continuing presence in the life to come.

5. We believe salvation is attained through spiritual regeneration in the act of repentance and acceptance of Jesus as Saviour.

6. Sincere spiritual redemption was made available by the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus, we believe that every regenerate person should symbolize his own salvation by being buried with Him in baptism.

7. We believe that a local church modeled after the New Testament order is a company of regenerate persons voluntarily joined together for the purpose of extending God's Kingdom on earth.

8. We believe that each church should from time to time, as a congregation, celebrate the Lord's Supper as a memorial to Him.

9. We believe in the ultimate triumph of God's Kingdom over all opposing powers, and that every regenerate soul shall have a share in that triumph.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE HUNDRED-FIFTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Thursday Morning, October 21, 1965

1. As messengers from the churches of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association gathered at the Lawndale Baptist Church on October 21, 1965, Mrs. E. T. Bailey played a 10 minute organ prelude.

2. At 9:00 a.m. Moderator, James Holder, called the 115th annual session to order.

3. Mr. Yates Pearson led the group in the singing of "Soldiers of Christ, Arise."

4. Rev. Joel Jenkins led the opening prayer.

5. Rev. Billy G. Washburn announced that 230 messengers had registered and moved that these together with others who would register be elected to constitute the 115th annual session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. The motion carried and it was so ordered.

6. In presenting the program, Rev. Billy G. Washburn, speaking for the program committee, recommended certain changes. The changes were acceptable to the messengers and the program was adopted as printed in this volume.

7. Chairman of the Missions Council, Rev. Fred Crisp was recognized. He recommended that Emmanuel Baptist Church, which had been under watch-care of the association for one year, be accepted into the full fellowship of the association. A standing vote was taken with Pastor, Rev. Fred Cartee, standing at the front facing the messengers. Emmanuel was accepted without opposition after which members of the church were asked to stand for recognition.

8. Moderator, James Holder, appointed the following as the Committee on Committees to report to the 1966 session: Rev. Leonard Thomas, Chairman, Rev. R. L. McGaha, Rev. Aaron Phipps, Rev. Woodrow Flynn, and Rev. James Graham.

9. Rev. Raymond Needham was recognized as host pastor to welcome messengers to the Lawndale Baptist Church. He also gave information concerning facilities and instructions concerning the noon meal.

10. Moderator, James Holder, requested that in the absence of a clerk (Rev. LeRoy Sisk had recently resigned as clerk-treasurer) messengers wanting recognition to speak should state their name and the name of the church they represented clearly so that clerk pro-tem, Miss Judy Blanton, could record the names.

11. Mr. Yates Pearson introduced Mr. Robert Decker who sang the solo: "God Is Our Refuge." The accompanist was Mrs. Fred Mauney.

12. The moderator introduced Rev. Coy Dellinger, pastor of North Brook Baptist Church, to bring the inspirational message. Using Hebrews 2:1-3 as a text he developed his sermon on the following points:

Salvation is great because (1) of its origin—God the Father, (2) of what it cost God—His Son, (3) of what it does for man—redeems him, and (4) of what it provides—eternal life.

13. Mr. Yates Pearson led the messengers in singing the hymn, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus."

14. The moderator called attention to the General Board Report, pointing out important aspects as reported. He then called attention to the proposed budget and entertained a motion for its adoption. It was moved, seconded, and duly passed that the budget be adopted as proposed.

15. The moderator recognized Miss Pat Borden, reporter and photographer from the *Shelby Daily Star*.

16. The following persons came to give reports with special emphasis on proclaiming Christ at home:

(1) Rev. Hugh Borders brought the Sunday School Report emphasizing the place of the Sunday School in evangelism. His report was adopted.

(2) In the report on the Music Ministry Mr. Allen Jolley commented on the task of the music ministry in the local church, indicated that the associational music ministry found its purpose in assistance to local churches, and referred to two major printed helps: **The Church Musician** and the **Junior Musician**. His report was adopted.

(3) The Training Union report was brought by Director, James Sides. Major emphasis was placed on the Training Union as a vital part of the total church program. He also pointed out the fact that many new materials were available to upgrade the work. This report was also adopted.

(4) The report on the Printed Word was brought by Mr. Cyrus Bazemore of the staff of the **Biblical Recorder**. "A reading Baptist is an informed Baptist," said Mr. Bazemore. Having referred to the influence of the **Recorder** on Baptist life in North Carolina, he concluded with the statement that all Christian literature begins with the Bible. The report on the Printed Word was adopted.

(5) It was moved and seconded that the Brotherhood report be adopted as printed in the book of reports. The moderator called attention to two recommendations (see report) and then Rev. Coy Prevette, Pastor of North Kannapolis Baptist Church spoke to the report. His major emphasis was on the involvement of men in the missionary activities of the church, especially missionary education for the boys. He pointed out also that men should become more involved in the visitation and witnessing programs of the church. The printed report was adopted.

(6) Mrs. W. E. McSwain, president of the WMU, gave her report in the form of a skit written by Mrs. Recca Bingham. The report emphasized the importance of personal witness. In remarks prefacing the skit Mrs. McSwain made the statement that "God no more wants a part-time follower than we want a part-time God." Her report was approved.

17. Mr. Yates Pearson led the singing of "We are Living, We are Dwelling."

18. The moderator recognized pastors who had come into the association since the last annual meeting. The following were present: James Graham—Bethlehem, W. T. Lookadoo—Faith, Joel P. Jenkins—New Hope, C. C. Parker—Piedmont, Charles Freeman—Plains View, Joseph T. McCain—Shelby First, and Andy Meade—Wallace Grove. Thurmond Copeland was recognized as new Minister of Music and Education of Calvary. Several visitors were recognized and welcomed.

19. In a brief period of miscellaneous business the following items were dealt with:

(1) Rev. Dennis Larkins made several corrections in the report of the Ordination Advisory Committee. The report was received as information as printed in this volume.

(2) Rev. W. V. Tarlton invited messengers and visitors to Zion for the Friday morning session.

(3) Rev. Raymond Needham made further announcements concerning lunch.

(4) The moderator announced that 434 messengers had now registered.

(5) The moderator stressed the importance of those taking part in the program be at the front of the sanctuary when it is time for their appearance.

20. Mr. Yates Pearson introduced Gardner-Webb College Choir led by Mrs. Robert Gidney for the special music. While the choir was getting ready Mr. Pearson led the messengers in singing "Who Is On The Lord's Side." The choir presented the following numbers: "Bless The Lord, O My Soul", "For The Beauty Of The Earth", "Create In Me A Clean Heart, O God", "Jesus, Friend Of Sinners", and "Beautiful Saviour."

21. Rev. C. O. Greene was recognized to present the report of the Superintendent of Missions. After the report was properly received as information, Rev. Greene spoke briefly on the subject, "Proclamation Through Associational Missions." He pointed out the fact that the work of the association is done through the voluntary cooperation of individuals who count responsibility a privilege. We engage in proclamation through personnel, publication, programs, promotion, planning the work, and planting the seeds.

22. The morning session was adjourned by the moderator, after which Rev. C. O. Greene closed with prayer and thanksgiving for the noon meal.

Thursday Afternoon

23. The afternoon session began at 1:15 p.m. following a brief organ prelude.

24. Mr. Allen Jolley, Music Director for the session, led the group

in singing "Come Thou Fount."

25. Rev. Curtis Bundy led the opening prayer.

26. Mr. Jolley introduced soloist, Mrs. James Stamey, who sang "Overshadowed By His Mighty Hand." Her accompanist was Mrs. Wallace Horn.

27. Rev. L. M. Tenery was recognized and brought the doctrinal sermon on the doctrine of "The New Birth." His text was II Cor. 5:17-25. Other passages used were chosen from Ezekiel 36 and John 3. He emphasized the necessity of the new birth and indicated that it must come about by repentance, obedience, and spiritual insight or faith. Rev. Tenery included in his message the doctrine of the "preservation of the saints" and related this doctrine to that of "the new birth."

