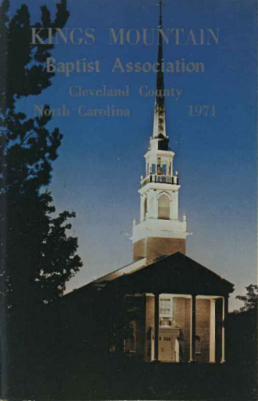

Cedar Baptist Church was organized in December, 1894, and accepted into Kings Mountain Baptist Association in 1903. They have a present membership of 167. The present house of worship was constructed in 1954. Rev. Jerry Langston is pastor; Emerson Probst is Sunday School Director; Donald Melton is Church Training Director; and Mrs. Aletha Downen is W.M.U. Director.



New Bethel Baptist Church was founded in July, 1848, with a charter membership of twenty-five persons. Only seven churches in the Kings Mountain Association are older. New Bethel was the first to host the Association and has always been prominent in support and leadership of the Association. The present building was erected in 1954 during the pastorate of C. O. Greene. Rev. W. C. McKinney, Jr., is the present pastor.

## CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

### Preamble

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

### Article I Name

The name of this body shall be the "Kings Mountain Baptist Association."

### Article II Purpose

It shall be the purpose of the Association to cooperate with the State and Southern Baptist Conventions in the promotion of Christian Missions at home and abroad, and in any other related objects such as evangelism, Christian education, benevolent enterprises, and social services, which it may deem proper and advisable for the furtherance of the Kingdom of God.

## Article III Membership

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist Churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Membership Committee and if recommended by this Committee and accepted by the Association shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year. At the end of one year, upon recommendation of the Committee, membership within the Association of such churches shall be determined by vote of the Association. During this period such churches shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its Constitution and By-Laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and, if requested, the General Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like Associations.

## Article IV Meetings

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Tuesday evening and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or General Board provided two weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 3: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each 50 members of the church, provided each church shall have not less than three nor more than ten messengers. These shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those attending and registering at the Associational meeting.

## Article V Authority

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this constitution in Article III, Sections 2 and 3.

## Article VI Officers and Their Election

Section 1: The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Music Director, Organist, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Chairman of Library Council, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Youth and Family Services Director, and parliamentarian.

Section 2: The officers shall be elected on the morning of the last day of the Annual Meeting for a term of one year each. The nominees shall be constructed and nominated by the Committee on Nominations (By-Law IV, Section 6) except the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk-Treasurer who shall be nominated from the floor. Committee nominations shall not preclude nominations from the floor.

Section 3: All officers shall complete their work as soon as practicable after the closing of the Annual Session. The newly elected officers shall assume, at the

close of the Annual Session, all duties incumbent upon said officers relating to the work of the ensuing Associational year.

Section 4: Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election.

### Article VII Trustees and Their Election

There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

### Article VIII The General Board

The General Board shall be composed of all Associational Officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Associational Superintendent of Missions (ex officio without voting privileges), each active pastor, two other members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The General Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the constitution. It shall be the duty of the General Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association in its annual meeting. The quarterly meetings will be in October, January, April, and July; on Monday after the third Sunday at 10:00 A.M.

### Article IX Committees

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through the following annual meeting.

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the annual meeting:

- (1) Order of Business Committee (By-Law IV, Section 1)
- (2) Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
- (3) Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
- (4) Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)
- (5) Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 5)
- (6) Nominations Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
- (7) Constitution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
- (8) Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
- (9) Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
- (10) Resolutions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
- (11) Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
- (12) Secretary Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
- (13) Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
- (14) Place and Preacher Committee (By-Law IV, Section 15)
- (15) Youth and Family Services Committee (By-Law IV, Section 17)
- (16) Any other Committee authorized by the Association.

B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting, Committee on Committees (By-Law IV, Section 14)

Section 2: The following committees shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty days prior to the annual meeting to serve during the annual meeting:

(1) Enrollment Committee (By-Law IV, Section 14)

### Article X Amendments

Amendments to this constitution may be made at any annual session of the Association upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association in the first session and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association in the last session. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

### BY-LAWS

#### By-Law I PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

#### By-Law II ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

#### By-Law III DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committees on Committees and Committees on Enrollment. He shall be Chairman of the General Board and be an ex officio (without voting privileges) member of all other committees.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be Vice-Chairman of the General Board.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's annual meeting; distribute at the annual meeting copies of the digest of these reports; make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the General Board. He shall inform all persons elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action. He shall receive and back all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its General Board, or as designated in the Budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the General Board or the Association in Annual Session); render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the annual meeting and give a report at each quarterly General Board meeting; and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Association Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.

Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and shall make a written report to each annual meeting of the Association.

Section 6: Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the General Board except the office Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator

shall automatically become Moderator.  
**By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES**

**Section 1: THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE** shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Clerk and Associational Music Director. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the annual meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the sessions when adjustments in the order of business become necessary.

**Section 2: THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE**

(1) Shall be composed of the Associational officers listed in Article VI, Section 1, of the Constitution along with the chairmen of the Evangelism and Finance Committees. It shall work with Associational Superintendent of Missions in promoting the work of the Association, and lead and assist in determining need for, beginning new mission stations, and organizing new churches.

(2) If such advice is sought it shall advise any group seeking to organize a new church. It shall also seek to help any member church dealing with its problems.

(3) When without a Superintendent of Missions, this Committee shall seek out and recommend to the Association, or its General Board, for election a new Superintendent of Missions according to By-Law VI, Section 11.

(4) It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or General Board and act on routine or emergency matters between meetings of the General Board. It shall initiate and recommend matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven shall be necessary to transact business.

**Section 3: THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE**, composed of 6 members, shall promote the work of evangelism in the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its General Board.

**Section 4: THE FINANCE COMMITTEE**, composed of three members, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs for an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the annual meeting.

**Section 5: THE ORDINATION COMMITTEE**, composed of three members, with the pastor of the candidate, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

**Section 6: THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE**, composed of 6 members, shall contact before and nominate on the last day of the annual meeting of the Association the officers of the Association according to Articles VI and VII of the Constitution. This Committee shall also, in cooperation with the coordinating committee of the various departments of work, recommend workers in these various departments (Article VI, Section 1). It shall also coordinate Associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. This Committee

shall also assist the General Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

Section 7: **THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE**, composed of three members, shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed.

Section 8: **THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE**, composed of three members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws (Article III, Section 2).

Section 9: **THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE** shall be composed of the following Associational Officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMU Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, and the Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an Associational Calendar for the coming year and present same to the General Board for adoption.

Section 10: **THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE**, composed of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation and any other resolutions it or the Association may deem wise.

Section 11: **THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE** shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and 6 other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Associational Meeting.

Section 12: **THE SEMINARY EXTENSION COMMITTEE**, composed of 3 members, shall plan and provide for such Seminary Extension classes as may be desired.

Section 13: **THE CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMITTEE**, composed of 6 members, shall recommend ways in which the Association can work for promotion of civic righteousness and social uplift.

Section 14: **THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES**, composed of 5 members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX, Section 1), and shall assist the General Board in filling vacancies on all other standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the chairman of each committee.

Section 15: **THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE**, composed of 3 members, shall receive or solicit invitations for the place or places of meeting for the next annual meeting of the Association, and shall recommend place or places. It shall also recommend the Preacher and alternate for the annual session or sessions.

Section 16: **THE ENROLLMENT COMMITTEE** shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of the messengers at all of the sessions.

Section 17: The Youth and Family Services Committee, composed of 3 members, shall assist the Youth and Family Services Director in co-ordinating the work of the Associational Youth and Family Services.

Section 18: Members of all these committees, except those appointed by the Moderator, shall be elected to serve for not more than three years on a rotating basis.

#### **By-Law V TRUSTEES**

The duty of the trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment or other securities of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its General Board.

#### By-Law VI SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS

Section 1: His selection shall be upon recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association in its annual meeting or, between sessions of the Association, by its General Board. His term of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity.

#### By-Law VII WRITTEN REPORTS

Written reports to appear in the Annual Minutes shall not exceed 300 words, except for History and Statistics.

#### By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the annual meeting by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

#### By-Law IX DEFINE PROCEDURE

Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.

Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six Associational Groups as follows: Polkville, Lantimore, Shelby, Kings Mountain, Grover, and Waco.

#### By-Law X THE CONFESSION OF FAITH

The Baptist Faith and Message as revised and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention on May 9, 1963.

## PROCEEDINGS

Tuesday Evening, October 18, 1971 Case Baptist Church

1. An organ prelude was presented by Mrs. E. T. Bailey, Associational Organist, as messengers from various churches and visitors gathered in Case Baptist Church for the 121st Annual Meeting of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

2. Rev. Russell Pitts, Moderator, called the meeting to order and welcomed the messengers and visitors on behalf of the Polkville Group of churches.

