New Hope Baptist Church

New Hope Baptist Church was organized in August 1874 with 161 Charter members. Prior to that date services had been held at Earl School for several years. Rev. Thomas Dixon was the first pastor, and New Hope joined the Kings Mountain Baptist Association in the same year.

The first Church building was a one room structure. A much larger building was built in 1914. This building was used until August 1954 when the present building was constructed (or occupied). New Hope has had 25 pastors during its 101 years of serving the Lord in the Earl Community.

Donald M. Farrow, the present pastor, has served New Hope since March 1970. He is a native of Wilmington, N. C., and is a graduate of Wake Forest College and Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary.

He has served churches in Rocky Mount and Sealeman, N. C. For the last 15 years he has been in the U. S. Army Reserve program as a Chaplain. Three years of this time he served on active duty with the 2nd Armored Division.

Constitution and By-Laws

PREAMBLE

We, the members of Missionary Baptist Churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the principles and rule of order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article I Name

The name of this body shall be the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

Article II Purpose

It shall be the purpose of the Association to cooperate with the State and Southern Baptist Conventions in the promotion of Christian Missions at home and abroad and in any other related activities.

jects such as evangelism, Christian Education, benevolent enterprises, and social services, which may develop proper and advisable for the furtherance of the Kingdom of God.

Article III Membership

Section 1: The association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist Churches in the area of the Association.

Section 2: Churches desiring membership in the Association shall apply to the Membership Committee. Application should include:

1. Formal action by the group seeking admission reflecting that 75% of those voting represent the desire to come under the watchcare of the Association.
2. A written statement reflecting their beliefs and practices.
3. A written statement that expresses their intent to cooperate.
4. A willingness to meet with the Membership Committee to discuss other items of mutual interest to both parties.

The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist faith and practice and what it means to cooperate with other churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. If recommended by this Committee and accepted by the Association, a mission or a church shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a minimum of one year. Membership within the Association shall be determined by vote of the Association at its annual meeting. Churches under the watchcare shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except their members shall not hold office *ex officio*.

Section 3: The Association shall be sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its Constitution and By-Laws. Member churches may also withdraw as they desire, and, if requested, the General Board may grant letters of recommendation to other like associations.

Article IV Meetings

Section 1: The Association shall meet annually on Tuesday and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October and continue until the business of the Association is disposed of.

Section 2: Special meetings may be called by the Moderator or General Board provided two weeks notice is given to the member churches.

Section 3: Each church shall elect annually, in addition to the pastor, two messengers to the meetings of the Association for each 50 members of the church, provided each church shall have not less than three nor more than ten messengers. These shall constitute the voting body of the Association. The names of messengers printed in the minutes shall include only those attending and registering at the Associational meeting.

Article V Authority

Each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches except as provided in this Constitution in Article III, Sections 2 and 3.

Article VI Officers and Their Election

Section 1: The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Music Director, Organist, Sunday School Director, Chairman of the Library Council, Baptist Youth For Christ Director, Youth and Family Services Director and Parliamentarian.

Section 2: The officers shall be elected on the morning of the last day of the annual meeting for a term of one year each. The nominees shall be contacted and nominated by the Committee on Nominations (By-Law IV, Section 5) except the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, WMJ Director and Brotherhood Director shall be nominated and contacted for acceptance by their respective organizations and presented by the Committee on Nominations with their report of nominees. Committee nominations shall not preclude nominations from the floor.

Section 3: The newly elected Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, shall assume at the close of the annual session all duties incumbent upon them relating to the work of the ensuing associational year. All other officers shall assume all duties incumbent upon them relating to the work of the ensuing year on the following January 1.

Section 4: Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election for two years.

Article VII Treasurers and Their Election

There shall be three Treasurers of the Association, one preferably a pastor, serving terms of three years each on a rotating basis. On nomination by the Committee on Nominations, one new trustee shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, no trustee being eligible to succeed himself until after the lapse of one year. The expiration date of each trustee's term of office shall appear by his name in the Associational Minutes.

Article VIII The General Board

The General Board shall be composed of all Associational Officers (Article VI, Section 1), the Associational Director of Missions (an office without voting privileges), each active pastor, two other members chosen by each member church from its membership and certified to the Association in its annual report, and chairmen of all standing committees of the Association. The General Board shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the constitution. It shall be the duty of the General Board to meet quarterly and to make reports and recommendations to the Association in its annual meeting. The quarterly meetings will be in October, January, April, and July, on Monday after the third Sunday.

Article IX Committees

Section 1: The Association shall have the following standing committees, with their terms of office being from the close of the annual meeting through the following annual meeting.

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the annual meeting:

- (1) Order of Business and Program Committee (By-Law IV, Section 1)
- (2) Executive Committee (By-Law IV, Section 2)
- (3) Evangelism Committee (By-Law IV, Section 3)
- (4) Finance Committee (By-Law IV, Section 4)
- (5) Ordination Committee (By-Law IV, Section 5)
- (6) Nominations Committee (By-Law IV, Section 6)
- (7) Constitution Committee (By-Law IV, Section 7)
- (8) Membership Committee (By-Law IV, Section 8)
- (9) Calendar Committee (By-Law IV, Section 9)
- (10) Resolutions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 10)
- (11) Historical Committee (By-Law IV, Section 11)
- (12) Seminary Extension Committee (By-Law IV, Section 12)
- (13) Christian Life Committee (By-Law IV, Section 13)
- (14) Youth and Family Services Committee (By-Law IV, Section 17)
- (15) Church Revitalization Committee (By-Law IV, Section 18)
- (16) Missions Committee (By-Law IV, Section 19)
- (17) South Mountain Camp Committee (By-Law IV, Section 20)
- (18) Recreation and Drama Committee (By-Law IV, Section 21)
- (19) Any other committee authorized by the Association.

