The present sanctuary was completed in May, 1970. J. E. Bishop was called as pastor in June, 1962, and will be retiring December 31, 1972.

Boiling Springs Baptist Church was organized in 1847, and marked her 125th anniversary with a four-day celebration September 14-17, 1972. The present buildings were constructed on a new site of 37 acres in 1969. The present membership is 804. The pastor, T. Max Linsen, has served since 1948.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Preamble

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article I Name

The name of this body shall be the "Kings Mountain Baptist Association."

Article II Purpose

It shall be the purpose of the Association to cooperate with the State and Southern Baptist Conventions in the prosecution of Christian Missions at home and abroad, and in any other related objects such as evangelism, Christian education, benevolent enterprises, and social services, which it may deem proper and advisable for the furtherance of the Kingdom of God.

Article III Membership

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist Churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Membership Committee and if recommended by this Committee and accepted by the Association shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year. At the end of one year, upon recommendation of the Committee, membership within the Association of such churches shall be determined by vote of the Association. During this period such churches shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its Constitution and By-Laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and, if requested, the General Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like Associations.

Article IV Meetings

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Tuesday evening and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or General Board provided two weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 3: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each 50 members of the church, provided each church shall have not less than three nor more than ten messengers. These shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those attending and registering at the Associational meeting.

Article V Authority

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this constitution in Article III, Sections 2 and 3.

Article VI Officers and Their Election

Section 1: The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Music Director, Organist, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Chairman of Library Council, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Youth and Family Services Director, and parliamentarian.

Section 2: The officers shall be elected on the morning of the last day of the Annual Meeting for a term of one year each. The nominees shall be contracted and nominated by the Committee on Nominations (By-Law IV, Section 6) except the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk-Treasurer who shall be nominated from the floor. Committee nominations shall not preclude nominations from the floor.

Section 3: All officers shall complete their work as soon as practicable after the closing of the Annual Session. The newly elected officers shall assume, at the close of the Annual Session, all duties incumbent upon said officers relating to the work of the ensuing Associational year.

Section 4: Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election.

Article VII Trustees and Their Election

There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

Article VIII The General Board

The General Board shall be composed of all Associational Officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Associational Superintendent of Missions (ex-officio without voting privileges), each active pastor, two other members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The General Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the constitution. It shall be the duty of the General Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association in its annual meeting. The quarterly meetings will be in October, January, April, and July; on Monday after the third Sunday at 10:00 A.M.

Article IX Committees

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through

the following annual meeting.

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the annual meeting:

- (1) Order of Business Committee (By-Law IV, Section 1)
- (2) Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
- (3) Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
- (4) Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)
- (5) Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 5)
- (6) Nominations Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
- (7) Constitution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
- (8) Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
- (9) Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
- (10) Resolutions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
- (11) Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
- (12) Sanitary Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
- (13) Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
- (14) Place and Preacher Committee (By-Law IV, Section 15)
- (15) Youth and Family Services Committee (By-Law IV, Section 17)
- (16) Any other Committee authorized by the Association.

B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting, Committee on Committees (By-Law IV, Section 14)

Section 2: The following committees shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty days prior to the annual meeting to serve during the annual meeting:

- (1) Enrollment Committee (By-Law IV, Section 16)

Article X Amendments

Amendments to this constitution may be made at any annual session of the Association upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association in the first session and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association in the last session. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

BY-LAWS

By-Law I PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

By-Law II ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

By-Law III DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committees on Committees and Committee on Enrollment. He shall be Chairman of the General Board and be an ex officio (without voting privileges) member of all other committees.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be Vice-Chairman of the General Board.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the

member churches at least a month before the Association's annual meeting, distribute at the annual meeting copies of the digest of these reports, make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the General Board. He shall inform all persons elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action. He shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its General Board, or as designated in the Budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the General Board or the Association in Annual Session); render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the annual meeting and give a report at each quarterly General Board meeting; and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Association Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.

Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and shall make a written report to each annual meeting of the Association.

Section 6: Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the General Board except the office Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1: The ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Clerk and Associational Music Director. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the annual meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the sessions where adjustments in the order of business become necessary.

Section 2: THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

(1) Shall be composed of the Associational officers listed in Article VI, Section 1, of the Constitution along with the chairmen of the Evangelism and Finance Committees. It shall work with Associational Superintendents of Missions in promoting the work of the Association, and lead and assist in determining need for, beginning new mission stations, and organizing new churches.

(2) If such advice is sought it shall advise any group seeking to organize a new church. It shall also seek to help any member church desiring assistance with its problems.

(3) When without a Superintendent of Missions, this Committee shall seek out and recommend to the Association, or its General Board, for election a new Superintendent of Missions according to By-Law VI, Section 11.

(4) It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or General Board and act on routine or emergency matters between meetings of the General Board. It shall initiate and recommend matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven shall be necessary to transact business.

Section 3: THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE, composed of 6 members, shall promote the work of evangelism in the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its General Board.

Section 4: THE FINANCE COMMITTEE, composed of three members, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs for an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the annual meeting.