3. Mr. Gary Southard, minister of music at Second Baptist Church, Shelby, led the assembly in singing, "We're Marching to Zion".

4. The opening prayer was led by Rev. Eugene Land, pastor of Second Baptist Church, Kings Mountain.

5. Mr. Joseph E. Cabaniss, Clerk-Treasurer, moved "that those registering, together with those who will register, be elected to constitute the 121st Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association." This motion was seconded and is carried.

6. Mr. Hubert C. Dixon, Chairman of the Order of Business Committee reported on the committee meetings and moved that "the program as printed,



along with any necessary changes, constitutes the Order of Business for this the 121st Annual Session of the Long Mountain Baptist Association." This motion was seconded and it carried.

7. Dr. Wyan Washburn, Associational Historian, gave his report. He urged the Historians and clerks, anyone with the responsibility of recording events, to record well, to record what people are saying as well as the facts and figures. He moved the adoption of his report. The motion was seconded and it carried. The report is found elsewhere in this volume.

8. The Moderator, Rev. Russell Pitts, appointed the Committee on Committees: Rev. C. C. Busby, chairman, Mrs. Wilcox Harmon, Mrs. David Beaton, Mr. B. H. Hopper, and Rev. Raymond Crook.

9. Rev. C. O. Green gave the Superintendent of Missions' report—a Review of the work that's been done and a Preview of things to be done in the future.

10. Mr. Gary Southard led the assembly in singing "Onward, Christian Soldiers" accompanied by Mrs. E. T. Bailey at the organ.

11. Rev. Pitts, Moderator, gave a special welcome to the following pastors and ministers of music who had come into our Association since our last session: Rev. Paul Millwood, Grover First; Rev. David Elms, Oak View; Rev. T. W. Bates, Westview; Rev. Marvin Whitman, David; Rev. Arnel Center, Jr., Piedmont; Rev. Ronald McSwain, Lawndale; Rev. Jerry Laughter, Casar; and Rev. Eugene Land, Kings Mountain Second; Mrs. Doris Fink, Minister of Music at Pleasant Grove. Visitors recognized at this time were Rev. Hugh Borders of Spruce Pine and Rev. F. J. Hendrix of Atlanta, Ga.

12. In the absence of the Chairman of the Constitution Committee, Rev. C. O. Green, Superintendent of Missions, brought the proposed changes in the constitution as printed in the program so that they could be voted on tomorrow.

13. Rev. Fred McGeehan, Jr., gave the Youth and Family Services report. He said this group serves as a supporting group to other organizations ministering in these capacities and encouraged churches (especially the leadership) to look on the courts as a source where ministry is possible. He recognized the work of the Committee and asked the prayers of the people for the committee. He moved the adoption of his report. It was seconded and it carried.

14. "The Expositor", a musical group from First Baptist Church of Shelby, led by Mr. Van Ramsey, rendered two special numbers: "Shrivers of Blessing" and "The Happy Side of Life".

15. Rev. Max Evington, pastor of Pleasant Ridge Baptist Church, brought the Inspirational Message. Taking as his text Matt. 16:13-18, he said some principles of sports can be applied to the church: We must have a winning style; be on the offensive rather than the defensive; be in constant contact with the coach (God). He concluded his message with this question: The church is going to win, will we be a part?

16. As the stage was cleared for the next item on the program Moderator Russell Pitts reported there were 310 messengers and 95 visitors present for a total of 305.

17. Youth Speaks, a youth program coordinated by Rev. James Wall, pastor of Lattimore Baptist Church, was a very impressive program designed to (1) share the love of Christ, our Heavenly Father, and the Cross and (2) instill in our hearts something to take back to our own churches and share. This closed with the congregation joining hands as they sang "They'll Know We Are Christians By Our Love".

18. Rev. Jerry Laughter, pastor of the host church, Casar, led the closing prayer.

19. Mrs. E. T. Bailey presented an organ prelude as messengers gathered at New Bethel Baptist Church for the second day of the 121st Annual Session.

20. Mr. Allen Jolley, Minister of Music at First Baptist Church, Kings Mountain led the assembly in singing "Come Thou Almighty King" accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Bailey.

21. Rev. Marvin Whitman, pastor of David Baptist Church, led the opening prayer.

22. Moderator Russell Pitts expressed appreciation to the Polkville Group of Churches and Rev. W. C. McKinney, Jr., pastor of the host church, welcomed the messengers and visitors to New Bethel Church and made necessary announcements about the facilities.

