FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH, Shelby, N.C.

The First Baptist Church of Shelby was organized June 17, 1847, and worships in the third building on its original site at 123 N. LaFayette Street. The sanctuary was completely rebuilt and enlarged for the third time in 1873. First Baptist served as host to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association also in the years 1894, 1925, 1943, 1953, and 1967.

The church has a membership of 2230 and is currently involved in a number of outreach ministries: Transportation evangelism; spiritual, youth and marital counseling; Sunday School classes for exceptional children and unwed mothers; emergency assistance for indigents; suicide prevention; alcoholic rehabilitation; and moral chaplaincy.



REV. GENE L. WATTERSON

Mr. Watterson came to Shelby First Church on July 27, 1960, and is the church's thirty-second pastor. He is a native of Decatur, Alabama, a graduate of Sanford University and Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, and has done special studies in clinical counseling at Central State Hospital, Petersburg, Virginia.

Currently he is serving on the Executive Committee of the General Board, as president of the Council on Christian Higher Education, and on the Nominating Committee of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Constitution and By-Laws

Preamble

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article I Name

The name of this body shall be the "Kings Mountain Baptist Association."

Article II Purpose

It shall be the purpose of the Association to cooperate with the State and Southern Baptist Conventions in the promotion of Christian Missions at home and abroad, and in any other related objects such as evangelism, Christian education, benevolent enterprises, and social services, which it may deem proper and advisable for the furtherance of the Kingdom of God.

Article III Membership

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist Churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply the the Membership Committee and if recommended by this Committee and accepted by the Association shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year. At the end of one year, upon recommendation of the Committee, membership within the Association of such churches shall be determined by vote of the Association. During this period such churches shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be sole judge of its membership and may

receive churches, or reject churches, according to its Constitution and By-Laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and, if requested, the General Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like Associations.

Article IV Meetings

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Tuesday evening and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or General Board provided two weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 3: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each 50 members of the church, provided each church shall have not less than three nor more than ten messengers. These shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those attending and registering at the Associational meeting.

Article V Authorities

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this constitution in Article III, Sections 2 and 3.

Article VI Officers and Their Election

Section 1: The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Music Director, Organist, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Chairmen of Library Council, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Youth and Family Services Director, and parliamentarian.

Section 2: The officers shall be elected on the evening of the last day of the Annual Meeting for a term of one year each. The nominees shall be constructed and nominated by the Committee on Nominations (By-Law IV, Section 6) except the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk-Treasurer who shall be nominated from the floor. Committee nominations shall not preclude nominations from the floor.

Section 3: All officers shall complete their work as soon as practicable after the closing of the Annual Session. The newly elected officers shall assume, at the close of the Annual Session, all duties incumbent upon said officers relating to the work of the ensuing Associational year.

Section 4: Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election.

Article VII Trustees and Their Election

There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

Article VIII The General Board

The General Board shall be composed of all Associational Officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Associational Superintendent of Missions (ex officio without voting privileges), each active pastor, two other members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The General Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the constitution. It shall be the duty of the General Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association in its annual meeting. The quarterly meetings will be in October, January, April, and July; on Monday after the third Sunday at 10:00 A.M.

Article IX Committees

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through the following annual meeting.

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the annual meeting:

- (1) Order of Business Committee (By-Law IV, Section 1)
- (2) Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
- (3) Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
- (4) Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)
- (5) Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 5)
- (6) Nominations Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
- (7) Constitution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
- (8) Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
- (9) Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
- (10) Resolutions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
- (11) Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
- (12) Seminary Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
- (13) Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
- (14) Place and Preacher Committee (By-Law IV, Section 15)
- (15) Youth and Family Services Committee (By-Law IV, Section 17)
- (16) Any other Committee authorized by the Association.

B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting, Committee on Committees (By-Law IV, Section 14)

Section 2: The following committees shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty days prior to the annual meeting to serve during the annual meeting:

- (1) Enrollment Committee (By-Law IV, Section 16)

Article X Amendments

Amendments to this constitution may be made at any annual session of the Association upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association in the first session and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association in the last session. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

BY-LAWS

By-Law I PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed at the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

By-Law II ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

By-Law III DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committees on Committees and Committee on Enrollment. He shall be Chairman of the General Board and be an ex officio (without voting privileges) member of all other committees.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be Vice-Chairman of the General Board.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's annual meeting, distribute at the annual meeting copies of the digest of these reports, make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the General Board. He shall inform all persons elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action. He shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its General Board, or as designated in the Budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the General Board or the Association in Annual Session); render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the annual meeting and give a report at each quarterly General Board meetings and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Association Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.

Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and shall make a written report to each annual meeting of the Association.

Section 6: Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the General Board except the office Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1: THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Clerk and Associational Music Director. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the annual meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the sessions when adjustments in the order of business become necessary.

Section 2: THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

(1) Shall be composed of the Associational officers listed in Article VI, Section 1, of the Constitution along with the chairmen of the Evangelism and Finance Committees. It shall work with Associational Superintendent of Missions in promoting the work of the Association, and lead and assist in

determining need for, beginning new mission stations, and organizing new churches.