B. To be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting, Committee on Committees, (By-Law IV, Section 14)

Section 2: The following committees shall be appointed by the Moderator at least thirty days prior to the annual meeting to serve during the annual meeting:

- (1) Enrollment Committee (By-Law IV, Section 16)

Amendments to this constitution may be made at any annual session of the Association upon a affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members present. Proposed changes must be presented to the Association on the first day and voted upon by a standing vote of the Association on the last day. It is recommended that all proposed changes first be submitted to the Constitution Committee.

By-Laws

By-Law I PARLIAMENTARY RULES

Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting its deliberative assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

By-Law II ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin October 1 and close September 30.

By-Law III DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1: The Moderator shall preside over the meeting of the body according to the Constitution and By-Laws, appoint Committees on Committees and Committee on Excessiveness. He shall be Chairman of the General Board and be an ex officio (without voting privileges) member of all other committees.

Section 2: The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure, of the Moderator, and shall be Vice-Chairman of the General Board.

Section 3: The Clerk-Treasurer shall send annual report forms to the member churches at least a month before the Association's annual meeting, distribute at the annual meeting copies of the digest of these reports, make up accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distributing of Minutes to the member churches, keep on file copies of Minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and shall also serve as Secretary of the General Board. He shall inform all persons elected to office or appointed to serve on committees of each action. He shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association, disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its General Board, or as designated in the Budget (no money is to be disbursed which is not included in the budget except upon recommendation of the Finance Committee to the General Board or the Association in Annual Session) render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the annual meeting and give a report at each quarterly General Board meeting and keep books available and open to the examination.

Section 4: The Auditor shall, at the close of the Association Year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records and report to the Association in session.

Section 5: The Historian shall collect and preserve historical data on the Association and its churches, and shall make a written report to each annual meeting of the Association.

Section 6: The Sunday School Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Sunday School Department. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to this committee that would promote this work.

The Associational Sunday School should assist church leaders to be more effective in their responsibility. This should include:

1. Provide opportunities for fellowship and inspiration.
2. Interpret the Sunday School program.
3. Train Sunday School leaders.
4. Consult with Sunday School leaders concerning their program.
5. Provide organization and leadership for cooperative work among the churches.

Section 7: The Church Training Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Church Training Department by the Executive Committee or the Association is carried out and that the on-going work of this department is maintained at all times.

Section 8: The Music Director shall provide music leadership for the Association in session and when requested at other times during the year. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meeting and offer creative plans to this Committee that would promote the work. He shall co-

coverage, music growth in the churches throughout the year and shall make a written report to the annual meeting.

Section 9: The Brotherhood Director shall cooperate with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of men and boys in the churches. This officer shall attend the Executive Committee meetings and offer creative plans to promote the development of men and boys and an awareness of world mission needs.

Section 10: The Woman's Missionary Union Director serves on the Executive Committee of the Association and works with the Director of Missions; leads the WMU Council; confers with other associational WMU officers and assists them in their work; leads in providing opportunities for leaders and members of church WMU's to have fellowship and to receive inspiration concerning their mutual mission tasks; leads in interpreting the WMU program to church leaders; leads in training church WMU leaders and members; consults with church leaders concerning initiation of WMU work and the improvement of existing work; provides at and plans for associational meetings; leads in associational WMU annual planning; leads in discovering mission action needs and in coordinating the work being done; and reports program of WMU work to the association and serves as contact between the association and state WMU.

Section 11: The chairman of the Library Council shall promote the beginning and maintenance of church libraries in the churches; provide training opportunities for church librarians; maintain and develop the associational library; attend the Executive Committee meetings; cooperate with the Director of Missions and make an annual written report to the association at its annual session.

Section 12: The Baptist Youth for Christ Director shall, under the supervision of the Director of Missions, guide and promote the youth activities of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association. Such activities may include:

1. Youth Council sessions
2. Bi-monthly Youth for Christ meetings in local churches
3. A Karon Crusade for Christ every 3 to 5 years
4. Mission Vacation Bible School and/or Backyard VBS
5. Sponsorship of a booth at Cleveland County Fair each October
6. Any other such activity which the Baptist Youth for Christ Director, Youth Council, Director of Missions, and Executive Committee of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association deems necessary to foster a positive Christian witness for Christ.

Section 13: The Youth and Family Services Director shall work under the Director of Missions in the building up of family life in the churches and in the community-at-large. He shall give attention to troubled young people. His major work will be in relation to the county juvenile courts in support of court counselors, youth and families. He shall enlist and supervise volunteer workers to support troubled youth and their families.

Section 14: The Parliamentarian shall, at the annual meeting of the Association, rule on all questions of parliamentary procedure which shall arise during the sessions. The Parliamentarian shall serve as a resource person to the churches and shall, upon request, advise and assist the churches on matters of parliamentary procedure.

Section 15: Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the General Board except the office of Moderator, in which case the Vice-Moderator shall automatically become Moderator.

By-Law IV DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1: The ORDER OF BUSINESS AND PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Clerk, and the Associational Music Director. It shall rotate the three members among the group of churches with the host churches being determined by the place of meeting among the group of churches with the host churches being determined by the place of meeting. It shall recommend the Presbyter and the alternates for the annual sessions. It shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on printed program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall, on the opening day of the annual meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and carry through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary. This Committee will be responsible for promoting the annual meeting through the various news media.

Section 2: THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

(1) Shall be composed of the Associational officers listed in Article VI, Section 1, of the Constitution along with the Chairman of the Evangelism and the Finance Committees. It shall work in unison with the Director of Missions in promoting the work of the Association, and lead and assist in

determining need for, beginning new mission stations, and organizing new churches.

