Mr. Bearden came to First Baptist in September, 1974. He is a native of Greenville, S. C. and graduated from Gardner-Webb College, Lenoir Rhyne College, and attended Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary.

He has served churches in Morganton, Paw Creek, Greensboro, Ashboro, and Charlotte. Rev. Bearden has just completed a term as president of the N. C. Baptist Pastor's Conference and is now serving on the Ministerial Board of Associates of Gardner-Webb College.



FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH

First Baptist Church of Kings Mountain was organized March 21, 1890, and accepted into the Kings Mountain Association that same year. The present Church Building has been in use since 1960.

With a membership of 616, First Baptist Church is involved in Community Ministry with classes and services held in Convalescent Centers, State Park, and City Hall in addition to a full program within the Church structure, including Boy Scouts, Graded Chorus, and Mission Organizations. A unique feature of First Baptist Church is a house provided for Foreign Missionaries on furlough. Each year a different missionary is in residence.

SECOND BAPTIST CHURCH

Second Baptist Church began as a community Sunday School led by Mr. J. R. Roberts, Superintendent of Coos Cotton Mills, in 1914. It was constituted as a Missionary Baptist Church in 1915. There were 27 Charter members and the name "Eastside" was chosen for the new church. The church was admitted to the King Mountain Baptist Association in 1915.

The first building was a one room school house located off Cranford Drive, donated by Dr. O. G. Falls. In 1922 a brick vestry building was erected on Linwood Drive across the street from the present location. In 1953 the present structure was raised.

In 1923 the church changed its name to the Second Baptist Church.

The church has had 13 pastors in its history and has ordained some 8 men into the ministry, all of whom now pastor churches in North Carolina. The present pastor, Reverend Eugene W. Land, has served since 1970.

Constitution and By-Laws

Preamble

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rules of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article I Name

The name of this body shall be the "Kings Mountain Baptist Association."

Article II Purpose

It shall be the purpose of the Association to cooperate with the State and Southern Baptist Conventions in the promotion of Christian Missions at home and abroad, and in any other related objects such as evangelism, Christian education, benevolent enterprises, and social services, which it may deem proper and advisable for the furtherance of the Kingdom of God.

Article III Membership

Section 1: The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist Churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Membership Committee and if recommended by this Committee and accepted by the Association shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year. At the end of one year, upon recommendation of the Committee, membership within the Association of such churches shall be determined by vote of the Association. During this period such churches shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office nor vote.

Section 3: The Association shall be sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its Constitution and By-Laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and, if requested, the General Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like Associations.

Article IV Meetings

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Tuesday evening and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or General Board provided two weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 3: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each 50 members of the church, provided each church shall have not less than three nor more than ten messengers. These shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those attending and registering at the Associational meeting.

Article V Authority

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this constitution in Article III, Sections 2 and 3.

Article VI Officers and Their Election

Section 1: The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Music Director, Organist, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Chairman of Library Council, Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Youth and Family Services Director, and parliamentarian.

Section 2: The officers shall be elected on the morning of the last day of the Annual Meeting for a term of one year each. The nominees shall be contacted and nominated by the Committee on Nominations (By-Law IV, Section 6) except the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk-Treasurer who shall be nominated from the floor. Committee nominations shall not preclude nominations from the floor.

Section 3: All officers shall complete their work as soon as practicable after the closing of the Annual Session. The newly elected officers shall assume, at the close of the Annual Session, all duties incumbent upon said officers relating to the work of the ensuing Associational year.

Section 4: Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election.

Article VII Trustees and Their Election

There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer, serving terms of three years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

Article VIII The General Board

The General Board shall be composed of all Associational Officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Associational Superintendent of Missions (ex-officio without voting privileges), each active pastor, two other members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The General Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the constitution. It shall be the duty of the General Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association in its annual meeting. The quarterly meetings will be in October, January, April, and July; on Monday after the third Sunday at 10:00 A.M.