(2) If such advice is sought it shall advise any group working to organize a new church. It shall also seek to help any member church desiring assistance with its problems.

(3) When without a Superintendent of Missions, this Committee shall seek out and recommend to the Association, or its General Board, for election a new Superintendent of Missions according to By-Law VI, Section 11.

(4) It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or General Board and act on routine or emergency matters between meetings of the General Board. It shall initiate and recommend matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven shall be necessary to transact business.

Section 3: THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE, composed of 4 members, shall promote the work of evangelism in the Association in cooperation with the State Departments of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its General Board.

Section 4: THE FINANCE COMMITTEE, composed of three members, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs for an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the annual meeting.

Section 5: THE ORDINATION COMMITTEE, composed of three members, with the pastor of the candidate, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

Section 6: THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE, composed of 4 members, shall contact before and nominate on the last day of the annual meeting of the Association the officers of the Association according to Articles VI and VII of the Constitution. This Committee shall also, in cooperation with the nominating committee of the various departments of work, recommend workers in these various departments (Article VI, Section 1). It shall also nominate Associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. This Committee shall also assist the General Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

Section 7: THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed.

Section 8: THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws (Article III, Section 2).

Section 9: THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following Associational Officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMU Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, and the Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an Associational Calendar for the coming year and present same to the General Board for adoption.

Section 10: THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation and any other resolutions in or the Association may deem wise.

Section 11: THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and 6 other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Associational Meeting.

Section 12: THE SEMINARY EXTENSION COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, shall plan and provide for such Seminary Extension classes as may be desired.

Section 13: THE CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMITTEE, composed of 4 members, shall recommend ways in which the Association can work for promotion of civic righteousness and social uplift.

Section 14: THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES, composed of 5 members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX, Section 1), and shall assist the General Board in filling vacancies on all other standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the chairman of each committee.

Section 15: THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE, composed of 5 members, shall receive or solicit invitations for the place or places of meeting for the next annual meeting of the Association, and shall recommend place or places. It shall also recommend the Preacher and alternate for the annual sermon or sermons.

Section 16: THE ENROLLMENT COMMITTEE shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of the messengers at all of the sessions.

Section 17: The Youth and Family Services Committee, composed of 3 members, shall assist the Youth and Family Services Director in co-ordinating the work of the Associational Youth and Family Services.

Section 18: Members of all these committees, except those appointed by the Moderator, shall be elected to serve for not more than three years on a rotating basis.

By-Law V TRUSTEES

The duty of the trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowments or other securities of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its General Board.

By-Law VI SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS

Section 1: His selection shall be upon recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association in its annual meeting or, between sessions of the Association, by its General Board. His term of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a voting and advisory capacity.

By-Law VII WRITTEN REPORTS

Written reports to appear in the Annual Minutes shall not exceed 300 words, except for History and Statistics.

By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the annual meeting by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

By-Law IX DEFINE PROCEDURE

Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and

closed with prayer.

Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.

Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six Associational Groups as follows: Polkville, Lattimore, Shelby, Kings Mountain, Geover, and Waco.

Proceedings

First Baptist Church, Shelby
Tuesday Evening, October 23, 1973

1. Mrs. E. T. Bailey, Associational Organist, presented an organ prelude as the messengers and visitors gathered in Webb Chapel of First Baptist Church, Shelby, for the 123rd Annual Session of Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

2. Rev. Roland Leath, Moderator, called the meeting to order.

3. Mr. Sidney Tanner, Minister of Music at Elizabeth Baptist Church, led the assembly in singing, "Joy to the World" and "To God Be the Glory" to the tune of "How Firm a Foundation."

4. Rev. Johnny Enloe, pastor of Sandy Plains Baptist Church, led the opening prayer.

5. Mr. Jack Dover, Chairman of the Order of Business Committee "moved the adoption of the printed program as the order of business with changes as are necessary as the time passes."

6. Mr. Joseph Cubanis, Clerk-Treasurer gave the General Board report and report of the Finance Committee. These reports are found elsewhere in this volume. He moved the adoption of the reports; the move was seconded and it carried. Mr. Cubanis also made a report of the work of the Special Selection Committee to seek a Superintendent of Missions, reporting the call of Rev. Cline W. Borders. He introduced Rev. Borders, Mrs. Borders and their son, Danny. Rev. Borders then spoke, expressing appreciation for the confidence of the Association. Basing his remarks on Mark 15, Rev. Borders spoke on the subject "I feel called to the task." He spoke of some of the things he hopes to do in answer to our call, then he expressed a need for the people of the Association.

7. Mr. Sidney Tanner led the assembly in singing "O God Our Help in Ages Past."

8. A group of young people from Elizabeth Baptist Church presented special music, directed by Sidney Tanner.

9. Moderator Roland Leath, Associate Pastor of the host church, recognized Rev. Gene Watkinson, pastor of the host church, who welcomed guests on behalf of the First Baptist Church of Shelby.