23. Mr. Joseph Cabaniss, Clerk-Treasurer, gave the General Board report and the financial report. These reports are found elsewhere in this volume. He moved the adoption of these. The motion was seconded and it carried.

24. Rev. Wilson Harmon, pastor of Waco Baptist Church, gave the report of the Committee on Nominations. He moved the adoption of that report as found elsewhere in this volume. That motion was seconded and carried.

25. Rev. Dale Clark, pastor of Sandy Plains Baptist Church, gave the report of the Place and Preacher Committee. It was recommended that the evening session in 1972 be held at Poplar Springs Baptist Church; the second session be held at Rolling Springs Baptist Church; and that the preachers be: Rev. Joseph Sanders, Second Baptist Church, Shelby, Inspirational Message; Rev. Dan Jolley, Zion Baptist Church, Doctinal Message; and Rev. James Rice, Churchill Drive Baptist Church, Missionary Message; with Rev. Edward Sessions, Pleasant Grove Baptist Church, as alternate to the other three. These recommendations were adopted.

26. The Moderator called for the election of officers for the coming year. Rev. Wilson Harmon nominated Rev. Russell Pitts as Moderator. There was a motion that nominations cease. This motion was seconded and it carried, electing Russell Pitts as Moderator by acclamation.

Mr. E. H. Hopper nominated Rev. Roland Leath as Vice-Moderator. Rev. James Wall moved that nominations cease electing Rev. Leath by acclamation. The motion was seconded and it carried electing Rev. Leath as Vice-Moderator.

Rev. Edward Sessions moved that we re-elect Mr. Joseph Cabaniss as Clerk-Treasurer. The motion was seconded and it carried, electing Mr. Joseph Cabaniss as Clerk-Treasurer.

27. Mr. Allen Jolley led the congregation in singing the hymn "I Will Sing the Wonderful Story".

28. Rev. W. C. McKinney, Jr., pastor of New Bethel Church, brought the Doctinal Message. Taking as his text Luke 9:46-55 and Matthew 13:24-30, he said that there is a strong movement among Baptists toward creedalism. Quoting Acts 15:28-29, he added that Christ needed no defense then, nor does he need any now. He needed the loyalty of his disciples and that's what he needs now instead of Christians trying to kill each other with the Bible. He closed his message with the question: Who am I to sit in judgment on another's experience?

29. Mr. Carlos Young spoke on the Cooperative Program. He defined the Cooperative Program as "Doing together what we cannot do separately." He said that "If we keep the money going out, God will keep it coming in."

30. State Convention reports were given as follows:

Rev. Guy Cain spoke for the Annuity Board. "Pastors minister to you spiritually; it's no little thing for him to receive your material things." The church has a responsibility to meet the medical costs of the pastor and his family whether it is through Insurance or with cash. 51 churches out of 70 in our Association are in Annuity Retirement Program.

Mr. Andrew Leiser of the School of Pastoral Care brought greetings from, and some highlights of, that agency.

Dr. W. R. Waggoner, President of the Children's Homes, reported on that agency. He said that 86 years ago North Carolina baptists launched a program of child care which today is second only to Texas in the number of children served.

Rev. E. C. Wilkie spoke on Stewardship Development. In his report he reminded the messengers that stewardship begins with people and that stewardship is to bring the church members up to a high level of Christian living.

Mr. Peyton Brown substituting for Dr. Gordon Muddrey reported on the Baptist Foundations. Citing Luke 1, he told how people could be stewards in death as well as in life through the Baptist Foundation.

31. Mr. Joseph Cabaniss, Clerk Treasurer, reported that 237 messengers, 89 visitors, and 11 outside the association, for a total of 337, had registered.

32. Rev. W. C. McKinney, Jr., gave instruction concerning lunch.

33. Mr. Van Ramsey, accompanied at the piano by Rev. Roland Leach, sang a special number, "Let Me Burn Out, Lord."

34. Rev. Jack Clark, an associate in the Sunday School Department of the Baptist State Convention, spoke on World Missions. Citing Matthew 28:19-20 as his text, he said World Missions is God's love reaching out to all people.