Article IX Committees

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through

the following annual meeting:

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the annual meeting:

- (1) Order of Business Committee (By-Law IV, Section 1)
- (2) Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
- (3) Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
- (4) Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)
- (5) Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 5)
- (6) Nominations Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
- (7) Constitution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
- (8) Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
- (9) Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
- (10) Resolutions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
- (11) Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
- (12) Seminary Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
- (13) Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
- (14) Place and Preaches Committee (By-Law IV, Section 15)
- (15) Youth and Family Services Committee (By-Law IV, Section 17)
- (16) Any other Committee authorized by the Association.

B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting, Committee on Committees (By-Law IV, Section 14)

Section 2: The following committees shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty days prior to the annual meeting to serve during the annual meeting:

- (1) Enrollment Committee (By-Law IV, Section 16)

Article X Amendments

Amendments to this constitution may be made at any annual session of the Association upon an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association in the first session and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association in the last session. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

BY-LAWS

By-Law I PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

By-Law II ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

By-Law III DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committee on Committees and Committee on Enrollment. He shall be Chairman of the General Board and be an ex officio (without voting privileges) member of all other committees.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be Vice-Chairman of the General Board.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's annual meeting.

distribute at the annual meeting copies of the Digest of these reports, make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the General Board. He shall inform all persons elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of such action. He shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its General Board, or as designated in the Budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the General Board or the Association in Annual Session); render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the annual meeting and give a report at each quarterly General Board meeting; and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Association Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.

Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and shall make a written report to each annual meeting of the Association.

Section 6: Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the General Board except the office Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1: The ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Clerk and Associational Mgmt. Director. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the annual meeting of the Association, present the printed programs for adoption and serve through the sessions when adjustments in the order of business become necessary.

Section 2: THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

(1) Shall be composed of the Associational officers listed in Article VI, Section 1, of the Constitution along with the chairman of the Evangelism and Finance Committees. It shall work with Associational Superintendent of Missions in promoting the work of the Association, and lead and assist in determining need for, beginning new mission stations, and organizing new churches.

(2) If such advice is sought it shall advise any group seeking to organize a new church. It shall also seek to help any member church desiring assistance with its problems.

(3) When without a Superintendent of Missions, this Committee shall seek out and recommend to the Association, or its General Board, for election a new Superintendent of Missions according to By-Law VI, Section 11.

(4) It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or General Board and act on routine or emergency matters between meetings of the General Board. It shall initiate and recommend matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven shall be necessary to transact business.

Section 3: THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE, composed of 6 members, shall promote the work of evangelism in the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its General Board.

Section 4: THE FINANCE COMMITTEE, composed of three members, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs for an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the annual meeting.

Section 5: THE ORIENTATION COMMITTEE, composed of three members, with the pastor of the candidate, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

Section 6: THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE, composed of 6 members, shall contact before and nominate on the last day of the annual meeting of the Association the officers of the Association according to Articles VI and VII of the Constitution. This Committee shall also, in cooperation with the nominating committee of the various departments of work, recommend workers in these various departments (Article VI, Section 1). It shall also nominate Associational representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. This Committee shall also assist the General Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not exclude other nominations from the floor.

Section 7: THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed.

Section 8: THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws (Article III, Section 2).

Section 9: THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following Associational Officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMU Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, and the Vice-Moderator as chairman. This committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an Associational Calendar for the coming year and present same to the General Board for adoption.

Section 10: THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation and any other resolutions it or the Association may deem wise.

Section 11: THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and 6 other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Associational Meeting.

Section 12: THE SEMINARY EXTENSION COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, shall plan and provide for such Seminary Extension classes as may be desired.

Section 13: THE CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMITTEE, composed of 6 members, shall recommend ways in which the Association can work for promotion of civic righteousness and social uplift.

Section 14: THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES, composed of 5 members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX,

Section 1), and shall assist the General Board in filling vacancies on all other standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the chairman of each committee.

Section 15: **THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE**, composed of 3 members, shall receive or solicit invitations for the place or places of meeting for the next annual meeting of the Association, and shall recommend place or places. It shall also recommend the Preacher and chorists for the annual session or sessions.