10. Moderator Leath gave a special welcome to the following new pastors and

11. There was a motion and second to take an offering for the Christian Action League for use in its fight against Liquor by the Drink. Motion carried and the offering taken amounted to \$114.55.

He reported that on 33 occasions he sat with troubled families; raised tuition for 2 children to be placed in private schools; launched a volunteer program of tutors for young people in need. He then introduced Mrs. Lynn Lefford, Juvenile Court Coordinator, who presented her project of a home for incorrigible girls.

13. Moderator Leath made announcements concerning parking for the Wednesday session.

14. Special music was rendered by the Adult Choir of First Baptist Church, Shelby, led by Mr. Van Ramsey.

15. Rev. Richard Pyles, pastor of Patterson Grove Baptist Church, brought the Inspirational Message, basing his message on Mark 4.

16. The benediction was given by Rev. Eugene Land, pastor of Second Baptist Church, Kings Mountain.

Messengers registered: 236; Non-Messengers: 93; Visitors from outside the Association: 3--for a total of 332.

Wednesday Morning, October 24, 1973

17. Mrs. E. T. Bailey presented an organ prelude as messengers and visitors gathered in First Baptist Church, Shelby, for the second day of the 123rd Annual Session.

18. Rev. Gene Land, pastor of Second Baptist Church, Kings Mountain, and Vice-Moderator, presided at the morning session.

19. Mr. Van Ramsey, Minister of Music of First Baptist Church, Shelby, led the assembly in singing "Jesus Saves" and "There Is Power In the Blood" accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Bailey and at the piano by Rev. Roland Leath.

20. Dr. W. W. Washburn gave the historian's report. He spoke of land selling for 70 cents per acre 125 years ago; he urged the people to record history. He moved the adoption of his report. There was a second and it carried.

21. Rev. Bruce Clappitt, pastor of Bethel Baptist Church, led in prayer.

22. Various items of business were transacted. Rev. Russell Pitts, chairman of the Finance Committee presented the budget and moved its adoption as printed with 2 pertinent changes. The move was seconded and it carried.

Rev. Ernest Smith reported for the Nominating Committee. That report is found elsewhere in this volume. He moved the adoption of his report. There was a second and it carried.

23. The Vice-Moderator called for the election of officers. Rev. C. A. Kirby, Jr., nominated Rev. Roland Leath for Moderator. Rev. Max Edgington moved that nominations cease; there was a second and the motion carried, electing Rev. Leath by acclamation.

Rev. Russell Pitts nominated Gene Land for Vice-Moderator. Rev. Leath presided. There was a motion that nominations cease; there was a second and the motion carried, electing Rev. Land by acclamation.

Rev. C. O. Grogan nominated Joseph Cabanis for Clerk-Treasurer. There was a motion that nominations cease. It was seconded and the motion carried, electing Mr. Cabanis by acclamation.

24. Mr. Van Ramsey led the assembly in singing, "I Will Sing of My Redeemer" accompanied by Mrs. Bailey at the organ and Rev. Leath at the piano.

25. Rev. Curtis Bundy, pastor of Ross Grove Baptist Church, brought the Doctrinal Message from John 3—"Ye must be born again." He gave this exhortation to preachers: Make plain to people how to be saved.

26. The following State Convention reports were given:

TOWN AND COUNTRY. Rev. James Lambert brought greetings from Roy Smith and his department, using 2 Kings as the basis for his remarks on "Sharing" Good Tidings.

STEWARDSHIP. Rev. E. Cleve Wilkie paid tribute to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association and expressed his thanks for the privilege of speaking for the State Convention. His remarks centered on "Stewardship is people." The Business of the New Testament Church is to produce New Testament Christians.

STATE MISSIONS. Rev. William Bowerwright gave an overview of State Missions. He said that there are more than 50 areas of State Missions.

27. Visitors recognized at this time were: W. A. Waggoner of the Children's Homes; Rev. and Mrs. W. G. Camp from the Sandy Run Association; and Worth Grant who spoke briefly for the Wycliffe Bible Translators.

32. Mr. Sidney Tanner led the assembly in singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Bailey.

34. Moderator Leath called for miscellaneous business. There was none.

ASSOCIATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT 1972-73

"People who know go to people who need to know Jesus, . . . and that is People to People." All over our convention, as these words are sung, churches catch the spirit of People to People. People-to-People is a church plan for reaching people for Bible study, for Christ, and for church membership. Paul, in his first epistle to the Corinthians, said, "Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him."

Jesus, our Lord, has set the example of how a Christian should face the ending of his life. Those whom we remember in this moment made their preparation while they were with us. Therefore, we do not grieve; we rejoice with them in their knowledge of those good things prepared by their Saviour.

Theodore Wilder, in his play, OUR TOWN, has some very relevant words about death and our attitude toward it, and the attitude of the dead toward the living:

"Now there are some things that we all know, but we don't take 'em out and look at 'em very often. We all know that something is eternal. And it ain't houses and it ain't names, and it ain't earth, and it ain't even the stars . . . everybody knows in their bones that something is eternal, and that something has to do with human beings . . . The dead don't stay interested in us for very long . . . They get weaned away from us . . . They're waitin'. They're waitin' for something that they feel is comin'. Aren't they waitin' for the eternal part in them to come out clear?"