28. The hymn, "Blessed Assurance," was led by Mr. Jolley.

29. Rev. B. L. Raines was recognized who moved the adoption of the following reports: Evangelism, Baptist Hospital, Homes for Aging, Children's Home, and Christian Education. After the second, Rev. Raines moderated a panel discussion assisted by Mrs. C. D. Forney, Jr. and Rev. Hugh Borders who directed questions to the panelists. Serving on the panel were Dr. Julian Hopkins of the State Department of Evangelism, Dr. Walter Sanders of the Baptist Hospital, Mr. Walter Davis, our Representative for the Homes for the Aging, Mr. C. O. Weaver, Business Administrator of the Homes for the Aging, Dr. E. Eugene Poston, President of Gardner-Webb College, and Rev. Neal Peyton representing the Division of Missions. The discussion was made more meaningful by the projection of appropriate slides throughout the discussion. Said reports were adopted.

30. Dr. E. Eugene Poston presented the report on Gardner-Webb College holding his discussion to the theme of the "Decade of Advance." He emphasized many of the points as printed in this volume. Especially did he emphasize the need of Gardner-Webb's becoming a four-year college in the near future. His report was received as information.

31. Mr. Walter Zvoda was recognized by the moderator and given three minutes to express his concern for the growing tendency toward ecumenism. He pointed out that the Catholic Church is growing much more rapidly than protestantism and expressed fear that we were in danger of losing religious freedom.

32. The moderator recognized Mr. Robert Decker who directed the Junior Choir of Elizabeth Baptist Church in the singing of the following special numbers: "Hear Us, Blessed Jesus", "Oh Yes, Oh, Yes!", and "My Faith Should Be A Happy Thing."

33. The moderator gave opportunity for representatives of institutions who had not previously been recognized to present themselves. No one came.

34. Rev. R. L. McGaha was recognized to present the Home Missions report. After a motion and second to adopt, said report was received, Rev. McGaha introduced Rev. Gene Moffatt whose discussion centered on two themes: (1) the building which houses the Home Mission

Board offices in Atlanta and (2) the importance of one giving his witness "where he is." The report was adopted.

35. The session was adjourned and Rev. Floyd Willis led the closing prayer.

Friday Morning Session

36. On Friday Morning, October 22, messengers and visitors convened at the Zion Baptist Church as Mrs. E. T. Bailey played a five-minute organ prelude.

37. Moderator, James Holder, called the assembly to order at 9:30 a.m.

38. Mr. Thurmond Copeland led the messengers in singing two hymns: "Send The Light" and "O Zion Haste."

39. Rev. Paul Johnson led the opening prayer.

40. Rev. Wilson Padgett was recognized to bring the missionary message. Out of Romans 10:1-15, he developed his message under the title, "The Heart's Desire." In preparation for the message, Rev. Padgett had written several of our missionaries to find their most pressing needs. Foremost in the request of our missionaries were prayer, personnel (especially missionary preachers), and open church membership in the United States. The message was built around the following four points: (1) The Measure of Missionary Obligation, (2) The Messenger of Missions, (3) The Means of Missions, and (4) The Motive for Missions.

41. The moderator introduced Mr. Bill Dover, reporter and photographer for the Star.

42. Mr. Guy Cain, representative of the Annuity Board, presented the Annuity Board Report. His remarks were mainly devoted to recent developments in the Board's protection plans. The report was adopted as appears in printed form.

43. Mr. Gordon Maddrey, Secretary of the Baptist Foundation, was recognized. He spoke briefly on the purpose of the Foundation. A motion and second to adopt the report was heard and it was adopted as printed.

44. In a period of business and announcements the following matters were presented:

(1) Rev. W. V. Tarlton welcomed messengers and visitors to Zion and gave information about facilities.

(2) Rev. C. A. Kirby, Jr. reported for the Committee on Place and Preachers. It was recommended that the 1966 session be held at the Double Springs Baptist Church and that the preachers be: Rev. Joel Jenkins of New Hope—Missionary message, Dr. Joseph T. McClain of Shelby First—Inspirational Message, and Rev. Russell Fitts of Double Shoals—Doctrinal Message. The recommendations were adopted.

(3) Rev. Wilson Padgett, Chairman of the Committee on Nominations, presented the list of nominations for associational officers for the coming year. These officers were elected and their names appear elsewhere in this volume.

(4) Rev. Max Linnins, Chairman of the Committee on Committees, presented their recommendations for committees for the coming year. These also were elected and their names appear elsewhere in this volume.

(5) Mrs. Fred Crisp reported that 480 messengers were now registered.

(6) Rev. Raymond Needham, Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, presented their report which was duly adopted.

(7) In the absence of Dr. Wyan Washburn, Historian, Rev. Max Linnins presented the Historian's Report. It was adopted as printed.

45. The moderator called for the election of associational officers for the coming year.

(1) Rev. Fred Crisp placed in nomination for moderator Rev. James Holder. With no other nominations, Rev. Dennis Larkins moved that Rev. Holder be elected by acclamation. Rev. C. O. Greene moderated as the vote was taken and Rev. Holder was elected without opposition.

(2) Rev. Norman Brown placed in nomination for vice-moderator the name of Rev. C. A. Kirby, Jr. Rev. R. L. McGaha moved that nominations cease and that Rev. Kirby be elected by acclamation. The motion carried without opposition and it was so ordered.

(3) Rev. Wayne Ashe, Chairman of a committee to seek out and nominate to the association in annual session a person to assume the duties of clerk-treasurer (see minutes of the General Board Meeting of September 20, 1965), placed in nomination the name of Billy G. Washburn for clerk-treasurer. Rev. C. A. Kirby, Jr. moved that Rev. Washburn be elected by acclamation. The motion was duly seconded and carried.

(4) Rev. Max Linnins nominated Dr. Wyan Washburn for Historian. With no other nominations, Rev. Fred Crisp moved that nominations cease and that Dr. Washburn be elected. The motion carried and it was so ordered.

46. Rev. Fred Crisp raised the question of the schedule for the next annual meeting. It was explained that next year's meeting would begin with an evening session on Thursday, following the third Sunday in October and continuing for as many sessions Friday as is necessary to complete the association's business.

47. The moderator recognized visitors from outside our association.

49. Mr. Thurmond Copeland led the group in singing "When The Roll Is Called Up Yonder."

50. Rev. S. L. Lamm brought the report on Memorials. One minister, Rev. J. H. Gentry, and several deacons were among those deceased since our last session. As the messengers bowed in silent remembrance, our moderator led in prayer.

51. Mr. Copeland presented Mr. Allen Jolley and the Youth Choir of Kings Mountain First who favored us with the following selections: "I Have Come From The Darkness To The Light", "My Lord Is Near Me All the Time", and "The Lord Is My Shepherd."

52. Rev. Kenneth Gibson presented the report on Foreign Missions as printed in the book of reports and moved its adoption. After a second to the motion, Rev. C. A. Kirby, Jr. was recognized who spoke concerning his trip abroad with the North Carolina Chorale. Special attention was given to the restrictions to the protestant denominations in Spain and the very real need for missionary work in that country.

53. Mr. Copeland led the messengers in the hymn, "Jesus Shall Reign."

54. Rev. Cline Boarders was recognized for discussion on Seminary Extension work. He announced that a class for pastors was then in progress and that classes for laymen were being planned for the early months of 1966. Mr. Boarders expressed the hope that this work would help "bridge the gap between pulpit and pew." His comments were received as information.

55. Mr. Copeland presented Mrs. Lloyd Bost who sang as a solo, "A Prayer," by Guion. Mrs. Hubert Plaster was the accompanist.