Section 16: **THE ENROLLMENT COMMITTEE** shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of the messengers at all of the sessions.

Section 17: The Youth and Family Services Committee, composed of 3 members, shall assist the Youth and Family Services Director in co-ordinating the work of the Associational Youth and Family Services.

Section 18: Members of all these committees, except those appointed by the Moderator, shall be elected to serve for not more than three years on a rotating basis.

By-Law V TRUSTEES

The duty of the trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment or other securities of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its General Board.

By-Law VI SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS

Section 1: His selection shall be upon recommendation of the Executive Committee and on vote by the Association in its annual meeting or, between sessions of the Association, by its General Board. His time of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity.

By-Law VII WRITTEN REPORTS

Written reports to appear in the Annual Minutes shall not exceed 300 words, except for History and Statistics.

By-Law VIII AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the annual meeting by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

By-Law IX DEFINE PROCEDURE

Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.

Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six Associational Groups as follows: Polkville, Lanesboro, Shelby, Kings Mountain, Groves, and Waco.

This special church project emphasizes teaching people for Bible study and for Christ. HISTORIAN'S REPORT TO THE KINGS MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION October 22, 1974

Exodus 13:3 reads in part, "And Moses said unto the people, 'Remember Ye this day in which ye came out of Egypt.'"

As in days of old when Moses told the children of Israel to remember their troubles and trials in Egypt, the Association is also involved in a project to remember it's troubles and trials in 125 years of recorded history. This project had been somewhat hampered by lack of secretarial help and a person to do research until recently when we obtained the services of Mrs. Charlotte Tadder Swift, who will continue the research and secretarial work begun by Mrs. Otthella Traywick, who moved away with her preacher-husband.

The ark is moving again and we are now researching the difficult period of the late 20's and early 30's and soon hope to bring the story of the Association on up to World War II and the 60's and 70's.

This will be a four-fold book: (1) a story book, and we're getting many stories in addition to the factual minutes of the Association, (2) a picture book, and we are obtaining the services of a qualified photographer to help us gather and evaluate the photographs, (3) a teaching book in which we can teach the younger generation the facts and doctrines of our Baptist people (4) a reference book which will have documented facts of the past 125 years.

As your historian, I was pleased to note that at the recent selection of ten famous Cleveland County people to the Hall of Fame, that seven of the ten were Baptist laymen, a laywoman, and a minister, who for 40 years was moderator of this Association. For the Association to furnish the county with 7 out of 10 of it's most famous leaders, speaks well of the Association, of the county, and certainly of it's leadership.

There have been many changes in current leadership and many ventures into new kinds of programs in the various churches, and a factual summary of these happenings will be filed with the historian's report.

1974 ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention

The Southern Baptist Convention Annuity Board paid out a record nearly \$16 million in retirement and protection benefits during 1973. This means that in the Board's history, it has now paid out over \$100 million in retirement and protection benefits.

More than 9,000 retired pastors and other church-related vocational workers or their widows receive the benefits.

In addition, the Annuity Board set another record. This one was for funds held in trust for those participating in retirement and protection plans while still in active service. About 38,000 pastors, other church staff and denominational agency employees are included.

Funds held in trust exceeded \$350 million for the first time, President Darold H. Morgan reported.

The Board issued another 13th Check, or extra benefit, for annuitants shortly before Christmas 1973. It amounted to two extra months' worth of benefits and totaled \$1,187,379. The 13th Check helps annuitants, whose benefits are fixed, to meet the rising cost of living. Payment of the 13th Check is over and above the 12 contracted monthly benefits and depends from year to year on investment income.

Board officials and national market experts expected the investment picture to brighten in 1974 after a poor performance in the general stock market in 1973 resulted in a deep cut in income from investments. Investment income declined to \$10 million in 1973 after hitting a record of more than \$22 million the year before.

The Board's decline in equity, or stock, investments paralleled the decline in the market generally, which affected all other types of investors as well. The major market indicators—Dow-Jones, Standard and Poor, and Value Line—all were down during the year.