Our memory of those whom we have known and loved this past year is not yet dimmed. But our hearts rejoice that the "something eternal" in them is now coming out clear. To God be the glory.

- (6) In special session Friday, September 28, 1973, approved by unanimous action a recommendation of the Executive Committee of the Association, that Rev. Clive W. Borders be asked to serve our Association as Superintendent of Missions.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT Kings Mountain Baptist Association

1973

"Remember the days of old. Consider the years of many generations. Ask thy father and he will show thee; thy elders and they will tell thee". Deuteronomy 32:7

History continues to be interesting and brings its surprises. If you read proof, read the headlines this morning, or last week or last month . . . then read about it again in 1983, or 2003 or 2073. Today's dramatic happenings are tomorrow's history. In government, the middle East, in your church or this association.

After study and consultation, your History Committee recommends the following goals and guidelines for your consideration:

1. **A HISTORIAN IN EVERY CHURCH** actively compiling day to day, week to week and year to year happenings, and preserving it in an interesting and available form for the future. It is just as important for New Life to record what happened in 1971 as it was for Pleasant Hill to record what happened in 1951, that is the events of their birth and beginnings.

2. **MICROFILM EVERY RECORD.** It has been about five years since most of our churches microfilmed most of their records. Much more materials have accumulated and should be added to your file. It can be done through Nashville, or through Wake Forest University at Winston Salem.

3. **HISTORICAL MUSEUM.** The Cleveland County Historical Association, in co-operation with the county commissioners, is studying a plan to create a museum of history for the county, and home it is in the present old court house when the new government center is completed. Along with other denominations and churches, this association and its churches should be represented. The story of the churches and the religious happenings are just as important as any secular events. Religious activities have contributed richly to the warp, wool and web of history in this area. Our religious leaders have also been our civic, political and secular leaders.

4. **125th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS.** Mt. Sinai and New Bethel were constituted in 1848 and are this year observing their one and a quarter century anniversaries, just as Shelby First and Boiling Springs did last year, Beaver Dam will be next in 1975 having been organized in 1850, and Pleasant Hill will be 125 years old in 1976. It was founded the year Kings Mountain Association was organized at Double Springs. We need to look back in order to better look forward on these occasions.

5. **BI-CENTENNIAL CELEBRATIONS.** Old Buffalo and Sandy Run, mother churches to this association, both celebrated their 200th anniversaries last year. The county, state and nation will have a series of events in 1974, 1975 and 1976 for the national Bi-Centennial. Kings Mountain Association's 125th anniversary will coincide with the nation's 200th anniversary. We ought to plan some challenging and inspirational dramas and displays for the coming days.

6. **THE BOOK.** The book on the history of the association and its churches is still in the making. For a year we had no reproaches since Mrs. Trynack left the association, but now we have some help, part time, and are slowly and surely making some progress. It certainly will be published no later than the 125th anniversary year. To our knowledge we will try to add a little patience and love.

1973 ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT

Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention

The Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention this year added new benefits or increased benefits for most active and retired pastors, church staff members and denominational workers it serves.

For annuitants (retirees, widows and disabled persons) on the roll December 31, 1972, monthly income checks have been permanently increased by 4 per cent. Just before Christmas, 1972, more than 7,000 annuitants received "13th Checks" amounting to the size of two extra months' benefits. The "13th Checks" are paid in

addition to the regular monthly payments.

Participants in Plans A-10, A-11 and A-25 on January 1, 1973 had their accrued credits increased by 10 per cent in "good experience credit," and Plan B participants received an additional interest credit based on the Board's good experience on its investments. In addition, the Board approved (subject to action by state conventions) an increase in widow benefits under Plan A to 50 per cent of the potential or actual retirement benefits; previously it was 40 per cent. This increase applies to those retiring January 1, 1973 and thereafter.

At the same time, a temporary income benefit under Plan A was established for a widow, child or dependent parent of those who die before early or normal retirement, or after disability retirement, and who have met the required participation. The temporary income benefit can amount, at maximum, to \$513.53 per month for 36 months (or a total of \$12,000) if the participant died before age 40. The length of payment of the benefit decreases with the age at death. This benefit is payable to those who died January 1, 1973 or thereafter.

More than 9,000 insurance policyholders transferred from the previous Health Benefit Plan with Blue Cross-Blue Shield to the new plan began January 1, 1973 with Aetna Life Insurance Company.

The Board reported several records for its operations in 1972. Funds held in trust for over 38,000 participants in retirement plans passed \$300 million for the first time. Investment income reached a new high for 1972 of more than \$22 million. Retirement and other protection benefits paid out for the 12-month period composed \$10 million for the first time.

The total amount of money paid in "13th Checks" exceeded 200 million dollars, also for the first time. Good investment results in 1972 on funds held to pay benefits account for this dividend.