Section 5: THE ORDINATION COMMITTEE, composed of three members, with the pastor of the candidate, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

Section 6: THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE, composed of 6 members, shall contact before and nominate on the last day of the annual meeting of the Association the officers of the Association according to Articles VI and VII of the Constitution. This Committee shall also, in cooperation with the nominating committee of the various departments of work, recommend workers in these various departments (Article VI, Section 1). It shall also nominate Associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. This Committee shall also assist the General Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

Section 7: THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed.

Section 8: THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws (Article III, Section 7).

Section 9: THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following Associational Officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMU Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, and the Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an Associational Calendar for the coming year and present same to the General Board for adoption.

Section 10: THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation and any other resolutions it or the Association may deem wise.

Section 11: THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and 6 other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Associational Meeting.

Section 12: THE SEMINARY EXTENSION COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, shall plan and provide for such Seminary Extension classes as may be desired.

Section 13: THE CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMITTEE, composed of 6 members, shall recommend ways in which the Association can work for promotion of their righteousness and social uplift.

Section 14: THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES, composed of 5 members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX,

Section 1), and shall assist the General Board in filling vacancies on all other standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the chairman of each committee.

Section 15: THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, shall receive or solicit invitations for the place or places of meeting for the next annual meeting of the Association, and shall recommend place or places. It shall also recommend the Preacher and alternate for the annual session or sessions.

Section 16: THE ENROLLMENT COMMITTEE shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of the messengers at all of the sessions.

Section 17: The Youth and Family Services Committee, composed of 3 members, shall assist the Youth and Family Services Director in co-ordinating the work of the Associational Youth and Family Services.

Section 18: Members of all these committees, except those appointed by the Moderator, shall be elected to serve for not more than three years on a rotating basis.

By-Law V TRUSTEES

The duty of the trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment or other securities of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its General Board.

By-Law VI SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS

Section 1: His selection shall be upon recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association in its several meeting or, between sessions of the Association, by its General Board. His term of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity.

By-Law VII WRITTEN REPORTS

Written reports to appear in the Annual Minutes shall not exceed 300 words, except for History and Statistics.

By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the annual meeting by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

By-Law IX DEFINE PROCEDURE

Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.

Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six Associational Groups as follows: Pulaski, Letchmore, Shelby, Kings Mountain, Groves, and Waco.

By-Law X THE CONFESSION OF FAITH

The Baptist Faith and Message as revised and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention on May 9, 1963.

PROCEEDINGS

Tuesday Evening, October 17, 1972, Poplar Springs Baptist Church

1. An organ and piano prelude was presented by Mrs. E. T. Bailey, Associational Organist, at the organ and Mrs. Teresa Winn at the piano as the messengers and visitors from the various churches gathered in Poplar Springs Baptist Church for the 122nd Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

2. Rev. Russell Pitts, Moderator, called the meeting to order and expressed appreciation for the privilege of meeting at Poplar Springs Baptist Church.

3. Mr. Terry Childers, Minister of Music at Westview Baptist Church, led the assembly in singing "To God Be the Glory."

4. The opening prayer was led by Rev. Broadus Heatherly, pastor of Mount Sinai Baptist Church.

5. Mr. Jack Dover, chairman of the Order of Business Committee, "moved that the printed program be adopted as our order of business for this 122nd Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association." The motion was seconded and it carried.

6. Rev. J. Edgar Bishop, pastor of Poplar Springs Church welcomed the messengers and visitors on behalf of Poplar Springs Church.

7. Moderator Pitts appointed the Committee on Committees. That list is found in the Associational Directory near the front of this volume.

8. Dr. Ryan Walburn gave the Historian's Report. He told of the progress that has been made in writing the History of the Association saying that most of the history has been researched through 1920. He also announced that they are looking for a replacement for Mrs. Orville Trapwick as secretary to do the research work. He moved the adoption of his report. His motion carried.

9. Rev. Pitts gave the Moderator's Message. His text came from Acts 1:8. He said "Missioners are right at the door of your church and mine."

10. Rev. C. O. Greene gave the Superintendent of Missions' Report. He used Ecclesiastes 7:8 as the basis for his remarks. He pledged his continued support of World Missions.

11. Rev. W. V. Tarlton, chairman of the Committee to honor Rev. Greene upon his retirement, spoke words of appreciation of the Association for the work of Mr. Greene during these thirteen years and presented to Rev. Greene a check which had been contributed to by the various churches.

12. Moderator Pitts led a prayer of thanksgiving for the work of Rev. Greene through the years.

13. Mr. Terry Childers led the assembly in singing a hymn.

14. Moderator Pitts gave a special welcome to the following pastors and ministers of music who have come into our Association since our last session: Rev. Broadus Heatherly, Mt. Sinai; Rev. W. Paul Riggs, Kings Mountain First; Rev. Perry Jones, Plains View; Rev. Lawrence Toney, Elliott Memorial; Rev. Fred Massey, Elizabeth; Rev. William H. Pope, Zion; Rev. James Deaton, Community; Rev. Ned Buckner, Pleasant Hill; Rev. Gene Carroll, Calvary; Rev. Kenneth Lambert, Polkville; Mr. Terry Childers, Minister of Music at Westview; and Mr. Charles Calamia, Minister of Music at Highland. Visitors recognized at this time were Rev. T. A. Linberger, South Mountain; Dr. E. L. Spivey, Mt. Holly; Rev. Hugh Borders, Spruce Pine; and Rev. Harold White, Raleigh.