35. Rev. Arnel Greer, Jr., pastor of Piedmont Baptist Church, gave the benediction and blessing for the noon meal.

#### Wednesday Afternoon, October 23, 1971

36. Mr. Van Ramsey, accompanied at the organ by Mrs. E. T. Bailey and at the piano by Rev. Roland Leach, led the congregation in a medley of hymns, "We're Marching to Zion", "He Keeps Me Singing", "Count Your Blessings", "Higher ground", and "I Would Be True".

37. Rev. T. W. Evers, pastor of Winview Baptist Church, led the opening prayer.

38. Rev. Richard Hyler, Chairman of the Constitution Committee, moved the adoption of the Committee recommendation as printed in the program. His move was seconded and it carried. This report is found elsewhere in this volume.

39. In the absence of the Membership Committee, Mr. Joseph Cabaniss, Clerk, brought the report of this committee of the application for membership by New Life Baptist Church and moved that said church be received under the watchcare of the Association for one year. Motion was seconded and it carried.

40. Organization reports were given by the following:

Harold Threatt reported for the Sunday School. He moved the adoption of his report as found elsewhere in this volume. The motion was seconded and it carried.

Edmond Sessom gave the Church Training report as found elsewhere in this volume. He moved the adoption of report. It was seconded and it carried.

John Hensbick reported for Brotherhood. He reported two new Brotherhoods organized. A copy of his report is found elsewhere in this volume. He moved its adoption. It was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. W. D. Ledbetter reported for W.M.U. Her report is found elsewhere in this volume. She moved the adoption of her report. It was seconded and adopted. She reported three new W.M.U.'s.

Mr. Van Ramsey gave the Music report. He moved the adoption of his report as found elsewhere in this volume. It was seconded and adopted.

Miss Ruby Irwin reported for Church Library. She reported there are 30 churches with active librarians. She moved the adoption of her report as found elsewhere in this volume. Motion was seconded and it carried.

Hackett Wilson was not present for his report.

41. Moderator Russell Pitts recognized Dr. Eugene Poston, President of Gardner-Webb College, for his report on the college. He reviewed the history of the College from its founding as a high school in 1903 and gave a report on last year's work. Rev. Bill McKinney moved the adoption of his report as found elsewhere in this volume. It was seconded and adopted.

42. The Moderator recognized a representative from Mars Hill College who brought greetings.

43. Rev. Robert Mullman brought a message on Christian Education. He stated that money from the Cooperative Program makes the difference between operating in the red and operating in the black for the Baptist Colleges in North Carolina.

44. In the absence of the Chairman of the Committee on Committees, Mr. Joseph E. Calhoun, Clerk, read the names of the additions to the various Committees to replace those rotating off. A complete list of these committees is found elsewhere in this volume. He moved the adoption of this report. It was seconded and it carried.

45. Rev. James Rice, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, recognized Mr. Hugh Dover, announcer of WCHS, a local radio station, and presented him with a plaque commemorating his 25 years of service to the County and Association through radio. Rev. Rice moved the adoption of his report as found elsewhere in this volume. This move was seconded and adopted.

46. Mr. Van Ramsey led the congregation in singing "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart" and "He Lives" accompanied at the organ by Mrs. E. T. Bailey and at the piano by Rev. Roland Leath.

47. Rev. Ernest Smith, pastor of Dover Baptist Church, brought the Missionary Message. He reminded that 24 years ago at the second day of the Associational Annual Meeting at New Bethel Church on a dark, rainy day he brought the message. Taking Matthew 28:16-20 as his text, he said the Lord leaves no doubt as to the mission of the church in the world. It is to 'Go, make disciples, baptize and teach.' We are to go in the power He will give. He said "These marching orders have not been recalled."

48. Rev. W. V. Tuckson, one of our retired pastors, presented a short memorial service for those who have passed away during the past year. He paid tribute to all who have gone on and thanked God for their faithfulness.

49. Rev. C. O. Geerke, Superintendent of Missions, led the closing prayer.

50. Meeting was adjourned.

Over 3,500 came for some type of organized activity this season. 1970 attended our camps. Hundreds came by for a visit. 134 attended from your Association.

We had 1150 decisions for Christ. Of these 317 were professions of faith.

We maintained a dedicated staff of 22-25 whom God used in a wonderful way. They went into fifteen churches on week ends to sing, show slides and give testimonies about their experiences with Christ at camp. We are deeply grateful to them for this extra service rendered to the Camp.