56. Rev. Roland Leath gave the report on the Cooperative Program. The report was adopted.

57. Dr. Howard J. Ford brought the closing address of the session. Using I Cor. 3:9 as his text, he spoke on the theme, "Responding to the needs of the world." Dr. Ford indicated that the first step in stewardship is the giving of ourselves. Then he said that we must rethink our ideas on possessions—"it is the Lord which giveth." in his closing remarks Dr. Ford commended the Cooperative Program as the best channel through which we might respond to the needs of the world.

58. All business having been completed, Dr. Ford, by previous request of the moderator led in the prayer of adjournment and the 115th annual session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association came to a close.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

MINUTES OF THE SEVENTY-FIRST ANNUAL SESSION

The Seventy-First Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Association's Woman's Missionary Union was held at the Beaver Dam Baptist Church on Thursday, April 22, 1965, at 3:00 P.M. Co-hostesses were Poplar Springs Baptist Church, Flint Hill Baptist Church, Sandy Plains Baptist Church and Mt. Sinai Baptist Church. Theme for the program was "W.M.U. Fulfilling Its Mission Through WORSHIP." Organist was Mrs. Woodrow Funderburke, Jr., with Mrs. R. P. Withrow as song director.

The meeting was opened with an organ prelude, after which Mrs. W. E. McSwain called the meeting to order. After a congregational hymn, "O Worship the King," Mrs. Carson Hamrick, President of Beaver Dam Baptist Church, extended a welcome to all. Rev. Edgar Bishop, Pastor of Poplar Springs Baptist Church, led in prayer.

Mrs. W. E. McSwain, President, presided over the business session. Mrs. John Ed Davis presented a resolution concerning unwholesome and vulgar movies and reading matter. She moved that the resolution be adopted by our Associational W.M.U. to advance campaigns to focus attention on the problem and to encourage others to show concern and to cooperate to make it unprofitable for persons to benefit from these practices. The motion was duly seconded and passed.

Mrs. Paris Yelton presented the following amendment to the By-Laws: Article XI. Finances: Section 2. These funds will be on 25 cents per member basis, and are to be sent to the Associational Treasurer within two months following the annual Associational meeting. Mrs. Yelton's proposal was to change the above section to read: These funds will be on 50 cents per W.M.S. member basis, and are to be sent to the Associational Treasurer by December 1. Mrs. Yelton moved the adoption of this change, and the same was seconded and duly passed.

Mrs. W. Yancey Ellis presented the budget and moved its adoption. This motion was seconded and passed.

Mrs. B. H. Hopper and Mrs. David Beam were recognized as having served as executive officers for five years, and as each retires after this year, both made comments of appreciation for the cooperation of the ladies of the W.M.U.

Mrs. Grady Walker presented special music, after which "Ways of Worship" were presented.

Rev. W. V. Tarlton, Pastor of Zion Baptist Church, introduced his daughter, Elizabeth Tarlton, social work student of Louisville, Kentucky, who spoke on her Christian experience as a child and her desire to be a full fledged Christian worker.

Rev. Fred Crisp of First Baptist, Grover introduced Rev. Leroy Sisk, Pastor of Churchill Drive Baptist Church, Shelby, who spoke of the duties and privileges of an army chaplain. Rev. Sisk was in uniform. He cleared up many misunderstandings and explained the liberties that our government gives the chaplain.

Mrs. W. E. McSwain, President, introduced Rev. Jack Cook, industrial chaplain of Carolina Freight, Cherryville, N.C., who spoke on the duties and joys of his office. Rev. Cook stated that in a few years most of the industries in our county will employ a chaplain. He explained that the industrial chaplain does not take the place of the church or pastor, but works with them.

A congregational hymn, "Praise to God Immortal Praise." was sung and Mrs. John Gold led the call to prayer.

Rev. C. O. Green, Superintendent of Missions of the association, introduced the Rev. Neal L. Peyton, Home Missionary to the deaf in North Carolina. Mr. Peyton gave a vivid description of his work with the deaf and how we, as Christian people, can minister to these persons in our state.

The closing prayer for the afternoon session and the blessing for the meal which immediately followed was given by the Rev. Oscar Funderburke, Pastor of Beaver Dam Baptist Church.

NIGHT SESSION

The night session was opened by an organ prelude, followed by congregational singing, after which Mrs. Floyd Queen, President of Poplar Springs W.M.U., led in prayer.

Featured at this session were the Sunbeams. Mrs. Eugene Roberts presented this portion of the program by highlighting activities of the Sunbeams.

Special music by the Beaver Dam Melody Choir was followed by the theme interpretation — "W.M.U. Fulfilling Its Mission Through Worship" — by Mrs. Wilson Harmon of the Waco Baptist Church. Interest center for the theme was a realistic stained glass church window. Mrs. Harmon developed the theme along the line that our mission is to "tell the world about Jesus". To worship we must concentrate, communicate and be ready to commit ourselves. We must worship, lead others to worship, provide organization and leadership, provide and interpret information.

Reports from the following committees were given: Mrs. Alfred Collins, Chairman of the Place Committee, reported that the host church for the next session would be First Baptist Church, Shelby, date to be announced later. Mrs. Dan Camp, Chairman of the Appreciation committee expressed the thanks of the group for the flowers, delicious meal, music and messages. Mrs. Richard Plyler, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the officers for the succeeding year and moved that they be elected. This motion was duly seconded and passed. All officers went to the front for prayer of dedication, led by Mrs. Joel Jenkins.

Mr. Tom McGraw, Vice-President of Gardner-Webb College, introduced Mr. Ramzy Halaby, student from Lebanon, who told of his experiences in becoming a Christian and gave a testimony of his life since his conversion.

Rev. Oscar Funderburke presented Mrs. Aubrey Roberson, Missionary to Vietnam.

Mrs. Roberson appeared in the costume of the Vietnamese woman. She told of the four major groups of Vietnamese: those who practice paganism, the communist Vietnamese, those who are freedom-loving and seeking, and those who practice Christianity. She told something of the country and especially of the surroundings she and her family live in while in Vietnam. Mrs. Roberson gave us some of her personal experiences in leading these lost people to know and serve Christ. She closed by leaving with us the challenge to be more mission minded.

To close the Seventy-First Session of this W.M.U. Organization, Mr. Woodrow Funderburke, Jr. sang the "Lord's Prayer", and as he sang a portrait of the **Praying Hands** was flashed upon the auditorium wall in the darkened sanctuary.

And so another session of the Associational W.M.U. closed with insight into Missions and inspiration to do a better work for the Lord.