15. Rev. Earl M. Redding, chairman of the Membership Committee moved that "Kings Mountain Baptist Association receive into full fellowship the New

Life Baptist Church with the privileges and responsibilities afforded in the Constitution of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association." Motion seconded & it carried.

16. Rev. Dan Jolley, chairman of the Place and Preacher Committee called for a meeting of that committee tomorrow morning.

17. Moderator Pitts announced that 332 had registered.

18. Rev. Fred McGhee gave the Youth and Family Service Report. He reported on the work he has done with troubled families. He moved the adoption of his report. The motion was seconded and it carried.

19. Special music was presented by Terry Children "But Still He Loved Me," accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Childers.

20. Rev. Joseph Sanders, pastor of Second Baptist Church, Shelby, brought the Inspirational Message using as the basis for his message 1 John 1:1-4. He said we need a "New belief in an old book—the Bible"; a "new faith in an old fact—Christ's birth"; a "new passion for an old priority—powerful preaching."

21. The benediction was given by Rev. James Deaton, pastor of Community Baptist Church.

Wednesday Morning, October 18, 1972, Boiling Springs Baptist Church

22. Mrs. E. T. Bailey presented an organ prelude as messengers gathered at Boiling Springs Baptist Church for the second day of the 122nd Annual Session.

23. Mr. Allen Jolley, minister of music of Kings Mountain First, led the assembly in singing "This is My Father's World."

24. Rev. Perry Jones, pastor of Plains View Baptist Church, led the opening prayer.

25. Moderator Russell Pitts recognized Rev. Max Linsens, pastor of the host church, who welcomed the messengers and visitors to Boiling Springs Baptist Church and made the necessary announcements about the facilities.

26. Mr. Joseph Cabanis, Clerk-Treasurer, gave the report of the General Board. That report is found elsewhere in this volume. He also presented the budget for 1972-73 of \$24,635. He moved the adoption of both of these reports. The motion carried.

27. Rev. Dan Jolley, chairman of the Place and Preacher Committee asked for an invitation for next year's session. He reported for the Committee that the preachers will be: Rev. Richard Pyles, Patterson Grove, Inspirational Message; Rev. Curtis Bundy, Ross Grove, Doctrinal Message; Rev. James F. Wall, Lattimore, Missionary Message; with Rev. Ned Buckner, Pleasant Hill, as alternate for either of the three.

28. Rev. J. W. Harmon gave the report of the Committee on Nominations. He moved the adoption of his report as found elsewhere in this volume. His motion carried.

29. The Enrollment Committee reported 332 had registered last night.

30. The Moderator called for the election of officers. Rev. E. M. Smith nominated Rev. Roland Leath as Moderator. There was a motion that nominations close. This motion carried, electing Rev. Leath by acclamation.

Rev. James Wall nominated Rev. Wilson Harmon as Vice-Moderator. Rev. C. C. Sandy nominated Rev. Eugene Land as Vice-Moderator. Rev. Dan Jolley moved that nominations cease. Eugene Land was elected by a show of hands.

Rev. C. A. Kirby, Jr., nominated Joseph Cabanis as Clerk-Treasurer. There was a motion that nominations cease and he was elected by acclamation.

31. Mr. Allen Jolley led the assembly in singing "Blessed Assurance."

32. Rev. Dan Jolley, pastor of Zion Baptist Church, brought the Doctrinal Message using as his subject "The Lordship of Christ" based on Acts 26.

33. State Convention reports were given as follows:

William Poole for the Homes for the Aging—He expressed appreciation for the expression of love and concern for the ministry of the Aging.

Woodrow Hill for Christian Literature (BIBLICAL RECORDER). He reported that BIBLICAL RECORDER was founded 140 years ago and that it recently passed the 100,000 mark in circulation informing Baptists what is going on in North Carolina. He made an appeal to churches to include the RECORDER in their budgets.

Rev. Yates Campbell, pastor of Leroy Baptist Church in Gastonia, reported for the Baptist Hospital. He said the Baptist Hospital will celebrate its 50th Anniversary next May and made an appeal to the churches to support the Mucker's Day Offering.

Rev. Roy Deah, pastor of Highland Baptist Church in Hickory, spoke on Evangelism citing the need for winning the lost to the Lord. He expressed the hope to have 43 associations in the WIN Program next year.

34. Mr. Allen Jolley led the assembly in singing the hymn "Higher Ground."

35. Special music was rendered by Mr. Van Ramsey, minister of music at First Baptist Church, Shelby, "No One Stands Alone" and "I Want the World to Know" accompanied at the piano by Rev. Roland Leath.

36. Dr. Nolan Howington, Sunday School Board, Nashville, spoke on World Missions. He based his message on Luke 24:45ff and Rev. 14:6. He said that the proclamation of the gospel is judgment to some but to some it is good news. He said that we need to personalize missions, to pray that God will take our sons and daughters as missionaries.