By comparison, the Board's investments in mortgage loans and real estate investments proved to be profit-making for the year. In an effort to continue earning from real estate investments, the Board announced a new type of Plan C investment called land equity loans. Plan C is the Board's variable benefit plan, which supplements the basic retirement program, called Plan A, for ministers.

As of September 25, 1974, there were 58 churches and 71 staff members participating in the Southern Baptist Protection Program (retirement plan), in Kings Mountain Association.

1974 STEWARDSHIP-COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

More than 5,000 missionaries at home and abroad depend on gifts through the Cooperative Program for a salary each month. Over 3,000 of these have a basic ministry of evangelism, with all of the others using their skills as nurses, teachers, doctors, etc. to meet human needs in order to bring these to Christ. Through the Cooperative Program you are helping the widow, the homeless child, the homeless aged, the sick, plus the ministries of preaching and teaching.

Increasing the percentage given through the Cooperative Program is an excellent follow-through for the special offerings your church receives.

Failure to have a good follow-through, in anything, would be frustrating at the least and tragic at the most. Failure to have a good follow-through when you are fishing would cause all of your fish to get away and this would be frustrating. It would be tragic not to have a good follow-through in a baptismal service.

A good follow-through is the lifeline between good planning and good results. You will get excellent results if you plan well your special offerings and let your major emphasis be on the lifeline: **YOUR COOPERATIVE PROGRAM.**

Would your church give more if you received more money? If so, you need to have a thorough stewardship program in your church.

Last year 1,236 churches increased Cooperative Program giving by 10 percent or more over what they gave the previous year. Two of the associations in North Carolina had 100 percent of their churches giving through the Cooperative Program in 1973. These two associations were: Flat River and the Tar River.

Will you do four things?

1. Will you lead the church where you serve to increase Cooperative Program and associational mission giving by 10 percent or more?
2. Will you have a special prayer for your missionaries and other Cooperative Program causes during each service in your church during the October Cooperative Program prayer month?
3. Will you send your check for Cooperative Program **EACH MONTH** to Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, Post Office Box 36308, Raleigh, North Carolina 27611?
4. Will you help us have a good **STEWARDSHIP WORKSHOP** in your association next spring or summer, so we can: (1) Study recommendations for pastor and staff salary increases; (2) Get an overview of available program helps for each church in stewardship; and (3) Receive a report on where you are in **YOUR GOALS** for associational and Cooperative Program giving?

1974 BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS

The BIBLICAL RECORDER is grateful for another good year, although these are difficult days for religious publishers. Some have had to go out of business while others are squeezed by rising costs. The RECORDER has not escaped the pressures of inflation. For example, paper has risen 63 per cent already this year—and the end is not in sight.

Even so, the RECORDER has been in business for 141 years and expects to continue. A few changes have to be made, however, to keep the paper strong. As staff members have resigned or retired, they have not been replaced. Some weeks the number of pages has to be reduced to save money, but readers have been very understanding.

Despite some problems, the RECORDER is enjoying its highest circulation in history—more than 111,000—thanks to the continuing support of the vast majority of Baptist churches in the state. These churches and their members remember the part the RECORDER played in the overwhelming defeat of liquor by the drink last November. This is probably the most significant story that the RECORDER has reported since the associations met last year. You will remember that approximately 70 per cent of the voters in the state voted against liquor by the drink and it was defeated in 97 of 100 counties. This should take care of this issue for awhile.

The RECORDER will continue its emphasis on local church coverage, seeking to deal with problems that every church has. Naturally, we are prejudiced, but we do not believe any publication can take the place of the BIBLICAL RECORDER. If your church does not send it to every family, may we ask a simple question: Why? At a cost of only a nickel a week for each family, this is the best investment a Baptist church can make. Put the RECORDER in the budget before it has to increase the rate because of inflation.

CHILDREN'S HOMES

1974

Christian child care is a shared adventure. We proceed by faith to build a helping relationship with children and their families in need. We cannot know in advance the final outcome, but we are confident of God's power to work in these relationships for reconciliation and healing.