(2) When without a Director of Missions, this Committee shall seek out and recommend to the Association, or its General Board, for election a new Director of Missions according to By Law VI, Section 11.

(3) It shall administer all matters referred to it by the Association or General Board and act in routine or emergency matters between meetings of the General Board. It shall initiate and recommend matters concerning business management, approve employment of all office personnel, deal with problems relating to personnel, and maintain adequate equipment for the office. It shall meet regularly, not less than quarterly, but a quorum of seven, be necessary to transact business.

Section 3: THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE, composed of 6 members, shall promote the work of Evangelism in the churches and the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the Association or its General Board.

The Committee shall assume the responsibility for coordinating the radio ministry, Revells for Revells, as a means of evangelizing the community. Churches shall be encouraged to contribute to this program through their budgets.

Section 4: THE FINANCE COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, with the Treasurer shall study the Association's financial needs of an adequate program, present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the annual meeting.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the Association, upon request, with the stewardship programs offered by the Convention.

The Committee shall express gratitude to the churches for their stewardship development that enables them to participate in local, home, and foreign missions.

Section 5: THE ORIENTATION COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, with the pastor of the candidate, Director of Missions, and/or deacons of the requesting church, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate for the Gospel Ministry.

The Chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place and procedure.

The Committee shall ask the candidate to share his conversion experience, his call to the ministry, and question him in the area of his beliefs, convictions and doctrine.

The candidate may ask questions of the Committee members regarding any area of the ministry that concerns him. The Committee may counsel the candidate.

It is suggested that the candidate be questioned at least two weeks prior to his ordination.

The Committee shall approve or disapprove the ordination of the candidate with written notice to the ordaining church.

The Committee should secure an Ordination Certificate for the candidate.

The Chairman of the Ordination Council should report its activities to the General Board quarterly and provide a written report for the annual meeting.

Section 6: THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE, composed of 6 members, shall contact before and nominate on the last day of the annual meeting of the Association the officers of the Association according to Articles VI and VII of the Constitution. This Committee shall also, in cooperation with the nominating committee of the various departments of work, recommend workers in these various departments except the WMU and Brotherhood organizations. The officers and workers of these respective organizations shall be nominated by the organizations themselves and submitted to the Nominating Committee. (Article VI, Section 1) It shall also nominate Associational Representatives for the various institutions and agencies of our convention and members of the General Board of our Baptist State Convention. This Committee shall also make the General Board in filling vacancies which occur between annual meetings of the Association. This Committee's nominations shall not preclude other nominations from the floor.

Section 7: THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed.

Section 8: THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws (Article III, Section 2). The Membership Committee should be sensitive to groups seeking its services and be willing to present a statement of Baptist faith and practice and what it means to cooperate with other churches in the Association in a world-wide mission program. The Membership Committee shall annually review all churches

and relations under the watchcare of the Association and may present them for membership within the Association or that they continue under the watchcare.

Section 9: THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following Associational Officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMU Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, and Vice-Moderator as chairman. This Committee shall work out as soon as possible each year an Associational Calendar for the coming year and present same to the General Board for adoption.

Section 10: THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation; plan and promote the work of the committee in an annual planning meeting; and present resolutions of appreciation to individuals, organizations, and churches when there are events worthy of commendation.

Section 11: THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Historian as chairman and 6 other members. It shall be the duty of the Historical Committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the Association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Associational meeting.

Section 12: THE SEMINARY EXTENSION COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, shall publicize the courses and programs that are available, and shall plan, provide and promote Seminary Extension studies as may be desired.

Section 13: THE CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMITTEE, composed of 6 members, will give constant attention to the moral climate of the community, and shall initiate necessary action to maintain and improve that climate. The Committee shall commend those persons and institutions that uphold Christian virtues, and shall support the churches in the teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness.

Section 14: THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES, composed of 3 members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution (Article IX, Section 1), and shall assist the General Board in filling vacancies in all other standing committees occurring between sessions. This committee shall also name the chairmen of such committees.

Section 15: THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members, shall receive or solicit invitations for the place or places of meeting for the next annual meeting of the Association, and shall recommend place or places. It shall also recommend the preacher and alternate for the annual sessions.

Section 16: THE ENROLLMENT COMMITTEE shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of the members at all of the sessions.

Section 17: THE YOUTH AND FAMILY SERVICES COMMITTEE, composed of 3 members shall assist the Youth and Family Services Director in coordinating the work in the Associational Youth and Family Services.

Section 18: THE CHURCH RECONCILIATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of the present Moderator, as chairman, two immediate past Moderators and two lay persons to be appointed annually by the above stated members. The chairman will report to the Executive Committee or the General Board the names of those lay persons appointed. This Committee will be open to any person or persons of a member church seeking assistance with problems related to their church.

Section 19: THE MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be made up of the following members: The Director of Missions shall be chairman, without voting privileges; Moderator; Vice-Moderator; Clerk-Treasurer; Finance Committee Chairman; Sunday School Director; Church Training Director; Brotherhood Director; WMU Director; and the President of the Pastors' Conference.

This Committee is to be available as a working board, to support the Director of Missions as a person (as well as an officer in the association), provide feed-back concerning Associational programs and activities, conveying suggestions from the Association, and offering support in preparing programs to Executive Committee and/or General Board. The Missions Committee has no authority other than to make recommendations to the Executive Committee or the General Board. The Missions Committee may be called together at the discretion of the chairman or determine its own meeting time and place.

Section 20: SOUTH MOUNTAIN CAMP COMMITTEE shall promote the camp program in the Association, attend the annual meeting of the camp, and be aware of needs and plans, cooperate with the Director of Missions.