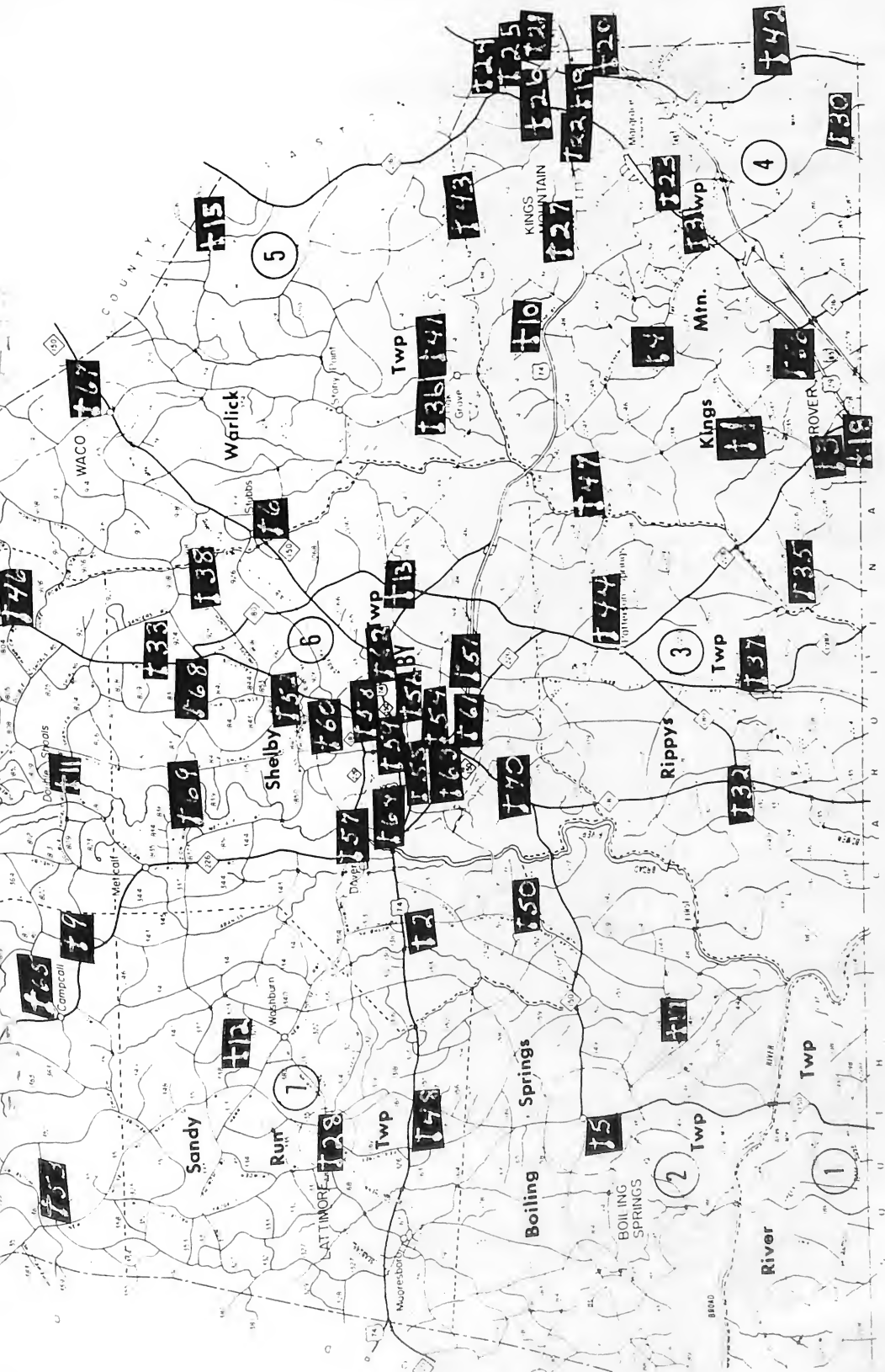

BY-LAWS FOR ASSOCIATIONAL WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object shall be to promote Christian missions through the organizations of Woman's Missionary Union in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE III

RELATIONSHIPS

Section 1. Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to Kings Mountain Baptist Association, shall be the liaison organization between church organizations and the N. C. Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 2. This associational Union shall recognize the autonomy of church organizations as provided in the Baptist democratic process of operation.

Section 3. Church organizations shall be recognized as units through which the object of this Woman's Missionary Union is accomplished, each responsible for its own program, and contributing to the work of the association.

Section 4. This associational Union shall be guided in its plan of work by the associational aims for Advancement.

ARTICLE IV

MEMBERS

The members of Woman's Missionary Union organizations in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association shall constitute the membership.

ARTICLE V

OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, YWA Director, GA Director, Sunbeam Band Director, and others as needed. These officers shall be elected annually in a meeting of the associational WMU and shall hold office for one year or until their successors are elected. The tenure of office shall be 5 consecutive years.

Section 2. These officers shall perform the duties set out for them in these By-Laws and the leaflet, "The Associational WMU."

ARTICLE VI

NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

Section 1. The nominating committee composed of 5 women shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee, and elected by the associational WMU to serve for one year.

Section 2. The nominating committee shall nominate officers and promotional directors. Other nominations may be made from the floor.

Section 3. The nominating committee, in event of a vacancy, shall present a nominee for the unexpired term for election by the associational WMU (or the Executive Committee).

ARTICLE VII

MEETINGS

Section 1. Day and/or night Associational WMU meetings (including business women) shall be held annually.

Section 2. Other meetings shall be held as authorized by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VIII

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the officers, promotional directors and any others desired.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall schedule the regular meetings of the organizations, plan the program of activities, hear reports and check progress on the Aims for Advancement.

Section 3. Regular meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held quarterly.

ARTICLE IX

PROMOTIONAL DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be directors of mission study, prayer, community missions, stewardship, and others as needed.

Section 2. These directors shall furnish information for corresponding local chairmen, hold conferences, and carry out other plans as authorized by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE X**COMMITTEES**

Section 1. There shall be committees standing or special as needed.

Section 2. Committees, except those otherwise provided for, shall be appointed by the president.

Section 3. The president shall be ex-officio member of all committees except the nominating committee.

Section 4. The duties of these committees are such as are set forth in these By-Laws and the leaflet, "The Associational WMU."

ARTICLE XI**FINANCES**

Section 1. The associational WMU shall adopt an annual budget, funds to be provided by WMU organizations in the Association.

Section 2. These funds will be on 50 cent per W.M.S. member basis, and are to be sent to the Associational Treasurer by December 1.

ARTICLE XII**PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY**

The rules contained in Robert's RULES OF ORDER, REVISED or the Parliamentary section in the WMU Year Book shall govern the Union in all cases to which they are applicable.

ARTICLE XIII**AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS**

These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the associational WMU provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.

The Society's work is made possible solely by voluntary gifts from churches and individuals. The single purpose of the American Bible Society is to help in the sowing and sharing of God's Word throughout the world.

Pastors, church workers and laymen can render an important service by giving copies of the catalog to others.

ANNUITY BOARD

THE LIFE BENEFIT PLAN

The Life Benefit Plan was inaugurated on October 1, 1964 to meet the need for supplemental life protection for our pastors and denominational employees, and has already achieved phenomenal success with more than ten thousand active participants. It affords protection ranging from ten to thirty thousand dollars for death under age 46 with graduated benefits thereafter for dues of \$3.34 to \$10.00 per month. It is still open for membership.

THE HEALTH BENEFIT PLAN

The health benefit plan is an all-inclusive program of hospital, surgical and major-medical protection program which is now being offered. The target date for the beginning of this plan is October 1, 1965. Five thousand applications are required by September 1 in order to put this program into effect.

BENEFITS PAID—"MANNA FROM HEAVEN"

It has been said by many annuitants that the checks which come from the Annuity Board each month are like "Manna from Heaven". These checks vary in size, depending upon the length of time one was a member and the amount of the dues paid.

Since the beginning of the Annuity Board in 1918, almost 47 million dollars have been paid in relief and annuity benefits to the men and women of God who serve Southern Baptist. In 1964 alone, 3½ million was paid to ministers and denominational workers or their families.

MEMBERS IN ANNUITY BOARD PLANS

Today more than 16,352 churches in the Protection Program for their pastors. Approximately 10,000 of these churches are paying the total 10% dues.

There are now 127 of the 176 educational institutions, hospitals, children's homes, homes for the aged and other southwide agencies protected by one of the Annuity Board programs. This means more than 25,000 members are in the Annuity Board retirement plans.

There are seven with 70% or more of the churches in the plan. At the present time North Carolina has 46% of the churches in the Protection Program for ministers.