Johnny and Rhia Rose were the very able assistants of T. A. Linberger, Camp Director. Your director is very much indebted to his whole family for the success of the Camp. Our Theme for the year was, "Showing Christ to the World". Rhia Rose wrote a new song to help remind the campers that every Christian has the responsibility of showing Christ to the world. Each week during the summer we had a Missionary to help give each one a worldwide vision of our responsibility. Campers studied organization work each day.

We had a good year financially. During the year we deposited \$36,500.00 into the general fund. Operating expenses were \$72,790.00. During the year we paid off a \$9,000.00 note plus \$700.00 interest. Funds came in well during the year for the Chapel. \$4,177.60 is in the fund now.

Immediate Needs: Cantakers home to be built, winterize buildings, sow grass in play area, fix seeping at river, build bunk beds, build Chapel, finish missionary Cottage, increase Water Supply

Improvements during the year: painted assembly building, two cottages and store; covered water line, landscaping, enlarged play area, graded road to missionary cottage, paved basketball court, built office, sowed garden.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is seeking to fulfill the admonition of James 1:27 which says, "Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction . . ." The Board is doing this for every widow and child whose husband was a member of one of the various plans operated by the Board. The visiting is made in the form of a monthly check, and in many cases by a personal visit by someone representing the Board. In cases where the husband was a member of the Ministers Protection Plan the family may receive a check for as much as \$25,000 as was the case with two families in our own association upon the death of the husband.

Southern Baptists are also following the truth expressed in Luke 10:7, "For the workman deserves his support." Williams, even after he has retired if such workman has participated in any of the plans provided through the Annuity Board. It is a wonderful feeling to know that each month there will be a check to help meet the needs of the retired worker and his family. We "Thank God and take courage" for what the Board is doing in this respect.

With the constantly rising costs of medical care the Health Protection Plan cannot be emphasized too much. Even though the plan is rather costly the services provided are well worth the price. Life insurance plans are also available on a group basis which makes these plans less expensive than those provided on an individual basis.



We commend the pastors and other denominational workers who are in these protection plans, and more especially do we thank God for the churches as they help their leaders by providing part or all the cost the protection made available by our conversion. We would again urge the pastors and churches who are not now providing for the needs of the future to consider doing so at the earliest possible date.

REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS  
BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC.  
1971

Let a graduating senior express what it is like to live in one of our Baptist Children's Homes: "I really do not know how to write about a place which has been so fine, and which has given me the opportunity to worship, work, and learn; not only where we stand in moments of comfort and convenience, but where we stand in moments of challenge and moments of controversy. After all these years, one finally learns that certain values and practices are good and sound and help children to feel secure and happy."

This statement could be made by almost any senior regarding his home and community, for a child in the care of the Baptist Children's Homes has basically the same attitudes and values as other children. He differs from other children only in the tragic experiences which have made it necessary for him to live away from his family. For these children, it is our mission to provide loving care in the spirit of Jesus Christ. We want to work in harmony with what we sense God is doing in the life of each child, enabling the child to tap his own inner resources and grow to responsible adulthood.

The pursuit of this basic goal has led the Children's Homes to develop a variety of services, all family centered. Some families need resident care for their children and for these we have group homes and foster homes. Some families can remain together with outside help and for these we have family service in the form of counseling or financial assistance. For the unmarried girl who is pregnant, we offer maternity care. For the graduate in our care, we assist in higher education. For churches involved in day care, we provide a demonstration program and consultation service. We welcome individual inquiries regarding any of these services as the need may arise.

Our services are made available through strategically located facilities throughout North Carolina: in the East at Winston, Pembroke, Fayetteville and Raleigh; in the Piedmont at Chapel Hill, Thomasville and Charlotte; in the West at Asheville and Waynesville.

Staff members and children of the Baptist Children's Homes are grateful for the harmonious relationship we have shared with North Carolina Baptists. The churches have expressed their confidence and support through increased Cooperative Program gifts and a 1970 Thanksgiving Offering of \$380,000. Individuals continue to give generously and to become involved in our varied ministries. We accept this support as an investment in all that we are doing and we pledge ourselves to translate your investment into quality Christian child care.

### GARDNER-WEBB COLLEGE

Lloyd C. Boat, Chairman, Board of Trustees

E. Eugene Foster, President of the College

Gardner-Webb College granted her first Baccalaureate Degrees in May of 1971. There were 242 of them. Seventy-three more were awarded in August of 1971. Thirty-seven Associate in Arts Degrees were also awarded in May and August of 1971. There are still two-year programs available in Business and Nursing.