Income from premiums and dues topped \$50 million, another record.

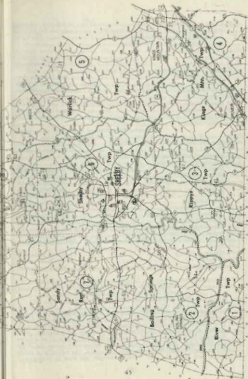

GARDNER-WEBB COLLEGE

Mr. R. Patrick Spangler, Chairman, Board of Trustees
 Dr. E. Eugene Poston, President of the College

The history of Gardner-Webb College reads like a miracle book. The school was chartered in 1905 as a Baptist Academy. The Kings Mountain Baptist Association gave birth to the school. The following men constituted a committee to study the feasibility of such a school: the Reverend J. V. Deveney, Chairman; A. C. Irvin, J. E. McBeaver, D. F. Fennell, and A. H. Sims. In the fall of 1907 the first students enrolled. The Sandy Run Baptist Association had already joined the Kings Mountain Baptist Association in sponsoring the school. The school grew strong academically and spiritually. The financial struggle was slow in coming-war.

depression, crop failures, and business reverses came and the school struggled hard to live. God did not plan to see the school close. He called many people to come to her aid with prayers, money, food, students, faculty, and administration.

The leaders of the school saw the need of her moving into junior college status and then senior college status. They are now talking of the possibility of a great Christian university in which Jesus Christ can be completely at home in it. There is a need for such a university in the Piedmont Section.

There are 1343 students enrolled for the academic year 1973-1974. A faculty of 94 lead these students to develop themselves as Christian leaders for the 21st Century as well as the remaining part of the 20th Century. "Where there is no vision, the people perish," Gardner-Webb College is looking to the future as a part of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention. She is extremely grateful for the Cooperative Program. Without it, the college would not want to exist. She wants to be a real part of the great missionary, educational, and beneficent movements that make up Baptist thrusts around the world. Gardner-Webb College is proud to be a Baptist College and to recognize the Headship of Jesus Christ.

The college lost one of her finest Trustees by death, Mr. G. Wayne DeHart's death brought sadness and joy—sadness, because a great Christian friend was present no longer—joy, because Gardner-Webb College knows that Wayne DeHart won the final victory of Eternal Life. His widow, Mrs. Wayne DeHart, is completing his unexpired term on the Board of Trustees. His son, Ray, is serving as a member of the Gardner-Webb College Board of Advisors.

The College has a debt of \$696,326 payable to the First Union National Bank of Charlotte. This is being amortized in the following way: one note, originally \$750,000, is being amortized at the rate of \$6,195 per month principal and interest, and another note, originally \$500,000, is being amortized at the rate of \$5,000 per month plus interest.

The current budget is \$3,800,000. The fall enrollment assures that the College will operate in the black unless there is a great drop in enrollment for the Spring Semester. We need the prayers and support of all Christians. The Fathers Day Offering is a genuine boost to the academic and spiritual programs.

We always stress the purpose to all whom we contact—"To develop quality Christian students who think for themselves and who will dedicate themselves to the Christian way of life in the vocation of their own choice."

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS

In May of this year Baptist Hospital observed its 50th Anniversary. The hospital opened its doors in May of 1923 "to bring the healing art more deftly under the dominion of the Great Healer."

The anniversary was celebrated jointly with the dedication of the new Reynolds Tower, a 16-story patient care facility. The completion of the Tower brings the total bed capacity to 655, placing Baptist Hospital within the top 10 per cent (in size) among hospitals in the United States. When the renovation of older sections of the hospital is completed the total number of beds will be 717.

Construction has begun on an ambulatory care building which will house the emergency room, several outpatient clinics, the Physical Therapy Department, and an Oncology (Cancer) Clinic and Research Laboratories. This building and the above-mentioned renovations will complete the present Medical Center Development Program.

Last November the Baptist State Convention heard the report of the Committee of 15 and adopted its recommendations. The hospital has been working to implement these recommendations:

1. A Medical Center Committee, composed of 8 Trustees from the Baptist Hospital Board and 8 from the Wake Forest University Board, has been appointed. This committee will consider matters involving the Medical Center and its future operation.
2. In January the hospital trustees appointed a committee of three to review appropriations from the Mother's Day fund and assist hospital personnel in making decisions on some specific requests for assistance. The hospital continues to provide care for people who cannot pay, valued at far in excess of the total Mother's Day Offering. The trustees' confirmed value of this care in 1972 was \$1,200,000—nearly four times the amount of the Mother's Day Offering—and this does not include the value of physicians' service, provided without cost to these service patients.
3. The Department of Pastoral Care is expanding its services to provide training for lay people. Dr. Mahan Siler joined the staff June 1 to head up this new work. The Department also anticipates the establishment of several satellite counseling and training centers in the state, beginning in the near future. Your Cooperative Program gifts support the work of this department.

The hospital's financial operation is "in the black", and there has not been a general room rate increase in 25 years. As of this date, the Mother's Day Offerings are running ahead of last year.