Section 21: THE RECREATION AND DRAMA COMMITTEE shall promote a program of

Christian recreation and drama in the churches. The Committee shall regard recreation and drama as a means, not an end. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall use their programs as a way to teach, a means of witnessing and an avenue of expressing the abundant Christian life. The Recreation and Drama Committee shall be responsible to give assistance to any church that should request help in the area of recreation and drama. The Committee's responsibilities shall include fellowships, Senior Adults, Retreats, Crafts, Drama Workshops and other assignments the Association may ask them to undertake. The chairman of the Recreation and Drama Committee shall plan with the Director of Missions and give a report of the Committee's activities at the General Board quarterly meetings.

Section 22: Members of all these committees, except those appointed by the Moderator, shall be elected to serve not more than three years on a rotating basis.

By-Law V: TRUSTEES

The duty of the trustees shall be to hold in trust any property, money, endowment or other assets of said Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or its General Board.

By-Law VI: DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

Section 1: His selection shall be upon recommendation of the Executive Committee and in veto by the Association in its annual meeting, or between sessions of the Association, by its General Board. His term of office shall continue until terminated by mutual consent or request of either party. He shall be a member of all committees and organizations of the Association in a serving and advisory capacity.

By-Law VII: AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made at any session of the annual meeting by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

By-Law IV: DEFINE PROCEDURE

Section 1: The business session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Section 2: Every report, resolution, or amendment offered to the Association shall be submitted in writing if requested by the Moderator.

Section 3: No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject except by permission of the Association.

Section 4: Messengers present from half the churches shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5: Unless the Association decides otherwise, Annual Sessions shall be held on a rotating basis with a church or churches in each of the six Associational Groups as follows: Polkville, Latitudes, Shelby, Kings Mountain, Greer and Ware.

By-Law X: THE CONFESSION OF FAITH

The Baptist Faith and Message as revised and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in May 9, 1963.

Proceedings

First Baptist Church, Greer
Tuesday Evening, October 23, 1973

1. Mrs. E. T. Bailey, Associational Organist, presented an organ prelude as messengers and visitors gathered in First Baptist Church, Greer for the 125th Annual Session of Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

2. The meeting was called to order by Mr. Carlon Young, Moderator.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

Last April Woman's Missionary Union began an emphasis called TIME—Training in Mission Education. This is to be continued throughout 1975-76 with both leaders and members to be given special training. At each local church council meeting once during the quarter some part of a book relating WMU to our mission boards is to be reviewed. Also at group and general meetings there will be member training.

For the 1975-76 year particular attention is being given to Baptist Young Women because of the previous low enrollment of this age group. This effort is called "A Troupe."

During the past year we held our annual spring meeting at First Baptist Church in Grover with our WMC Council in charge of the program. "The Hope of Sand," a new film on the Cooperative Program, was shown. The Leadership Training Conference was held in September at the Kings Mountain Baptist Church with about 250 in attendance.

Age-group meetings were held by Baptist Women in February and July, Baptist Young Women in November and March, Actress in October and June, Girls in Action in April. The WMC Council has met quarterly for planning, and members of the Council have visited in many churches to teach mission studies, present programs and train leaders. A new WMC has been organized at Allen Memorial.

The WMC NEWS, quarterly mail-out, has been sent to pastors and all church WMC officers. At the state W. M. U. Convention in Charlotte in March, our organization was recognized as a Distinguished W. M. U., the highest recognition given on the Achievement Guide. While we are happy over accomplishments, we also realize how much there is to be done.

Six members of the Council attended part of WMC Conference at Ridgecrest, and eight attended special leadership training at Fruitland in August.

I have attended General Board, Liaison, Executive, and Long Range Planning Committee meetings regularly this year. As an outgrowth of Long Range findings, our Council plans to emphasize Mission Action with workshops being scheduled for January.

I am persuaded that the programs, the building additions, the new sanctuaries, the added new equipment, the baptisms, and all of the other tasks, well done, have been works of faith. We have planted, we have watered, we have cultivated and harvested in faith. This is what making history is all about. All of us have made some sort of history, some positive, some negative. Our Superintendent of Missions has made a tremendous chapter in our history with the monumental work he has done at home

Your history committee met sometime ago and set some goals for many works of faith for the new church year, this 125th anniversary year. They are as follows:

YOUTH AND FAMILY SERVICES REPORT

This past year has been one of the most effective in terms of service for our Youth and Family Services and I would like to highlight four specific areas.

I. THE COUNSELING SERVICE

- (1) Early in the year the judge of Juvenile Court began to write into their orders that certain youngsters and their families see members of the Youth and Family Services staff for counseling.
- (2) The Juvenile Counselor's office in the Law Enforcement Center began providing office space and secretarial help.
- (3) Referrals have come from the churches, from the Association office and from the medical community.
- (4) The staff has been 212 interviews this year which represents a four-fold increase over 1974.
- (5) In addition to Dr. Fred McGehee, who has pioneered this voluntary counseling service in our association, Reverend Dean Coffey, in January, and Dr. Bill McKinney, in September began to assist in this counseling.

II. THE VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

- (1) Volunteers from the churches have been used on occasions this year to provide needed services for young people such as dependable, compassionate friendship, tutoring and in other ways.
- (2) We have appreciated the willingness of others to serve and we hope to use them in the future.
- (3) In September a full-time volunteer coordinator was hired by the Juvenile Court.

III. OPENING OF THE CLEVELAND COUNTY GIRLS' HOME

- (1) In January and February this year Youth and Family Services worked to secure appropriate housing for a shelter and treatment center for girls ages 9-15 with behavioral problems.
- (2) A home was opened in March on Groves Street in Shelby, and we share in the treatment of the girls living there by seeing their families and through case conferences.
- (3) This home is in need of maintenance funds this year. We do appreciate Lattimore, Peeling Springs and Double Mountain Churches for including the Home in their 1975-76 church budgets, and we hope that other churches will share with us.