The 6th year of operation is underway with a student body of 1461 and 88 faculty members. Thirty-two of these faculty have earned the doctorate. Six other faculty members are on leave of absence working on their doctorates.

The campaign to raise \$1,500,000 has surpassed the goal and has reached a total of \$2,200,000. The trustees and the administration are continuing the campaign to reach a challenge goal of \$3,500,000.

Gardner-Webb College is primarily a liberal arts school, with a wide range of majors. There are 121 ministerial students and 74 other full-time church-related majors enrolled during the present term. One of the great needs is an adequate financial aid program for these students.

The Dever Memorial Library has 57,270 volumes and a new building is in the planning stages. The J. R. Dever, Jr., Memorial Chapel is under construction. Plans are being developed for an addition to the Webb Administration Building and for a new dormitory to be named in memory of Mr. Robert Maxton Craig, Sr. There is a definite need for an auditorium-arena to meet the needs of an expanding physical education department, athletics, and convocations.

The Gardner-Webb College Endowment increased by \$98,000 and is now valued at \$1,163,000 (including an irrevocable trust). The physical plant is now valued at \$8,800,000. June 30, 1971, the college owed a debt of \$879,846 which is being amortized at the rate of \$11,000 per month plus interest.

Gardner-Webb College is proud to be a part of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. We pledge to support the Baptist cause throughout North Carolina, the Southern Baptist Convention, and the Baptist World Alliance.

Gardner-Webb's purpose is clear and concise. "To develop quality Christian students who will think for themselves and who will dedicate themselves to the Christian way of life in the vocation of their own choice." We shall strive to fulfill this purpose in every phase of the life of the college.

## NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT TO ASSOCIATIONS, 1971

Your Baptist Hospital admitted 17,557 persons in 1970 for a total of 150,174 days of care. In addition, there were 51,563 visits to outpatient clinics, including 17,241 to the Emergency Room. About 90% of these were "referral" patients—that is, patients who were referred to our Hospital by their local physicians because they needed the specialized medical care our Hospital is staffed and equipped to offer.

Our Hospital, from the day of its beginning, has provided good medical care for our people, including care for persons who cannot pay the cost. There has been great progress in medicine and tremendous increase in hospital costs, and these have made some policy changes necessary. The basic policy of providing care—now the highly specialized care for the more difficult cases—for those who cannot pay has not changed. This Christian ministry is at the heart of the work of our Baptist Hospital.

The financial situation of the Hospital is viewed by the administration with "cautious optimism". The operating deficit has been reduced and expenditures are being kept more nearly in line with income. The entire staff is cooperating in an effort to maintain a proper balance between sound financial policies and a spirit of Christian compassion.

The Medical Center Development Program is progressing on schedule. The new patient Tower is expected to be ready for partial occupancy by late 1972. The 14 bed coronary care unit will open about September, 1971. A statewide Development Campaign, initiated with pledges totaling \$177,183 from employees of the Medical Center, is moving toward successful completion.

Baptist Hospital offers a ministry of healing in Christ's name to all who need it. It seeks to fulfill the same purpose in North Carolina that a Baptist Hospital operated by our Foreign Mission Board seeks to fulfill in Korea or Nigeria. It ought to be supported by missionary-minded Baptists with the same enthusiasm and for the same reason we support every other phase of our denomination's World Mission Program. This is missions too.

## HISTORIAN'S REPORT KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION—1971 Our Baptist Church

"And this manner of His was forth . . ." Luke 7, 17.

There were rumors of a great prophet coming to Judea, Jerusalem and Galilee. The word got to John the Baptist who sent his disciples to Jesus to see if this was true. You remember the Master's reply. "Go your way and tell John what things ye have seen and heard, how the blind see, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, to the poor the Gospel is preached".

Rumor is not enough!

Other places in the Bible report on the good and evil of rumors. In the days of Ishak and Hesekiak God sent a rumor back to Nimrah and the great king Sennacherib went into a trap and was killed by the sword; but first the prophet

had to prophesy, the Jewish king believed, an angel kill the Assyrian hosts, to save the city of Jerusalem.

There may be wars and rumors of wars, and good or mischief may attend them, but there also must be deeds, happenings . . . FACTS if you will, for all of the work of the Church to be done and recorded for posterity to know.

To paraphrase some of the members of our younger generation, "Let us tell it like it is".

Newspapers have a formula for getting the news. The editor tells the reporter to find out Who, When, Where, What and Why, then explain fully by telling How.