Much has happened this year to strengthen the foundations for our ministry of child care. The recreation and administration buildings at Peophill Home are nearing completion. A cottage and two staff residences at Kennedy Home will soon be dedicated. A challenge gift of \$100,000 has been received for the development of Green-Burke Home at Chapel Hill.

"The Mountain Within", a thirty-minute 16mm sound picture, has been filmed to tell the story of the Children's Homes. It was premiered at the Piedmont Area conference September 12. Following extensive use on statewide television broadcasts, it was released for showings to churches, associations, civic clubs, and other interested groups October 1. Place your order for the film through the Department of Communications of the Baptist State Convention.

Our Piedmont Area services have expanded significantly during the past year. Mills Home continues to provide the highest quality group care to more than two hundred school age children. Wall Home has pioneered with an exciting outdoor high-adventure program for a group of teenage boys. Our first Emergency Care Home opened in Burlington May 21, and a similar home was opened in Charlotte in late summer. These two homes represent a cooperative venture with the Mount Zion and Mecklenburg Associations to provide emergency care on the local scene. Nine foster homes have been licensed and have increased the number of foster home children in care.

The continuing good will and generous support of our friends throughout the State make possible this vigorous and progressive ministry of child care. During the past year, North Carolina Baptists gave more than a million dollars to Christian child care in the North Carolina Baptist Children's Homes through the Cooperative

Program, the Thanksgiving offering, and designated gifts and offerings. Rising costs and the need for expanding services challenge all of us--staff and supporters--to continue our investment in the shared adventure of Christian child care.

As a Baptist, among the many vital ministries that you support are your North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging. For over 23 years now, you have had a part in serving hundreds of older people and making life much happier and secure for them. You have done so through two very helpful means of income: (1) The Special Offering for the Homes, received on the 3rd Sunday of February each year; (2) The Cooperative Program. Gifts through these two sources have increased from year to year, and offerings for 1974 will perhaps exceed \$350,000, providing more than 30% of the budget needed to operate 5 resident Homes and the Nursing Care Unit.

God, through you, has blessed this ministry of our Baptist Homes in a remarkable way, leading you to establish two Homes in Winston-Salem, Reutheren, and the Hayes Home, and the Nursing Care Unit, and three other Homes at Albemarle, Hamilton, and Yanceyville. In these Homes, 4 out of every 5 residents depend upon your love gifts and simply could not be cared for without your help.

Of greatest significance during the past year, has been the decision by the Trustees of the Homes to establish a 6th Home in Western North Carolina, to be located in the city of Asheville on the Pearson Estate, a magnificently beautiful twenty-one acre site, overlooking the city, and with the gorgeous Blue Ridge Mountains in the background. A dedicated group of people in the Western Carolina area have organized the first initial phase of what will become, it is hoped, a major State-Wide fundraising effort to obtain the necessary money to build this proposed Home, after approval by the General Board, and the Baptist State Convention. Church groups are encouraged to visit the beautiful site on which the proposed Home will be built, and will be served lunch, if an appointment is made in advance.

With the addition of a 6th Home for the Aging, with the spiraling cost of living, and the great and everincreasing needs of older people, it is most urgent that our Baptist people be more generous than ever before in support for the Homes through the regular channels of the 3rd Sunday of February Offering, the Cooperative Program, and an over and above gift for the Western North Carolina Home.

Ministry to an older person is a direct ministry as unto Christ Himself and is most pleasing to Him, we are sure!

SOUTH MOUNTAIN BAPTIST CAMP
1974 REPORT
THEME: "HIS WILL--MY WILL"

Christian greetings to our South Mountain Baptist Camp Friends. We first just want to say "Praise the Lord" for many victories this summer. Many of our campers say, "This has been the greatest week of my life." Others say, "What a blessing the camp program is to me." Many pastors write saying, "Our young people come home excited about serving our Lord, Jesus Christ." Thank God for these and other testimonies.