IV. SPEAKING ENGAGEMENTS AND CONSULTATIONS

- (1) Although the work of Youth and Family Services is more a program of listening than of speaking, we have participated in two family life conferences, brotherhood meetings and two lectures at Gardner-Webb College.
- (2) In September we met with leaders of the County, Social Services and Gaston Association to assist them in launching a program similar to the program in our Association.

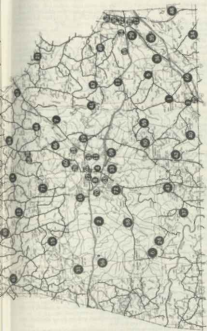

ASSOCIATION DEPARTS TO SERVE
AND CELEBRATE A LIVING LORD!

BY-LAWS FOR ASSOCIATIONAL W. M. U.

ARTICLE I NAME. The name of this organization shall be Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II OBJECT. The object shall be to promote Christian missions through the organizations of Woman's Missionary Union in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE III RELATIONSHIPS.

Section 1. Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to Kings Mountain Baptist Association, shall be the latest organization between church organizations and the North Carolina Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 2. This associational Union shall recognize the autonomy of church organizations as provided in the Baptist democratic process of operation.

Section 3. Church organizations shall be recognized as units through which the object of this Woman's Missionary Union is accomplished, each responsible for its own program, and contributing to the work of the association.

Section 4. This associational Union shall be guided in its plan of work by the Associational WMU Achievement Guide.

ARTICLE IV MEMBERS. The members of Woman's Missionary Union organizations in the churches and missions of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association shall constitute the membership.

ARTICLE V OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers shall be a Director, Assistant Director, Secretary-Treasurer, Baptist Women's Director, Assistant Baptist Women's Director, Baptist Young Women's Director, Assistant Baptist Young Women's Director, Action Director, Assistant Action Director, Girls in Action Director, Assistant Girls in Action Director, Mission Friends Director, Assistant Mission Friends Director and others as needed. These officers shall be elected annually in a meeting of the associational WMU and shall hold office for one year or until their successors are elected. The terms of office shall be five consecutive years.

Section 2. These officers shall perform the duties set out for them in these By-Laws and the "Woman's Missionary Union Work in the Association."

ARTICLE VI NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

Section 1. The Nominating Committee, composed of six women, shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee, and elected by the associational WMU to serve one year.

Section 2. The Nominating Committee shall nominate officers and age group directors and assistants. Other nominations may be made from the floor.

Section 3. The Nominating Committee, in event of a vacancy, shall present a nominee for the

assigned term for election by the associational WMU Council.

ARTICLE VII: MEETINGS.

Section 1. Day and/or night associational WMU meetings shall be held annually.

Section 2. Other meetings shall be held as authorized by the WMU Council.

ARTICLE VIII: W. M. U. COUNCIL.

Section 1. The WMU Council shall be composed of the officers, age group directors and any others desired.

Section 2. The WMU Council shall schedule the regular meetings of the organizations, plan the program of activities, hear reports, and check progress on the Achievement Guide.

Section 3. Regular meetings of the WMU Council shall be held quarterly, or as needed.

ARTICLE IX: COMMITTEES.

Section 1. There shall be committees, standing or special, as needed.

Section 2. Committees, except those otherwise provided for, shall be appointed by the Director.

Section 3. The Director shall be an ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.

Section 4. The duties of these committees are such as are set forth in these By-Laws and "Woman's Missionary Union Work in the Association."

ARTICLE X: FINANCES.

Section 1. The associational WMU shall adopt an annual budget, funds to be allocated from the associational budget.

ARTICLE XI: PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY. The rules contained in Robert's RULES OF ORDER, REVISED shall govern the Union in all cases to which they are applicable.

ARTICLE XII: AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the associational WMU, provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous meeting.

GARDNER WEBB COLLEGE

Gardner-Webb College is enjoying the beginning of the seventeenth year as a school. From 1905 to 1928 the school served students through the high school curriculum. From 1928 to 1971 two years of college studies were added. In 1971 Gardner-Webb College became a fully accredited Senior College. Gardner-Webb is also a member of the North Carolina Association of Colleges and Universities.

It is with joy and pride that the College is a part of the Baptist Family of North Carolina. The Cooperative Program is the life-line of the schools as well as missions around the world. The school keeps striving for excellence as an academic institution. The entire educational program works toward the fulfillment of the stated Purpose—"To develop quality Christian students who will think for themselves and who will dedicate themselves to the Christian way of life in the vocation of their own choice."

Currently there are approximately 1,400 students led by a dedicated faculty and staff of 140 people. The students and their teachers are striving daily to find God's will for their lives and preparing to carry out God's will.

Gardner-Webb College lost one of her most faithful Board members during the past year, Mr. T. R. Hendrix, Sr. of High Point. Mr. Hendrix had served on the Board for three full terms. At his death he was serving as Vice-Chairman of the Board. His influence will live on and on.

The present debt of Gardner-Webb College is \$1,410,641. It is being amortized monthly. The current Budget is \$3,909,625. The College is in sound financial condition. However, with inflation running high, there must be greater care in buying and spending. Again, the College expresses genuine gratitude to the Baptists of North Carolina for their generous support and for their prayers.

At the present time there are 302 students studying for full-time Christian service. There are 14 students who served in some capacity of Christian work during the past summer in eleven States.

Gardner-Webb College continues to give two year programs in Nursing, Data Processing, and

Secretarial Sciences. The College has a joint four-year program with The Bowman Gray School of Medicine in Medical Technology.

The school year 1975-1976 should be a successful one.