37. Rev. Max Lintons, pastor of the host church, gave instructions about the lunch.

38. The benediction and thanks for the noon meal were given by Rev. Ned Buckner, pastor of Pleasant Hill Baptist Church.

Wednesday Afternoon, October 18, 1972

39. Mr. Van Ramsey led the assembly in singing "Wonderful Words of Life."

40. The opening prayer was led by Rev. William H. Pope, pastor of Zion Baptist Church.

41. Welcome and the hand of fellowship was extended to New Life Baptist Church by the new Moderator Roland Leath.

42. Mr. Carlos Young spoke on the Cooperative Program. He also extended an invitation to meet with First Baptist Church, Shelby, next year.

43. The following organizational reports were made:

SUNDAY SCHOOL: Rev. James Wall moved the adoption of his report as found elsewhere in this volume. He reported that 12 workers took part in a Regional Realife Conference at Lincolnton in February and then held 2 Realife Conferences in our Association. He also announced that a Bible Conference will be held in September or October, 1973.

CHURCH TRAINING: Rev. Ed Sisson announced a Divisional Conference for Church Training leaders February 19-20, 1973, and a Director-Led Church Training Revital, September 28-October 2, 1974. He moved the adoption of his report as found elsewhere in this volume.

BROTHERHOOD: John Hendrick reported there are 37 Brotherhood organizations in our Association. He also reported that 4 meetings on the Associational level have been held this year. He moved the adoption of his report.

WMU: Mrs. W. D. Leibetter spoke of the blessings she received during her four years as Director and expressed appreciation to the WMU Council that has served with her. She moved the adoption of her report.

MUSIC: Mr. Van Ramsey gave the highlights of the year and moved the adoption of his report.

CHURCH LIBRARY: Miss Ruby Irvin reported 1 new library with six attending regional Conferences. She moved the adoption of her report.

CHURCH BEAUTIFICATION: Mr. Hackert Wilson reported on some assistance he had given in beautification of church grounds. He moved the adoption of his report.

44. The Gardner-Webb College report was given by Rev. J. Roy Robinson, assistant to the President. He reported there are 1567 students this year with 568 freshmen, from 20 states and 12 foreign countries. He moved the adoption of his report as found elsewhere in this volume.

45. Dr. Fred Bentley, President of Mars Hill College, spoke on Christian Education. He said there is a renewed interest in Christ on the campuses. There are times of crisis when we need your prayers, concern and support.

46. Rev. Dan Jolley, chairman of the Place and Preacher Committee, moved that we accept the invitation of First Baptist Church, Shelby, to meet with them next year. This motion carried.

47. Rev. C. C. Brandy gave the Committee on Committees report. He read the names of the members of the various committees and moved the adoption of his report. The motion carried. The list of committees is found near the front of this volume.

48. Mr. Gary Southard, minister of music at Second Baptist Church, Shelby, led the assembly in singing "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus."

49. Rev. James Rice, pastor of Churchill Drive Baptist Church, brought the Missionary Message. Before his message he asked Mr. Van Ramsey to sing "Sweet, Sweet Spirit." He spoke of his mission trips to Jamaica and Haiti. He introduced Michael Remy, a Jamaican student at Gardner-Webb College, who gave his testimony and thanked the people for their help in bringing him to Gardner-Webb to study for the ministry. Rev. Rice based his message on Matthew 28. Jesus said, "Go YE into all the world" and make disciples.

50. Mr. Allen Jolley, minister of music at First Baptist Church, Kings Mountain, led a short memorial service for the 204 in our association who have died during the year.

51. Moderator Russell Pitts turned over the gavel to Rev. Roland Leath, the new Moderator. Rev. Leath expressed appreciation to Rev. Pitts for presiding so ably.

52. After the closing prayer by Rev. Kenneth Lambert, pastor of Polkville Baptist Church, Rev. W. V. Turlion moved that we adjourn. The motion was seconded and it carried.

MUSIC REPORT

This has been a good year for the music ministries in our churches. The enrollment is at an all time high, as is the weekly attendance. Many churches have sought information regarding the various aspects in designing their rooms,

choir robes in sanctuaries, etc. Also, conferences have been held advising the selection and purchase of music. Others have sought information concerning musical instruments.

The high point of the year was the gathering of over 200 young people, under the direction of Susan Wilson, to form the choir for Kairoa '72. Also during the year, young people from our churches sang for the North Carolina Baptist Youth Convention in Raleigh Coliseum with 8,000 attending, and in August the North Carolina Youth Evangelism Night in the Greensboro Coliseum with 14,500 attending.

Currently there are 511 teenagers from 78 churches meeting each Tuesday at First Baptist Church in Shelby singing the musical "Christ Is Risen, Jubilation." During each rehearsal there is a time of chorus singing, hand work preparing the musical, and ending with testimonies and prayer. Of these 511 teenagers, 303 come from 33 churches in the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. These young people are from every high school, junior high school and college in Cleveland County. Presentation of this program will be after January 1st.

Dr. Phil Perrin of Gardner-Webb College is the director of the Cleveland County Community Chorus. Many of our Baptist adult choir members enjoy singing with this group. Last year they presented three programs.

REPORT ON WORLD MISSIONS: STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN

The Little Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions in 1971 was an all-time high ... \$17,833,810.22. Our hearts are filled with praise to God for

this remarkable outpouring of Christian generosity and missionary concern. The Foreign Missions \$36 million-plus budget depends primarily on the Cooperative Program unified budget of the Convention and the annual Little Moon Offering in local churches.