ANNUITY BOARD SECRETARY

Rev. Guy Cain is jointly employed by the North Carolina Baptist Convention and the Annuity Board. He promotes the Board's total program of protection by trying to enlist all pastors, churches and denominational employees who are not enrolled in the program in North Carolina. Baptist Homes For The Aging

1965 Associational Report

The day that North Carolina Baptists launched a ministry to the aging fourteen years ago was a good day indeed. Since that time four Homes for the aging have come into being, and a fifth one is in the making. Many elderly people have been blessed by this compassionate ministry through the years, and today 160 people are in residence at Resthaven, and the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem, the Albemarle Home in Albemarle, and the Hamilton Home in Hamilton. When the proposed new Home at Yanceyville is completed, there will be capacity for 200. It is anticipated that construction will begin on the Yanceyville Home during 1965.

This labor of Christian love and nurture is ours together, and we could not operate without the concern, the prayers, and the financial support of our Baptist people. This financial aid from the churches comes to us through two very vital avenues—the Special Day Offerings, received on the third Sunday of February each year, and the Cooperative Program. Special Day Offering receipts for 1964 were at an all-time high and exceeded \$96,000.00. Through these gifts we were able to supplement from 80% to 90% of our needy residents who could not be with us otherwise.

It is urgently hoped that the Special Day Offering for 1965 will be the greatest ever, especially in view of the pressing and ever-increasing needs of the aging in our midst who seek our help. The waiting list now is 175 and grows almost daily.

As the great heart of the Saviour yearns for all in the various areas of human need, we are grateful that He has commissioned us to include also a special ministry to the aged among us. We have responded to His plea, we are giving an answer to Him for these elderly people who are very dear to Him, and we pray that every church in our State Baptist Convention will be very careful to give increasing emphasis to this vital ministry.

Biblical Recorder

With serious moral issues facing us on every hand, Baptists need an accurate and comprehensive source of information. Secular papers cannot meet this need. These papers cover so many things—sports, society, business, obituaries, entertainment, national and foreign affairs, to mention a few. All too often religion is found only on a Saturday church page—if at all.

In the past year those who look to the secular press for coverage of Baptist events were disappointed on more than one occasion. The Southern Baptist Convention in Dallas and the Baptist World Congress in Miami Beach provide two examples. Even the best of the daily papers had no more than one article a day on these meetings. Some had none.

Where can Baptists get coverage of these and other significant meetings? The BIBLICAL RECORDER, their dependable medium of information for 132 years. Typical of its service, the RECORDER devoted special editions to these important meetings at Dallas and Miami Beach. Many people who

read these issues said they felt like they were there. This is the RECORDER'S job—to be our eyes and ears when we cannot be there.

In many other ways the RECORDER serves its readers. For example, a bill was introduced in the 1965 General Assembly that would have legalized distilleries in our state. Editorials in the RECORDER aroused our people and they, in turn, contacted their legislators. The bill was soundly defeated. A liquor-by-the-drink bill can be expected in the 1967 Assembly. Again, the RECORDER will keep you informed. With so many papers now accepting beer and liquor advertising, the question arises as to how they can give unbiased coverage to liquor proposals.

Let's talk money for a moment: The average Baptist family spends at least 50c to \$1.00 a week on newspapers with little complaint. And yet, for only 4c or 5c a week—the cost of a stamp—the RECORDER can come into a home. If your church does not have a RECORDER club, please see that one is organized. Only four people are needed to form a club. Better still, send the RECORDER to every family under the Church Budget Plan. Our Baptist people must be enlisted in the fight against evil. The best way this can be done is through the pages of the BIBLICAL RECORDER.

Brotherhood Report

Most of the activity within the Association Brotherhood, last year, was reflected in the Royal Ambassador program. Brother Bill Philbeck, as association RA leader, did an outstanding job. His report appears elsewhere in these minutes.

A number of churches were kind enough to invite me to speak at Brotherhood functions, for which I am deeply grateful. However, interest in general in the brotherhood program has not been overly encouraging. This is due largely, I think, to lack of publicity and promotion in the individual churches, and perhaps to the lack of specific projects.

It is my recommendation that the quarterly meetings formerly held by the Association Brotherhood be resumed and that, in addition, such workshops and training sessions as are deemed necessary be scheduled on interim dates throughout the year. Each program meeting should feature the most inspiring speaker available, preferably a layman, and should be well publicized throughout the association. To assure this, it is my suggestion that the office of "publicity-promotion leader" be added to the Association Brotherhood.

With the help of the State Brotherhood Director, a training session should be set up early in the year for the purpose of teaching brotherhood members fundamental techniques to be used in visiting and personal witnessing. These activities are, in my opinion, the two most important functions of the Brotherhood.

Every pastor should have a group of deeply dedicated men in his church upon whom he could call to pray in times of crisis. Every pastor should, I think, have prayer fellowship with these laymen, so often as is possible, before entering the pulpit. The Brotherhood is the logical source of such a prayer cell, just as it is, or should be, the organization responsible for the church visitation program.

The Brotherhood can be the "spiritual coal bin," stoking the pastoral furnace and radiating warmth and faith throughout the church. It is my prayer that the day may come when each of the 70 Baptist Churches in the Association, rather than the slightly more than half that number at present, may have such a "coal bin" in the form of its Brotherhood.

Children's Homes

Along with a part of the report to the associations sent out from Baptist Children's Homes, we include a report of what the churches in our association did for the homes during the past associational year.

The care of dependent, neglected and homeless children is the central mission of the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina. In addition to providing care for children it is the purpose of the Homes to join hands with our Christian forces to strengthen wholesome, Christian family life throughout the state. Our people have supported this ministry in a most generous and commendable way.

According to the records the churches of our association gave last year **\$13,737.00**. This represents a per member gift of about 54 cents. Sixty churches made some contributions, ten did not. We are hoping that every church will participate this year.

Our Homes are serving as many people who need our help as possible. They are dependent upon North Carolina Baptists for support. Every gift, however small or large, is appreciated and is used for the purpose for which it is given. Income through the Cooperative Program is becoming increasingly important.

The Thanksgiving Offering of last year is approaching three hundred ten thousand dollars (\$310,000.00) and is the largest ever given. This suggests that our people welcome an opportunity to support the "helping ministries" of the church which are close to the heart of our Lord.

There is a growing need for good Christian foster homes in which children needing this kind of care can live. Many families are finding much happiness and a great opportunity for service in caring for foster children. Thus, many boys and girls are privileged to grow up in Christian homes who otherwise would not have this opportunity. Should you have an "extra measure of love" to share in this way the Homes would like to know of your interest.

The need for a home in the western part of the state, more adequately to serve the people west of the Blue Ridge Mountains, has been discussed in various meetings and conferences. The possibility of such a home is meeting with genuine interest and enthusiasm. Attention is currently being given to a suitable location.

Members of the Board of Trustees and members of the staff of the Children's Homes are committed to the task of maintaining a Christian program of child care—a program that will merit the undivided support and loyalty of our people and that will bring honor to our Lord. To that end it is our purpose to meet, as effectively as possible, the challenges of our day.

Cooperative Program Report

For forty years the Cooperative Program has been the life line for Southern Baptists' Mission Work at home and overseas.

We are presently supporting 2,000 foreign missionaries; 2,500 home missionaries and more than 100 missionaries in North Carolina. This is not enough however. Dr. Cauthen, Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board, has challenged Southern Baptists to send out 5,000 foreign missionaries in the immediate future. As the boundries of our Southern Baptist Convention territory expand, there is need to greatly increase the home mission force. This calls for increased giving.

Our concern for a lost world is reflected in what we are willing to give to the support of work encompassed by the Cooperative Program.

According to the 1964 associational records, we increased our gifts through the Cooperative Program \$14,377.00 over the previous year for a total of \$187,556.00.

The digest of church letters for this year reveals an increase of \$20,312 and a total of \$207,868.

We note, with regret, that the 1964 minutes show that seven of our churches made no gifts through the Cooperative Program, and that two churches made no gifts to any kind of missions.