The writers of the Bible pulled no punches in telling the stories of man's weaknesses, follies and mistakes, or of his triumphs and God's great power and love.

Jesus did not say that the man from Gadara had a psychosisosis with paranoia, or a delusion of persecution, or that he had a depressive reaction with anislety. He said he was possessed by a devil, that he was evil.

The prophet Nathan told David, "Thou art the man".

Jesus told the woman at the well, "Thou hast had five husbands".

Both old and New Testaments faithfully report the happenings as they were, good or bad, fruitful or tragic, death or life *discovery* or *deception*, sin or salvation.

Our Historians, Clerks, secretaries and even the pastors, deacons or any one who has any thing to do with performing or recording the work of the church, ought to give the whole picture.

Some of the Churches are doing this, and well. Others have recorded very little. We who are researching the 120 years of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association records find some of the minutes of the Association and of some of the churches rather sterile, mild, weak, and a little lukewarm. We know of some occasions where all of the facts have not been included. In some of our churches large sections of the minutes are missing for one reason or another.

Finances and figures are the most faithfully reported "facts" in our records, but our Historical Committee will continue to urge the Scribes to record what the people are saying, thinking and feeling about the great issues in the Church today and what we are doing to resolve them.

If the Lord sends a rumor, let us supply the facts.

#### BY LAWS FOR ASSOCIATIONAL W.M.U.

ARTICLE I: NAME. The name of this organization shall be Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II: OBJECT. The object shall be to promote Christian missions through the organizations of Woman's Missionary Union in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

### ARTICLE III: RELATIONSHIPS.

Section 1. Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to Kings Mountain Baptist Association, shall be the liaison organization between church organizations and the N.C. Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 2. This associational Union shall recognize the autonomy of church organizations as provided in the Baptist democratic process of operation.

Section 3. Church organizations shall be recognized as units through which the object of this Woman's Missionary Union is accomplished, each responsible for its own program, and contributing to the work of the association.

Section 4. This associational Union shall be guided in its plan of work by the associational aims for Advancement.

ARTICLE IV: MEMBERS. The members of Woman's Missionary Union organizations in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association shall constitute the membership.

### ARTICLE V: OFFICERS.

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, YWA Director, GA Director, Sunday School Director and others as needed. These officers shall be elected annually in a meeting of the associational WMU and shall hold office for one year or until their successors are elected. The term of office shall be 5 consecutive years.

Section 2. These officers shall perform the duties set out for them in these By-Laws and the leaflet, "The Associational WMU."

### ARTICLE VI: NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS.

Section 1. The nominating committee composed of 5 women shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee, and elected by the associational WMU to serve for one year.

Section 2. The nominating committee shall nominate officers and promotional directors. Other nominations may be made from the floor.

Section 3. The nominating committee, in event of a vacancy, shall present a nominee for the unexpired term for election by the associational WMU (or the Executive Committee).

### ARTICLE VII: MEETINGS.

Section 1. Day and/or night Associational WMU meetings (including business women) shall be held annually.

Section 2. Other meetings shall be held as authorized by the Executive Committee.

### ARTICLE VIII: EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the officers, promotional directors and any others desired.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall schedule the regular meetings of the organizations, plan the progress of activities, hear reports and check progress on the Aims for Advancement.

Section 3. Regular meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held quarterly.

### ARTICLE IX: PROMOTIONAL DIRECTORS.

Section 1. There shall be directors of mission study, prayer, community relations, stewardship, and others as needed.

Section 2. These directors shall furnish information for corresponding local chairmen, hold conferences, and carry out other plans as authorized by the Executive Committee.

### ARTICLE X: COMMITTEES.

Section 1. There shall be committees standing or special as needed.

Section 2. Committees, except those otherwise provided for, shall be appointed by the president.

Section 3. The president shall be an-officio member of all committees except the nominating committee.

Section 4. The duties of these committees are such as are set forth in these By-Laws and the leaflet, "The Associational WMU."

#### ARTICLE XI: FINANCES.

Section 1. The associational WMU shall adopt an annual budget, funds to be provided by WMU organizations in the Association.

Section 2. These funds will be on 50 cent per W.M.S. member basis, and are to be sent to the Associational Treasurer by December 1.

ARTICLE XII: PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY. The rules contained in Robert's RULES OF ORDER, REVISED or the Parliamentary section in the WMU Year Book shall govern the Union in all cases to which they are applicable.

ARTICLE XIII: AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS: These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the associational WMU provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.