This month the Baptist Men's Journal will become a monthly publication rather than a quarterly. It will give a far more comprehensive coverage of Baptist work abroad. Foreign Missions Hotline I will begin October 1 and will continue through December 31, 1972. If you wish to call, the number is (703) 355-6581. You may secure the latest up-to-the-minute reports direct from headquarters. This line will be open during these three months 24 hours a day.

Convention-wide receipts from January/July, 1972 through the Cooperative Program amounted to \$16,000,63 for the same period the total designated was \$23,994,325.

The estimated total Cooperative Program gifts through our State Office was \$8,000,000. The proposed budget to be sent through the State channel this year, 1972/73 . . . \$8.5 million . . . an increase of \$5,000,000 over last year.

Of the funds going beyond the State, Home Missions receives 6.07%. Our Home Mission Board is doing a wonderful job with the small percentage allotted to it.

We have much of which to be proud and grateful, but the fact is we have the habit of coming up with "too Little too Late." May God help us to follow the example of the Macedonians: "They first gave their *own* selves to the Lord." Then we are told they brought an offering beyond their ability to give.

REPORT TO THE HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION October 17, 1972

"He that keepeth Israel shall neither slumber nor sleep." Psalm 121: 4

The Historical Report to the Association this year is brief. We haven't done much. Mrs. Orville Traywick, who has been our researcher and secretary for

several years moved away when her husband was called to pastor a church in eastern North Carolina. She was systematically researching and reviewing all the pertinent records of the Association from 1851 to the present.

Our Committee sorely misses the services of Mrs. Traywick and are looking for someone on a part-time basis who could continue where she left off. It would be nice if she were also a good photographer, since we want the history to be filled with pictures of our people and their past.

You may see from the Association's Treasurer's report the state of our finances. All of our bills are paid and we have a little nest egg for operation. This is not enough to publish the book, but these funds should come later. Our Committee has proposed pre-publication sale and expect sales after publication to meet the costs.

History is an on-going process and what was commonplace in 1851, 1853 or even 1873 are now historical events of importance and great interest. For example, in 1853 this Association met at the Boiling Springs Baptist Church, where we will be tomorrow. We were two years old and numbered only fifty members. We are now entitled to messengers from seventy churches. At the meeting in Boiling Springs, a man named David Hamrick invited all the messengers to go home with him for the night. They all went, had supper and breakfast and a night's lodging.

His wife Sarah was flabbergasted, but not outdoors. She had flour and cornmeal and sent her husband David to rob the bees for honey. She churned a big crock of milk for butter and buttermilk. The lodgers ate homecake, butter and honey and had cornbread and buttermilk. There is no record of more food, but the record says that they had wonderful fellowship as the men slept on the hay in the barn and the women made pallets to sleep on the floors.

This is a precious story of earlier times when life was simple, but religion was very real.

We hope that all the messengers will come to Boiling Springs tomorrow, spend the night if you will, but don't look for hay in the barn, or for homecake and honey. However, we will try to provide fellowship akin to that of 1853.

Let me urge every church to continue systematically recording its history, especially the simple human, personal things, as well as the business matters.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

Help! Help! That cry is often heard across the boards of the Southern Baptist Convention. This call comes from ministers, their families, and others who are employed by our churches and conventions. The Board also provides a very fine insurance plan against illness and the high cost of hospitalization. Widows of deceased ministers who are covered by the Minister's Protection Plan also receive a generous amount at a time when many of them would be left without resources.

We believe every pastor should be covered by this plan, and that the churches which they serve should see to it that the pastor has the help of the church in providing the needed resources in order that he may not be dependent on others after retirement, and that his family will be protected in case of his death before retirement age. This is the best plan we know of for pastors, their families, and other denominational workers. Let us demonstrate our compassion in advance for the men and women who serve so faithfully in the Father's Kingdom.

SOUTH MOUNTAIN BAPTIST CAMP REPORT 1972

Your camp is being used more and more each year! Late in the fall of 1971 and early in the spring of 1972 church groups came for retreats.

The increasing popularity of your camp prompted us to begin early to prepare for more campers. Repairing cabins, building bunk beds, drilling another well, etc., enabled us to take care of the overflow crowds that came.

Including the staff, our average attendance was 217 each week. 4,000 attended some kind of organized activity and hundreds came to visit our services. Including retreats and special groups there were 390 attending from your association.

Our theme for the summer was "Listening to God." We had a staff of 25-30 dedicated young people who were very helpful in our camp program. Bible study, worship, selection study, and study for advancement helped campers to have a deep experience with God. 1,385 made a decision for Christ, 323 professions of faith, 46 commitments for full time Christian service, and 1,036 rededications. Word has been received from a number of churches that their entire church was blessed when campers shared with them their camp experiences. Our mission emphasis made the campers aware that every Christian has a responsibility to share Christ with the whole world.

Our staff, under the direction of Mrs. Rhea L. Rose, developed two a touring choir. We led worship services in 19 churches in which over 250 made decisions for Christ. We were unable to accept all the requests by the churches.

We deposited \$30,000.00 into the general camp treasury. This was several thousand dollars more than it took to operate the camp. However, we urgently need the support from churches to enable us to make improvements, build a caretakers home, build a chapel, and finish paying for our bus. Many churches who learn of the way the Lord is using your camp are putting us in their budget.