Our camp continues to grow in attendance, with an average of 237 weekly for the summer. A total of 214 came from your association. This summer, campers considered how to know Christ and how to know and do His will. They were made aware of the needs of a lost world and were challenged to share Christ throughout the world. Above all, our camp continues to grow spiritually. Decisions for Christ amounted to 1,200, of which 330 were professions of faith. "Hallelujah."

CAMP OUTREACH: Our camp staff, consisting of about 30 young people conducted worship services in 14 different churches. Over 200 decisions for Christ were made in these services.

SOMETHING NEW: For the first time, we had a sign language class taught each day for those campers who were interested in learning to communicate with the deaf. Many responded to this class.

CAMP CHAPEL: Our Chapel which is now under construction is closed in, insulated, has the wiring and plumbing roughed in, and has one-fourth of the ceiling completed. The grading for the Chapel was donated by Mr. Truman Williams, and Mr. J. C. Cook gave of his time and machinery to saw some lumber for us. We have spent approximately \$20,000 thus far on the 20 x 40 two story building.

BY-LAWS FOR ASSOCIATIONAL W. M. U.

ARTICLE I. NAME. The name of this organization shall be Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. OBJECT. The object shall be to promote Christian relations through the organizations of Woman's Missionary Union in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE III. RELATIONSHIPS.

Section 1. Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to Kings Mountain Baptist Association, shall be the liaison organization between church organizations and the North Carolina Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 2. This associational Union shall recognize the autonomy of church

organizations as provided in the Baptist democratic process of operation.

Section 3. Church organizations shall be recognized as units through which the object of this Woman's Missionary Union is accomplished, each responsible for its own program, and contributing to the work of the association.

Section 4. This associational Union shall be guided in its plan of work by the Associational WMU Achievement Guide.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERS. The members of Woman's Missionary Union organizations in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association shall constitute the membership.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS.

Section 1. The officers shall be a Director, Associate Director, Secretary-Treasurer, Baptist Women's Director, Associate Baptist Women's Director, Baptist Young Women's Director, Associate Baptist young Women's Director, Actress Director, Associate Actress Director, Girls in Action Director, Associate Girls in Action Director, Mission Friends Director, Associate Mission Friends Director, and others as needed. These officers shall be elected annually in a meeting of the associational WMU and shall hold office for one year or until their successors are elected. The tenure of office shall be five consecutive years.

Section 2. These officers shall perform the duties set out for them in these By-Laws and the "Associational Woman's Missionary Union Manual".

ARTICLE VI. NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS.

Section 1. The Nominating Committee, composed of six women, shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee, and elected by the associational WMU to serve one year.

Section 2. The Nominating Committee shall nominate officers and age group directors and associates. Other nominations may be made from the floor.

Section 3. The Nominating Committee, in event of a vacancy, shall present a nominee for the unexpired term for election by the associational WMU Council.

ARTICLE VII. MEETINGS.

Section 1. Day and/or night associational WMU meetings shall be held annually.

Section 2. Other meetings shall be held as authorized by the WMU Council.

ARTICLE VIII. W. M. U. COUNCIL.

Section 1. The WMU Council shall be composed of the officers, age group directors and any others desired.

Section 2. The WMU Council shall schedule the regular meetings of the organizations, plan the program of activities, hear reports, and check progress on the Achievement Guide.

Section 3. Regular meetings of the WMU Council shall be held quarterly, or as needed.

ARTICLE IX. COMMITTEES.

Section 1. There shall be committees, standing or special, as needed.

Section 2. Committees, except those otherwise provided for, shall be appointed by the Director.

Section 3. The Director shall be an ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.

Section 4. The duties of these committees are such as are set forth in these By-Laws and the "Associational Woman's Missionary Union Manual".

ARTICLE X. FINANCES.

Section 1. The associational WMU shall adopt an annual budget, funds to be provided by the associational budget.

ARTICLE XI. PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY. The rules contained in

Robert's RULES OF ORDER, REVISED shall govern the Union in all cases to which they are applicable.

ARTICLE XII. AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the associational WMU provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.