SOUTH MOUNTAIN BAPTIST CAMP 1975 REPORT THEME: "LOVE IN ACTION"

Thanks to God for another year of victories at South Mountain Baptist Camp. As we discussed our theme, led in worship, studied about the needs of a lost world, and prayed about God's plan for our lives, the Holy Spirit moved with great power.

We had over 4,000 in attendance this summer, including those who came as special groups. In addition, we had approximately 1,000 visitors attending the various services at SMBC. This year we had an average of 236 campers per week for the eleven encampments that were held, which included 265 from your association. Of these 4,000 campers, the Holy Spirit inspired 1,440 of them to make some kind of decision, including 407 professions of faith. Praise the Lord! We were thrilled also to prevent hundreds of sin and heart camper arrests.

Our chapel was completed enough so that we were able to use it all summer and it was a great help to us in conducting our services. We are eternally grateful to the many churches and individuals who helped us financially and with free labor, equipment and materials. Several memorial contributions were also given, which were a great help.

To date, we have spent approximately \$45,000 on the chapel, of which we still owe \$8,000. It is estimated that it will take around \$5,000 more to completely finish this project. We need fifty more churches to include the camp in their budget so that this \$13,000 can be taken care of. We also need improvements in other areas. Some churches are assuming the responsibility of improving and maintaining a cabin. Maybe your church would like to do this. We also need a storage-workshop building about 30' by 40'.

Please remember that the camp is available for church picnics, day camps, and retreats during the fall and early spring. Also, the camp is becoming more popular each year and, because of this, I urge you to make your reservations early next year so you will not be left out.

1975 ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT

Agency Board of the Southern Baptist Convention

The Southern Baptist Convention Agency Board serves as a lifeline of support for 10,034 retired pastors and other church-related workers or their widows.

During 1974, the Board paid about \$15 1/2 million in retirement and other protection benefits to these annuitants. In the Board's 57-year history, it has paid a total of over \$125 million in retirement and protection benefits.

The Agency Board also holds in trust and invests retirement contributions from 38,000 pastors, other church staff and denominational employees—which will be converted into annuity benefits when they retire.

These funds held in trust amount to a record \$353,443,743. While this seems a large amount of money, it needs to be noted that this must be divided by the number of future annuitants it will serve for the remainder of their lifetimes after retirement.

The Agency Board would have enjoyed its best year ever in 1974, but the stock market's downturn intervened. Realized and unrealized losses in income from bonds, short-term investments, and common stocks amounted to \$21 million.

Gains in other investments reduced the net loss to \$11.5 million, or three per cent based on average investments. All investment funds, whether church-related or having other connections,

suffered from the stock market decline.

As the stock market began to recover in early 1973, the losses also began to be recovered, Board President David H. Morgan said.

In December, 1974, the Board issued a 13th Check to annuitants. It amounted to more than \$675,000 and was equal to one month's benefits. It is called a 13th Check because it is issued above and beyond the 12 regular monthly benefit checks distributed to annuitants.

Each association is encouraged to plan a Simultaneous Revival among the churches during the spring (March or April) of 1976. If you do not have a Simultaneous Revival, every Baptist church is urged to plan a dynamic revival effort in the spring of 1976.

The continuing response of youth and adults to Lay Evangelism Schools has been significant. In the past 3 1/2 years, 12,774 youth and adults have shared in this lay witness training from 1,007 churches and 53 associations. Also, 107 pastors from nine other associations have participated in Pastor's Retreats dealing with Lay Evangelism Schools. Five other associations have planned Lay Evangelism Schools during the fall of 1975.

"BE RECONCILED TO GOD AND MAN" was the theme of the 28th Statewide Evangelism Conference at War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, February 3-5, 1975. Over 2,400 pastors and lay persons heard excellent speakers emphasize various phases of evangelism.

Youth Ministries Week was held at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly during June 9-13 for 520 youth and adults with the emphasis on evangelism, vocational guidance, and recreation.

About 14,000 youth, pastors, and adult leaders will attend the 1st Statewide Youth Evangelism Night—August 15—at the Greensboro Coliseum. Dr. Bill Self, Atlanta, Georgia, is the guest speaker, and Bill and Linda Cates are the guest musicians. Christian youth continue to share a strong witness for Jesus Christ across our state.

The Division of Evangelism is cooperating with the Brotherhood Department in Lay Renewal Weekends and Renewal Evangelism.

Let us rejoice in the leadership of the Holy Spirit in wonderful revival meetings, city-wide crusades, and evangelism clinics during the past year.

The 30th Statewide Evangelism Conference will be at the Civic Center Auditorium, Asheville, during February 2-4, 1976.

Remember to pray daily for the work of evangelism in all the churches of our state, nation, and world.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT TO ASSOCIATIONS 1975

There have been many significant developments, in several different areas, at your Baptist Hospital during the past year.

By the time this report is read the new ambulatory care unit will be open, making possible enlarged and improved services for the Emergency Room, Outpatient Clinic, Physical Therapy and other departments. Renovation of the West Wing will be complete and renovation on the South Wing will begin in early August. The third floor of the Progressive Care Unit has been remodeled to provide 26 beds, therapy rooms and other improved facilities for Psychiatric services.

The long-awaited EMI scanner is now in use and is already proving beneficial in detecting blood clots, tumors, strokes and other abnormalities of the brain.

A Family Practice Center opened July 1, 1975 to offer more primary medical care for patients and also to provide specialized training for physicians who choose to enter Family Practice.

During the year the hospital had its biennial review by the Joint Commission on Hospital Accreditation. All areas of operation received an excellent report, but physician services, nursing services and administration all received especially high commendation.

Despite the continued rise in costs for services and materials the hospital has been able to operate in the black. The administration and department heads confer frequently and make diligent effort to see that the hospital operates as efficiently and economically as possible.