GARDNER-WEBB COLLEGE

R. Patrick Spangler, Chairman, Board of Trustees

E. Eugene Poston, President of the College

Gardner-Webb College received accreditation as a Senior College by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools December 1, 1972. This means that the graduates who received Bachelor's Degrees in 1972 will not be penalized. This was the climax of ten years of diligent work on the part of thousands of people. This could not have been done without the continuing help of the Baptists of North Carolina. The Cooperative Program is the life blood of Gardner-Webb College. The Father's Day Offering gets the transfusion needed to boost the program each year.

The 60th year is in progress. The largest enrollment in the history of the college has been reached—1567 students. These students are being taught by 90 faculty members. There are 176 people on the payroll at Gardner-Webb College, including faculty, staff, administration, and maintenance.

Many innovations are taking place in the academic program—internships in several disciplines, advance placement and credit, individualized instruction, and a limited number in independent study programs. One faculty member is at Florida State University developing computerized instruction for upper bracket courses.

Community Service is a growing part of Gardner-Webb College. This has been a long time concern at the college. Students and leaders go out into churches to serve, faculty members conduct workshops for public school teachers, and students do tutoring service for the economically deprived. The administration serves in the civic, political, and religious phases of community life. The college is becoming a vital part of community life. These three areas of service are being pursued: (1) teaching, (2) research, and (3) public service.

The college continues her capital gifts campaign in Lincoln and Catawba Counties in North Carolina, and Spartanburg and Greenville Counties in South Carolina. A total of \$2,471,405 has been pledged. The J. R. Dover, Jr. Memorial Chapel has been completed. The addition to the Webb Administration Building is underway. The building of the new Dover Library will be started in the near future. The Hubert M. Craig Residence Hall will be under construction during 1973. The need for an auditorium arena is great.

There are 247 students majoring in religion or religious education. Gardner-Webb ranks No. 1 among Southern Baptist Colleges in this area. Financial aid to these students is needed.

As of June 30, 1972, Gardner-Webb College owed a debt of \$789,106 to the First Union National Bank of Charlotte. At the date of this report the debt was \$768,692 and being amortized at the rate of \$11,195 per month plus interest.

The College is proud to be a part of the family of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and pledges her support of the State and Southern Baptist Conventions and the Baptist World Alliance.

The purpose of Gardner-Webb College is clear and concise—"To develop quality Christian students who think for themselves, and who will dedicate themselves to the Christian way of life in the vocation of their own choice."

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT TO ASSOCIATIONS

The distinctiveness of Baptist Hospital's ministry lies not alone in its care for charity patients, but also in the type of service it renders to all its patients, and to many other people throughout our state and nation and around the world.

As an academic Medical Center it is engaged in research and in education, as well as direct patient care. The ministry through research is far-reaching since new discoveries in medicine offer new hope to people everywhere. The educational ministry also extends around the world, since graduates of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine serve in 88 countries of North Carolina, in 47 states and the District of Columbia, and in 25 different countries. Alumni of the School of Pastoral Care serve in almost every state and in 39 other countries.

The quality of direct patient care provided at Baptist Hospital is distinct in at least two respects. First, it is a specialized type of medical care, provided for referral patients who have rare or complicated medical problems. Because of the highly-skilled specialists in almost every area of medicine, and the elaborate equipment available for diagnosis and treatment, we are able to provide the kind of care which is available only in a large medical center. Ours is one of only 108 such medical centers in the United States.

In addition to offering this kind of medical expertise, a second distinctive of our patient care is the Christian concern for the total person with all his needs. This spirit is found among physicians, nurses, aides, and other personnel throughout the Center. The Department of Pastoral Care seeks to minister specifically to the spiritual and emotional needs of patients and their families.

Baptist Hospital does continue to serve patients who cannot pay for their hospital care. Even with the tightening of admission policies and procedures, only one person in twelve months—i.e., one in approximately 17,000 applications for admissions—was not helped. In 1971, charitable allowances amounting to \$1,370,000 were loaned to patients unable to pay in full. The Mother's Day Offering of \$371,000 helped make this charity work possible.

The hospital takes pride in its record of charitable work, but would like to help our Baptist people to understand that there are other aspects of its work also which justify its existence as an institution of our Convention and make it worthy of the support of our churches.

The operating deficit has been eliminated and the hospital is now operating "in the black."

The new patient tower is being completed and some departments have already moved into the lower levels. Complete occupation should take place by January, 1973. One additional unit, a two story unit housing the emergency room and outpatient clinic, is scheduled to be completed by 1973. This will conclude the present development program.

"A Medical Center achieving with skill and understanding" is not just a letterhead slogan; it is a goal which Baptist Hospital seriously strives to attain.

PIEDMONT AREA REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC. 1972

For the past eighty-seven years, North Carolina Baptists and their Children's Homes have co-operated in a program of Christian child care. This relationship has been characterized, on the part of the agency, by a sensitivity to real needs and a commitment to the best in child care. On the part of North Carolina Baptists, there has been a lasting commitment to child care expressed in generous and enthusiastic support of the agency's ministry.