Recommendations

1. That our churches participate in the **TITHE . . . NOW! Emphasis.**
2. That our churches continue to give through the Cooperative Program.
3. That as individuals and churches, we pray for the continued success of the Cooperative Program.
4. That all churches observe October, or some other month if preferable, as Cooperative Program Emphasis Month. (A leaflet with appropriate suggestions can be secured from: Department of Stewardship Development, P. O. Box 9523, Raleigh, N. C.)

Foreign Mission Report

Surely in the light of news of our world so recently becoming first in our thoughts and concerns, we agree that it is "time to wake up" to the needs of the world as we have attempted to take the Gospel to them in places not so blessed as we. Perhaps too long we have preferred to remain asleep to the needs we have known existed. But with the conquest of space and the unleashing of new powers that can be used to deliver man or destroy, we are alerted to these needs and to the fact that we have our Lord's Commission to "go" and with the news of salvation, meet man's most pressing need.

We do not have to look far to see the needs, nor how little we do to meet them. While we as a rule are proud of what Southern Baptists are doing to support Foreign Missions we question whether or not we are meeting the challenge of reaching those without Christ as God would have us do or do we deceive ourselves when we proudly claim the title of "Missionary Baptists."

At the close of 1964 there were 1,901 missionaries (159 appointed during the year) under appointment by the Foreign Mission Board and assigned to 57 countries. 685 missionaries to 19 Latin American countries and the Baptist Spanish Publishing House; 625 to 14 countries of the Orient and Hawaii; 447 to 11 nations of Africa; and 144 to 13 countries of Europe and the Middle

East. During the year missionaries were named to four new countries: Togo, Ivory Coast, Luxembourg, and Yemen.

Dr. Baker J. Cauthen has said concerning our mission needs, "Even with growing financial resources, it is impossible to meet all the urgent needs which are annually recommended by the Missions. The recommendations each year exceed the resources available by more than \$3,000,000. While rejoicing in all the advance being made, it is realistic to remember that only the most urgent needs can be supplied and many necessary steps must be required to wait. Missions advance is projected with confidence that God will call workers into his harvest, and Southern Baptists will respond with resources to undergird their ministry."

Let us "awaken" to the fact that resources of a physical nature alone will not accomplish the task. There must be dedication of ourselves, resources, and sons and daughters for the greatest need of foreign missions remains that of personnel.

The General Board Report

Many items of important business were transacted by the General Board this associational year. Discussion on the establishment of a Seminary Extension Center in the association began in the December meeting. Rev. Marion DuBose, Associational Training Union Director, brought the motion and Cline Borders, Director of the Seminary Extension Program, spoke on the motion explaining courses available and the cost to the student. After much planning the Seminary Extension courses for pastors was announced to begin September 28th of this year. Other courses for laymen are being considered. Courses are available in both Old and New Testament and in other church related subjects.

In the December meeting the board unanimously voted to enter the "Tithe Now" program.

Announcement was received in the April meeting of the invitation to our Associational R. A. Leader, Bill Philbeck, to participate in the Layman's Crusade in Hawaii this year. Churches were invited to help pay his expense and many responded with gifts totaling over \$100. Mr. Philbeck reported a very successful crusade upon his return, in August, and offered to visit churches of the association to show slides and speak on his trip.

One of the major business transactions of the year occurred when Mr. Tom Cornwell, Chairman of the House and Ground Committee told of the desire of Hoyle Memorial Methodist Church to purchase the property now being used as the Baptist Center. A motion was made by Mr. Cornwell to sell the building at a price of \$13,000.00 and rent office space in the downtown area, using the interest from the principal to pay rent. The motion carried after much investigation the Missions Council and our Superintendent of Missions settled on the location on West Graham Street a building owned by Mr. Phil Rucker, next door to the Chamber of Commerce. The move of the associational office and the transfer of property to the Hoyle Memorial Church was accomplished the third week in September.

One request for Ministerial Scholarship at Gardner-Webb was approved for Charles R. Feld, member at First Baptist Church, Shelby.

Gardner-Webb College

E. Eugene Poston, President of the College

The 59th year of Gardner-Webb College began with a new calendar and a new system of registration. The calendar provides for completion of the first semester before Christmas holidays. Registration was done with a unit record system of data processing on IBM machines.

A total of 1190 students have enrolled for the fall semester. This total is broken down as follows: 1098 regular students, 32 special students, and 60 evening college students.

The total enrollment figures represent 58 counties of North Carolina, 14 states and the District of Columbia, and 2 foreign countries. We have foreign students from Lebanon and Japan.

Last year Gardner-Webb graduated her first Negro student, Miss Joyce Watkins. Joyce is now a student at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill.

The Gardner-Webb faculty, staff and administration number 78. There are 102 on the payroll, including maintenance force and cafeteria force. The Royster Memorial Hospital, which is a part of Gardner-Webb, has a staff of 54, including four doctors.

A brief review of the history of Gardner-Webb reveals that the Kings Mountain Association appointed a committee of five in the year 1905 to start a high school. With the help of the Sandy Run and the Gaston Association, the school opened in 1907. The pressure of state supported high schools led the Trustees to convert the high school to a junior college in 1928. The present Decade of Advance—1961-1971, has many goals, including a student body of 1000, a faculty of 75 members, and a fully accredited four-year college. The trustees and the administration feel that they must get ready for the four-year program in order to meet the demands and the needs of the area. They feel that the state supported community junior college program will press the school into a four-year program.

Many significant developments have occurred at Gardner-Webb during the past school year. A total of 1994 applications were received. The admissions committee members had to turn away more students than they accepted. The college entered the 60th Anniversary Phase of the Decade of Advance. The trustees set a financial goal of \$1,125,000. The total amount paid and subscribed to date is over \$1,000,000. There are still several counties to be solicited. The goal will be exceeded. A new Men's Dormitory has been built and occupied. The Charles I. Dover Campus Center is under construction. This \$525,000 building will house a new cafeteria, a bookstore, a snack shop, a post office, a recreation area, a day student lounge, a private dining room, student publications rooms, and faculty offices. The swimming pool adjacent to the Bost Physical Education Building is being enclosed for year-round use. Plans are being drawn for a Chapel-Religious Activities Center, a Classroom Building, a Sports Stadium, a new Entrance to the College, and a Bell Tower. A new campus layout for the next 20-25 years is being drawn up. A dedication service is being planned for the A. T. Withrow Science Building, the Bost Physical Education Building, and the Lutz-Yelton Dormitory. These buildings have been named in honor of leading families of the area. The O. Max Gardner Building will soon be converted into a Fine Arts Center. Credit for the above accomplishments must go to the Board of Trustees, the Board of Advisers, the Faculty, the Administration, the Staff and to Mr. R. Patrick Spangler, National General Chairman of the 60th Anniversary Phase of the Decade of Advance. Governor Dan K. Moore, speaking at a Gardner-Webb Convocation this year, said about Mr. Spangler, "He is a young man in a hurry to get a job done." Mr. Spangler is a faithful member of the First Baptist Church of Shelby, North Carolina. He will be the key to Gardner-Webb's four-year college dream.

The highlight of the past year was a general Convocation held in March of 1965. Speakers included the Governor of North Carolina, the Honorable Dan K. Moore; the Honorable Julia Butler Hansen, Member of the U. S. House of Representatives from the state of Washington; Mr. D. W. Brosnan, President of the Southern Railway System; the Honorable Basil L. Whitener, member of the U. S. House of Representatives from North Carolina. The concluding services of the Convocation was an evangelistic service with Dr. Billy Graham scheduled as the central speaker. Sickness prevented Dr. Graham's being present and one of his associates, Dr. T. W. Wilson, brought the evangelistic message. Scores of people responded. Some accepted Christ for the first time. Other rededicated their lives or surrendered to full-time Christian service. Thousands attended the weekend Convocation and evangelistic service.