Four of the associations in North Carolina had 100 percent of their churches giving through the Cooperative Program in 1972. These four associations were: Anson, Flat River, Tar River, and Yancey.

Will you do four things?

1. Will you lead the church where you agree to increase Cooperative Program and associational mission giving by 10 percent or more?
2. Will you have a special prayer for your missionaries and other Cooperative Program causes during each service in your church during the October Cooperative Program prayer month?

1. Will you send your check for Cooperative Program EACH MONTH to Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, P.O. Box 26508, Raleigh, N.C. 27611?
2. Will you help us have a good STEWARDSHIP WORKSHOP in your association next spring or summer, so we can: (1) Study recommendations for pastor and staff salary increases; (2) Get an overview of available program helps for each church in stewardship; and (3) Receive a report on where you are in YOUR GOALS for associational and Cooperative Program giving?

1973 REPORT OF BIBLICAL RECORDER TO THE ASSOCIATIONS

This has been another good year for the BIBLICAL RECORDER, thanks to your support and confidence. One of the milestones reached in the past year was passing the 100,000 mark in circulation. This occurred in May and circulation has now risen to nearly 104,000—the highest in the 140-year history of the RECORDER. This has been achieved largely because more churches are putting the RECORDER in the budget, thus saving money and also time and effort that is put forth each year to renew their subscriptions under the Club Plan of four or more.

All of these things are encouraging to those getting out the RECORDER each week. They feel their obligation to North Carolina Baptists is to get out the finest paper possible—one that is attractive and filled with interesting and helpful material. In addition, news coverage of meetings such as the Committee of 11 is needed if North Carolina Baptists are to settle this issue which has come up in the last two state conventions. Associate Editor Toby Davis has covered every meeting of this committee which is studying the baptism issue in our state. The RECORDER will carry the full report of this committee 60 days before the convention meets in Greensboro. The RECORDER's coverage of these important meetings will do much to help messengers arrive at the right decision in November. This is the Baptist way—full information which comes with freedom of the press.

As you know, the RECORDER has for years led the fight against liquor by the drink. Now the issue is up to the people in a statewide referendum on November 6. The RECORDER will continue to give you information that will help win this fight against the liquor interests and those who would profit from liquor by the drink if this passes—which we hope and pray it won't. If individual Baptists will become as concerned about this evil as the RECORDER is, a great victory for decency will be won in November.

Those of you who receive the RECORDER know what it contains each week—timely editorial, news of your fellow Baptist churches and fellow Christians, excellent photographs and covers, interesting personal columns, Letters to the Editor, and many other features. It is a Baptist family journal devoted to that which is wholesome and helpful.

Those of you who don't get the RECORDER should subscribe immediately, either by putting the RECORDER in your budget for only \$2.50 a year or by starting a club of four or more for only \$3 a year. Where else can you get so much for so little?

REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS PIEDMONT AREA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC. 1973

Christian child care is a creative opportunity. The Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina is committed to quality care which nurtures the whole person, physically, mentally, emotionally, and spiritually. It is our hope that each child in our care will have the opportunity to develop the full potential which is his by God's creation.

This has been a year of development and constructive change for the Homes.

The entire agency has voluntarily met the minimum standards for child caring agencies and has been licensed by the State of North Carolina for all of our services to children and their families.

Each of the three administrative areas has realized significant growth. In the Western Area, two additional cottages have been completed and occupied at Broyhill Home and construction has begun on the administration building and the recreation building. The Maternity Home continues to operate at or near capacity in its service to unwed mothers. In the Eastern Area, a new cottage is being built at Kennedy Home and the foster care program has been enlarged.

In the Piedmont Area these developments deserve special attention. (1) Mills Home has a new administrative organization. The twenty cottages have been divided into four units of five each, and each unit will have a unit director, two social workers, and the cottage personnel. These smaller units will provide closer working relationships between staff members, between staff and children, and between staff and families. (2) Wall Home at Walling has been reopened to provide for a group of boys, utilizing the special skills of the houseparents in an outdoor adventure program. (3) We are negotiating with Baptists in Alamance and Mecklenburg counties for the establishment of emergency care units. These units will be joint ventures between the Homes and the local supporters, with the local group providing the buildings and the Homes operating the program of care.

These pressing needs are laid on the hearts of Baptists who are concerned for our ministry of Christian child care. (1) We need many families who will open their homes to accept foster children. Any family interested in exploring this Christian service to children should write or call the nearest office of the Baptist Children's Homes. (2) The increase in the cost of food, clothing, supplies and services makes the Cooperative Program and the Thanksgiving Offering all the more important to our continuing services. We need significant increases in both to meet rising costs. (3) Several old cottages remain which need to be replaced with new cottages better suited to present patterns of child care. The development staff welcomes the opportunity to counsel any person regarding his future investment in Christian child care.

One of the most meaningful things that you do as a Baptist is the share that you have in the ministry of your North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging. As you look back with us upon the twenty-two years of this ministry, and the last year in particular, there are distinctive blessings that we would like to call to your mind and heart.