This annual report finds the agency vigorously pursuing its basic purposes. Changing patterns of family life and the involvement of government in social ministries profoundly affect the number of children needing our care and the types of care needed. More and more we are being asked to serve children with special needs beyond neglect and dependency: emotional alienation from family; trouble with the courts; borderline retardation; emotional disturbance which requires professional treatment. The urgency of the present and the challenge of the future is to find effective patterns of care for these children.

The Baptist Children's Homes will not be content to provide minimal care only. We are committed to quality care which serves the whole person, providing the experiences and relationships which can enable the child to develop his full potential. Quality care costs. It makes heavy demands on the individual staff member in his involvement with the child. It requires more staff members for the number of children served. It necessitates the purchase of supplementary professional services, such as medical and psychological specialists. But the cost is really an investment in the future of the children served, and we believe it is the best investment of life and money we can make.

The Children's Homes continues to expand and improve its services to children and their families. Two new cottages are under construction at Beechell Home. The Ten Star Builders' Program is rallying the support of Eastern North Carolina for Christian child care in that section of the state. Mills Home is engaged in a year-long study to determine how we can best serve the children in the Piedmont Area. Across the state, renewed effort is being given to the recruitment of foster families. Expanded services to families are being initiated.

We believe this ministry of child care deserves the confidence and support of North Carolina Baptists. Our Baptist friends have demonstrated through their interest and support that they believe in what we are doing. The Cooperative Program continues to be the lifeblood of our financial support. The 1971 Thanksgiving Offering channeled \$400,000 into our ministry of child care. Special gifts and bequests from individuals continue to provide for capital improvements. We deeply appreciate this generous support, and we pledge ourselves to continue this ministry of child care in the name of Christ and on behalf of North Carolina Baptists.

REPORT FOR 1972
TO
THE ASSOCIATIONS
ON
NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

In our Baptist Homes for the Aging, we feel that there is no relationship more important and more blessed than the one that we have with our Baptist people in our Baptist Associations throughout the State. It is a special joy to visit personally the Associations and to have fellowship with the good people who mean so much to us in our ministry and to express to them our special thanksgiving. It is with a deep sense of gratitude to the Lord and to you that we bring this report on our Baptist Homes for 1972.

This has been the best year that we have ever had in our twenty-one years. The Special Offering for the Homes and support through the Cooperative Program reflect an encouraging increase. Through these two vital sources, the Homes during the past year derived almost 80% of the total operating budget in

the cost of the residents and patients, with 20% coming from the offering, and 80% through the Cooperative Program. The most significant fact about this support from our Baptist people is that the majority of the residents in the Homes are persons with real financial needs, and these love gifts are used for their care. In fact, these gifts are a lifeline to the residents, and they could not be maintained without them. The greatest challenge to our Baptist people is to continue to increase the Special Offering from year to year, and thus keep pace with the needs of the residents who depend so greatly on it.

Our Baptist Homes now operate five resident Homes, with two located in Winston-Salem, and one each in Albemarle, Hamilton, and Yanceyville. These Homes have a capacity for 162 residents. In addition, there is a Nursing Care Unit, located in Winston-Salem, with a capacity for 63 patients. In these Homes we specialize in tender loving care and do not know of any place this side of Heaven, and outside of one's home, where a person can receive more compassionate Christian care.

Of great significance during the past year, in May, was the dedication of the York Wing of the Nursing Care Unit. This wing, accommodating 18 additional patients was completed in November of 1971 and named in honor of Judge and Mrs. William York, of Greensboro. He and Mrs. York gave \$80,000.00 for the construction of this new Wing, and the additional money needed was raised by the Trustees of the Homes. With this new addition, the Baptist Homes have been able to receive some few persons, on a limited basis only, directly as patients. The majority of the beds in the Nursing Care Unit are used for the residents of the five Homes, when nursing care becomes necessary. We are glad that the base of our operation has been broadened to include a ministry to the aging sick person, and we can only hope that we will move forward and be able to receive more patients in the years ahead.

Ministry to an older person is a direct ministry to Christ and is one of the finest things that North Carolina Baptists are doing. Be glad that you are a Baptist, and be grateful for the part that you are having in making the life of an aging person more abundant and more secure.

ASSOCIATIONAL BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc., is a charitable corporation. It was chartered on November 24, 1920, under the laws of the State of North Carolina. As a charitable corporation, it and its donors presently have certain tax savings.

It was created by the Convention for the purpose of procuring endowment funds and for administering such funds, for all institutions and agencies, owned and controlled by the Convention. It is independent of the causes it serves, but committed to their best interests. It is not a competitive agency, but a service agency dedicated to the task of undergirding all of our Baptist work.

Any property owner who wishes to do so—Baptist or non-Baptist, resident or non-resident, man or woman, young or old, can use the Baptist Foundation through cash, securities (stocks, bonds, notes, mortgages); real property (farms, woodland, houses, lots); and any and every other kind of property, real or personal. These gifts can be in the form of a living trust, gift annuity, or by bequest in will.

The Baptist Foundation stands ready at all times to aid individuals in making adequate preparation to use of the foregoing methods in providing for

any agency or institution fostered by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, or any of the Southern Baptist Convention agencies or institutions.