Gifts from the Baptist churches have been very gratifying. During the calendar year of 1974 the hospital received \$250,000 through the Cooperative Program and \$292,000 through the Mother's Day Offering. Hospital staff members have participated in Cooperative Program promotion in cooperation with the State Convention Division of Stewardship and Cooperative Program Promotion.

The Department of Pastoral Care has opened a counseling center in Raleigh, its second satellite center. Plans are developing for a third satellite in the western part of the state. The Department has established a scholarship fund as a memorial to Dr. Richard K. Young, the department's first director, who died December 31. Full re-accreditation was given the School of Pastoral Care in December by the Association of Clinical Pastoral Education.

During the past year Mr. Reid T. Holmes retired as President of the hospital, after serving in the hospital administration for 29 years.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INCORPORATED

Christian child care provided by the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina is a cooperative mission. It was through the life, teaching and ministry of Christ and under the leadership of the Holy Spirit that North Carolina Baptists launched their child care ministry 90 years ago. Today it is recognized as one of the outstanding ministries of its kind in the nation.

The lives of more than 3,700 people were affected in a significant way through the services of the Homes during the past year. Daily care and related services were provided 1,524 children. Of this number, 1,061 were in continuing programs while 463 received casework, counseling, and referral services. While we were caring for the children, a close working relationship was maintained with 2,178 adults in an effort to reestablish homes and strengthen family relationships.

New and exciting developments are in progress throughout the state. During the past year emergency shelters were opened in Charlotte and Forest City to meet the needs of children requiring immediate assistance. Both Brookhill Home and Mills Home will have a new wing for children constructed during the next year. Progress is being made to expand facilities at Odum Home, increasing numbers of facilities are opening hearts and homes for the care of foster children. All of these indicate a living, vital and growing ministry to people.

The award winning film, "The Mountain Within," speaks with praise and appreciation wherever it is shown. It will continue to be available by request, either to the Communications Department of the Baptist State Convention or to the Children's Homes.

A cooperative mission requires that the parties involved have a clear, common purpose to which they are firmly committed, undergirded by mutual trust, and clear communications. These three factors characterize the relationships between the Baptists of North Carolina and their Children's Homes. Through the Cooperative Program and the Thanksgiving Offering, Baptists throughout the state can share a commitment to Christian child care. In response, the staff of the Children's Homes is committed to translate this support into a dynamic ministry of love and concern for children and families in need. With God's continued blessing we will move together to fulfill our mission.

1975 BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS

Baptist state papers claimed more attention than usual at the 1975 meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Miami Beach this year. In the celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the Cooperative Program, it was revealed that they had played a tremendous part in the growth of our denomination. Louis D. Newton, denominational statesman and former editor of Georgia's CHRISTIAN INDEX, introduced all the 33 editors of state papers and made a comparison of circulation of such in 1975 with that of 1925 when the Cooperative Program was born. Many were not in existence at that time, however, but this in itself reveals something of Southern Baptist growth.

In giving a special committee report on state papers, B. Franklin Paschall, pastor of First Church, Nashville, Tenn., reported that present circulation is 1,514 million and recommended that the convention reaffirm its goal of getting a state paper into two million Baptist homes by 1980. The committee recommended a vigorous campaign in all states to help accomplish this, and also recommended that state papers be incorporated in all local church budgets.

The BIBLICAL RECORDER is one of those 33 state papers, and one of the oldest, and we hope, one of the best. In spite of continued problems for religious publications because of inflation, and skyrocketing postage costs, the circulation of the RECORDER remains above 112,000. Congregations including it in their budgets for all their families are the ones which have an informed membership. It is our hope that North Carolina Churches will take seriously the recommendation reaffirmed at the Southern Baptist Convention that state papers be incorporated in local church budgets for all their member families. Already more than 1,000 churches in North Carolina are doing this, and more congregations do so each year. Pastors and deacons should initiate such action, and it should be supported by all the organizations in the church.

The BIBLICAL RECORDER has covered many sensitive issues this past year. Words of appreciation have come from Baptist people all across the state, but they are aware that "an informed people is the backbone of Baptist democracy."

The RECORDER continues to operate on a limited budget, and with an altogether too small staff. Local churches can help us by understanding these limitations, and by renewing their subscription plans promptly.

Ray K. Hodge, pastor of First Church, Kinston, wrote "One of the easiest tasks I have had as a pastor is to lead churches to include and keep the denominational paper in the church budget. It is such a bargain that trying to save a few dollars (by not subscribing to it for our families) is too costly. It would be like saving the expense of regular visits to the dentist, only to pay more in various ways later."

His advice is well taken.

N. C. BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

There has never been a year in the history of your Baptist Homes where more people have sought the services of the Homes. This has been true particularly of the aging sick persons. Almost daily calls come from elder persons, and their families, inquiring about admission to one of your five resident Homes and the Skilled Nursing Care Facility of the Homes.

Today there are some 21,000,000 Americans 65 and above, and this number, it is anticipated, will grow by over 100,000 a year in the years ahead. The needs of aging people are overwhelming, and we must strive diligently to meet those needs.

Although we can minister to our North Carolina Baptist Homes to only 250 persons at any given time, we have served hundreds of aging people through the twenty-four years that we have been on the scene at Southaven, the Haven Home, and the Nursing Care Unit, in Winston-Salem, and in our Homes at Albemarle, Hamilton, and Yanceyville. As God continues to bless us and lead us, we will make every effort to expand our ministry and to reach out and help as many elder persons as possible in the years ahead. We can do this only by the grace of the Lord and by the increased concern and giving of our Baptist people.

Gifts for 1974-75 from our Baptist Churches, through the Cooperative Program and through the 3rd Sunday of February Offering for the Homes, reflect a very encouraging increase. This is great, and we are grateful especially since here out of every five persons who live in our Homes depend upon these love gifts for their care! Your love gift is a life-line to these deserving older persons, and they could not be cared for in the majority of cases, if it were not for you.