In the first place, there is no greater realization that we can have together than the awareness of the fact that this special ministry to older people is a venture of faith in God. It always has been. We hope that it always will be. God has brought us from one Home to five resident Homes, with two located in Winston-Salem (Rothaven and the Hayes Home), and one each in Albemarle, Hamilton, and Yadonville. These Homes have a capacity for 162 residents, and there is a Nursing Care Unit in Winston-Salem, with a capacity for 63 patients, and serving all of the Homes' residents, when nursing care is needed. Four out of every five persons who come to us in our Homes for the Aging are persons whose income is very limited.

They look to you, through your love gifts, for a supplement to their care, and all of a look to the Lord continually for His great love. This, therefore, is a venture of faith.

Never forget that this is your ministry, on behalf of Christ, to older persons and that they simply could not be ministered unto without your love gifts. Specifically, during the past year, through your gifts, you contributed \$185 a month for the care of the majority of the residents in your five Baptist Homes. Through the Special Offering you contributed 20% of the total income of the Homes, and through the Cooperative Program, you gave 10% of the total budget needed. The tie that binds this ministry to the hearts of our Baptist people and our Baptist Churches is a very special one and a very distinctive one indeed.

Be glad also for the fact that your love gifts make possible quality care. It has often been said of the ministry of our Baptist Homes that there is no finer care that an older person can receive this side of Heaven than the care given in our Homes for the Aging. Everything that we do for Christ should be this way, and we are certainly trying to give Him our best day by day in our ministry to the older people in our care. There is someone serving around the clock, watching over the residents and patients even as they sleep. One of our Supervisors, or "Mothers," as they are often called was given the name of "Guardian Angel," when a resident, during an illness discovered later that the "Mother" was keeping vigil just outside her door.

God bless you for your share in this ministry to the Aging, which is both special and distinctive. Pray for us, come to see us, and continue to support this ministry as liberally and loyally in the future as you have in the past.

1973 ASSOCIATIONAL BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc., is a charitable corporation, chartered under the laws of the State of North Carolina by the Baptist State Convention in 1923. The Foundation, as an agency of the Convention, encourages, receives, and manages gifts and bequests for benefit of all Baptist institutions, agencies, and causes fostered and supported by the North Carolina and Southern Baptist Conventions. The Foundation is not a competitive agency, but a service agency dedicated to the task of undergirding all Baptist work. It encourages the donor to use the local church as a channel for directing the income from Foundation trusts to the benefiting cause. The operating expense of the Foundation is received from the Cooperative Program of the Convention.

The Foundation Executive Secretary is available to assist churches and individuals interested in a program of perpetual stewardship, particularly as it relates to estate planning, involving gifts to Baptist institutions, agencies, and causes. The Foundation provides a means for establishing trusts to benefit these Christian causes as well as providing an opportunity for perpetual stewardship witness. Through gifts of property, cash, or securities during lifetime, donors and/or other beneficiaries can receive annuities from the Foundation during their lifetimes, and can also receive certain tax benefits provided for each gift.

Responsibility for the administration of the Foundation is vested in a fifteen-member board of directors elected by the Baptist State Convention. The present board consists of thirteen prominent and successful business and professional men and women and two outstanding pastors, all of whom are dedicated to the best management of the sacred trust funds now placed in the Foundation. The investment policy calls for investment in quality securities with diversification, good income, and balanced growth potential.

Additions to the investment principle by donors and from property sale and rentals totaled \$54,204.92 for the fiscal year 1972-73. As of June 30, 1973, the cost or inventory value of all securities, notes, and principal cash of all funds being administered by the Foundation was \$801,392.96. Real estate held by the Foundation was valued at \$561,167.54, making the total value of all properties administered \$1,362,460.50.

During the 1972-73 year, beneficiaries of existing trusts were paid \$13,934.61. A total of \$129,465.60 has been paid to Baptist institutions, agencies and causes during the past six years from the income of invested Foundation funds.

EVANGELISM REPORT

The spirit of evangelism continues to be very much in evidence in the churches of the Kings Mountain Association as it has been the past few years. Several new tools of evangelism are being used and are proving very effective in most instances. The Lay School of Evangelism with its emphasis on personal witnessing has stirred many of our congregations. The lay ministry of evangelism is another new tool being used by some churches. It too utilizes the personal encounter type of witnessing. It seems that nothing can nor will replace the one to one method of winning souls to Christ. As far as Evangelism on a state level, "SHARING CHRIST NOW" was the theme of the 27th Statewide Evangelism Conference at Owens Auditorium, Charlotte-February 5-7, 1973. Over 2,400 pastors and lay persons were challenged by outstanding speakers to lead their people to become more involved in the work of evangelism. The closing session on Wednesday, February 7, was held at Pritchard Memorial Church, with an emphasis on prayer and personal renewal.

The Division of Evangelism has encouraged churches to participate in KEY 73. One hundred and fifty denominations are sharing in this evangelistic effort. The purpose of KEY 73 is to unite all Christians in the task of evangelism and to enable Christians to confront every person in the United States and Canada with the Gospel of Christ.