Even though Gardner-Webb is basically a liberal arts college, the school offers three additional programs—an evening college for adults, an IBM Data Processing School for regular college and evening college students, and an Associate in Arts Degree Nursing Program. The Nursing Program has already received accreditation. There is one male student in the nursing program. All of this is being done to meet the stated purpose of the college, which is “to develop quality Christian students who will think for themselves and who will dedicate their lives to God in the vocation of their own choice.”

During the past year college Endowment Funds increased \$128,508.64 through gifts, bequests and savings, and the plant fund assets increased \$489,716. At the present time the Gardner-Webb College Endowment Fund is valued at \$664,334.72. The Physical plant is valued at \$3,070,368.46. All bills were paid promptly and our total debt as of July 31, 1965, was none.

Historian's Report

“Write the vision and make it plain upon tables, that he may run that readeth it.” Habakkuk 2:2.

We are now ready to write a History of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

The history has been made, 115 years of it, glorious, meaningful, inspiring history of ancient and recent days. We have the records on microfilm and in the annuals of the Churches and the Association. This body has appointed a Commission quite able to do the task.

We have only to authorize a beginning, assign the tasks to be done and count the cost. During this session the Commission will report on a six-fold request from the Association at Waco last year.

As historian I feel the Association, its churches and their members should expect such a History to be comprehensive; to cover the entire life of the body and all pertinent information about it. This history should cover first the origins of Baptists in the area, in relation to early settlements. It must tell the story of the Association, its problems, accomplishments and something of the leaders. It must recount the growth of the Churches themselves, their buildings, programs, their organizations such as the Sunday School, Training Union, Womans Missionary Union, the Brotherhood, the music, and of course, the personalities in the churches.

It must reflect the Mission of the churches and of the Association itself, and how this mission is being carried out.

We must resolve to tell the truth about ourselves, and, like the Bible, leave out nothing of importance; not garnish or embellish or gild the past; let the book and the records mirror the past as it was, including attitudes toward theology, faith and practice, towards temperance, towards other denominations, towards missions, towards race, and toward ourselves and our work.

Let us write the record plain upon the tables, "that he may run that readeth it."

In this rapidly changing world we need to run just to keep up. A really good History of this Association will help us to get ahead.

Report on Home Missions

In an Associational report on Home Missions of Southern Baptists three things defy the mind of man to print, portray, picture or estimate in relation to the work of the Home Missions.

Number one: the detailed universality of the area and type of work that is done for our Lord; two: the dimension of the need of the Christian service it performs; three: the value to the Kingdom of God resulting from these services in the United States of America.

Our Home Mission enterprise with its 3,011 workers (including Summer workers) serve in all fifty states of our Nation plus Cuba, Panama, and Puerto Rico. The 144 added recruits this year and a great number of former workers with the use of 66% of the budget pressed into new areas with the Gospel of our Lord.

In many languages as a result of 47,512 classes taught, 172,733 sermons preached, 1,574,265 pieces of religious print given, professions of faith and additions to churches amounted to 90,671 plus 12,000 through our Chaplaincy. Also 446 new missions were started and 201 new churches organized this year thus reaching a total of 18,285 missions organized and 6,682 churches constituted during the past nine years.

Many churches that have existed for years, having a dire need of extending their physical facilities to do a great work for the peoples of their community, have been aided by the Church Loan Division. Six million dollars was loaned this year to over 421 churches enabling a greater work to be done for our Lord. The division reports a corpus of more than \$15 million in all its funds for this service. Plans are now being made to establish loan funds through the State Conventions to broaden this service.

Jesus said, "The harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few." As it is with our local churches, as it is with the Foreign Mission Board, so it is with the Home Mission Board; if, (and the potential more than exists) every detail in function was doubled, we still would be a long way from sight of the horizon regarding present existing needs.

Heaven only knows and eternity only can reveal the value of the work done by our local churches, the Foreign Mission Board, and likewise our Home Mission service for our Lord here in this great American nation. Southern Baptist Home Missions need our prayers, our money, our men and women. Our prayer, our money, our men and women in dedication are deserved by Him who said, "In as much as ye did it unto the least of these, ye did it unto me."

Baptist Hospital

More than 35,000 sick people were seen in the clinics of our Baptist Medical Center in Winston-Salem last year, and more than 19,000 were hospitalized for bed care. These sick people came from all sections of our state, out of all kinds of financial circumstances, and with almost every type of serious disease and sickness known to man. Most of them were

sent by their local doctors, because they had problems which were difficult of diagnosis or treatment, and needed specialized facilities and skills such as those found at our Baptist Hospital.

In addition to the sick people who were served, there were more than 700 persons in training in the various fields of medical care and Christian service. These students were studying in ten different schools, and in other fields of training in our Medical Center, and will go out to serve as physicians, nurses, technicians, pastors and other Christian workers, in our communities and churches throughout North Carolina and on our mission fields around the world. These schools offer excellent opportunities, and they are interested in qualified Baptist young people who wish to invest their lives in useful service to their fellow man and in the Kingdom of God.

The ministry of our hospital to people who are seriously ill and in meager circumstances lies at the very heart of its total work. All of our Mother's Day offerings are used for this purpose; when the doctors have given their skilled services without charge to these patients, and the money available from all other sources is added, every dollar we give is multiplied nine times over in free service to those who need help.

It is a high privilege for us in our churches to minister in the name of the Great Physician, through our hospital, to these multitudes who are sick. It will be a welcome voice when the King shall come in His glory and we can hear Him say: "Come, ye blessed of my Father; for I was sick, and ye visited me."

Report of House and Grounds Committee

Your committee has not had to spend any money on the building and grounds at 1003 Buffalo Street, Shelby this year. However, we can report to you that we spent many hours in meeting and consultations connected with selling the property to Hoyle Memorial Methodist Church.

In considering with them the joint needs committed with the house and lot they again indicated an interest in buying the building. Appraisals were made, an offer of \$13,000 was made and reported to the Genral Board. The Board accepted the offer and transferred ownership to Hoyle Memorial in September.

We also assisted in finding new quarters for the Baptist Center. It is located at 107 West Graham Street Shelby.

Report of Associational Music Ministry

1964-1965

The goal of the Associational Music Ministry during this past year was to provide inspiration and training for the music leaders of the local churches. To implement this goal, the music committee adopted a program of "One Night Clinics" for music leaders.

The first of these clinics, held at the Dover Baptist Church, was designed as a methods and materials clinic for church choir directors and accompanists. Mr. Robert Decker, Minister of Music at the Elizabeth Baptist Church, led this clinic and presented materials that could be used effectively in the local churches. A fellowship supper for directors and accompanists was enjoyed before the clinic began, and both, the supper and the clinic, were well attended.

The second one night clinic was one on Music in Worship and was attended by pastor and music leaders. In this meeting, held at the Elizabeth Baptist Church, a panel discussed the use of music in worship, and then, those present divided into smaller groups to discuss and plan worship services. For those who attended, it was a very stimulating meeting.

The third and last of these clinics was held at the Bethel Baptist Church and was designed to help those who lead children in music experience. Mr. Allen Jolley led the group in studying methods and materials for Juniors. Because of poor attendance, the group studying the Beginner and Primary materials did not meet. This clinic was worth while but would have meant much more to the churches in the association if it had been better attended.

Other areas of work for the Associational Music Ministry during this past year included giving assistance to individual churches when called upon and planning the Associational Christmas Carol Sing.

We were very pleased with the attendance and spirit of the Carol Sing held this year at the Double Springs Baptist Church. The program consisted of congregational singing, a speech choir from First Baptist Church, Shelby, bringing the Christmas scripture, and a combined choir consisting of Junior Choirs from several local churches singing the cantata, "Lo! A Star."