When one uses the Baptist Foundation, one is **EXTENDING HIS STEWARDSHIP IN PERPETUITY**. This can and does bring a great deal of satisfaction and joy to the person who uses the Foundation for this purpose.

EVANGELISM REPORT

It is exciting what the Holy Spirit is doing through the ministry of evangelism in our state. 6,000 youth and adults in 425 churches have now participated in Lay Evangelism Schools or Pastor's Retreats. Forty-two associations already have confirmed dates for schools. We thank God for this tremendous response to the important emphasis of lay witnessing. This will be a continuing effort in future years.

Over 2,400 pastors and lay persons attended the 26th Statewide Evangelism Conference in Fayetteville last February. Special conferences were held with practical emphasis on different phases of evangelism during the first afternoon session. Outstanding speakers challenged pastors to involve their people in the total ministry of evangelism through the church.

The Division of Evangelism in cooperation with the Department of Communications and the Division of Church Programs sponsored a Statewide Communications, Evangelism and Administration Conference in Greensboro in May. The purpose was to help pastors and others communicate the Gospel of Christ more effectively.

A new week at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly at Southport during June 12-16 was Youth Ministries Week with inspiration and training in Evangelism, Vocational Guidance and Recreation. All evening sessions were centered around Bible Study and a workshop experience in learning how to witness for Christ. Over 600 youth and adults were present for the week. On Friday evening 113 youth made different kinds of public decisions. Next June we will have another Youth Ministries Week.

Almost 20,000 youth, pastors and adult leaders are expected to attend the 2nd Statewide Youth Evangelism Night on August 18 at the Greensboro Coliseum.

It is evident that God is working through Christian youth today to share His Gospel in a thrilling, significant manner.

Let us rejoice in the excellent reports of revival meetings, city-wide evangelistic crusades and associational evangelism clinics during the past year. It is our hope and prayer that we shall continue to have a strong increase in baptisms this coming year that many more persons may experience Christ by genuine faith commitment.

The 27th Statewide Evangelism Conference will be February 5-7, 1973 at Ovens Auditorium, Charlotte.

Remember to pray earnestly for the leadership of the Holy Spirit in the total ministry of evangelism in North Carolina, our nation and our world.

BY-LAWS FOR ASSOCIATIONAL W.M.U.

ARTICLE I: NAME. The name of this organization shall be Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II: OBJECT. The object shall be to promote Christian missions through the organizations of Woman's Missionary Union in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE III: RELATIONSHIPS.

Section 1. Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to Kings Mountain Baptist Association, shall be the liaison organization between church organizations and the N.C. Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 2. This associational Union shall recognize the autonomy of church organizations as provided in the Baptist democratic process of operation.

Section 3. Church organizations shall be recognized as units through which the object of this Woman's Missionary Union is accomplished, each responsible for its own program, and contributing to the work of the association.

Section 4. This associational Union shall be guided in its plan of work by the associational aims for Advancement.

ARTICLE IV: MEMBERS. The members of Woman's Missionary Union organizations in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association shall constitute the membership.

ARTICLE V: OFFICERS.

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, YWA Director, GA Director, Songteam Band Director and others as needed. These officers shall be elected annually in a meeting of the associational WMU and shall hold office for one year or until their successors are elected. The terms of office shall be 5 consecutive years.

Section 2. These officers shall perform the duties set out for them in these By-Laws and the leaflet, "The Associational WMU."

ARTICLE VI: NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS.

Section 1. The nominating committee composed of 5 women shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee, and elected by the associational WMU to serve for one year.

Section 2. The nominating committee shall nominate officers and promotional directors. Other nominations may be made from the floor.

Section 3. The nominating committee, in event of a vacancy, shall present a nominee for the unexpired term for election by the associational WMU (or the Executive Committee).

ARTICLE VII: MEETINGS.

Section 1. Day and/or night Associational WMU meetings (including business women) shall be held annually.

Section 2. Other meetings shall be held as authorized by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VIII: EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the officers, promotional directors and any others desired.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall schedule the regular meetings of the organizations, plan the program of activities, hear reports and check progress on the Aims for Advancement.

Section 3. Regular meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held quarterly.

ARTICLE IX: PROMOTIONAL DIRECTORS.

Section 1. There shall be directors of mission study, prayer, community missions, stewardship, and others as needed.

Section 2. These directors shall furnish information for corresponding local chairmen, hold conferences, and carry out other plans as authorized by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE X: COMMITTEES.

Section 1. There shall be committees standing or special as needed.

Section 2. Committees, except those otherwise provided for, shall be appointed by the president.

Section 3. The president shall be ex-officio member of all committees except the nominating committee.

Section 4. The duties of these committees are such as are set forth in these By-Laws and the leaflet, "The Associational WMU."

ARTICLE XI: FINANCES.

Section 1. The associational WMU shall adopt an annual budget, funds to be provided by WMU organizations in the Association.

Section 2. These funds will be on 50 cent per W.M.S. member basis, and are to be sent to the Associational Treasurer by December 1.

ARTICLE XII: PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY. The rules contained in Robert's RULES OF ORDER, REVISED or the Parliamentary section in the WMU Year Book shall govern the Union in all cases to which they are applicable.

ARTICLE XIII: AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS: These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the associational WMU provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.