It is thrilling what the Holy Spirit is doing through the ministry of our first summer youth evangelism teams. Three college students—Steve Biehl, Conover; Terry Grimes, Lenoir, and Christy Furrise, Williamson, are leading in music, preaching in youth revivals, and directing youth witness training sessions in churches from Marshall to Washington.

During June 11-15 over 730 youth and adults were present for the Youth Ministries Week at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly, with the emphasis on Evangelism, Vocational Guidance, and Recreation. Eighty-one youth made various decisions, including sixteen professions of faith.

Over 16,000 youth, pastors, and adult leaders are expected to attend the 3rd Statewide Youth Evangelism Night at Greensboro Coliseum on August 17. It is exciting how God is using the witness of thousands of Christian youth across our state in a tremendous manner.

The response of youth and adults to Lay Evangelism Schools in the past twenty months has been outstanding. 9,364 youth and adults have participated in this lay witness training from 720 churches and 34 associations. Also, 107 pastors

from nine associations shared in a Pastor's Retreat to learn how to lead their churches in Lay Evangelism Schools.

The Division of Evangelism in cooperation with the Department of City and Metropolitan Missions will sponsor a Metropolitan Missions and Evangelism Seminar in October 1-2 at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary at Wake Forest with the theme: "Reaching the Cities for Christ".

The 28th Statewide Evangelism Conference will be at War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, during February 4-6, 1974.

Let us thank God for the excellent reports of revival meetings, city-wide crusades, and evangelism clinics. Remember to pray for the TOGETHER WE ADVANCE emphasis that we may strive to attain a 10% increase in baptisms, C. P. gifts, Bible Study involvement and Assoc. Missions gifts. Let's go tell about Jesus!!

KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HISTORICAL DATE

BY-LAWS FOR ASSOCIATIONAL W.M.U.

ARTICLE I: NAME. The name of this organization shall be Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II: OBJECT. The object shall be to promote Christian missions through the organizations of Woman's Missionary Union in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE III: RELATIONSHIPS.

Section 1. Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to Kings Mountain Baptist Association, shall be the liaison organization between church organizations and the North Carolina Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 2. This associational Union shall recognize the autonomy of church organizations as provided in the Baptist democratic process of operation.

Section 3. Church organizations shall be recognized as units through which the object of this Woman's Missionary Union is accomplished, each responsible for its own program, and contributing to the work of the association.

Section 4. This associational Union shall be guided in its plan of work by the Associational W.M.U. Achievement Guide.

ARTICLE IV: MEMBERS. The members of Woman's Missionary Union organizations in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association shall constitute the membership.

ARTICLE V: OFFICERS.

Section 1. The officers shall be a Director, Associate Director, Secretary-Treasurer, Baptist Women's Director, Associate Baptist Women's Director, Baptist Young Women's Director, Associate Baptist Young Women's Director, Action Director, Associate Action Director, Girls in Action Director, Associate Girls in Action Director, Missions Friends Director, Associate Missions Friends Director, and others as needed. These officers shall be elected annually in a meeting of the associational W.M.U. and shall hold office for one year or until their successors are elected. The tenure of office shall be five consecutive years.

Section 2. These officers shall perform the duties set out for them in these By-Laws, and the "Associational Women's Missionary Union Manual."

ARTICLE VI: NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS.

Section 1. The Nominating Committee composed of six women shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee, and elected by the associational WMU to serve one year.

Section 2. The Nominating Committee shall nominate officers and age group directors and associates. Other nominations may be made from the floor.

Section 3. The Nominating Committee, in event of a vacancy, shall present a nominee for the unexpired term for election by the associational WMU Council.

ARTICLE VII: MEETINGS.

Section 1. Day and/or night associational WMU meetings shall be held annually.

Section 2. Other meetings shall be held as authorized by the WMU Council.

ARTICLE VIII: W.M.U. COUNCIL.

Section 1. The WMU Council shall be composed of the officers, age group directors and any others desired.

Section 2. The WMU Council shall schedule the regular meetings of the organization, plan the program of activities, hear reports, and check progress on the Achievement Guide.

Section 3. Regular meetings of the WMU Council shall be held quarterly, or as needed.

ARTICLE IX: COMMITTEES.

Section 1. There shall be committees standing or special as needed.

Section 2. Committees, except those otherwise provided for, shall be appointed by the Director.

Section 3. The Director shall be an ex officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.

Section 4. The duties of these committees are such as are set forth in these By-Laws and the "Associational Women's Missionary Union Manual."

ARTICLE X: FINANCES.

Section 1. The associational WMU shall adopt an annual budget, funds to be provided by WMU organizations in the Association added to the amount allocated from the associational budget.

Section 2. These funds will be on a 50 cents per Baptist Women and Baptist Young Women member basis, and are to be

ARTICLE XI: PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY. The rules contained in Robert's RULES OF ORDER, REVISED or the Parliamentary section in the WMU Year Book shall govern the Union in all cases to which they are applicable.

ARTICLE XII: AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the associational WMU provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.