South Mountain Baptist Camp Report

1965 Season

South Mountain Baptist Camp continues to bless the lives of the great numbers who attend her various activities. Hundreds of campers had a rich and deeper experience with God and learned a lot about our church work.

We had five G.A. Camps with 831 attending. We had four R.A. Camps with 417 attending. We had 243 campers who received honor camper awards. 630 earned the Star camper award. To receive these honors the campers must study on forward steps or Manual study. Also, it is necessary to read a Mission Book. We had eight Missionaries on our camp programs this summer.

We had a total of 2030 who attended the various activities during this season. We had an increased number of youth retreats, over night camps and supper meetings. Campers came from 111 churches. Catawba River Association led with 352 coming from 17 churches. Gaston was next with 292 coming from 23 churches. 201 attended from your association from 19 churches.

Our theme for the summer was "Christ, The Hope Of The World" (Col 1:27). 739 were inspired to make some kind of decision for Christ. 95 professions of faith, 605 rededications and 39 for special service.

For years we have been hauling in crushed ice at the camp. We were authorized by members of the camp committee to buy an ice-maker. We have the faith that enough individuals and churches will make donations to pay for it. It is a 220 lbs. capacity. The cost was \$714.00 installed. Donations have taken care of over \$400.00 and we have saved on the price of ice.

We are happy to report that we received an "A" rating from the North Carolina Health Department.

Even though the Camp fees are unusually low for the campers we have been operating on the money received from them. We receive approximately \$3,000.00 over and above our seasonal expenses that is applied to the salary of our camp Director who is employed the year round. We look to the churches for about \$1,000.00 of his salary. He is available to help promote camping anywhere in Region Eight. Most of the money received from the churches is used for development and improvements, and to pay off our indebtedness. We only owe \$2,500.00 to Mr. B. H. Poteet of Morganton.

Sunday School Report

The decade of the sixties may prove to be a crucial period for Christian education and evangelism in our churches. In every planning session from the state level to the local association responsible leaders voice the opinion that danger signals are flashing in every area of the church's ministry. While offerings increase personal involvement decreases. The population explosion continues in the face of a static church membership.

In our own association the spurt in industrial growth begun in the late fifties has almost stripped us of the label "Bible Belt." On a given Sunday, during the Morning or Evening Worship Hour, a large percent of the church's members are on the job in a seven-days-a-week industry. Even with the decline in morals our present day society is drawing heavily on the spiritual bank account deposited for it by the preceding generation. Once the churches allow this account to become "overdrawn" the foundation will crumble. To paraphrase the words of Jesus, "Great will be the fall of it."

In the face of such circumstances the task of the Sunday School should be clear to us all. (1) Sunday School may have to become "Monday" School. The Extension Department and Mission Bible Study Classes left the church house to go where people are. Why not provide such Bible teaching when people have the time off from a rotating shift schedule?

(2) Th Sunday School ministry must take the offensive outside of the four walls of the church. While the church is that "light set on a hill" lost and indifferent men must be sought and brought to that light. A new generation brought up outside the church, and the "transplanted" person from a pagan or Catholic background, will not be drawn to Bible study and public worship. If our Sunday Schools fail to reach these people the church of today will be smothered tomorrow: smothered, mind you, by people!

(3) The Sunday School must minister to all of the people in its community. A program limited to "our kind of people," (however you may define "our kind of people"), will be to commit suicide by degrees.

Your Associational Sunday School workers pledge to each and every church a genuine interest and concern for any problem that may be encountered during the coming year. The total resource of our department are available to YOUR church upon invitation.

Superintendent of Missions Report

Instead of boring you with statistics let me share with you some observations concerning developments in Baptist life.

In the five-year plan of Southern Baptists the emphasis for this year is "Proclamation and Witnessing." This is a two-pronged approach which emphasizes public proclamation of the Gospel and also daily personal witnessing as we work and play. These emphases would not lessen the importance of the "preaching of the world" but would add to it the neglected area of "being the church" in all of life. How we need it!

In North Carolina we are asked to participate in a five year program of work which will begin in October 1966. Yearly emphases will be: reaching more people, Christian maturity, stewardship and equipment, community involvement, and World Missions. We are asked to use this year in preparation and promotion of these plans. Each church would do well to study its program of work, pinpoint areas of need, set goals, and make plans for reaching these goals. Our Associational workers stand ready to help you in every way possible.

As we think of our work in the Kings Mountain Association we are observing what seems to be a rather strange phenomenon. From talking with pastors and church leaders and studying church bulletins, newsletters, and reports, two things are apparent: most churches are not having much trouble with finances. The money is coming in better than ever before. But to keep up attendance at church services and enlist workers in church activities is becoming more and more difficult. Does this mean that the "faithful few" are making more money and are giving more generously as well as being faithful in attendance and service? Or does it mean that many are sending their money, thereby tipping their hats to God and saying, "That's it, don't bother us with anything else?" Could our increasingly industrialized society be a factor? We don't know but we think it needs some study. How can we motivate people to whole hearted Christian living?

An item of major importance in our Associational life is the moving of the office. The building on Buffalo Street was sold to Hoyle Memorial Methodist Church. The capital will be held intact and interest from it will be used to help pay the rent on the new office at 107 West Graham Street, Shelby next door to the Chamber of Commerce. We are delighted with the new place and are thrilled that so many more of you are using our facilities since we are conveniently down town. We want all of you to come to see us. Call on us for any help we can render.

Training Union Report

Training Union organization and materials have been and continue to be undergoing a great deal of change to meet the needs of our people. These changes are being taken to the people through the tireless efforts of our State Training Union Workers who are working very closely with our associational workers. Every effort is being made on every level of leadership to enlist, train, and use every Christian for more effective Christian living, personally and socially.

Even though the place of Training Union in the development of the Christian life and in the instructional program of the church has not been as fully accepted as other organizations, continuing efforts are being made to show its relevance and to continually strive for higher standards in materials and structure. The prayers of those who know the importance and rich rewards of training for more effective Christian living and serving will continue to undergird and promote this work for our Lord Jesus Christ.

This past year has been encouraging as the Reverend Marion Dubose, Jr., now serving in another state, led our associational work in an excellent way. His spirit of leadership encouraged and brought forth good efforts from his co-workers. There was a fair response from the churches which made all the efforts worthwhile.

Some of the experiences of the year need to be noted:

1. "M" Night was an experience to worship and challenge as the Reverend James Potter, pastor of Prichard Memorial Baptist Church, Charlotte, led us as the speaker for the event. With an attendance of 870 our association was FIFTH in the state in attendance. Fifty-five churches were represented and forty-five pastors were present. Let us strive for an even larger group this year as we unite for service.

The Southern Baptist Convention has finally planned our schedule so that the Week of Prayer for Foreign Missions will not conflict with "M" Night.

2. The response to the associational Junior Memory Week, Intermediate Sword Drill, and Young Peoples Better Speakers tournaments was gratifying. Several of our churches are providing this valuable stimuli for Christian growth to their youth. The value of these worthy activities cannot be overestimated.

3. Associational Youth Night was held at the First Baptist Church, Shelby, with leaders in the areas of Government, Medicine and Related Sciences, Education, and Vocational Christian Service discussing these areas of vocations with the young people. The young people were divided into four groups with the conference leaders rotating so that each group benefited from the discussion of all the four areas of vocations presented.

Prior to the conference periods a delicious meal was served and a devotional period was conducted highlighted by a choral group of young people from the First Baptist Church, Kings Mountain, led by Mr. Allen Jolley.

4. Church Membership Study Week was promoted on a group basis with all the groups providing their respective churches with a study in the area of worship. This approach proved to be effective and many people benefited from this study of an unparalleled need.

This approach was effective in that associational leaders believed that a larger number of people could be reached than would be reached at a central associational wide study. Each church should check itself and see that more of its people are informed of this annual study and vigorously encouraged to attend.