Signs on the horizon indicate that we will need greater financial support for our Homes for the Aging from our Baptist people than ever before.

The most exciting development in the family of your Baptist Homes for the past year has been the experience of obtaining one of the most beautiful locations in the Blue Ridge mountains of North Carolina for the proposed Western North Carolina Baptist Home. This site is a twenty-one acre tract of land overlooking the city of Asheville, better known as the Pearson Estate, on Richmond Hill, in Northwest Asheville. God Himself, we feel, has guided us in discovering this beautiful site.

Plans are in the making now to raise \$1,000,000 for the construction of this new proposed Western North Carolina Baptist Home. These plans initially will include 50 rooms for residents, with living rooms, dining rooms, library, chapel and activities rooms, and other necessary rooms. With the completion of this Home, North Carolina Baptists will be enlarging their base of ministry to almost 300 persons, and older people from Western North Carolina will have a facility to serve the hundreds in their area who will need the service of this lovely facility now and in the years to come.

Pray for the ministry of your Baptist Homes for the Aging. Give as liberally as possible that the overwhelming needs of older people in our midst might be met more adequately. Visit the Homes and see first-hand the personal joy that your gifts bring. Know that your ministry to even one of these dear older people is a ministry to unto Christ Himself.

THE CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE

The Director of The Christian Action League, and our new President, Bill Wallace, wish to express deepest appreciation to the many friends and supporters of the work of the League in _____ ASSOCIATION. Our program depends upon you for its success. You provide the money, you furnish the prayer support, and you furnish the "clout" which the League has in its efforts.

With trustees and friends and supporters in every Association in the State, we have a broad base of support. As we do the work of God in North Carolina, we are so very conscious of our dependency upon Him and for the wonderful way in which you have supplied our needs.

The General Assembly has been in session this year. A bill was introduced by Representative Dan Lilly of Kinston to close every beer joint in North Carolina at midnight. Under the present law these places can stay open until 2:30 in the morning from the last Sunday in April through the last Sunday in October. The bill failed to receive enough support in the House ABC Committee to pass.

A bill was introduced by Representative Bruce Love of Sanford to strengthen the state-wide statute regulating the flow of pornography. This proposed change would have given the District Solicitor discretionary power in the matter of the advisory hearing, and would have defined hardcore pornography in the Public Nuisance Section of the Law. This bill also failed to get the nod of the House Judiciary One Committee. We will be back in a later session with both of these concerns.

We continue to need your support. The most dependable thing to do is to place the Christian Action League in the budget of your church for a definite amount each month. As you do this, we will continue to be able to serve.

The League will be promoting Abolitionism Awareness Sunday in January and Highway Safety Sunday in August. Your support of these two efforts will help to save the lives of multitudes of innocent people in North Carolina. God created human life and thereby made it sacred. We are to recognize the sacredness of human life and seek to preserve it for God in every way that is possible.

Of equal significance in reaching students, however, will be the work of pastors, Sunday School teachers and other committed Christians in the churches from which these persons come. It is our hope to work together in a number of ways during the coming year to strengthen each other and seek even more effective ways of service.

THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. REPORT 1975

As revealed through a Sunday School lesson during the past year, a good foundation of discipline and training in Spiritual matters is necessary for a young life to develop in a way to withstand the pressures of life during periods of stress and strain. It is almost true to refer to the need of a good base or foundation for any activity or project contemplated in this life. Not in anyway is there a difference for a need of the Foundation, as thought of in terms of the Baptist Foundation, when we consider the future potentialities and needs to sustain and expand mission efforts and services to bring mankind into the influence of the saving grace of God's Son, Jesus Christ.

Chartered in 1919 by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc. has sought to assist individuals throughout the state in their estate planning, providing ways to support Baptist institutions and mission work on a permanent basis. Property and funds placed with the Baptist Foundation are invested by a conservator elected board of directors with the income paid annually to the institution or mission cause designated by the donor.

Individual assistance is provided Baptists throughout the state in the establishment of trusts that not only benefit the donor but also support the Christian activities of our denomination in a lasting, perpetual way.

During the past two years, \$256,070.41 has been given to the N. C. Baptist Foundation, Inc., in the way of annuity trusts. In this type trust, the donors reserve the right to the income from the investments for their lifetime and then the income will be paid to the Baptist cause specified in the original trust agreement. The line of our land provide to the donor certain tax advantages for the gift portion of these transactions.

We still account for a major portion of the funds held in trust by the Foundation. One such gift to benefit mission work from this year forward, came in the form of a farm and other assets given by the deceased. It was determined by the tax records found in this estate, that this person will give annually three times as much for missions through the income from this trust fund, as she was ever able to earn in total wages during any year of her lifetime. So what she could not do for our Lord's work here on earth in her lifetime, she does after her life here among us has ended.

New gifts to be held in trust by the N. C. Baptist Foundation amounted to \$635,879.37 during 1974-75 fiscal year. Added to the market value of assets held from previous years being the total value to \$2,331,359.67 as of June 30, 1975. Income from all assets held by the Foundation which have been or will be distributed to designated beneficiaries in the near future amounted to \$76,357.62 for the past 12 months.

1975 STEWARDSHIP AND COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

The faithful stewardship of individual Christians and the missionary vision of our churches, expressed through their support of the Cooperative Program enables Southern Baptists to maintain a growing World Missions Program at a time when many others are having to reduce their outreach.

To celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Cooperative Program let us commit ourselves to do four things:

1. Each church increase its gifts to the Cooperative Program by 15% or more.
2. Pray for your home and foreign missionaries at each service in your church during October.
3. Contribute through the Cooperative Program every month.
4. Have a stewardship workshop in the Association.
